CONSIDER THE PIG.

The Hog Produces Meat Quickly and at Low Cost For Feed.

As a champion of the pig in its ability to produce meat quickly and at a low cost the New York College of Agriculture points out the hog's value in the present emergency. The college says that as a consumer of waste products and low grade feed the pig has no equal and that there should be at least one brood sow on every New York

Pigs make good use of food, producing a pound of gain from each four or five pounds of dry matter in their feed, while fattening cattle are said to require ten to twelve pounds of dry matter for each pound gain in weight. An. other advantage claimed for the pig is his ability to fit into intensive agriculture, occupy a small space if necessary and utilize products that otherwise would have no value. The products of the hog lend themselves readily to preservation in the home and may be held indefinitely. Pigs yield from 70 to 80 per cent of their live weight when dressed compared to only 55 to 65 per cent in the carcase of a steer. Many village and suburban homes, it is said could profitably keep a pig.

ONCE NEARLY CAUSED A WAR.

After the Crimean Treaty of Peace the Question of Its Control Brought England and Russia to the Very Verge of Renewed Hostilities.

Less than thirty miles east of Sulina. the second important Black sea port of Roumania after Constanza, is the tiny Island of Serpents, around which cling many fantastic legends of fascinating interest as well as several historical episodes which at one time threatened to become of international moment, says the National Geographic society bulletin,

Unlike the monotonous reaches of reed covered marshland which stretch for fifty miles along the Roumanian and Russian shores to the north and south of the Sulina mouth of the Danube and seldom attaining an elevation of more than two feet above the level of the Black sea, the Island of Serpents, or Fido-nisi, thrusts its precipitous cliffs above the water to heights ranging from fifty to a hundred feet. It is a mere fleck of rock in a sea whose depth a few yards from the shore is twenty fathoms.

The islet is scarcely more than a mile in circumference, but has been a beacon guiding ships to the Danube for many centuries, its elevation being in such striking contrast to the delta land

In ancient times Fido Nisi had a variety of names, but Grecian poets and as Leuce, or the White island, on account of the numerous sea fowl which over its cliffs.

It was to this island that Thetis, the marine goddess, is supposed to have arried the ashes of her son, Achilles hence the temple erected here in honor of the hero of the Trojan war. An other legend relates that Thetis snatchthat thereafter he lived on the island with Iphigenia, the daughter of Agamemnon, who had been saved from sacrifice by the goddess Artemis.

One of the most poetic descriptions of the island and its temple is given by Arrian in the account of his voyage around the Black sea in the second century of the Christian era, He

The island was not mentioned in the terms of the treaty, and when Turkey sent a small party to relight the lighthouse, which had been dark through the struggle of 1853-6, Russia attempted to take control of the beacon which stands as a guidepost to the Danube's mouth. England protested and sent a fleet across the Black sea to enforce her demands in behalf of her then recent ally, the sultan. Russia after a brief threat of resist-



Potatoes and Alfalfu.

For sections where early potatoes succeed the Ohio experiment station recommends this crop as one of the best to precede alfalfa, since the land is usually well fertilized and manured. and frequent cultivation kills nearly all weeds before alfalfa is seeded. The polatoes can be harvested for late July and early August alfalfa seedings, and a good seedbed can be prepared merely by disking and harrowing. Such midsummer seedings of alfalfa have been found by the experiment station more satisfactory than spring seedings in oats or barley.

Grow Two Crops.

Get at least two crops from most of the garden space. Onlons set for green onlons should be followed with celery; early cabbages with late cucumbers; early potatoes with sweet corn, celery, reans, turnips or spinach; peas with late cabbage, carrots or beets; lettuce and spinach with beans, cabbage, celChest Expansion.

Applying Manure.

If manure has not been re-enforced with acid phosphate or rock phosphate. acid phosphate or bonemeal should accompany its application to the land. Fifty pounds of acid phosphate or 100 pounds of rock phosphate should be used to treat a ton of manure. A ton of manure thus treated will give fully twice the returns as a ton of untreated manure. It is well to keep in mind also that the maximum returns per ton of manure are secured with a light application. For the most economic returns with grain, manure should be spread on the field uniformly.-Pennsylvania Agricultural College.

Tame the Sheep Flock.

The safety of the flock may be greatly insured by calling up the sheep every night and shutting them into a tight fold. They soon get the habit and are also more docile the year around. A flock of sheep cannot be made too tame. A wild flock is of less value and makes less growth and shorter fleeces than a quiet one - Farm Journal
