Wanted? O blind of heart, you wrote it wasted. The loyalty, the courage and the pride; May, you, who could but pity and desire.

SCOUTS STEADY IN SCHOOL

That all boys should do their best school work in these war times is the necessary caution of Commissioner of Education P. P. Claxton, as follows: "With the hearty approval of the president, the department of the interior is carrying on through the bureau of education a nation-wide campaign for the maintenance of our schools and of other agencies of education as nearly as possible at their full efficiency in work and in attendance during the war."

"I am therefore appealing to you for help, first, in bringing it about that all scout boys, or as nearly all of them as possible, shall enter school promptly, attend regularly, and work hard; and second, in getting the help of all scout boys in inducing other boys to do the same."

SCOUT SAVES GIRL'S LIFE

The fact that Grace Ohler, aged eight, is alive in Seton hospital in Cincinnati is a tribute, physicians say, to boy scout training.

The Ohler girl while carrying a jar of gasoline, broke it and severed an artery in her arm. An effort to summon seven physicians in the neighborhood was futile.

With blood streaming from the wound, the girl called young Smith from his home. Utilizing his boy scout training, he applied a double tourniquet. A boy friend then drove the girl and the boy scout to Seton hospital in his auto in ten minutes. There the severed artery was closed.

SCOUT GUARDS ARE PRAISED

Almost everyone in this country has heard of the coast watching work of English scouts. They have often received official recognition.

Vice Admiral Sir Cecil Thursby, on handing over his appointment as admiral commanding coastguard and reserves, to Vice Admiral Sir Dudley de Chair, acknowledged the valuable assistance rendered by sea scouts employed on coastwatching, and is impressed by their smartness, intelligence, and keenness in carrying out their important duties.

SCOUTS RESCUE CANOEISTS

The members of Troop No. 91 of Manhattan rescued two canoeists from drowning in the Hudson river. The scouts were in a motorboat. The scoutmaster, Father Coogan, who is also a police chaplain, was in charge of the boat. Sixteen first and second class scouts were aboard.

A mile away, one of the scouts discovered a distress signal. A canoe paddle was waved at intervals by some one in the water. The scouts soon effected a rescue.

Because of his price guarantee of \$2.25 a bushel Uncle Sam stands to lose from 50 cents to a dollar on every bushel of wheat harvested this year. Having made this guarantee to the farmer he will make it good. That is Uncle Sam's way.

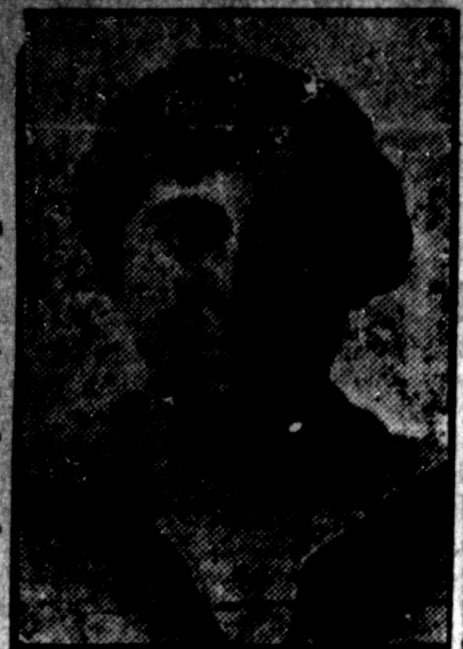

Sugar Bowl Safeguarded

In all western states the sugar industry has been made safe for 1919 by a largely increased acreage.

A few co-operative sugar factories are being promoted but on the whole beet growing as a regular farm crop is stimulated. Two years ago an unwise agitation among the growers held up signing contracts until it was too late and wheat was sown on large beet areas. With the sugar market stabilized by after war conditions and the need of an enormous export, factories will still turn out enough for our use. Consumption will be larger than ever at fair prices, the increased use of confectionary following decreased use of alcohol being a factor.—The Manufacturer.

Sheep and Wool Production

The department of agriculture and state farm bureaus are doing a great constructive work in getting thousands of small flocks established.

The tide has been turned in domestic sheep and wool production and from a decline of millions of sheep we may now see constant increase.

Enabling the wool producer to consign his clip direct to a warehouse where government standards of grading are established

was a big step.

It put a premium on the flock master grading up flocks as the finer and longer wool sheep brought him greater returns on his wool clip.

Of course, there will have to be some restrictions on dumping the low grade wools of South America and Australia on the American markets. But taking all that the Federal government and the states are doing the wool industry is being pretty well stabilized and production can be increased.—The Manufacturer.
