

MADE OCCASION FOR FESTIVAL Travelers in Northern Russia Fittingly Celebrate the Crossing of the Arctic Circle



Four alien enemies have caused the people of this country two-thirds as estimated at \$200,000,000 annually and by the latter at \$300,000,000 annually.

The chief alien enemies are the house mouse and three kinds of rats. The introduced European hare is also proving injurious in some localities. The natives are the more than 750 kinds of rodents that inhabit this con-

Now, all of the 750 are, or may become, depredators, though many of them are only mildly and occasionally so, as is shown by the fact that together they accomplish only one and one-half times the damage caused by the four alien rodent pests. For the aliens are in practically every house, every barn, every mill, every elevator, every storehouse, over most of the country, while the natives run largely in the fields, ranges and woods.

Native Rodent Bad, Too.

Some of our native rodents are very bad citizens-such as the prairie dog. the pocket gopher, the ground squirrel. Even that ancient rival of the weather bureau, the groundhog, sometimes causes great damage, crunching corn like a litter of shotes or mowing down alfalfa or soy beans like a herd of steers. Against all these, unremitting or at least such occasional warfare as is necessary to hold them in check.

as destructive-the skunk, the weasel, the mink, the fox, and the badger These are among the most potent natural agents, says the United States department of agriculture, in preventing an undue increase in mice, rats, ground squirrels, pocket gophers, and the like. Some of these have been hunted, of course, for their valuable pelts, but they are hunted also beof domestic animals and game. Cog- correspondence on the subject.

Prepared by the United States Depart- i nizance has not been taken of the fact that many of these small native animals destroy numerous injurious rodents and are thus an asset to the country. An occasional skunk, mink or fox does commit depredations in the poultry yard, but that is merely a case of an individual gone wrong, and punitive measures should be directed against the individual and not against the species. They are also in many places very destructive to game and are then destroyed as vermin.

Natural Enemies That Help.

The natural enemies of the rodents may do a great deal toward protecting the farmer, but they cannot always, of course, do enough. The skunks, minks, weasels and foxes will get a good many of the rats and mice in the fieldsand even around the barn, but they cannot be expected to make a clean-up even there and, of course, they can accomplish nothing against rats and. mice in the house, mill or store. There artificial means have to be employed.

Guillotine 'Trap Is Best. The United States department of agriculture, through the bureau of biolegical survey, has devoted a great deal of study to methods of rodent control. Polson has been found the most potent weapon against such rodents as live in the open, but as a rule it cannot be employed in houses where people live or work. APPEARANCE COUNTS IN SELLING PRODUCE

Anything but High-Grade Material Should Be Avoided.

It Should Be Uniform in Size, Color and Quality and Packed So That Contents and Container Will Carry Well.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

It has been shown that the consumer cannot expect to receive produce by parcel post at a price much lower than the local retail price. The producer's appeal to customers, therefore, is largely through the quality and appearance of his produce. The consumer has come to expect a uniform product and will not be satisfied with a shipment of miscellaneous ungraded produce. As the sending of anything but high-grade material will result in failure to retain trade, and as many persons have discontinued ordering produce by parcel post because they received one shipment that was unsatisfactory in quality, it is better for a producer to reject an order than to send such goods. The produce should be uniform in size, color, and quality, and should be packed so that the contents and container will carry properly and arrive in good condition.

Quality is very important, but probably more produce is judged by appearance than by quality. Some farmers are prone to think of the likes and dislikes of the purchaser as whims and fancies, whereas, as a business principle, he should endeavor to cater to the desires of his customers. It is known that white eggs sell better in New York, while brown eggs bring a premium in Boston. The average farmer cares little whether eggs are white or brown, but this indifference should not govern what he sends to

Hines, director general of railroads, asking that this practice be stopped at once.

The county commissioners of Co fax ounty in response to the request of a umerously signed petition at their reent meeting decided to appoint a board which will have charge of hortiultural development. Members named are George H. Webster of Cimarron. Frank Van Buskirk of Raton and L. I. Taylor of Springer, each prominent in the fruit business. They will have power to appoint inspectors to look after the orchards.

House bill 97, authorizing the construction of a highway between Albuquerque and Farmington has been passed by the Senate. Senator Chrisman pointed out that in addition to connecting three county seats and giving the San Juan valleys direct connection with the rest of New Mexico, the road will serve about 5,000 people in the Jemez region, besides the rapidly increasing number of settlers in and around Cuba, La Jara and Regina. The road passes through Large cañon, said to be the longest passable mountain canon on the continent. It will serve 8,500 people in San Juan county Sheriff Hixenbough is rapidly establishing a record in Raton for being constantly on the job to prevent or at least to punish violators of the laws

against liquor selling. The livestock industry of the whole state is to benefit directly and immediately as a result of the efforts of the New Mexico Cattle and Horse Growers' Association in carrying out its legislative program. Ten bills, relating to as many phases of the industry, have been passed by the House

After long years of conference and disputation the city of Raton has been successful in closing a contract with the officers of the Raton Electric Light & Power Company, through the action of the mayor and city council which will eventually lead to city ownership of this public utility. The city has been given an option on the entire holdings of the light company running to the first of May, 1920. The purchase price named in the option is \$60,000. It is believed that there will be no difficulty in securing at a special election the proper authoriza tion for the expenditure of the public funds to consummate the purchase.
