WITNESSES OF CHRIST'S GLORY.

LESSON TEXT - Luke 9:28-36. GOLDEN TEXT - This is my beloved Son; hear ye him. - Mark 9:7. ADDITIONAL MATERIAL - Matt. 17:1-8; Mark 9:2-4; II Peter 1:16-18. PRIMARY AND JUNIOR TOPIC - Peter and John with Jesus on the mountain. SENIOR AND ADULT TOPIC - The story of Jesus Christ.

While it is true that in this lesson the disciples are witnesses of Christ's glory, the full truth is that the manifestation of Christ in glory was to give to the discouraged disciples a foregleam of the Messianic Kingdom. The hopes of the disciples were crushed when Christ announced his death on the cross. They were unable to see how victory could issue from death.

CHAPTER XXXII. The Last of the Namur. The vessel was plainly a total wreck, rapidly pounding to death on a sharp ledge of rock. Both masts were down, and, lifted as the bow was, it was easy to perceive the deck was in splinters where falling spars and topmasts had crushed their way through. The bows had caught, seemingly jammed in between rocks, the stern sunk deep, with cabin port holes barely above reach of the waves. Not a living thing appeared on board, and as the fog slowly drifted away, my eyes could discern no sign of any boat, no evidence of the crew, along the wide sweep of water. A voice aroused me.

Bigger and Heavier Men Fruit. It is thought by naturalists that the eggs of domestic hens of the present day are larger and heavier by nearly a third than those of the hens of the ancients. BAPTIST WOMEN TO RAISE \$15,000,000

FIFTH OF SUM SOUGHT IN FIVE-YEAR PROGRAM WILL COME FROM THEM.

ARE DOING A LARGE WORK

Hospitals, Mountain Schools, Good Will Centers and Church Building Funds Maintained by Them in Addition to Regular Gifts.

Evidencing the larger sphere which women have come to occupy in church life, as well as other activities, when the Baptist 75 Million Campaign was decided upon at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta last May, the women, through their regular organization, the Woman's Missionary Union, at once agreed to be responsible for one-fifth of the sum sought, or \$15,000,000. This means that the Baptist women of the South will raise for missions of all kinds, Christian education and benevolences, the sum of \$3,000,000 a year for the next five years, in addition to their contributions to local enterprises and special work.

Through the channels of the Woman's Missionary Union, with headquarters at Baltimore, Md., the Baptist women of the South have since their organization contributed more than \$6,000,000 in cash to various denominational purposes. With the addition of boxes of food and clothing sent to orphanages and other benevolent institutions, the total of their contributions through this channel has reached \$6,710,432.71. Miss Kathleen Mallory is the corresponding secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union, and in appreciation of the service she has rendered in that connection the Baptist women of Alabama have established the Kathleen Mallory Hospital for Women at Leichow-Fu, Shantung, China, Miss Mallory being a native of Alabama. Women of many of the other states have also undertaken special enterprises of their own. Those of Georgia, for instance, established the Ayers Hospital for Women at Hwangahtien, China, a girls' school at Kumamoto, Japan, the Catherine Bryan Kindergarten School at Canton, China, and the Mary P. Willingham School for Girls at Blue Ridge, Ga., a school designed especially for the education of girls in the mountainous section of that state. Many of the other state unions have special projects such as Good Will Centers in the tenement, factory and mining districts, where effort is made to bring more sunshine and enlightenment and love into the homes and lives of needy families, especially those of foreign birth; church building funds, scholarships for young women who want to obtain training for special Christian service, and similar undertakings. The general W. M. U., representing all the women of the Southern Baptist Convention owns, and operates the Women's Training School at Louisville, Ky., which has already sent out 700 trained women for special service in all parts of the world; and has established the Margaret Fund for the education in the Baptist schools of the South the sons and daughters of missionaries on the foreign fields, and the Fannie E. S. Heck Memorial, a church building fund established in honor of one of the greatest leaders Southern Baptist women has known. But money for the support of these institutions as well as that for the payment of the women's pledge of \$15,000,000 in the 75 Million Campaign, will be raised by the actual work of the women and through economy and sacrifice. Church fairs, bazaars, suppers, ice cream socials and the like, are frowned upon by the organized Baptist women of the South as unworthy means for raising funds for carrying forward the work of the kingdom of God and their contributions will not come from this source, it is announced.

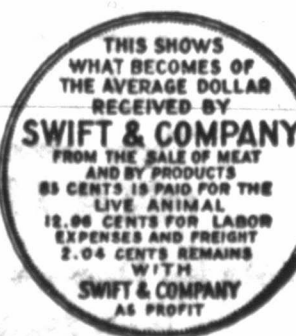

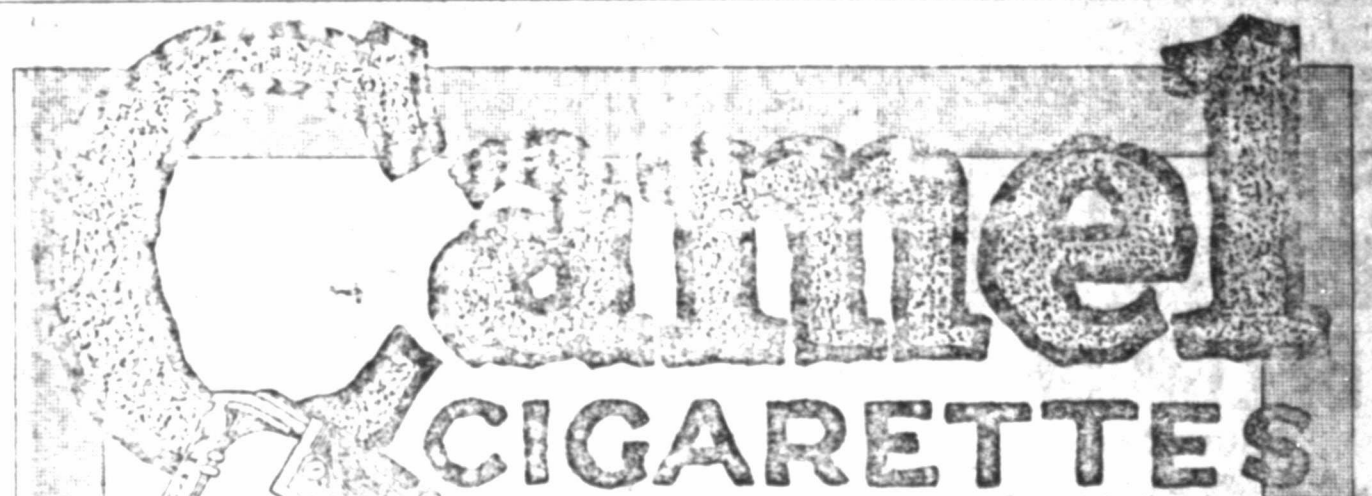

Roosevelt Oyster



DIGNIFIED open-air theater, to be known as the Roosevelt Forum, built along the lines of a Greek amphitheater and utilized as a nonpartisan meeting place by patriotic Americans for the discussion of grave problems affecting the future of this country, is one of the features of the proposed park at Oyster Bay. The plans already have been approved by the Roosevelt Memorial association.

Electus D. Litchfield, architect, who designed the monument to President McKinley at Columbus, Ohio, and who has executed other important commissions, has been engaged by the Roosevelt Memorial committee at Oyster Bay to carry out these plans for the memorial park. Mr. Litchfield lives at Oyster Bay and was a neighbor of Colonel Roosevelt. Therefore he is familiar with the park site.

Mr. Litchfield thinks a forum such as has been suggested for the park would have met with the approbation of the colonel himself, says the New York Sun. Members of the Roosevelt Memorial association also feel that such a forum could be made most useful in our national life in carrying out in a useful and vital way the ideals and teachings of Theodore Roosevelt.

Mr. Litchfield's Vision. "At the head of the auditorium," says Mr. Litchfield in describing his plans for the park, "there would be a rostrum, having its west front built somewhat in the form of a Greek theater and providing a stage upon which may be seated the performers at operatic concerts for the people. Within its walls I had hoped there might be a reception room and a small hall, somewhat in the nature of a supreme court room in the capitol at Washington, where would be gathered from time to time once every two or three years, or two or three times a year, as in the opinion of the trustees of the Roosevelt forum the occasion may require, a few of the great men of the country, who shall there discuss before the whole nation the grave questions that will affect conditions in this country as a result of the war's aftermath."

This beautiful park to the memory of a great American will embrace about forty acres and titles to the property have been examined and surveys made. When completed this park will have an athletic field, tennis courts, bathing beach and pavilion, the theater, a great flagpole 150 feet high and a beautiful promenade, arched by elm trees in the center of which will be a lagoon.

The idea of William Loeb, Jr., chairman of the Roosevelt Memorial committee at Oyster Bay, and other members of the committee, is to have a park that will provide in the best and most healthful way amusement facilities for the country at large; a park that will have an individuality and atmosphere suggestive of the life and spirit of Roosevelt. The colonel was a practical man who combined artistic ideas with common sense execution, and the Roosevelt Memorial association does not want a park that would not have met with the approval of the colonel himself. As a matter of fact Colonel Roosevelt himself very much desired such a park at Oyster Bay and publicly expressed his views on the subject.

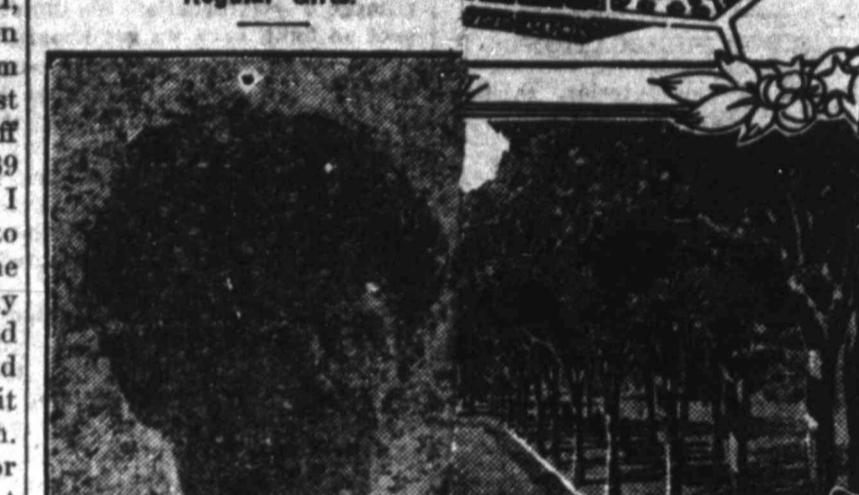

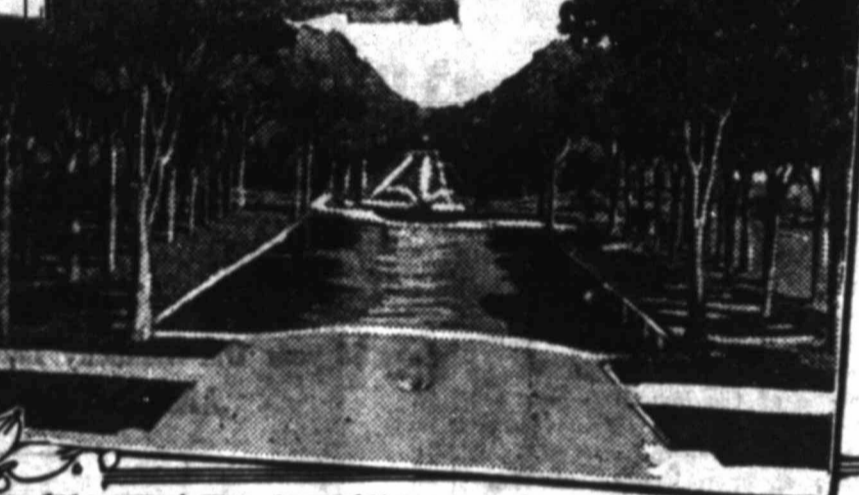

LAGOON AND FOREST

It is interesting, in view of the present movement, to recall the fight that was made several years ago by some of the citizens of Oyster Bay for a park—a fight that resulted in failure, but which aroused the interest of Colonel Roosevelt, who did what he could at that time to arouse the enthusiasm of his fellow townsmen over the project.

"For years the townspeople declined to take any action to secure the just rights which a few of them had infrequently enjoyed," wrote Colonel Roosevelt during the winter of 1918 in describing this unsuccessful battle for the park: "Then the selfish misconduct of one or two property owners who sought to deny all proper access to their beaches roused a feeling which manifested itself in a foolish and vicious effort—at one time a mob effort—to destroy the docks and thereby prevent the property owners of access to their sailboats. The motive seemed to be less to secure their own rights than to interfere with those of whom they were jealous. Recourse to the law finally settled the right of the property owners to their docks and their duty to keep openings in the docks so that the clamblers and the rare wayfarers along the beach would not be interfered with."

"But this did not help those farmers or villagers who occasionally wished to come to the beach for bathing or boating. A few public-spirited persons therefore started a movement for a park, with a long stretch of beach, on which public and private bathhouses and bath houses could be erected. Various well-to-do persons, none of whom would ever have used the park, agreed to furnish half the money if the town would furnish the other half. It was voted on at the next election.

"I rode down to the polls with a friend, a hired man—a good, upright, hard-working citizen, who lives some miles away from the water, who owns a small property and is therefore a small taxpayer. After voting I found that our two votes had neutralized each other; he voted against the park; and the park proposition was beaten by the votes of the smaller taxpayers who lived inland and from among whom the chief beneficiaries of the park would have come. (The boldface is Colonel Roosevelt's.) These men had felt vaguely jealous of the richer property owners near the water and had sympathized with the movement to interfere with them; but they were not willing to incur the small expense necessary in order to establish such collective ownership of a portion of the waterfront as would enable them to enjoy their rights along it."

May Cost \$1,500,000. The cost of the memorial has been variously estimated, beginning with sums less than \$1,000,000. But those who have studied the plan feel that \$1,500,000 should be raised to assure its complete realization. Although the memorial is in some extent local, in a larger view it concerns the whole nation. The sum given is very small, if it be distributed over the population. School children alone could and would give an appreciable part of it. Indeed, since Oyster Bay stands for the Roosevelt home life, it is peculiarly appropriate that the nation's children should take a special interest in such a memorial, as they did in the restoration of Washington's home at Mount Vernon.

slav government's hydrographic office. A program of these undertakings was published last November in the Comptes Rendus of the French academy of sciences by the widely known oceanographer, Gen. J. G. Shokalski, who is still in Petrograd, so far as known. Subsequently General Shokalski has found means of sending letters on the same subject to some of his scientific friends in the United States.

The explorations were to be carried out by two parties. One, working from the White sea eastward to Cape Chelyunskii, was to be under the command of Captain Viikitskii, the discoverer of Nicholas II Land and the leader of the expedition which made the northeast passage from Bering strait to the Atlantic ocean in 1914-15. Another party, surveying from Cape Chelyunskii to Bering strait, was to be commanded by Capt. P. A. Novopashennii. Several new radio stations were to be established to facilitate the work of the expeditions.—Scientific American.

But modern farmers have found scores of ways by which they can attract buyers for their products. The suggestions offered herewith are designed particularly for the farmer who is in a position to supply a given grade of goods in sufficient quantities to meet a stable demand.

There are many means of direct appeal to buyers which are made particularly profitable by the tremendous increase in auto travel. Today that farm is remote indeed which is not passed many times a week by town or city motorists, the majority of whom are possible customers for the farmer. Consequently he must look well to the appearance of his place. Perhaps unthoughtfully features of which he is not conscious exist, but the passerby, keen to discern these signs of laxness, hesitates to purchase at such a farm.

Uses for Bulletin Boards. A bulletin board near the front gate is a big asset, if carefully prepared. In addition to the name of the farm or the farm owner, it should state in simple, large type the kinds of produce for sale and the prices. Some farmers have found supplementary notices, placed at a proper distance on either side of the main bulletin board, very valuable in calling attention to the latter. Suggested wording for these follows:

FAIR VALLEY FARM Read Marketing Bulletin Ahead.

There are various ways in which the farm name can be displayed to the owner's financial advantage. Any farm will be better remembered by passing strangers if its name appears in neat lettering over or beside the main entrance or across the face of a barn. The farmer who possesses an auto truck—and he is legion these days—is overlooking a splendid advertising opportunity if he does not have the name of his farm and his special products neatly lettered on the side of his vehicle. Then every trip to town is a reminder to hundreds, perhaps thousands, of people that the owner is still

"on the map." One dairy farmer who built up a large retail trade not only carried on his vehicles the name of his farm, but made all his trucks and wagons even more distinctive by painting them a dark yellow.

Letterheads a Help. Printed letterheads are a real asset for the farmer who is selling to either wholesale or retail trade. The following form is suggestive:

FAIR VALLEY FARM BUTTER, EGGS, DRESSED POULTRY, BY PARCEL POST FROM THE FARM TO YOU. BLAND, MD.....D.

Many farmers who handle considerable quantities of produce find it profitable to use distinctive, printed wrappers. Another simple means of advertising is neatly printed gummed labels for use on the outside of packages sent by parcel post or express.

Advertisements in local or metropolitan papers should be short and should give a description of the goods with the prices, and the name and address of the person advertising. In some cities the Sunday edition gives better results than the daily edition.

What Advertiser Should Know. The person who advertises must offer a product that is wanted by the persons who read the paper at the time the product is advertised, in the places where the paper has a circulation. In other words, he must know what to advertise, when to advertise, and where to advertise. The following are suggested forms for parcel post classified advertising:

James J. Jameson, Proprietor Fresh eggs, direct from the farm. Send for three dozen delivered by parcel post, prepaid. Fair View Farm, Blank, Va.

Butter, direct from dairy. Fresh, clean, and sweet. Send for two pounds, delivered postpaid by parcel post. Fair View Farm, Blank, Va.

Cherries from the tree to you by prepaid parcel post. Picked the day they are mailed. Send for a quart to Fair View Farm, Blank, Va.

Typical of the small number of farmers who have entered the field of national advertising is one in a middle-western state, who has built up a country-wide trade in his special brand of home-made sausage by using the advertising columns of publications of national circulation, supplemented by cleverly prepared pamphlets and the use of distinctive wrappers.

kept scrub stock. The final result of pure-bred sires is that the farmer makes more money and the city family gets more and better food, probably at lower prices.

The crusade, the experts say, eventually will tend to result in reducing the cost of living to the consumer without taking the difference out of the pocket of the producer. For that reason, they point out, the city man has a definite money interest in the better sires crusade. While he can hardly be expected to put the same amount of effort into it that the live stock breeder should, he is expected to give encouragement and aid to the program whenever the opportunity offers. And there will be no lack of opportunity, particularly in the smaller cities and towns where the farmers are in close contact with the city business men.

GENERAL FARM NOTES Where is your binder? Get the stables ready for winter. Save some clover seed this season. Comb honey should be removed from hive as soon as capped. There is no money in working team or man in the rain. Use the best seed obtainable; poor seed means low yields. Trace chains and short tugs are a happy farm combination. Don't waste and burn the straw. It is valuable and should be returned to the land.

FEDERAL MEAT INSPECTOR TO PLANTS WHOSE PRO



A Slaughterhouse With a Federal Inspector (X) in Charge.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
John Brown-Jones is queer.

Want proof? Well, he planted a fine field of corn, but it was unfenced and all of the neighbors' stock had free access to it. Brown-Jones turned in and built a woven-wire fence around that field, horse high, bull strong and pig tight. But—and here is the proof of his queerness—he left a ten-foot gap with no sort of fence across it at all. The cows and horses pushed at that fence and the hogs nosed around it without result—for a few days. Then, as anybody might have known, they found the gap and the Brown-Jones corn "went floppy."

Queer isn't the name for it, you say? Certainly not. The fellow was a full-fledged fool—only there wasn't any such fool. That story is a sort of parable written to illustrate what the people of the United States are doing every day with regard to the meat they eat. Against diseased and unwholesome meat they have built the fence, high and strong and close woven, but they have left a big open gap through which any kind of disease or uncleanness may enter the home and play havoc.

What Federal Inspection Is.

Take your own town, for instance. About 75 per cent of the beef eaten in your town has the stamp of purity placed on it by the United States department of agriculture. You know it is clean and that the animal from which it was taken was sound and healthy. When the steer went to the

pen, ready for slaughter, he was thoroughly inspected by a veterinarian of the bureau of animal industry. If there had been anything wrong with him, or even a suspicion of anything wrong with him, slaughtering him for meat purposes would have been prohibited. But he was sound, apparently, and was killed for beef. But that did not end the inquiry. After the steer was slaughtered, another inspector very carefully examined the carcass, the lungs, the heart, the liver. Still another department of agriculture inspector watched the canning of such portions of the carcass as went into cans. And other inspectors of the department looked after the packing plant as a whole—saw that sanitary rules were observed, that the water supply was pure, that the workmen had facilities for keeping themselves clean, that the tables and other equipment did not become foul, that every process was carried out with due regard to cleanliness.

That system of inspection, you say, ought to insure the purity of the meat supply? Not at all. It does insure purity of the meat inspected, but federal inspection cannot be extended to all meat; it does not go all the way.

Government Cannot Interfere.

The United States department of agriculture, being a federal agency and operating under federal laws, cannot interfere in purely state affairs. Suppose there is a packer or butcher in your town who probably is—other products

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

COMING EVENTS. Arizona State Fair—Nov. 3 to 2, 1919. The Red Cross Roll Call drive will be conducted nation-wide from November 2 to 11, 1919.

Several cases of scarlet fever have been reported near Estancia, N. M.

The Shorty Gobbler Oil Company has spudded in its test well near Clayton, N. M.

Governor Campbell has pardoned six men serving terms in the state penitentiary at Florence, Ariz.

That Phoenix will be called upon to care for the greatest number of tourists in its history this season is the opinion of Joe Dalton of that city.

The meeting of the executive board of the New Mexico Cattle and Horse Growers' Association, which was to have been held at the State College on Nov. 3 and 4, has been postponed until Nov. 7 and 8.

Arizona cotton growers are to receive profitable assistance in the marketing of Pima cotton at Eastern buying points through a consignment service established by banks and cotton men in Los Angeles.

French, N. M., has fallen in line with the other towns in the state in the oil business and has recently organized a new company to be known as the French Petroleum Company, with a capital stock of \$100,000.

A special session of the Arizona Legislature will be called early in 1920 to consider ratification of the federal constitutional amendment granting suffrage to women. It has been announced by Governor Campbell.

A "teachery" is an establishment in Dawson, N. M., which appears to have solved the problem of providing comfortable quarters for the public school teachers of that city.

The McKinley Land and Lumber Company of Albuquerque began sawing logs again after being closed down for the past six years.

Reckless driving by college boys out for speed rides was ended promptly at Tucson, Ariz., by Patrolman Red Osborn, who, when two machines, loaded with youths failed to halt when he called, and rushed down upon him, drew his revolver and shot one front tire as the machine rushed past and shot a rear tire off as it attempted to get away.

The state of Arizona was made richer to the extent of \$171,928.90, which amount was received in a warrant from the Treasury Department at Washington and represents the receipts from the national forests within this state for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919.

Clayton, N. M., is making an effort to keep in line with other cities in the state and announces that in the next ninety days it will install one of the most modern fire alarm systems in the country.

The Colmor Irrigation project in Colfax and Mora counties, N. M., is about completed and will be ready to deliver water in the spring.

Three New Mexico counties have remitted to the State Highway Commission sums of money that are to be expended by the commission upon roads in the counties.

It is now assured that the Jerome Grande Copper Company will be financed for an extended campaign of development.

The total resources of all state and national banks of Arizona amount to \$80,884,871.10, according to figures compiled by M. S. Stanley, deputy state auditor.

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By REV. F. M. FITZWATER, D. D., Teacher of English Bible in the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.

LESSON FOR NOVEMBER 9

PETER'S GREAT CONFESSION.

LESSON TEXT—Matt. 16:13-20. GOLDEN TEXT—Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God.—Matt. 16:16.

The time has now come for the King to take account of his ministry.

This confession in some sense marks the turning point in Christ's ministry. Hereafter it is more restricted to his disciples. Two reasons are sufficient why this should be (vv. 1-12): (1) The Pharisees and Sadducees show their attitude towards him in their demand for a sign. His answer is that none shall be given save that of his death and resurrection, as symbolized in the experiences of the Prophet Jonah.

1. Peter's Confession (vv. 13-16). Two questions of Christ provoked this confession: 1. The question as to the opinion of the people concerning him.

2. The question as to the opinion of the people concerning him. They recognized him as a teacher or prophet of more than human authority and power. Today, as then, there is a diversity of opinion among the people as to Jesus Christ.

3. The New Body, the Church, Announced (vv. 17-20). Peter had made a noble confession of Christ, so now Christ confesses him. If we confess Christ he will confess us (Matt. 10:32, 33).

This was, no doubt, startling to the disciples. They did not realize that redemption was to be accomplished through the passion of the cross. So unwelcome was this announcement that Peter cried, "This shall not be unto thee."

IV. The Cost of Discipleship (vv. 24-27). To follow Christ means suffering. To follow him is to turn one's back upon the world. Life can only be saved by losing it.

1. There must be denial of self (v. 24). There is a wide difference between self-denial and denial of self. Self-denial is practiced everywhere by all people, but only the disciples of Christ or Christian people deny self. Christ takes the place of self.

2. "Take up his cross." This cross is the suffering and shame which lie in the path of loyalty to God. To do our duty will mean suffering (2 Tim. 3:12).

3. Follow Christ. This means to have the mind of Christ, to do like Christ. All such shall be rewarded when Christ comes in glory.

Christian Character. One truly Christian life will do more to prove the divine origin of Christianity than many lectures. It is of much greater importance to develop Christian character than to exhibit Christian evidences.—J. M. Gibson.

It may seem a little strange to you that I have been in this community for several years and now announce that I will enter the profession of adjustment of glasses for the various defects of the eyes, but the following, I think, will be explanatory.

I had been actively engaged in the optical business for ten years prior to my coming to this country from Kentucky. My reason for leaving that country was to take a rest from the profession. During my practice there I was very closely confined and felt that a vacation would do me good. I was interested in this country in the ranch business and decided to spend my vacation assisting in same.

In the fall of 1917, about the time I was contemplating going back to Kentucky to take up my work again, I was asked to accept an appointment on the Local Board for this county, in which capacity I served as member and chairman until the Board was excused from further duty. At the expiration of these services I was requested by the physicians of this city to take the State Board examination of this state and practice in this field. After careful consideration I decided to do so.

When I first entered the optical profession I practiced under competent instruction for a period of five years and then went to the Bradley Polytechnic Institute, Peoria, Ill., at which place I took their full course in the Horological Department, including Optometry, receiving my diploma from this institution with the class of 1908. During my attendance at this institution I was assistant in the optical work, being one of three men who was selected by the Dean of the Horological Department to assist in this work. This institution is in affiliation with the University of Chicago and is considered the best of its kind in the world. After my decision to take up the work in this field, I wrote to the Dean telling him of my intention and received the following letter from him:

To Whom It May Concern:

Hancock was a student of the Horological Department of the Bradley Polytechnic Institute, Peoria, Illinois, taking a full course, including Optometry and he was assistant in one of the classes in optical work.
