NEW INSURANCE RULINGS

In addition to the rule of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance. which provides that a man may reinstate his term insurance at any time within eighteen months after discharge, or within twelve months after his last premium was paid, the Bureau has recently issued another rule which declares that in all cases men may reinstate their insurance up to December 31, 1919. This will provide for reinstatement by many men who would otherwise have been precluded.

Thanksgiving Proclamation

"By the President of the United States of America: "A proclamation:

"The season of the year has again arrived when the people of the United States are accustomed to unite in giving thanks to Almighty God for the blessings which he has conferred upon our country during the twelve months that have passed. A year ago our people poured out their hearts in praise and thanksgiving that, through Divine aid the right was victorious and peace had come to the nations which had so cour-ageously struggled in defense of human liberty and justice. Now that the stern task is ended and the fruits of achievement are ours we look forward with confidence to the dawn of an era where the sacrifices of the nation will find recompense in a world at peace.

"But to attain the consummation of the great work to which the American people devoted their manhood and the vast resources of their sountry, they should, as they give thanks to God, reconsecrate thomselves to these principles of right which triumphed through His merciful odness. Our gratitude can find no more perfect expression than to Iwark with loyalty and patriotism those principles for which the free ples of the earth fought and died.

During the past year we have had much to make us grateful. In spite of the confusion in our economic life, resulting from the war, we have prospered. Our harvests have been plentiful and of our abundance we have been able to render succor to less favored nations. Our democracy remains unshaken in a world torn with political and social unrest. Our traditional ideals are still our guides in the path of progress and civilization

"These great blessings, vouchsafed to us, for which we devoutly give thanks, should arouse us to a fuller sense of our duty to ourselves and to mankind to see to it that nothing we may do shall mar the coms of the victory which we helped to win. No selfish purpose mated us in becoming a participant in the world war, and with a like spirit of unselfishness we should strive to aid by our example and by our co-operation in realizing the enduring welfare of all peoples and in bringing into being a world ruled by friendship and good will.

Therefore, - I, Woodrow Wison, president of the United States of America, hereby designate Thursday, the 27th day of November, next, servance as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer by my fellow countrymen, inviting them to cease on that day from their ordinary tasks and to unite in their homes and in their several places of worship in ascribing praise and thanksgiving to God, the author of all blessings and the master of our destinies.

Call for 8,000 skilled and unskilled workmen to dig soal from Oklahoma mines during the period of the strike will be made within the next few days, it was announced definitely by Gobernor Robertson, following a meeting of the state council of defense at which' the proposal to issue such a call was indors-

Leading mine operators have assured the governor that workmen, unskilled in the art of mining, can be used advantageously in the crisis, and have promised co-operation in the undertaking. Operators told the governor that unskilled workmen can earn \$5.00 a day and probably more after a few days' training.

A complete list of all mines in the states showing the approximate number of men needed to keep up production was submitted to the governor by the operators as a guide in placing the men who are expected to respond to the governor's call. It is believed that it will be about a week before any considerable number of men can be mustered and sent to the mines.



Edict Banishes Blemishes on Landscape-To Be Allowed Only Beside Business Buildings.

Two Thousand Guardsmen Scattered Unsightly signs and billboards must not deface Father Knickerbocker's fair Among the Mines.--Nearly Eight real estate landscape.

This is the latest edict of the zoning committee. Secretary Swan announced that the law would be enforced forthwith, whoever might be the offenders. "The city's determination to enforce this provision of the zoning resolution

has been demonstrated in several instances by the revocation of permits. mistakenly issued for the erection of billboards in residence districts and by the institution of suits to bring about the removal of billboards where the owners have not complied with removal orders," said he. "To bring about effective enforcement property owners who have suffered from an invasion should immediately place the matter before the superintendent of buildings on their borough.

"Instead of merely regulating the height, size and construction of signs, it frankly recognizes the fact that there is no such thing as a billboard respectable enough to rub elbows with churches, schools and private homes. When hereafter erected the billboard must go where it will cause a minimum harm-alongside business buildings and industrial establishments. Those existing before the law was passed, are allowed to continue. Commercial advertising can in no sense be deemed accessory to any of the uses specifically permitted in residential districts."

Carvery few persons interested in the adornment of American highways with trees, but that may be the forerunner of a new idea in such decoration, remarks the Christian Science Monitor. His suggestion, in brief, looks to the planting of productive as well as simply ornamental trees, preferably nut trees, because the "common fruit trees, having been cultivated for generations, are more or less spoiled children, requiring continued cultivation if they are to be happy." Such planting, he says, would combine the Greek idea of utility and beauty; yet his own experience with fruit trees on the border of a private estate suggests a difficulty, for the trees were ruined by the heedless way in which a miscellaneous public gathered the fruit. Nuts would, perhaps, present less temptation, and there is, of course, hope that the public, once it individually realized that beautifying the common highway was one important function of the trees, would be more careful in its treatment of them. 



While it is true that in this lesson the disciples are witnesses of Christ's glory, the full truth is that the manifestation of Christ in glory was to give to the discouraged disciples a foregleam of the Messianic Kingdom. The hopes of the disciples were crushed when Christ announced his death on the cross. They were unable to see how victory could issue from death.

Jesus took with him Peter, James, and John, and went into the mountain to pray. His chief aim in retirement was to get the disciples apart into a state of receptivity so that he might show them the method of the Kingdom. Before going to the mountain he declared that there were some standing in his presence who would not taste of death till they should see the Son of Man coming in his Kingdom (Luke ing spirits might be revived and their confidence restored, he is transfigured before them. Two men from the upper world are sent to converse with him about his approaching death in Jerusalem (v. 31)-the very thing about which the disciples refused to talk. Then, too, God's own voice was heard in words of approval of Christ's course, directing them to hear the Master. Surely they cannot doubt his ability now to carry into/execution his kingdom plans. The purpose, then, of the transfiguration is to give the disciples a foregleam of the coming Kingdom. to enable them to see the Kingdom in embryo. 



Mr. Litchfield's Vision.

"At the head of the auditorium." says Mr. Litchfield in describing his plans for the park, "there would be a rostrum, having its west front built somewhat in the form of a Greek theater and providing a stage upon which may be seated the performers at openair concerts for the people. Within its walls I had hoped there might be a reception room and a small hall, somewhat in the nature of a supreme court room in the capitol at Washington, where would be gathered from time to time once every two or three years, or two or three times a year. as in the opinion of the trustees of the Roosevelt forum the occasion may require, a few of the great men of the country, who shall there discuss before the whole nation the grave questions that will affect conditions in this country as a result of the war's after-

math." This beautiful park to the memory of a great American will embrace about forty acres and titles to the property have been examined and surveys made. When completed this park will have an athletic field, tennis courts, bathing beach and pavilion, the theater, a great flagpole 150 feet high and a beautiful promenade, arched by elm trees in the center of which will be a lagoon.

The idea of William Loeb, Jr., chairman of the Roesevelt Memorial committee at Oyster Bay, and other members of the committee, is to have a

park that will provide in the best and most healthful way amusement facilities for the country at large; a park that will have an individuality and atmosphere suggestive of the life and spirit of Roosevelt. The colonel was a practical man who combined artistic ideas with common sense execution, and the Roosevelt Memorial association does not want a park that would not have met with the approval of the colonel himself. As a matter of fact Colonel Roosevelt himself very much desired such a park at Oyster Bay and publicly expressed his views on the subject.

How the Park Will Look. The general appearance of the Roosevelt Memorial park as it will

beyond it a long approach from the west between thickly planted native American shrubs and low-growing trees; laurel, wild honeysuckle, dogwood, beech and ash forming a dense dark foliage in contrast to the gravel walks, the reflection of the sky in the lagoon and the bright deep blue of the bay itself."

It has also been suggested to the Roosevelt Memorial association that as elms are the most beautiful trees for the park it would be an excellent idea to call upon the farmers of Long Island and Connecticut to donate specimen elm trees to the association.

The site of the proposed park is of great natural beauty. The ensemble effect would be somewhat similar to the beautiful park at Versailles, where the peace conference was held, but it will be typically American in spirit and

conception. There will be no attempt on the part of the architect to imitate the Versailles scheme. The proposed

lagoon will look like a diamond set in green jade, and, through a fringe of elm trees the spectator will get a glimpse of the Roosevelt forum. Over all will wave the Stars and Stripes that the colonel loved so well. In every way the aim will be to suggest the virile personality of the man who was first, last and all the time an American. Referring to the flagpole with monumental base which forms, in a way, the center of the formal scheme, Mr. Litch-

field suggested that some day the base might be the final resting place of the great man's mortal part. May Cost \$1,500,000.

The cost of the memorial has been variously estimated, beginning with sums less than \$1,000,000. But those who have studied the plan feel that \$1,500,000 should be raised to assure larger view it concerns the whole nation. The sum given is very small, if it be distributed over the population. School children alone could and would give an appreciable part of it. Indeed, since Oyster Bay stands for the Roosevelt home life, it is peculiarly appropriate that the nation's children should

take a special interest in such a memorial, as they did in the restoration of Washington's home at Mount Vernon.

"For years the townspeople declined to take any action to secure the just rights which a few of them bad infrequently enjoyed," wrote Colonel Roosevelt during the winter of 1918 in describing this unsuccessful battle for the park: "Then the selfish misconduct of one or two property owners who sought to deny all proper access to their beaches roused a feeling which manifested itself in a foolish and vicious effort-at one time a mob effortto destroy the docks and thereby prevent the property owners of access to their sailboats. The motive seemed to be less to secure their own rights than to interfere with those of whom they were jealous. Recourse to the law finally settled the right of the

property owners to their docks and their duty to keep openings in the docks so that the clammers and the rare wayfarers along the beach would not be interfered with.

"But this did not help those farmers or villagers who occasionally wished to come to the beach for bathing or boating. A few public-spirited persons therefore started a movement for a park, with a long stretch of beach, on which public and private boathouses and bath houses could be erected. Various well-to-do persons, none of whom would ever have used the park, agreed to furnish half the money if the town would furnish the other half. It was voted on at the next election. 



Farmer Increases Products and **Receives More Money.**

Crusade Launched by Department of Agriculture Will Eventually Result in Reducing Cost of Living to Consumer.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The definition of the term "pureored sires" is written in one wordeconomy." There are many definiions, many of them learned and long, hat might be written, but the breeding experts of the United States depart-

ment of agriculture, when they met to launch the state and national crusade for "Better Sires-Better Stock," agreed that the primary meaning of it is economy.

The scrub hog requires a certain number of bushels of corn to make 200 pounds of pork. The pure-bred or highgrade hog takes the same number of bushels of corn and makes 300 pounds of pork. The pure-bred or high-grade cow makes three gallons of milk out of the same quantity of silage that the scrub cow uses to make a gallon and a half of milk. These figures are not meant to be scientifically exact, of course, but merely to illustrate the principle. The result is that the farmer gets more pounds of salable prodnct out of his feed when he uses purebred sires at the head of his herds and flocks. He gets more money and his

kind, it would be to your interest to see what can be done about it. A Mother's Three Reasons.

A woman recently appeared before the city council of San Diego, Cal., and asked to be heard on the matter of local meat regulations. She told the council there were three reasons why she wanted to see nothing but government inspected meat in San Diego. Then she introduced her three children to the council. If there had been anything wrong with him, or even a suspicion of anything wrong with him, slaughtering him for meat purposes would have been prohibited. But he was sound, apparently, and was killed for beef. But that did not end the inquiry. After the steer was slaughtered, another inspector very carefully examined the carcass, the lungs, the heart, the liver. Still another department of agriculture inspector watched the canning of such portions of the carcass as went into cans. And other inspectors of the department looked after the packing plant as a whole-saw that sanitary rules were observed, that the water supply was pure, that the workmen had facilities for keeping themselves clean, that the tables and other equipment did not become foul, that every

process was carried out with due regard to cleanliness. That system of inspection, you say, ought to insure the purity of the meat

supply? Not at all. It does insure purity of the meat inspected, but federal inspection cannot be extended to all meat; it does not go all the way.

It may seem a little strange to you that I have been in this community for several years and now announce that I will enter the profession of adjustment of glasses for the various defects of the eyes, but the following, I think, will be explanatory.

I had been actively engaged in the optical business for ten years prior to my coming to this country from Kentucky. My reason for leavin gthat country was to take a rest from the profession. During my practice there I was very closely confined and felt that a vacation would do me good. I was interested in this country in the ranch business and decided to spend my vacation assisting in same.

In the fall of 1917, about the time I was contemplating going back to Kentucky to take up my work again, I was aske dto accept an appointment on the Local Board for this county, in which capacity I served as member and chairman until the Board was excused from further duty.
