VERY WEAKLY FOR CALL ON GERMANY SEVERAL YEARS I TO SURRENDER LIST OF HUMAN DEVILS

FREDRICK WILLIAM HEADS LIST

CHOICE COLLECTION HUN "SUPERMEN", RAPISTS, MURDERERS

With Hindenburg, Capelle, Bethmann-Hollweg, von Kluck, von Sanders To Keep Them Company .--Lersner Refuses the List.

Paris.-Kurt von Lersner, head of the German peace delegation here, has returned to Premier Miller, and the list containing the names of Germans whose extradition is demanded by the allies, which was handed to him last week and has informed the premier that he has resigned and is leaving for Berlin by the first train.

Baron von Lersner told the Associated Press his decision was in line with the attitude he had maintined throughout regarding the question of extradition. He declared he had held that no German officials could be instrumental in carrying out the extradition clauses of the treaty and conits merit in the treatment of many sequently the matter having come up in a definite final form, there was nothing left for him to do but to resign and go home.

Dr. Wilheim Mayer, German charge d'affairs at Paris, has received formal instructions to accept the allied note.

The ambassadors' council has confirmed its decision not to publish the names of those Germany is asked to surrender but it includes in addition to several hundred small fry who are wanted for all sorts of crimes from rape to grand larceny, committed during the war, fifteen or twenty of the men highest up who were personally responsible for the atrocious conduct of the Hun armies. Among these are the crown prince, Frederick Wilhelm, crown prince Rudolph of Bavaria; von Bethmann-Hollweg, the chancellor; von Hindenburg, the supreme commander; von Capelle, head of the navy; field marshal von Kluck, commander of the right wing of the German army in its advance on Paris in 1914: Gen. Kurt von Manteuffel, German military commander in Louvaine, Belgium, in 1914; field marshal von Buelow, commander of the second German army: Gen. Stenger, commander of the 53rd German infantry brigade: Gen. von Tesma, former governor of Luxembourg; the Niemeyer brothers, one a captain, who in 1918 mistreated British prisoners; Major von Goerts and Lieut. Werner, Capt. Max Valentiner and Capt. Forstner, submarine commanders; Baron von der Lancken, former military governor of Brussels, and Field Marshal Liman von Sanders, German commander






Miss Loderhose met "Doctor Hoffman" first at a dance through a woman who said she was Doctor Hoffman's


