Castro MOD Chairman Spells Out Polio Threat; Plans Forthcoming Campaign

The fact of the continuing fight against polio will depend a great deal on the success of next January's March of Dimes, Steve Taylor, Castro County Campaign Chairman, said today.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor have just returned from a March of Dimes planning meeting in Dallas with Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which was attended by more than 500 volunteer leaders from Texas, Oklahoma and south Arkansas.

The Salk Polio vaccine marks a great step forward, but polio is not licked yet," Taylor said. "It won't be until polio cripples is a thing of the past. That can happen only when everybody who is susceptible has been given the protection vaccine affords. We have rebuilt the lives of tens of thousands for whom the vaccine was given too late."

Preparation for the 1956 March of Dimes will start immediately.

Three Dimmitt Students To Be On Program



Youts Urges S-D Day Observance

Glen Youts, manager of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, today called on every motorist and pedestrian in the community to observe the second national "S-D Day"—Safe Driving Day—Thursday, Dec. 1, 1955.

He said last year's S-D Day proved the success of such an effort by reducing the national toll of deaths, injuries and accidents.

He added: "The community's goal this year, as a year ago, will be to eliminate all traffic accidents for the 24-hour period. But, in making one day particularly safe, motorists and pedestrians should feel conscious of the responsibility to make every day safe."

Safe Driving Day is sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety in cooperation with many national organizations, and with the endorsement of the President and all 48 governors. The Chamber of Commerce of the United States and its member organizations throughout the country are cooperating. Youts commented:

"Traffic safety begins with the individual. Every individual, whether a pedestrian or motorist, has a responsibility for traffic

safety. Traffic laws and safety regulations are designed for the public welfare and safety, but they

are of value in accomplishing a purpose only to the extent that the individual complies to them

and practices good old common sense. "Safety is everybody's business."

WARNING

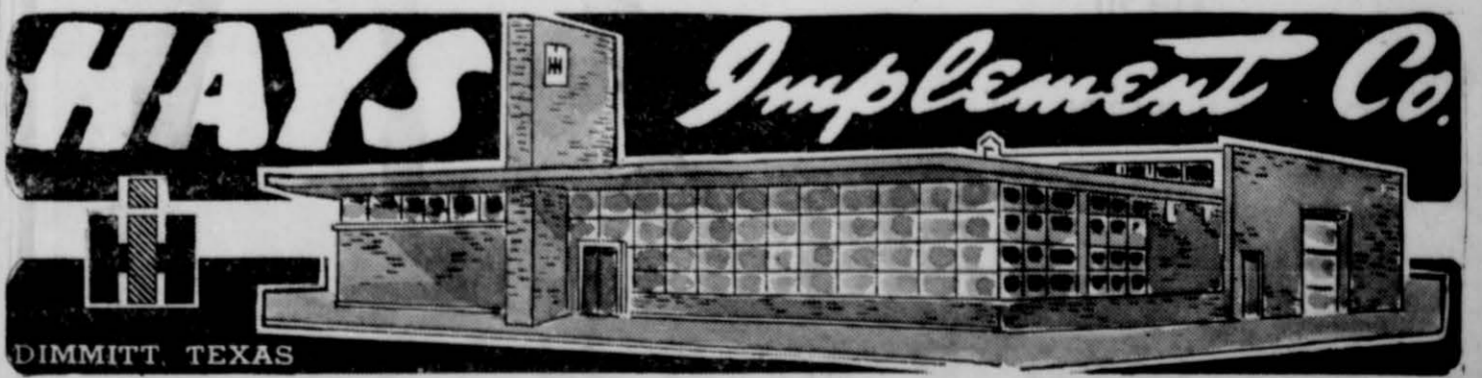

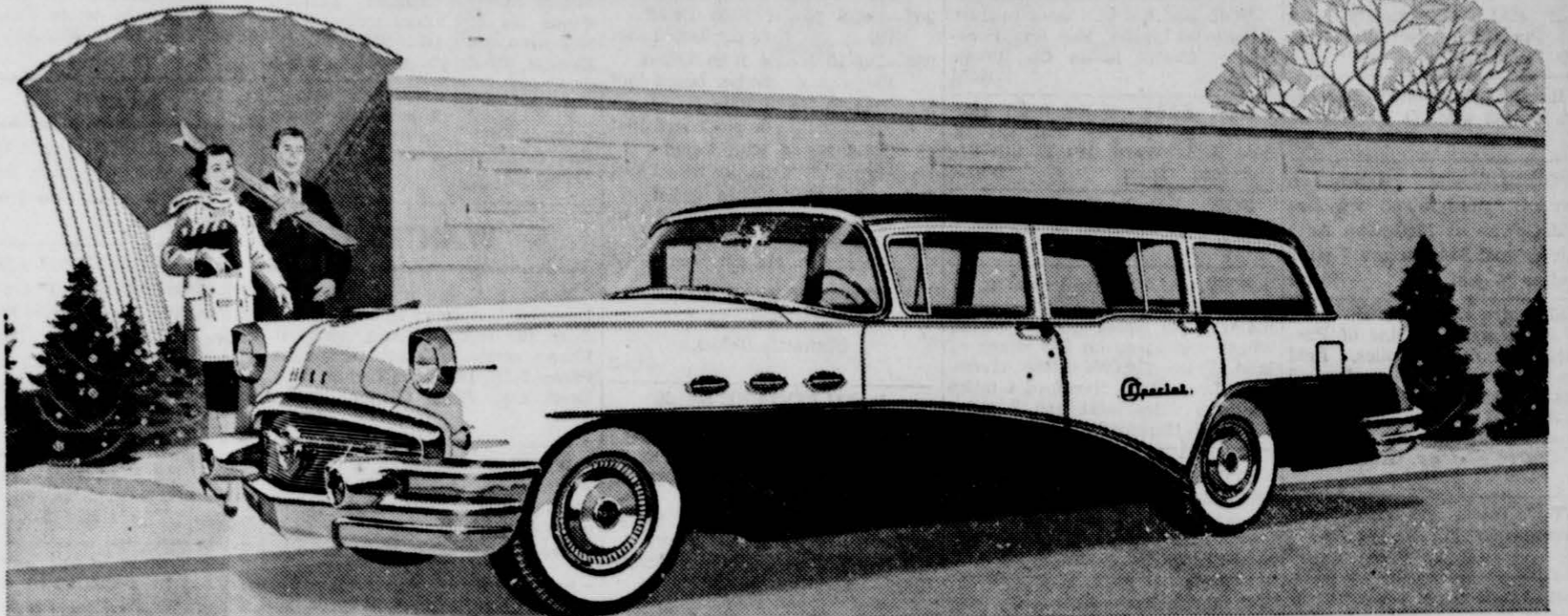

Moscow
Moscow is a city of tremendous size. The Russians estimate the population at from five to seven million. All of the housing is apartment type.

I asked a number of times about seeing the private residential sections. Each time I was told that there are no private residential sections, that private individuals did not own land in Russia. Living space is assigned upon application of the individual. The amount of living space allowed is determined by the number of individuals in the family group. This may include people from four generations.

I was told that some people owned houses that were located away from the city, to which they took their families each summer. The house was owned by the individual as personal property, but he did not own the land. Most of the housing is in buildings that are built flush with the sidewalk. Entry to the different living units is gained by going through a gate that extends into a center courtyard from which you have access to the several apartments.

There is an acute housing shortage at the present time and much of the building that is going on in Moscow is multiple unit housing. We saw many of these buildings under construction and observed the type of workmanship. The brick laying does not appear to be even fair by our standards. The plastering work does seem to be fair. Much of this work is done by women who can be seen on each and every job. They appeared to be very strong and hard workers. Many of them are also seen doing much of the street work. That is the cleaning of the streets and also the repairing thereof. Many are working as park attendants and as cleaning women on the sidewalks and other portions of the public parks.

The Kremlin is a tremendous walled area in which there are many buildings, including a fabulous palace which was built by the czars. A part of this structure has been made over and houses the Supreme Soviet. This is made up of the Soviet of Nationalities of 708 members and the Soviet of the Union of 639 members. All of these are seated in one hall at desks. The chamber is much longer than it is broad and has the appearance of many of the lecture rooms in some of our universities, although much larger.

The Russian government has converted one of the buildings inside the Kremlin into a museum. This museum houses a great number of items concerning Russian history, including the many types of dress during the czarist days, ever back to suits of armor worn by men and also used on the horses.

Many of the coaches, which are very ornate, have been preserved. Many intricate works of art and

royal jewels are also on display. The Kremlin fronts on Red Square. This is where the tomb of Lenin and Stalin is located. It is a square, dark red, marble structure just outside the Kremlin wall on the square.

The tomb is opened at certain times for visitors to view the remains of Lenin and Stalin. You pass through a door at ground level at which is stationed guards. You turn to the left and go down several flights of stairs below the earth and turn into a chamber which houses the bodies of Lenin and Stalin. They are in a glass case and seem to be perfectly preserved. There is a pinkish or orange glow around them.

Lenin's body is the first that you see, although you can see them both at the same time. They both appear to be asleep. Lenin has his fists doubled up and seems to have his jaw set.

Stalin, however, has his hands folded across his mid-section in a very calm manner and his physical appearance seems to be calm and relaxed.

Great numbers of people pass through this tomb every time it is opened. I had watched these throngs from my hotel window but did not know where they were going or what they were doing. We were told by some of the Russians that the crowds seem to get larger rather than smaller.

Across the Red Square from the tomb is the large store of Moscow. It is called Gumm. I asked one of the interpreters if that was the place to go to get the best prices. He laughed and said that the prices were the same everywhere because they were fixed by the state.

He told me that it made no difference whether you bought a pair of socks in a Black Sea port or in an isolated town in Siberia. If the socks were the same, then the price was the same.

Most of the shops have a picture in the window indicating what they are selling. If it is fish, then there is a picture of several fish in the raw. The picture is rather colorful. However, it occurred to me that since the state owns everything and the prices are all the same, a lot of colored paint could have been saved if they had just written "fish" across the window. I guess I just don't understand that type of economy.

The streets are all very wide and there are many wide squares. One fellow ventured that if New York had Moscow's wide streets there wouldn't be a traffic jam. It might also be pointed out that if Moscow had New York's narrow streets they wouldn't have any traffic jam. Actually, I can see more automobiles from my office window in Washington than I saw in all of Russia, including an automobile factory which we went through. This was the Stalin Auto Works which I will talk more about next week.
