





TREES SERVE TWO PURPOSES

Give Beauty to Town and Will Be Source of Revenue to Future Generations.

The women's clubs of the country have organized for state-wide tree planting. In California each district of the federated clubs has been supplied with tree-planting data from the association. In Georgia the tree planting was done in the winter by the Georgia federation, when thirty-one memorial groves were planted under the direction of Julia Lester Dillon. In Delaware the federation is co-operating with the great road-building program there in order to have the highways of the state become one big "road of remembrance." "This is one of the biggest programs before any state," says Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Forestry association. "Every state should watch what General du Pont and the state of Delaware does. Samuel C. Lancaster, the highway engineer who built the Columbia river highway, has submitted a comprehensive plan to General du Pont. This includes tree planting on an intelligent scale.

"The greatest educational campaign the country ever saw is being worked out through the schools of the country. The coming generation will know the value of forestry to the country in which it lives. Our forests are like a bank. We must deposit in them if we hope to draw out. Through the planting of trees and the study of outdoor life the children will easily take up the economic side of the subject and understand what must be done toward saving our forests."



Villa May Enter the Movement and Complicate It Further. - Two More Americans Are Murdered.

El Paso.—Yielding to general sentiment of the army officers, border comd, and pressure of the civilians of res and negotiations of the agents of the Liberal Constitutionalist revolution, Gen. Jose G. Escobar, Carranga's commander in Juarez, signed

an agreement with representatives of Gen. Alvarado Obregon for transfer of control to the rebels at once. There was not a shot fired. Immediately upon the news becom ing known to the Mexican people,

bands played, church bells rang and the auxious tension prevalent in the border town for the past week relaxed perceptibly. The formalities of the turnover are being carried out between the former tederals and the rebel agents, headed by Arturo Elias, from Sonora, who has been chief of the negotiations. There was no interference by officials of the United States, civil or military, neither have there been arrests of members of the Obregon rebel junts, which has had many conferences during the week. Reluctant to Sign.

obar appeared reluctant to sign proclamation announcing the ge, and did so only after the pal regimental and troop coms had signed. A report that Secobar's proclamation declared Juares had revolted against Carranza, but without recognition of the Sonora cause, nor subordination to that group was taken to mean that the document was the first step in favor of the rebals and that Escober would relinquish sand to appointees of Sonora chiefs. A formal statement is exected through American Consul E. A. Dow, from Mexicans in Juares.

Trinidad Romero, mayor, and Antonio Liulas, police chief, were arrest-ed but released within the city.

Troops Rebellious.

Two trains of rebel troops were reapproaching from Chihuahua City. Carranza troops, mostly Yaqui Indians, headed by Gen. M. Urbalejo, in Casas Grandes section, Mormon colonies, are reported rebellious and unsafe to bring into Juarez for sur-

The capitulation of Juarez to the Obregon cause has materially weakened the resistance of the Carranza government to the general revolt, which is reported rapidly spreading over the country. Juarez is probably fourth on the list of border ports in point of revenues, and with defection of the entire state of Chihuahua, the Sonora revolution comes swiftly into financial, as well as military power. Business men here, among which are fifty prominent visitors from Chicago, on southwestern tour, have expressions of satisfaction that border ports are falling into hands of Mexicans familiar with and friendly to Americans and American affairs. nes West of Mississippi Want A Additional \$352,898,000 Sum For Upkeep.

Washington.-Western railroads need an additional \$352,893,000 to bring their net income up to the 6 per cent on their property investment of \$8,003,883,000 provided by the transportation act, the interstate comm commission was informed by Samuel M. Felton of Chicago, chairman of the western executive rate committee.

To provide this sum, freight rates in the territory west of the Mississippi must be increased 24 per cent, he said. Railroad executives today asked congress for an additional \$50,000,000 with which to buy rolling stock during the coming year.

Appearing before the senate interstate commerce committee, representatives of the carriers declared that a serious and general car shortage existed through the middle west and that they were unable to borrow money on their own credit for freight cars needed to remedy the situation.

Washington.-The nation's railroads will need an additional \$1,017,000,000 to bring their income to the six per cent basis provided in the transpertation act.

Through the association of railway executives, the roads proposed to the interstate commerce commission today that this sum be realized through increased freight charges, leaving passenger rates as at present.

While there has been an increase in operating expenses of 99.1 per cent since 1916, the roads basis of revenues has been increased only 36.37 per cent, the executive statement declared, and the operating expense of the lines now are 88 per cent of the revenues against 69 per cent in 1916.

TOWN OF PEGGS, IN CHERO-KEE COUNTY, IS WIPED OFF THE MAP

ONLY THREE HOUSES STANI

And Whole Families Are Wiped Out. -Child is Born in Height of the Storm and Will Sur-

vive.

Muskogee.-Fifty-one persons are known to have been killed and approximately 100 were injured in a tornado that virtually wiped out Peggs, a small village in the northwest corner of Cherokee county.

Forty-three bodies have been recovered by rescue workers from Muskogee, Tahlequah and Locust Grove. More are believed to be still in the wreckage.

Only three buildings remained standing after the storm had passed Whole families were wiped out by the storm. Seven members of the family of Jonn Littlefield were killed. while nine perished at the home of N. Stevens

Forty-two coffins are being sent to the scene of the storm from Tahlequah. This is as many as could be found in the city.

Temporary hospitals have been organized amid the wreckage and scores of slightly injured are being given first aid. If they can stand the trip to Tahlequah, they are being taken there to temporary hospitals.

The only physician in Peggs, Dr. I. Hill was killed. The stricken village had a population of about 250.

When the autos arrived in Peggs they found the twisted, mud-splattered bodies. Heavy rain and hall accompanied the storm and when the workers began collecting the bodies from the muck and rubbish many were so plastered with mud that they had to be washed off before their identity could be established.

One of the freaks of the storm was that a small frame shack, uninhabited, was left standing in the heart of the town while brick buildings housing many persons around it were razed to the ground. The Peggs school house. a concrete building, was crushed like an egg shell.

Storm Area Three Miles Long. The storm covered an area three miles long and one mile wide, appar ently dropping down just in time to hit the village and rising soon after leaving it.

Twenty-one In One House. In the three twisted and shattered houses left standing in the town of Peggs, 51 horribly mutilated bodies

iay in row after row. Twenty-one lay in one house, twelve in another. In an improvised lean-to made from boards nicked from the wreckage. women and little children bruised almost beyond the semblance of human forms and under the influence of drugs administered to relieve their pain, tossed and moaned. Others with their arms in slings walked among the ruins



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JAPAN'S CHILD LABOR WORKS A 16-HOUR DAY



Third of Nations Two Million Operatives are Women and Girls - Discontent Is Growing Among Them.

Cherry blossoms and snow-capped mountains mean little to these baby laborers of picturesque Japan. For sixteen hours a day they stand at their machines, with only one or two rest days a month. Their homes are the factory dormitories, and after two years many of them contract tuberculosis or other diseases which compel them to give up work.

Six hundred thousand of Japan's 2,000,000 operatives are women and girls, and some 300,000 are from ten to eighteen years of age. This is one of the reasons why the Interchurch World Movement has mapped out an educational program which, during the next five years, will help the Japanese government solve some of its problems.

The cost of living in Tokyo is greater than in New York or London. There are frequent strikes, and increased suffering and discontent mark Nippon's industrial world. Working hours are excessive.

The Protestant churches which are cooperating in the new world program believe that one way of working for the children is to enlarge the churches' educational program. A part of this project, too great for any single denomination, is the establishment of a Japanese Christian university.
