sweet potatoes may be grown by taking vine cuttings from those that have been previously planted and inserting these in ridges in place of rooted plants. The sweet potatoes grown from vine cuttings are usually free from disease and are smooth and uniform, making them very desirable for winter storage.

. In many sections peas can be plant-ed as late as September and will yield a very nice crop before cold weather sets in. For this purpose the early or quick-maturing sorts should be

Can or Store Vegetables. Large quantities of garden vegetables are lost through want of suitable means of taking care of the surplus This can be done either by canning or by storage, depending upon the kind of vegetable to be cared for. The secret of filling the pantry shelves with canned goods is to can a little every day during the season when vegetables are plentiful in the garden. Storage facilities either in the form of a special room in the cellar or a suitable outdoor storage pit should be provided. In a few instances arrangements with the local cold storage or ice factory for the partitioning off of a small compartment in their ice storage room in which vegetables that should be stored at a temperature near the freezing point may be kept. This class of storage is especially desirable for apples and Irish potatoes. Sweet potatoes should always be stored in a warm place and planted in July or August, provided given plenty of ventilation.

In planning the garden operations for the balance of the season, it is well to take into consideration all of the standard crops and varieties, leaving above features, First, grow the kind of vegetables that are needed for canning and storage; and, second, make provision to can or store all that are the South a very excellent crop of not needed for immediate use.

FAST WIRE SERVICE GIVES PROMPT NEWS

Information is Vital to Intelligent Food Distribution.

Telegraphic Reports Sent From Big Market Centers Every Fifteen Minutes During Day-Much Spoilage Is Avoided.

The federal bureau of markets news services on live stock and meats, hay, feeds, and seeds, and dalry products, and fruits and vegetables, are designed to keep before producers, distributors, and consumers a picture of the movement of important crops to market, the supplies arriving in all of the principal consuming and distributing centers and the wholesale prices prevailing in each. To make its reports of the greatest practical usefulwith the fastest system of communication available. Its branch offices in the great consuming and distributing markets are connected with leased telegraphed lines and operated by burean telegraphers. These wires are busy from eight to twelve hours a day in the transmission of market information which is vital to intelligent and systematic food distribution.

From the time the live stock markets open in the morning until the close of the day's business, the bureau's representatives at Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha and East St. Louis send out a telegraphic report from one or the other of these markets every 15 minutes. The sales of live stock in the Chicago yards alone average more than \$3,000,000 a day and the value of the live stock sold in the public stock yards of this country is more than \$5,000,000,000 annuallyfigures indicating the importance of supplying information that is authori-

When a market is oversupplied with a product particularly a highly perishable fruit or vegetable-a great waste results. The product spoils and becomes unfit for use and the dealers suffer a financial loss on account of this spollage and also on account of the fact that they must sell their stocks at a sacrifice in order to dispose of them at all. Gluts of this kind used to occur frequently and were nearly always coincident with a scareity of food in another place. Since the market news service on fruits and vegetables was instituted, this situatien has improved materially.

STANDARDIZING FARM PRODUCTS WILL HELP

Recognized as Fundamental to Improved Marketing.

Prevents Waste and Shipment of Dieeased With Sound Fruits and Vegetables-Much Loss to Shipper Can Be Avoided.

Standardization of farm products is being widely recognized as fundamental to improvement in marketing. Without well-recognized, acceptable, standard grades, the various market news services of the bureau of markets, United States department of agriculture, cannot be made fully effective because there must be a recognized basis for buying and selling, a common language, through which grower, shipper, transportation comness, the bureau has equipped itself | pany and dealer may clearly understand one another.

Standardization, moreover, eliminates waste and prevents the shipment of diseased with sound fruits and vegetables and of over-ripe with properly matured specimens. Failure properly to classify products before shipment frequently results in deterioration, decay and inefficient distribution. Much of this less might be prevented by sorting products into grades at the point of production, packing each grade separately to minimize contamination, and converting inferior or unmerchantable grades into by-prod-



He has the scorn and contempt of every well in-formed American,"

N a late afternoon of a winter's day, during the American Revolution, a rakish schooner and a majestic frigate anchored well inside a little bay on the northeastern coast of England. A whaleboat drove shoreward, a young officer scrambled up the steep cliffs and a few minutes later a mysterious stranger was transferred to the frigate's deck. He answered to the name of "Mr. Gray" and was said to be merely a pilot, but he was greeted with surprising deference.

For no ordinary man would these vessels have ventured so near that coast of sandbars and hidden rocks. The wind was a mere ruffle of air. But the incessant mutter of the long, slow ly blew the land-breeze; the mutter of the waters grew deeper. Only here and there did a few stars twinkle between the fast gathering clouds. TURN MACHINE **GUNS ON MOB**

ONE MAN KILLED AND TWO WOUNDED IN CONFLICT

GROWDS ARE NOW SUBDUED

Militia Acting Upon Orders of Adjutant General Shoots Into Crowd of Masked Men and Bystanders.

Durham, N. C .- Jim Ray, 40, of Graham was killed; Wellie Phillips of Graham, seriously injured and Clem Bradshaw of Haw River, slightly wounded when a masked mob attempted to storm the Alamance county jail, where three negroes charged with attack on a white woman are held, according to a statement made by Captain Marion B. Fowler, commanding the Durham machine gun company guarding the jail.

"Absolutely false," Captain Fowler said in connection with the report that no reason could be assigned for the shooting. "The masked mob," Captain Fowler said, "fired the first shots. The machine gunners returned the fire with machine guns and other

"The man killed and the two men injured were not members of the mob," Captain Fowler said.

Reports from Graham state that nobody seems to know just why the gunners opened fire and denial is made that there was any concerted attempt to storm the jail, around which crowds gathered, when bloodhounds trailed from the home of the woman attacked to a servant's house at Rainey hospital nearby and the three negroes were found in bed together, arrested and placed in jail.

Citizens pursuaded the crowds not to attack the jail, until a machine gun company arrived from Durham at orders of Governor T. W. Bickett, who instructed them to shoot and shoot straight if the necessity arose.

Crowds stayed around the jail until nearly daylight and then dispersed and the day passed very quietly, the officials stated, expecting no further trouble. With the street lights out, a crowd appeared to have gathered near the jail, and for some reason, not yet clear, fire was opened by the machine gunners.

After the shooting, all the soldiers were withdrawn with their guns from outside the building and are now on guard within the prison. Reports late state that the crowds are rapidly diminishing and officials declared they expected no further trouble. They have not yet asserted, it is said, which of the three men held, is the man wanted or that anyone of them is guilty but it is said that there is reason to believe that one of the trio is the criminal.

HONOR CHATEAU THIERRY

The ceremony of presentation was held on the top of Hill 204 at the foot of the monument erected to the men who fell in the battle. SHIP LAUNCHING RECORD SET RAILROAD MEN SEVEN 7,825-TON VESSELS ARE LAUNCHED

All Went Into the Water Within 50 Minutes and Establishes a World's Record.

Philadelphia.-As a climax to its many notable achievements since it was created as a war emergency, Hog Island established a new world's ship launching record.

Seven 7,825-ton steel cargo carriers, the last on the ways at the big plant, was sent overboard, according to arrangements, within fifty minutes. Officials of the American International Shipbuilding corporation claim this is the first time such a feat ever was attempted.

Elaborate preparations were made for the launchings. The yard was thrown open to the public and special trains, trolley cars and excursion steamers brought passengers from all sections of the city and nearby towns.

With the completion of the seven ships to be saunched and twenty-two others now in the wet basin for outfitting, the American International Corporations' contract of 122 vessels. 110 cargo carriers and twelve troop ships, will have been finished and the yard will be turned over to the government. This work, it is estimated, will take at least four months. What the final disposition of the huge yard, with its fifty ship ways and scores of buildings that during the height of its activities housed more than 30,000 workers, will be, has not been determined. A number of suggestions have been offered by commercial and business organizations, among them being the purchase of the plant by the city and its conversion into a railway and ocean terminal.

THE EMPLOYEES AGREE TO AWARD BUT WILL ASK ANOTHER INCREASE

TELEGRAPHERS WILL PROTEST

While Organizations Are Not Satisfied They Are Going to Accept For Present in Order to Secure Back-Pay Award.

Chicago.-Acceptance under protest of the United States railway labor board's wage decision was decided upon at an executive conference by all of the sixteen recognized ratiroad unions except one, was announced following the meeting by Timothy Shea, of the brotherhood of locomotive firemen and enginemen.

The one exception was the brotherhood of railway telegraphers, which referred the award to its membership together with a strike proposition. The fifteen other organizations decided that they would renew their case before the labor board.

New Demands to Follow.

The organizations which accepted the award expressed dissatisfaction with the amount of increases granted by the board, but decided upon acceptance, in order, they stated, to receive the back pay due them under the provisions of the award. Leaders said they would present a new request for further increases in wages to meet what they considered a "fair wage."

The order of Railroad Telegraphers in a statement declared that they "apparently had been unjustly discriminated against by the board without any explanation for this discrimination." They received a smaller amount than any other organization and the representatives who were in this city have referred without recommendation, the award to the membership with a strike vote proposition added, for such action as they shall decide upon.

Increase Asked.

Washington.-On increase of 20 per cent in passenger fares and 50 per cent in Pullman charges was asked of the interstate commerce commission by the railroads to cover part of the \$600,000,000 award of the railroad labor board.

Additional increases in freight rates ranging from 10 per cent in eastern territory to 8 per cent in western territory, also were asked. I. David's Unsuccessful Attempt to Bring Up the Ark (vv. 1-5).

of doing a right thing. That the ark of the Lord of Hosts, the symbol of God's presence, should be brought to the very center of the nation's life was a decision worthy of all praise. It surely met God's approval. David gathered together the representative menof the nation in order that the movement might be a national one. That David was sincere in this measure cannot be doubted, but he was hasty and inconsiderate. God had expressly decreed that the Kohathites should bear the ark upon their shoulders (Num. place it even upon a new cart was a positive violation of God's commandment. Though David was sincere, hissincerity did not atone for disobedience to God's Word. The dictum that it matters little what you do, just soyou are honest and sincere, is one of the Devil's blackest lies. It mattered much in this case, and always does. David cannot be excused on the ground of ignorance, because he had the opportunity to know. God cannot be blamed for man's ignorance when he has given him the law and the ability to understand it.

II. God Vindicates His Law and Holless (vv. 6-9).

The people were very joyful as they moved on toward Jerusalem with the ark, but suddenly there was a stop to Nearly all the equipment for build- their jubilant voices and music. At forth his hand to steady it. This resuited in his being stricken with death. Ignorance does not make a man immune from the death which is in the touch of the heavily charged electric wire; neither does it in the case of the violation of God's laws.
