## 500 DEAD FROM QUAKE SHOCKS TO PROBE TWO OKLAHOMA

EXTENT OF DISASTER IS GROWING WORSE EACH HOUR OF RESCUE

### 20,000 ITALIANS HOMELESS

Many Towns are Wrecked-Thou sands of Persons are injured and Much Damage is Done by Sudden Quakes

Pisa, Italy.-King Victor Emmanuel with his suite, who came to this city mediately after he received news of the earthquake in this vicinity, went to visit districts in Tuscany which were affected by the shock.

The Epoca estimates that the dead in the earthquake exceed 500 and the homeless more than 20,000.

Detachments of troops and Red Cross workers have set out from Spesia, Genoa and other cities to give aid to the refugees.

Thousands of persons are homeless and are living upon the bounty of the government or such aid as is being furnished by charitable organizations.

Throughout the provinces of Massa-Eh-Carra and Lisa improvised towns of military tents have been prected to house the fugitives.

The territoy violently disturbed seems to be lozenge shaped with Florence at the southern apex and Modena at the northern end. It extends along the Etrurian coast and runs over the Appenines eastward for upwards of 100 miles. In this district there are many populous towns, and no tidings have as yet been received from many of them. There is every in-ligation that the shock was a se were one and report from cities in the earinquake zone show that buildings countled benearh the strain of the convulsion of the earth.

At Fivizzano, a town of 17,000 inhabitants, near Carrara, almost every building was damaged and some completely destroyed. Among the collapsed buildings is the postoffice, in the ruins of which is the entire staff. Soliera, in the province of Massa Marfittima, and Monti, nearby, were practticaly destroyed. Rivesano, Forni and Montignoro, are reported in ruins, NEW NOTE SENT TO MEXICO while in Marina and Carrara many structures have collapsed. At Viareggio the church of St. Paul was de stroyed and at Castel Franco di Sotto the ceiling of a church was shat

Panic prevails at Lucca as a result of the catacylsm and from Gavinana and Limestre come reports of lives being lost. At Villa Franca in Lunigiana, an entire family was buried in the ruins of their home, and the village of Vigetta was entirely destroyed. Serious damage was done in the Frigino district, where houses collapsed and at Franssinero, where a number of houses fell. Pievelpelago and Saint Andrea were badly damaged, but the number of victims has not been ascertained.

The whole matter has been referred by the bureau of internal revenue to the attorney general, it was learned.

#### M'SWINEY MAY BE FREED Premier George Wants Pledge That Murders in Ireland Cease.

London.-A dispatch to the London Times from Viege, Switzerland, quotes David Lloyd George, the British prime minister, as saying that if guarantees are given that the murtier of policemen in Ireland will cease the premier is convinced that Lord Mayor MacSwiney and the other hunger-strikers will be released from

Oklahoma and Tulsa County Sheriffs to be Brought Before the Investigators

Oklahoma City.-Following a denial by the supreme court of the attorney general's petition for ouster proceedings to be instituted originally in the court against Sheriff G. E. Johnson and Deputies J. B. Saunders and Frank J. Goodwin of Oklahoma county, Elmer L. Fulton, assistant attorney general, announced that he will file his petition in the district court. The petition asks also that the officers be suspended from duty until the decision of charges against them. It alleges neglect of duty on the part of the officials at the time of the lynching of Claude Chandler, young negro moon-

Call for a grand jury in Oklahoma county to investigate the personnel of the mob which lynched Chandler was issued by Judge Edward D. Oldfield in district court on motion of O. A. Cargill, county attorney. The grand jury will be drawn and will begin its investigations September 22.

Oral argument as to whether the supreme court shall assume original jurisdiction in the ouster proceedings against Sheriff Woolley of Tulsa county will be heard. After the court refused the application of Fulton for oriignal action in the Oklahoma county case, C. W. King, assistant attorney general handling the investigation of the recent mob in Tulsa county, requested that he be given further opportunity to present his case to the supreme court, Sheriff Woolley of Tulsa will be heard at the same tin a, if he desires to oppose original action by the supreme court, it was announced.

Although members of the supreme court expressed themselves on the bench as regarding as unconstitutional the provisions of the attorney general's act giving the supreme court original jurisdiction in ouster cases. the decision not to hear the Oklahoma county case was announced to be made because there was not sufficient evidence that a fair trial could not be obtained in the district court.

Protection of Lives and Property Are Demanded.

Washington. - The United States has sent a new note demanding that the lives and property rights of all Americans in Mexico be accorded fullest protection by the newly elected government.

This notification, Secretary Colby said, is supplementary to representations recently directed more particularly toward protection of American oil interests. It demands protection for all interests.

Mexican embassy officials are strongly of the opinion that Mexico's reply will be couched in extremely conciliatory terms. This opinion is based largely upon the statement by President-elect Obregon that desiring "to set Mexico right in the eyes of the world," he will appoint impartial commissions to adjust American claims for reparation, as well as to adjust disputes over oil properties.

It is probable that the reply will be an elaboration of Obregon's statement, perhaps going into detail as to the proposed commissions. Embassy officials express belief, also, that the United States will be urged not to press its grievances until the new administration is firmly established in

King and Queen Mother Quarrel Over

Lease Fees.

London.-A dispute has arisen between King George and Queen Mother Alexandria regarding lettings which have been made by her majesty on the royal estate at Sanderingham.

The queen mother let a number of building plots on ninety-nine year leases at very low rents but received fees in each case varying from \$2,500 to \$10,000. The king claims that as Alexandria is only a tenant for life of the royal property she cannot appropriate these sums herself.

The matter has been referred to the home secretary, who is supposed to settle any such dispute between the sovereign and any member of the royal family. This is the first occasion in seventy years that a dispute between two members of the royal family has been referred to the home secretary.

#### Bank Robbed of \$4,000.

New Orleans-Three armed men entered the industrial branch of the Hibernia Bank and Trust company, lined four employes against the wall and escaped with \$4,000 in currency which they took from the teller's counter. Two of the robbers made an unsuccessful attempt to open the door to a safe which contained more than of to the aid of the Pittsburgh, \$15,000. Within five minutes from the time they entered they departed in an automobile. No trace of the robbers have been receivd.

## AND JURY IS NOW ORDERED HUGE ARMY IS TO BE RAISED

GREAT INDUCEMENT TO THOSE WHO WILL TAKE PART

### BE USED IN EMERGENCY

70,000 Officers Selected for Command in U. S. Emergency Militia Which Will be Able to Mobilize Within 24 Hours

Washington.-The war department t was announced, is completing the organization for a vast emergency army, the greater portion of which can be mobilized and equipped within 24 hours. Under this plan the first line will consist of the regular army of 300,000 troops; the national guard with 435,000 officers and men will form the second line. A reserve force. for which 70,000 officers have already been appointed and 12,000 more are under consideration, will form the final and by far the most numerous

While the number of troops in the reserve force is not definitely fixed, the skeleton organization will be such that it can be expanded to any size the emergency may require.

Nine Zones Are Planned. For the organization and administration of this great army the country has been divided into nine military districts to be known as corps areas and which will displace the six departments established in 1916. These areas are organized not only with respet to the military population composed within their boundaries but also with reference to supplementing the military defense of the coast lines.

Each corps area commander will be charged with all the military activities in his area and with certain exceptions will be in command of all the regular and organized reserve personnels stationed therein. He must not, however, be confounded with the commanders of tactical corps that may be organized in his area. He will deal directly with local authorities and one of his most important duties relates to the organization of the national guard and organized reserves.

The strength of the national guard, 455,000, is practically the same number of national guard officers and men who were serving in the United States army on June 30, 1918.

### 10 ARE KILLED, 70 HUJURED COLLISION OF HEAVY IN-

Denver, Colo.—Ten persons were killed and seventy injured when two interurban cars collided headon on a curve just outside of Globeville, a suburb of Depver. All but one of the dead have been identified.

A special car on a train carrying a load of holiday pleasure seekers to sort, collided with a regular car returning from Boulder on the Denver & Interurban railway.

According to officials in charge of the Globeville stations, the conductor of the outbound car failed to obtain orders to wait at Globeville for the incoming car. The incoming car was two minutes behind schedule and was running at high speed to make up the time. When the cars struck they plowed into each other for a disance of fifteen feet.

The cars collided on a curve and were virtually telescoped. One of the cars was enroute from Denver to Boulder, Colo., while the second was coming to Denver from Boulder.

With an impact heard for blocks accompanied by the grinding of brakes and the screams of the injured, the big coaches smashed head-on. The Boulder coach ploughed fifteen feet into the front of the out-bound coach. The cars were so badly telescoped that their front ends were a mass of wreckage.

Those in the front part of the coaches were enmeshed in the wreckage and great difficulty was encountered by the rescuers in bringing out the dead and injured.

2. Reason given (v. 21). "The drunkard and the glutton shall come to poverty." Intemperance in drinking and eating leads to ruin. Poverty inevitably follows in their wake.

5. Wounds without a cause. These are wounds which might have been avoided-from fightings in which a sober man would not have engaged, and from accidents which are purely the result of intoxication.

6. Redness of eyes. This has reference to the bloodshot eye of the tippler which renders dim his vision.



When the critics proclaim Darde as "a second Rodin" they have a definite thought in mind. Auguste Rodin (1840-1917) was what may be called an impressionist in method and a realist in execution. His chief characteristic is his extraordinary power "in the synthesis of psychic expression."

Translated into ordinary English and illustrated by example, this means something like the following: His much-abused "Balsac" is not so much a statue of the man as an embodiment of the "Comedie Humaine"; his "Kiss" is less the embrace of a man and a woman than the psychology of passion in the kiss. And, of course, Rodin was a sensation in the art world. Nearly every one of his many works has been hotly discussed with extravagant praise and downright abuse-and is so discussed to this day. 





CHARMING studio, in the Latin quarter of Paris, sheltered "Three Musketeers of the Brush;" Talbot Wynne, or Taffy, a big, fair, blue-eyed young Yorkshireman, who had been a soldier, but was at last following his wish to be an artist; then Sandy McAllister, or the Laird, as his friends called him, intended by his parents for a solicitor, but who was in Paris painting Toreadors and singing French ballads, with a decided Scotch accent.

"The third he was Little Billie," or William Bagot, a pleasing young Englishman from London. To live and and at last it was a reality, he and his two friends having taken the studio together. He often looked at these friends and wondered if anyone, living or dead, ever had two such glorious chums. He never forgot that Impromptu, which he was destined to hear again one day in very strange circumstances.

Then the two, Svengali and his come panion Gecko, made music together so divinely, indeed, that even Taffy and the Laird were almost as wild in their enthusiasm as Billie, but with an enthusiasm too deep for words.

Suddenly there came another interruption, a loud knuckle-rapping at the outer door, and a voice of great volume, that might belong to any sex, or even an angel, uttered the British milkman's yodel, "milk below," and before anyone could say "entrez," a strange figure appeared framed in the gloom of the antechamber; the figure of a very tall and fully developed young girl, clad in the gray overcoat of a French infantry soldier; below this there showed a short striped petticoat, and beneath it were visible her bare white ankles, the toes losing themselves in a huge pair of men's list

While not strictly beautiful, the girl had great charm; she was really much like a healthy young English boy. Closing the door behind her she said, wistfully: "Ye're all English, now, aren't ye? I heard the music and thought I'd just come in for a bit and pass the time of day; you don't mind?

Triby, that's my name, Triby O'Fer-

Yes this was Trilby of the studios, artists' model, taking her noonday rest. She sat down upon the model throne to eat her luncheon and listen to the music.

When Svengali had brought the music to a close, Trilby remarked it was not very gay, and offered to sing a song which she knew, and in English, whereat she sang "Ben Bolt," and finished amid an embarrassing silence; for her hearers did not know whether it was intended seriously or in fun; such a volume of sound ensued that it flooded the studio, but without melody or music of any kind, in fact as if the singer were tone-deaf as indeed she

With her charm and goodfellowship, Trilby won the hearts of the Three Musketeers, Billie's most of all, and it was Billie for whom she felt the deepest affection. She cooked for them at times, mended their clothing, listened to their music and the wonderful talks of "the glory that was Greece and the grandeur that was Rome." At other times she criticized their work; in fact, was quite "one of them."

A climax came one day when Billie, visiting another studio, discovered Trilby posing for the "altogether." He was so shocked that he was awakened to the fact of his great love for Trilby, and rushing home to his friends, declared that he was going to Barbizon to paint the forest and that he wanted to be alone.

Trilby, too, saw matters in a different light, and after much self-examination and struggle, decided that she would pose no more, but would earn her living as a fine laundress, with an old friend who had a laundry and was doing well. Poor Trilby was certainly one of the frail ones but through ignorance, rather than wrong intent; now she saw her mistake and with her love for Billie there came a new feeling, a dawning self-respect.

Nineteen times Billie asked Trilby to marry him, but she always refused. feeling herself unworthy. Then one Christmas night he asked her the twentieth time, "Will you marry me? twentieth time, "Will you marry me? If not I leave Paris in the morning never to return," and Trilby, fearing to lose him out of her life, finally answered "Yes."

Then the three Musketeers were together again in Paris, where they visited the scenes of former times, at least going to the old studio, now rented to other tenants, but having still upon its wall Billie's famous drawing of Trilby's foot, protected by a covering of glass: and beneath it some stanzas to Pauvre Trilby, la belle et bonne et

One night they attended a concert in a large hall on the Rue St. Honore. The first violin had scarcely taken his seat before they recognized their old friend Gecko. Just as the clock struck, Svengali appeared-the conductor. Then a moment of silence, and two little page-boys each drew a silken rope, the curtains parted, and a tall figure walked slowly down to the front of the stage. The house rose to meet her as she advanced, bowing to right and left-"It was Trilby."

Her eyes on Svengali, at a signal from him, she sang without accompaniment, in a voice so immense in its softness, richness and freshness, that it seemed to be pouring itself from all around; and then her dove-like eyes looked past Svengall, straight at Billie, and all his long-lost power of loving came back with a rush.

At last—the final performance of the evening. Trilby vocalized, without words, Chopin's Impromptu in A flat; astounding, no plane had ever given out such notes as these! Amid the wild applause and enthusiasm of an immense audience Trilby had made her debut in Paris.
