CERTIFY I EV STATE AUDITOR TO ABIDE BY ATTORNEY GENERAL FREELING'S DECISION

TAX LEVY CONTROVERSY ENDED it Was Opinion of Attorney General That the Legality of the Equalization Board Could Not

Be Questioned.

Frank C. Carter, state auditor, will certify the ad valorem tax levy of 1% mills for state purposes to the county assessors for collection next Monday. he said, after Attorney General Freethat it was his ministerial duty to cer- | Osage, tify the levy passed by the majority of the board of equalization and that he had no authority to consider the legality of the board's action.

Freeling did not discuss the figures upon which the majority members of the board based their contention that a levy is necessary or the other figures of the auditor upon which he based his opposition to any levy at all, he said in his opinion. He held only that the auditor had no power to question the action of the board after it had been taken.


Contention Not Reversed, Carter Says. "So long as he holds it is my duty to certify out the levy, I acquiese," Carter said. "I shall send out the notices to the county assessors on Monday for them to spread the levy on their tax rolls. The attorney general did not pass upon the questions upon which I made my objections to the levy, and I do not consider that his opinion is a reversal of my ontentions. It mains merely that if taxpayers of the state agree with my statements that a lavy is unnecessary and illiegal, it is for then to take a ope to ston its on lection, and not for me to do it."

Board Determined Necessity.

Freeling's opinion advised Carter as follows:

"It was the duty of the state board of equalization under the law to consider the data with reference to the finances of the state and make such tax levy as in its judgment would meet the requirements of the state under the law. The board made this computation and determined by a vote of four to two that it was necessary to make a levy of 11/2 mills ad valorem tax for state purposes, onefourth mill for common schools and

> Because of intense confusion in the yard it was difficult to obtain accurate in formation even an hour after the blast. It was believed, however, that a score of workmen had been trapped in the hold.

> An employe of the drydock company said he had been seen at least six bodies taken from the hold of the Crowe.

> The blast blew a great hole in the starboard side of the ship. At one porthole appeared's workman trapped below. He pleaded with his fellow workers ashore to rescue him. A hose was turned on him while workers raised a cry of "ladders- ladders, for God's sake, ladders."

When ladders were brought rescuers worked desperately. Firemen in gas masks descended inao thes moke filled hold. Bodies were hauled up with ropes and the injured rushed to hosintals. 1.1 -

An hour after the explosion four bodies had been recovered. A hasty check-up of workers showed four more missing. The number of injured was placed between twenty and thirty.

PEACE TERMS ARE FINISHED

Russians and Poles' to Restore Seized Property.

Riga.-Polish and soviet Russian delegations here were completing the work of framing the final armistice terms between the two governments and Prince Sapieha, Polish foreign minister, was expected to arrive to take part tomorrow in the ceremonies fucident to signing the convention.

The exact terms of the agreement have not as yet been made public, but it is learned from authoritative sources that the two governments will covenant to mutually return all prisoners held by them, restore archives and other property and to pay for property taken or destroyed by either country without military necessity. Many claims for a restoration of gold taken from the state bank at Warsaw when the Russians evacuated that town upon the approach of German forces during the world war now are being considered by the finance committee, and there are indications of an adjustment.



This 'tots' does not include the population of outlying possessions which will be announced is soon as the figures for Alaska and the military and naval services abroad are tabulated. It is estimated, however, those possessions have 12,250,000 inhabitants, so the total number of people living under the American flag is round in

1. The reason for (v. 12). The news of the imprisonment of John the Baptist caused Jesus to forsake Judea and go into Galilee. The fate of John he accepted as foreshadowing his own. Because of this, he withdrew from the metropolis and went to the remote regions where his work would attract less attention. When the people wilfully reject the truth and at-tempt to do violance to the messen-ger, he should turn from them unless specially directed otherwise.

2. To whom the proclamation is made (vv. 18-16). The people in Capernaum. This was done in fulfillment of a prophecy in Isaiah 9:1, 2, These people did not enjoy such privfleges as those around Jerusalem. This was one of the darkest and most corrupt of the provinces, and now it is getting the light first. This foreshadowed the present age when the grace of God would reach out to the Gentiles. But this is just like the Lord. He did not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance. It should be our husiness, like the Master, to go to the most benighted souls with the message of light and life.

3. His message (v. 17). "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." This is the same kingdom which John the Baptist and the Old Testament prophets proclaimed. It means the Messianic earth rule of Jesus Christ. This is not our message, for ours is the gospel of the grace of God through faith in the finished work of Christ. We should call upon men to repent and believe the time is coming when heralds will again announce the coming of the kingdom, and the King himself will come forth from the heavens to establish his mediatorial kingdom. FIREPROOF PLANE SUCCESS

Has Midnight Landing Device-Another Great Invention.

New York-Experts of the army and navy aviation service were preparing reports to the government on the flying demonstration of a flaming oil-soaked, fire-proofed airplane and its midnight landing device, witnessed by them at Mineola. American and British experts who saw the srec'acular demonstration by Paul Collins. a civilian flier, and it marked one of the most important developments in avia-

1920 **BIG CLOTHING REDUCTION**

Spring Prices to Be Very Much Lower Than Estimated.

Chicago,-Bertram J. Cahn, presidont of the wholesale clothiers' association of Chicago, has forecast a reduction in clothing prices, which, he said, will be even more not'crable in spring goods, ft was announced.

Mr. Cahn asserted that manufacturers will make small profits this fall and asserted that many clothiers were foregoing profits and selling at cost. He predicted, however, that material costs would be lowered by spring, and woolen mills will have announced a cut 18-Alabama --- 2.347.295 of from 20 to 25 pr cent for spring 19-monnessee --- 2.997.459 goods. With labor's co-operation in creased production, he foresaw still

further reductions in prices. Mr. Cabn's statement, it was said, was authorized by the National Association of Clothiers as the first authentic statement on the present clothing situation.

Louisiana to have 364,000 acres of permanent refuge on the gulf ∞

UISIANA, though she looks a gift horse in the mouth when it comes to woman suffrage, knows a good thing in bird life conservation when she ees it. Which is to say that the very same legislature which refused to acre, at a low estimate. ratify the Susan B. Anthony amendment took action that gives the Pelican state a vast bird refuge. So, while Louisiana did not help the women to realize their ambition for "votes for women in 1920," she is going to help them keep their swearoff on wearing algrettes and wild-bird plumage on their hats. If all the plans go through Louistana's bird refuge will be a huge one. In any event it's a big one, as such things go. Of course, some of the big national parks with their thousands of square miles of wild-life sanctuary are bigger. But Louislana's refuge is quite big enough to accomplish its purpose. And geographically it is just exactly where it is needed. It fronts on the Gulf of Mexico, extending back far enough to take in rolling prairie and wooded upper land, Ideal territory for the preservation and propagation of bird life of various kinds. It lies directly in the paths of migration north and south through the Mississippl valley, up and down which, according to observers of the United States biological survey, passes more than 87 per cent of the migratory game birds that enter the United States from either direction each season. By this action of the legislature Louislana became possessed of 164.30° acres through two gifts. One is 85,-000 acres in Vermition parish from the Rockefeller foundation and the other is 79,300 acres, including the famous Marsh island, from the Russell Sage foundation. These two tracts were allotted to the state five years ago on the condition that the state conservation department should demonstrate for five years its ability to protect the wild life and to establish breeding places for all the resident birds and for all the visitors from central and South America. Mexico and the north. The conservation department did a good job and wrote Q. E. D. at the end of these five years. Thereupon the two foundations informed the state that they were prepared to turn over the tract in perpetuity. So the legislature passed enabling acts, permitting the state to receive these tracts and to preserve them forever as wild life refuges. Prior to this legislative action the state of Lousiana had been the recipient of a gift of 57.000 acres in the some part of the state from Charles Willis Ward and John Avery McGlen-



Parker, Conservation Commissione M. L. Alexander and Mr. Mclibenny have a plan to increase the total acreage to 363,000 in one big tract.

The Rockefeller foundation and Ward-Mclihenny tracts are separated by two other tracts. One of the latter is a tract of 48,000 acres, lying in Vermillion parish and owned by the Vermillon Bay company. The other is a tract of 86,000 acres, belonging to several owners. By the addition of these two tracts the big bird refuge would have an unbroken frontage of 75 miles on the gulf.

Commissioner Alexander believes that the next year will see the purchase of these two tracts by the state and their addition to the refuge. It is stated that a majority of the owners of the \$6,000 acre tract have agreed to sell to the state for refuge purposes at a price approximating \$5 an acre. This is virtually a gift to the state of half the value of the land.

Mr. McIlhenny has been called the "father of wild-life conservation in the south." Apparently he deserves the title. Anyway, it was he who influenced Mrs. Sage to make the Marsh island purchase.

The first work of the department was to eliminate the market hunters, which was done by means of armed wardens, authorized as deputy sheriffs and marshals, traveling in motor patrol boats equipped with small rapid-fire guns. It was a hard fight. Louisiana has long been the baunt of

swarms of market hunters and plumage hunters. Many battles were fought between the wardens and the poachers. The most sensational, possibly, was that in which Rene Saunler fought a three-hour gun hattle with six market hunters. The warden was shot in the eye and the lung, but arrested all six lawbreakers. Saunier nearly died, but finally recovered. All six of the poachers are serving terms in state's prison and Marsh Island is free from their kind nowadays.

Soon after obtaining the Russell Sage foundation gift Mr. McIlhenny went again to New York and, with Mr. Ward's assistance, succeeded in persuading the Rockefeller foundation to take action.

I believe this is the only place in

North America where these herons nest in any numbers, though I have recently shipped 1.500 pairs of these and of the Louisiana and little blue herons to another wild-life refuge just being established in Florida.

"Today there are also breeding in Willow pond, some 6,000 pairs of little blue herons, 10 000 pairs of Louisiana herons, 300 pairs of green herons, 50 pairs of purple gallinutes, 60 pairs of Florida gallinules, 25 pairs of least bittern, 10 pairs of kingrails, and so on.
