PROCEEDINGS

Portales, New Mexico, Saturday, Oct. 16th, A. D., 1920.
At a called session of the Board of County Commissioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, at the court house in Portales county site of said county, following were present, to-wit: S. S. Pearce, chairman; Ed L. Hill and Chas. S. Toler, commissioners; and Seth A. Morrison, clerk.
Whereas, by section 1977 of the Constitution of the New Mexico Territory, 1915, it is made the duty of the Boards of County Commissioners of each county, in the State of New Mexico, to proclaim elections that are to be held in their respective counties, for the purpose of voting upon candidates for the different offices and matters, and to do so ten days before election by Public Declaration, in each of the two leading newspapers published in a county; and
Whereas, it is made the duty of said Board of County Commissioners to give public notice of the object of the election, the candidates to be voted upon, questions to be voted on, the names of the candidates for each of said offices, as the same are on file in the office of the County Clerk, the postoffice address of each said candidate and the place where the election is to be held in each precinct in their respective counties, also to appoint judges for holding the election in the various precincts of their respective counties.
Now Therefore, we, the Board of County Commissioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, pursuant to law and the authority vested in us, do hereby Proclaim an election to be held in the various precincts of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, on Monday, the Second day of November, A. D., 1920; the object and purpose of said election being to elect candidates for offices hereinafter mentioned, also to vote on and question "An Act Providing for the Issuance of Four Per Cent Bonds by the State of New Mexico, in the Sum of Two Million Dollars to Provide Funds for the Construction and Improvement of State Highways Provided for by a Tax Levy for the Payment of Interest and Principal of Said Bonds, and for Other purposes as provided in Senate Substitute No. 86, as Amended."
We do further proclaim that at the election the qualified voters of said county shall vote for the following officers to be elected to the State at Large, to-wit: Representative in Congress for the term of two years, Governor, for the term of four years, Lieutenant Governor, for the term of two years, Secretary of State, for the term of two years, State Auditor, for the term of two years, State Treasurer, for the term of two years, Attorney General, for the term of two years, Superintendent of Public Instruction, for the term of two years, Commissioner of Public Safety, for the term of two years, Justice of the State Supreme Court, for the term of six years, State Corporation Commissioner, for the term of six years, do further proclaim that at the election, the qualified voters of said county, shall vote for the following officers, to-wit: State Senator, for the term of two years, State Representative, for the term of two years, District Attorney, for the term of four years, County Commissioner, for the term of two years.

One County Commissioner, for precinct two, for the term of two years.
One County Commissioner, for precinct three, for the term of two years.
One Probate Judge, for the term of two years.
One County Clerk, for the term of two years.
One Sheriff, for the term of two years.
One Assessor, for the term of two years.
One County Treasurer, for the term of two years.
One Superintendent of Schools, for the term of two years.
One County Surveyor, for the term of two years.
We do further proclaim that at said election the qualified electors shall vote "For" or "Against" the "State Highway Bond Act."
We do further proclaim that the following named persons be and they are hereby appointed to serve as judges of the election in the various precincts of said county, Tuesday, November 2nd, 1920, and that the first named Judge in each precinct shall be designated as chairman of the Board of Judges and shall receive the ballot box and all election supplies from the County Clerk.

R. H. HANNA VISITS CITY

The Hon. Richard H. Hanna, Democratic nominee for Governor, spoke to one of the largest audiences ever assembled for any political meeting at this place on Friday evening, October 15th, and judging from the amount of enthusiasm and applause the crowd was not disappointed.
Judge Hanna is a forceful speaker and impresses listeners as a clean, virile, sincere American statesman, far removed from the rank and file of the all too prevalent politician.
His talk was entirely free from personalities or in the language of the "herd," mud-slinging. It seems pitiable that when it is not possible to find any stigma either moral or political, to attach to a candidate's name that the leaders of the opposing party are so hard pressed as to compel them to fall back upon the inane and age worn accusation.
His clean, concise statement of facts left no doubt in any unbiased mind of thorough knowledge of his subject, the absolute integrity of the speaker, or the sincerity in the welfare of New Mexico whose rights he so loyally champions and defends and seeks to protect and more firmly establish by defeating and vanquishing boss rule from state politics.
It is very evident that his absence from the aforesaid mud-

slings is not due to any pigeon livered or molly-coddle fear, but because he is above petty conduct of any nature.
To attempt to describe the impression of character and strength of this man is futile. We cannot describe these things. We only know they are there. He is the type of man in whose presence the shoulders straighten, the chest expands and lagging purpose rallies to once more "play the game." It can readily be understood why the best Republican papers in the state are supporting this Democratic candidate. It is because they are big enough and clean enough to place good government above partisanship, even though temporarily they must desert their party. It is to be hoped the Republicans in general will prize this fearless stand of these honest men who dare to defy "Boss Bursum." We feel and know there are many heretofore dyed-in-the-wool Republicans who are going to vote for Judge Hanna, because they also know that clean government is the supreme issue of state development and because they are sincere, progress loving New Mexicans.

NON-PARTISAN MEETINGS
Furnish Succulent Morsel for Sweet Tooth of Republican Speakers.

Is it coincidence? That immediately following the necessity for calling to order a Republican speaker who had been asked to address the W. C. T. U. convention at Belen, which organization is known to be strictly non-partisan, because he, namely, Mr. Stroupe, insisted upon making a "true to type" Republican speech and even persisted until the Secretary, Miss Harriet Henderson demanded order for the second time. We have brought to our attention that the only two Republican campaign speeches that have been given in Portales were suddenly arranged when non-partisan meetings had been called and crowds gathered for other purposes, namely the most worthy and much appreciated talks on Child Welfare by officials of New Mexico Child Welfare Service, a state organization. The first occasion was when a large crowd of women had gathered from the four corners of the county to hear this talk on the subject before stated and found instead Judge Mechem and party, the speakers of the hour, or hours rather, because by the time the gentlemen had finished, (they having extended the courtesy to the lady speakers of waiting until they were through) it was too late for the original program to be given. So the Welfare committee was asked to speak after the meeting of the Woman's Club of Portales on Wednesday, the 20th, when there was to be an open non-partisan meeting under the auspices of the Club for the instruction for the proper marking of the ballot, which would bring a large number of persons together. It was so arranged and the meeting held according to schedule and on that afternoon a lady by the name of Mrs. Stroupe, who explained that she was in Portales quite by accident, asked permission of the Club to be allowed to speak on "Good Citizenship." This courtesy was granted as it was generally known that the meeting was strictly non-partisan. After the Club meeting and Child Welfare work talks were over the above lady took the floor. The meeting rapidly evolved into something of very different character than non-partisan, however. So much so that after a few minutes only a few chairs remained filled in the room.
Among many of the statements the lady made was one that Judge Hanna had always been against Woman Suffrage and had said the New Mexican women were not ready for it, and that he, Judge Hanna, had offered her very dear friend, Mrs. Carrie Chapman-Catt, the great suffrage leader, the supreme affront of her whole career by talking against woman suffrage in her presence, and that she (Mrs. Stroupe) would never forgive him for it and had sworn to get even.
Following is a statement written and signed by a woman citizen of Portales who needs no introduction to either this district or state, who through her extensive work and position, knows whereof she speaks, and gives Judge Hanna's true attitude toward the question of woman suffrage:

The Statement:

As acting state chairman of the National Suffrage Association, I had occasion to call upon Judge Hanna and other state officials at the State Capitol, about three adv.

years ago when the Suffrage amendment was pending in the House of Representatives. The National Suffrage association had sent individual memorials stating that the signor favored the amendment. Judge Hanna signed this memorial very graciously and gladly, and stated that he would wire Congressman Walton to do all that he could for its passage. State Senator Dunlavy was in Washington when the amendment passed the House of Representatives and wired me that it passed by one vote and Walton voted for it.
Senator A. A. Jones held the chairmanship of the Suffrage Amendment in the U. S. Senate at that time and the good work which he did in that Congress made it possible for its passage in the present Congress.

LABOR ORGANIZATIONS URGE FUNDS BE PLACED IN U. S. SECURITIES

Montreal, Canada.—The Fortieth Convention of the American Federation of Labor, by unanimous vote, declared regular and systematic investment in Government securities a part of its permanent policy for the benefit of its members and the welfare of the country. The resolution bearing on this subject reads in part: "The American Federation of Labor reiterates its former endorsement and approval of the plan of the Savings Division of the United States Treasury Department now being operated in each of the Federal Reserve Districts. "All International Unions and Federal Unions are urged to advocate War Savings Stamps, War Savings Certificates and Registered Treasury Savings Certificates as the best and safest method for saving and investment their members can adopt, against the schemes of those who are now undertaking to take advantage of the Government's savings program and the savings habit formed during the war by introducing thrift systems in industry, through which they will make a profit from the savings of workers." The convention also recommended local unions place their funds in government securities, buy Liberty and Victory Notes and hold them to maturity. The convention's final resolution asked that the government continue and extend the savings work through each of the Federal Reserve Districts. Geo. H. Joh made this office a pleasant call this week.
