AMERICAN FARMERS HEAR **GOVERNOR HARDING** SPEAK

RESERVE BOARD DISPLEASED

Statement of New Farm Loan Plans Will Be Made Public In Washington Very Soon After Governors' Session le Predicted

Washington,-The federal reserve board is preparing to make a new statement of policy covering all the phases of the credit situation, was told representatives of agricultural interests in convention here, who appealed for relief from "stringent" credit con-

The statement probably will be made public after the conclusion of the fall conference of federal reserve | ed. agents and reserve banks, it is said.

A committee from the reserve board listened for three hours to accounts of conditions which the agricultural delegation said threatened the life of the nation through a reduction of food production. Difficulties of the farmers were laid almost wholly to inability to obtain financial assistance. It was asserted that banks of the reserve system were not supplying needed funds and that many local bankers claimed to be acting under instructions from the federal reserve

Denial of the board issuing instructions which would result in curtailing farmers' credit was made. The board and officals of the reserve banks were in sympathy with the plight of the farmers, and were encouraging loans to aid them, but the board was without authority to instruct member banks as to loans they could or could not make.

"In the first place," Governor Harding said, "I can see no practical value in your visit to the board. Our acts are defined by law. Your conference here with us has resulted only in your re-telling what we already knew. The board knows your trials and your difficulties and is in entire sympathy with you."

Bankers Confidence Shaken Governor Harding told the delegation that German interesth had informed him they were in the market for 2,000,000 bales of American cotton. NIGHT RIDERS KILL GIN GUARD POST COTTON GINS TO HOLD **FOR 40C PER POUND**

Battle To Force Holding of Staple From Market Is Cause of Huge Losses To Cotton Gins.

First bloodshed in connecttion with widespread efforts of night riders to keep cotton off the market until the staple is bringing 40 cents a pound was reported from England, Ark. Nora Canada, a negro, employed as guard at a gin whose owner had received a warning to discontinue operations was found shot to death.

The heaviest loss sustained since the night riders' campaign began, is reported from Cameron, Tex., where the compress and warehouses of the Cameron Compress Company, and 7,000 bases of cotton were burned. The flames destroyed property valued at \$1,000,000. Some officials believe the fire was of incendiary origin and the authorities are investigating a report that an automobile driven at high speed was seen to leave the vicinity just before the flames were discover-

Two Fires In Texas.

Two additional cotton fires were reported in Texas. The platform of the Farmers' Union warehouse at Rockdale was discovered in flames but the fire was extinguished. Several bales of cotton were reported destroyed in a fire at Thorndale.

Alabama Gins Are Idle. Gins in Moulton, Ala, were idle after the owners had discovered warnings posted on them, ordering them to to close until cotton brought 40 cents a pound and cottonseed \$40 a ton. Every gin in Calhoun, Ala., was

posted. The warning resulted in the calling of a mass meeting of the county branch of the American Cotton Association to discuss methods for protection. The warnings in this case were signed "Committee of One Hundred."

TO BE MADE UP OF RUTHEN-IA. UKRAINE, COSSOCK AND VOLGA STATES

GEN. WANGEL TO BE PRESIDENT

Indication in Official U. S. Circles Are It Will Morally Support, If Not Recognize the United States of Russia.

Washington.-A new and powerful federation by which white Ruthenia, the entire Ukraine, the Cossack territory between the Sea of Azov and the Volga, and all the territory now held by General Wrangel, will be organized into the United States of Russia, it was learned officially. The territory thus embraced includes approximately three-sevenths of all the population of European Russia.

The first president of the new republic, it is expected here, will be General Wrangel, who proposes immedistely the military forces of the various states are combined to make a liveries last year, has been supplied, it general attack upon the soviets. For this purpose he will have approximately 350,000 troops, the most formidable army ever assembled to combat Lenme and Trotzky. General Wrangel will also have the active co-operation of General Seminoff, now in command of a large force in Siberia.

Information received by this govermment stated that the Russian army recently defeated by the Poles is refusing to fight against General Wran gel. The entire soviet forces are said to be rapidly disintegrating and the next few weeks, it was predicted, will witness the most important developments in Moscow.

It was strongly indicated in official circles that the United States will morally support if it does not actually recognize the United States of Russia. It will insist, however, that the new government do its utmost to obtain control as much as possible of the old Russian empire, which the administration has announced would not be permitted to disintegrate.

Allies Ald Kerensky,

That all the great powers are ac tively supporting the proposed new movement is made clear by the fact that within the past few days the entire allied diplomatic corps in Pekin has compelled China to restore Prince Kudacheff, the Kerensky ambassador, to full power as the official representative of Russia. This significant move was made after China had shorn Prince Kudacheff of all official recognition and virtually ordered him and all the other Kerensky officials out of the country.

Baron Wrangel, it was pointed out, s a conservative of the conservatives. He was an officer in the czar's army. Later he supported Kerensky. When Kolchak, an ardent monarchist, was removed Wrangel succeeded him.

Wrangel's only rival for chief excutive of the proposed new republic is President Petlura, of the Ukraine, He represents the peasant class. It is understood, however, that he is content to remain head of the province over which he now presides.

All Business Houses Burned Madill, Okla.—Every business house in Aylesworth, a town 12 miles east of here, was burned, according to meager accounts reaching here. Firebugs are blamed for the blaze, although it is not known what reasons they could have had for setting the fire. Because of a strong wind, the small fire engine was unable to check the flames. Ten days ago a fire which is thought to have been set by firebugs, burned store buildings in Aylesworth and this fire cleaned out the remaining bushness houses of the town.

NO SHORTAGE IN COAL IS SEEN **OPERATORS SAY THEY CAN**

SUPPLY THE DEMAND

Public is Warned to Use Care Burning Fuel as Many Care Are Commandeered

New York,-There will be no serious coal shortage in any part of the country this year, provided ordinary care is exercised by consumers, it was predicted at the conference of the National Coal association, which comprises two-thirds of the bituminous coal producers of the United States. The coal operators, however, declar-ed that in order to keep the markets supplied steady work at the mines and a sufficient supply of railway cars also would be required. It was stated that some bituminous operators were getting only about 25 to 30 per cent of the of business in New Mexico, it was con-

A special committee which has been working with various co-operative agencies to prevent a winter fuel shortage reported that the interstate commerce commission, railways, big coal dealers and others were co-operating to increase production and to improve transportation and distribution facilities.

In order that the northwest may be protected an emergency order similar to that provided for New England dewas made known at the conference when the northeast is supplied, the operators and the railways will then be in a position to supply other sections of the country before the extreme cold weather begins, it was stated. The most serious shortage now is in the middle west, the operators said, but domestic consumers, through a systematic distribution, are getting enough coal to meet their demands.

80,000 Cars Commandeered. The committee's report stated that by an order of the interstate commerce commission 80,000 coal cars being used for the transportation of automobiles, sand, gravel and other commodities had been released for transportation of coal. With these cars, it was stated, the railways will furnish authcient cars to handle 12,000,000 tons of coal a week.

U. S. LINES CUTTING RATES

Competition of French Lines Said to ton from Des Moines. Be Cause of Reduction.

Washington.-Chairman Benson of the shipping board announced American and foreign shipping lines had agreed to go the limit in reducing freight charges to meet the competition of the French line, which has refused to enter a conference with lines of other nations for stabilizing rates. "War to the knife" will result, the chairman said, unless the French lines

plays fairly with the conference and joins in maintaining rates on the At-Action was taken on unanimous decision of the conference to broak rates, the chairman explained, when the

French line notified brokers it would take freight at rates under all the other lines. Both shipping board operators and private American owners are members of the conference, the chairman said. Rate cutting has been ordered on all

the services where the French line is established. These include ports of the entire eastern seaboard of the United States-North Atlantic, South Atlantic and gulf ports-French ports and Antwerp, Rotterdam, Hamburg and Bremen.

Every effort has been made to induce the French line to maintain rates established by the conference, Admiral Benson said, adding that it was with reluctance that American and other shipping interests had decided upon the retaliatory step.

new wealth created in one year by a single community-that is the record of Grove City, Pa., a whole community largely given over to dairying. There are many cities and towns throughout the county engaged in the production of some one principal commodity. Miners increase the value of coal by taking it from the ground. Manufacturers add to the value of raw materials by shaping them into marketable products. These increase wealth. But Grove City actually creates new wealth. It takes the air, sunshine and water-elements free to all -and converts them into gold-dairy

What the Grove City community is doing can be done by any community that is satisfactorily situated, and that has a well-equipped, well-managed creamery. The fact that the management is supervised by the United States department of agriculture probably gives it no appreciable financial advantage, because the relationship is investigational and has not reduced the cost of manufacture below that possible in many other creameries. The products are always sold on their merits, and the name of the department is not used to advertise them.

Community Spirit Built Up.

The success of the Grove City creamery is due largely to the admirable community spirit that has been built up there and in the surrounding district. That this spirit exists to-day is due largely to the efforts put forth by the business men of Grove City, especially the members of the Commercial club, an organization that is open to the farmers of the neighborhood who are interested in the advancement of dairying. From the very outset of the undertaking, in 1914, the business men took an active interest in the creamery-and in the movement toward agricultural development. through dairying, and by their enthusiasm they aroused the interest of the farmers.

The business men of Grove City took the first step, the farmers met them half-way, and all are now working for a common cause, which is the building up of a successful dairy community. Though the business men began the work for the public good and with fittle thought of personal gain, they have found that it is paying them well, because better farming has brought them better business.

The records of the creamery show a remarkable increase in income derived from the sale of its products. For the first year, from July 1, 1915, to June 30, 1916, the gross income was \$82,432; the second year it increased to \$212.904; the third year, to \$375,-506; and last year the gross income totaled \$505,810. As only a small part of the money was used to pay the cost of operation, nearly all of it was distributed among the farmers around Grove City. Since much of the income was due to increased and improved farm business, a large part of it may fairly be considered as newly created wealth.

Improved Dairy Cows.

The most direct cause of the greatly increased prosperity of the Grove City community is the more profitable dairy cow. Dalrying in the Grove City district has been much improved by the purebred cattle that have been shipped in, but it has been improved more by the scrub cattle that have been shipped out. The cow-testing association, which has taken the guesswork out of dairying in this district, is an organization of the dairy farmers who employ a tester to test their cows for production and to keep feed and production records.

Tuberculin tests from April, 1918, to May, 1920, were made on 387 herds, consisting of 4,988 animals, under the accredited herd plan. Of these, 148 herds are already accredited. According to latest figures, 250 farmers in the vicinity of Grove City own one or more purebred dairy animals. The importance of pure-breds is going for-

ward rapidly. The creamery has gained a reputation for high quality of products. This has brought a ready market at satisfactory prices, which have encouraged larger production. Increased production and satisfactory prices have made the furmers more prosperous, Increased financial prosperity, however, is only a small part of the gain that has come to the community. Better schools, better churches, better homes, and better social conditions are coming as a result of this, because the mony would be the result

> To achieve such success as that at Grove City, it is not necessary for a community to engage in the manufacture of dalry products. The Grove City plan can be adapted as well to any other type of agriculture. To make the work a success, however, the community must cast aside all selfishness, pull together, and organize, and should select for its field agent a man of personality, education, ability and diplomacy. He should be thoroughly trained in scientific and practical agriculture and must have tad wide experience. With such a man in charge and with a modern creamery there is every reason to believe that any community, with the spirit of cooperation and even fair agricultural resources, can do what the Grove City community has done.

Buyers of purebred live stock throughout the world are coming in increasing numbers to the United States, according to the bureau of markets of the United States department of agriculture. Foreign breeders now find in this country the greatest number of ebred herds, all breeds being well represented, and are assured of every facility for obtaining exactly the animals desired.

For many years breeders in the United States have been importing the finest animals from other countries, and by the most rigid selection in keen competition with other breeders have developed purebred live stock until now the live stock industry in this country is not surpassed by any other country in the world. In recent years animals hred in the United States have repeatedly won in open competition against imported animals at the leading live stock shows and expositions.

ANIMALS FOR MILK AND BEEF

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC

Measuring Up to Christ's Standard YOUNG PEOPLE AND ABULT TOPIC The Character Which Jesus Requires.

The so-called "Sermon on the Mount" is the king's proclamation of the laws which obtain in his kingdom. These laws do not set forth terms of salvation to sinners, but the principles of life which shall obtain when Christ reigns on earth.

I. The Characteristics of the Sub-Jects of the Kingdom (vv. 1-12). These characteristics are set forth

in the nine Bentitudes. 1. The consciousness of utter spiritual poverty (v. 3.) "Poor in spirit" does not mean to be without money (Isa. 66:2), but to come to the end of self in a state of absolute spiritual beggary, having no power to alter one's condition or to make one's self

2. A profound grief because of spiritual insolvency (v. 4).

3. A humble submission to God's will (v. 5). The outgrowth of mourning over spiritual insolvency is meek-

4. An intense longing to conform to the laws of the kingdom (v. 6). 5. Merciful (v. 7). The subjects of

the kingdom now take on the character of the king. 6. Purity of heart (v. 8). Since the king is pre-eminently pure, the sub-

jects who enjoy fellowship with him must have heart purity. 7. Peacemakers (v. 9). The one who has received the peace of God

through Jesus Christ will diffuse peace to others. 8. Suffering for Christ's sake (v. 10). The world hated Christ, the king, therefore those who reflect his

spirit in their lives shall suffer percecution (II Tim. 3:12). 9. Suffer reproach (v. 11). This means suffering falsely. In such case we should glory in it, for it brings

great reward in heaven. II. The Responsibilities of the Subjects of the Kingdom (vv. 13-16).

Man is corrupt, and the world is in atter darkness. The disciples of Christ are to live such fives as to purify and colighten. Their responsibilities are set forth under the figures of salt and light.

1. Salt of the earth (v. 13). The properties of salt are (1) penetrating; (2) purifying; (3) preserving. Since salt only preserves and purifies in the measure that it penetrates, so Christians only as they enter into the life of the world can preserve it from de-

2. The light of the world (v. 14). Light illuminates and warms. This world is cold and dark. The devil has set many pitfalls and snares. As sons of the light we should live so as to prevent the unwary from stumbling and fulling. III, The Laws of the Kingdom (vv.

20-48).

1. As to deeds of righteousness They must exceed that of the scribes and Pharlsees.

2. As to sanctity of tife (vv. 21-26). "Thou shalt do no murder," means more than simply to refrain from the taking of life. Rash auger is heart murder (v. 22).

8. As to organised life (vv. 27-22). The family is the unit of society. There is no sin that so rots society as that against the relation of the sexes. The two awful sine against the family are (a) adultery (vv. 27-30), (there is heart adultery as well as heart murder; (b) divorce (vv. 31, 32). Moses, for the hardness of the bearts of the people, permitted a man in case of adultery to put away his wife and give her a bill of divorcement.

4. As to onths (vv. 33-37). Speech is the absolute test of character. Whatever is more than the simple form of affirmation or denial comes of the Devil.

5. As to behavior toward those who do not recognize the laws of the kingdom (vv. 38-48). (1) Not revengeful (vv. 39, 40); (2) willing to do more than is required (v. 41); (3) charitable (v. 42)-even the borrower

should not be turned away; (4) love toward enemies (vv. 45-48). Love to enemies consists (a) in blessing them that curse us; (b) in doing good to them that bate us; (c) in praying for those who despitefully use us.

WAS of a Nottinghamshire family and educated at Cambridge. Likewise was I educated in medicine, and preferring a ship's surgeoncy to any preferment ashore, it came about that after several deep-sea voyages I found myself surgeon of that ship, the Antelope, which was wrecked in a violent storm on a coast northwest of Van Diemen's Land. Of all the ship's company I alone

escaped to the land, where, in utter exhaustion, I lay down and fell asleep. I awakened to find myself bound hand and foot, and surrounded by swarms of the tiniest human creatures. They brought me food and drink and conveyed me to their capital, where the king, of a majesty a full half-inch taller than any of his subjects, came with his court to view me. In time I learned that I was in the

kingdom of the Lilliputians. By them I was kept a long time in captivity. Being ultimately satisfied of the harmsness of my intent, I also adding my word of honor to do them no injury, they released me, and set aside six professors of education to teach me their language. For my bodily sustenance they allowed me a quantity of meat and drink sufficient for 1724 of their own people; for so, being exact in their mathematics, they estimated the proportions of my bulk to theirs. Three hundred cooks and one hundred and twenty waiters were named to dress my meals, two hundred seamstresses were apportioned to make my linen, and three hundred tailors for my outer clothing.

With my wants thus attended to, was desirous to be of service to them. My first service was not to damage their people or their property as I walked abroad, a most likely danger when the men were of such size that I could secrete two or three of them in one of my coat pockets. In walking the streets, were I to sfen heavily, there was danger of my shaking down large buildings; or, by not having an eye below me, I could easfly trend to death half a dozen of their cattle.

One day the king, who was most friendly to me, came to me in great trouble. The emperor of the neighboring kingdom of Blefuscu had threatened to lay waste the kingdom of Lilliputia. The Blefuscuan navy. consisting of fifty great ships of war, was even then about to set sail; but I, by wading and swimming, reached their chief harbor where they were yet at anchor. With my pocket knife I cut the cables of their fifty ships of war, and then, tying each ship to a piece of twine, I drew them after me to dry land, and so compelled the capitulation of Blefuscu.

While this deed redounded to my giory, it also raised me up powerful enemies, one being the high admiral of the Lilliputian navy. Had I wished, I could have crushed them and their entire kingdom under my boots, but there was my pledged word not to harm them, So when by secret intrigue they had me tried and condemned to the loss of my eyes, there was nothing left me but escape. I went to Blefuscu, where I was given a great reception and where they would have me stay; but I was weary of kings and princes, and told them that I desired nothing except that they would provision for me a boat, which I had found drifting on the shore, and allow me to go my way.

They stored the boat with the carcasses of one hundred oxen, three hundred sheep, with cows, buils, and as much rendy-dressed ment as four hundred cooks could provide. Being

sail on the third day and was picked up by an English merchant captain, who decided me crazy when I told ifm my story. Not until I had taker sev-eral head of cattle from my pockets would he believe me. To my great grief, one of the ship's rats carried

off one of my sheep on the way home. Cn reaching shore I learned that my uncle John had died and left me his estate near Epping, and the same be-ing sufficient to keep my family from want and the lust to wander being still quick within me, I set off to sea once more, this time in the Adventure, bound for Surat.

On this voyage, after a great tempest, we put into a strange bay for water. Rambling on the shore, I became separated from my companions and fell into the hands of some natives. of Brobdingnag, colossal men, of whom hardly one was under sixty English feet in height.

I was here put on exhibition, and my fame reaching the ears of the king and queen, they commanded my presence at court; and thither I was brought, in the charge of the daughter of one of my captors, a little girl named Glumdalcittch, nine years of age and small for her years, being not above thirty feet in height.

In the train of their majesties I traveled all over the kingdom, which was six thousand miles in length by three to five thousand in breadth. The capital city was fifty-four miles in length by forty-five in breadth, a wonderful city where the king's palace was seven miles around and the chief room therein two hundred and forty feet high, and broad and long in proportion. The king's stable was also a goodly building, housing five hundred horses, noble creatures of a height of from fifty-four to sixty feet,

Of the Lilliputians, I used to say that they were people without a blemish in their persons, and the Brobdingnagians coarse beyond description; but later reflection induces me to think that the Lilliputians had blemishes proportionate to their size, the same being too tiny for me to estimate; and that possibly the Brobdingnagians appeared more vulgar than they truly were, their colossal proportions magnifying every defect. In some matters these large people were at least larger-minded. Thus, in the matter of whether it was proper to break an egg on the little or big end-which had almost split the Lilliputian kingdom in twain-as to that matter the Brobdingnagians would have lost little sleep. I judge this from a comment by the Brobdingnagian king on a political matter which spoke of in connection with my own country-England. "It is tyranny," he said, "for a government to require those who held differing opinions to change or not to change them." His majesty was much interested

to hear of England; whereat I related at length her history, which astonished him. He protested that it seemed no more than a sequence of conspiracies, murders, revolutions, banishments, the worst effects that avarice, faction, hypocrisy, hatred, lust, malice and ambition could produce. "What a pernicious race of odious vermin to be allowed to crawl upon the earth!" he said; which injurious judgment of my noble and beloved country pained me exceedingly.

Now while I had become a favorite of a great nation, it was upon such a footing as ill became the dignity of human kind. I wished to be once more with people of my own mind; also I longed for a whiff of that sea which looked toward my own land. In response to my entreaties, I was taken to the sea coast. My little nurse Glumdalclitch being ill, I was put in charge of a page; who left me alone on the shore while he sought for birds' eggs. While thus alone, the traveling cabinet in which I lay was seized by a great bird who took it far out to sea and then let it drop, almost at the exact moment that an English ship haprened by to pick me up. Thus was I singularly rescued and brought once more safe to England.

I made other voyages and had divers adventures, a most singular one being that of my rescue from a desert continent by the people of an island which flew in the air, the same being made to rise and fall by means of an immense loadstone. The people of the flying island held themselves as a superior race, for no greater reason that I could see than that they had one eye turned inward and one turned up-

A later voyage took me to the country of the Yahoos and the Houyhnhnms. The Yahoos, being servile attendants to the Houyhnhams, were of disgusting habits, and so much resembled human beings that the wise and virtuous Houyhnhams took me also for a Yahoo even to the end of my stay with them, a judgment which grieved me much.
