FALL IS BEST TIME TO SELECT SEED CORN FOR USE NEXT YEAR



special importance this year, according to specialists of the department of agriculture. Much of the corn crop is at least two weeks late, and early fall frost would cause a repetition of the conditions in 1917, when a large part of the corn crop was frozen and was unfit for seed. The following spring, seed corn was very scarce and high.

Good seed corn is the secret of a good corn crop, and autumn is the time for the selection of corn to be planted the following season. Many farmers put off seed selection until the spring when there is a scarcity of good seed corn. There is danger in this delay every year, but when the corn crop is late, as it is this year, the danger is especially great. Each spring the department of agriculture receives reports from many sections telling of the willingness of farmers to pay good prices for seed corn and their inability to obtain it.

This scarcity could be prevented by selecting the seed when it is most abundant and when the very best can be obtained-at ripening time when it has been in no way reduced in vitality. Many let this opportunity pass, the farmers expecting to purchase their seed corn, only to find that they cannot buy at any price in the winter or; spring as good seed as they could have

Requirements for Seed.

Until a community has its experienced and honest corn breeder, the best place for the farmer to obtain seed corn is from fields on his own farm or in his neighborhood that were planted with a variety that has generally proved most successful in that locality. By far too many farmers consider seed good simply because it will grow. To be first-class, seed corn Well adapted to the seasonal and

Stalks that are free from disease. Among the best methods for the control of several important corn diseases, including the ear and stalk rot, is the sclection of seed corn from diseasefree stalks. The selection of diseasefree seed corn is discussed in Farmers' Bulletin No. 1176, entitled "The Control of Corn Root, Stalk, and Ear Rot Discases."

Husk Ears From Stalks.

As soen as the corn matures, the farmer should go through his field with a seed-picking bag and husk the ears from the stalks that have produced the most corn without having any special advantages, such as space, moisture or fertility. Avoid the large ears on stalks standing singly with an unusual amount of space around them. Preference should be given the plants that have produced most heavily in competition with a full stand of lessproductive plants. In all localities the inherent tendency of the plant to produce heavily of sound, dry, shelled corn is of most importance. Late-maturing plants with ears that

are heavy because of the excessive

amorat of sap should be ignored. Sap-

piness greatly increases the harvest

Early selection of seed corn is of size and weight, and is apt to destroy the quality. In central and southern states, all other things being equal, short, thick stalks are preferable. Short stalks are not so easily blown down and permit 'thicker planting. Thick stalks are not so easily broken down, and in general are more productive than slender ones.

Safe Way for Storing.

The same day seed corn is gathered dry place where there is free circula- itation. tion of air, and placed in such a manner that the ears do not touch each other. This is the only safe proceddre. If left in the husk long after ripening, it may sprout or mildew during warm, dry weather, or become infested with weevils or grain moths, or their eggs.

There are various ways in which seed corn can be prepared for drying. also be used. The farmer, however,

FARMERS MUST MAKE **USE OF BY-PRODUCTS**

Increased Costs Compel Elimination of All Waste.

Corn Stover, Disregarded in Many Cases, Is Valuable Feed for Young Stock, Idle Horses and Cattle During Winter.

With the increasing price of land, feed, and the higher cost of labor, it is becoming necessary that the farmer eliminate, as far as possible, any waste. He must make use of all the by-products of his business much the same as the manufacturer does. It is a far cry from the story of romantic adventure and the historical novel to the tale of reforming tendencies, political, social and religtous. He has an knowledge of what will interest the great pubstory about it in such a way that he becomes a phe-nomenal best seller. He has learned the profession of writing novels by novel writing, and he learned to por-

tray people by enreful study of those he wanted to use. He has acquired a power of characterization that is almost photographic. He uses this power to preent people of great appeal to a large body of Americans, for they are the type known to many. All this shows the seriousness of the man. That his political novels, for instance, are real stories of politics is shown by the fact that a former president of the United States and two former governors of Massachusetts have consented to retell

them in shortened form. Winston Churchill has written his best book, so far, in the opinion of most readers, in "Coniston." It portrays a vital phase of American politi-cal life; it has had a potent influence in improving the conduct of our publie affairs. In Jethro Bass he has created his greatest character, as yet-one that will probably take permanent rank in American literature.

TAKE no shame in the pride with which I write of my grandfather, Lionel Carvel, Esq., of Carvel Hall. in his lordship's province of Maryland, albeit he favored his majesty. PUBLIC OPPOSES

Canvass of 5,154 Editors Shows 4,466 Communities Against Socialistic Experiment.

Against 83 Per Cent in 1919 Think Public le Opposed to Radicalism.

The American public is more intensely opposed to Government operation than it was a year ago, according to the newspaper editors of the country. Out of 5,154 editors replying to a questionnaire sent out by the Press Service Company of New York, 4,466, or 86 per cent, gave it as their judgment that the people of their communities were overwhelmingly against the Government competing in business with its own citizens.

In 1919 the Press Service Company conducted a similar canvass of editors on the government operation of railroads. That questionnaire showed that 83 per cent of the editors considered their communities against Government operation of public utilities.

Apparently, then, if editors estimate public opinion accurately, that opinion in a year, considered by communities, has swung 3 per cent farther away from socialistic experiments.

Eleven Million, Circulation. The combined circulation of the papers whose editors replied is 11,428,-817, which means, according to the usual estimated ratio between circulation and readers, a constituency of at least 44,000,000. And this constituency is pretty evenly scattered throughout the country, no considerable section of any state being unrepresented. The estimate of opinion based on this thoroughly diffused 44 per cent of the country's population may, therefore, be considered a fair representation of the people as a whole.

Another feature of the result is its evident lack of partisan bias. The and conducted by lay people. major political affiliations of the papers represented are fairly evenly divided, being 1,857 Republican and 1,350 Democratic. There are also 1,485 independent and 462 miscellaneous, including labor organs, etc.

How little the results are affected by the politics of the papers is shown in an analysis by sections. In the Southern section, for instance, where replies came from 65 Republican papers and 389 Democratic, the per-centage against Government eperation was 88; in the Great Lake section, with conditions reversed, 478 Republican and 155 Democratic, sition was 87 per cent.

Judgment Apparently Unbiased. The questionnaire closes with a request for the editor's personal epinion on certain concrete cases as follows:

"Do you personally believe that the Federal Government should own and operate competitive industries to provide: (a) Fertilizer? (b) Clothing? (c) Automobiles? (d) Farm implements? (e) Foodstuffs?

Substantially all the editors who gave estimates of their readers' opinions also expressed their own by replying to this last question. Proof of considerable effort to avoid personal bias is found in the fact that in many cases the editor differed from the opinion he credited to his community. The percentage of "nos" ran: (a)

76; (b) 88; (c) 86; (d) 82; (e) 79. While the questions were based on general principles involved in the Government participating in competitive business, the so-called Muscle Shoals Bill now before Congress was used as a concrete example of a Government eperation scheme. Under this bill a Government-owned corporation would be given broad powers to operate and develop Government plants and properties. It would produce at Muscle Shoals various fertilizer products and sell them in competition with producers and inerchants in the fer-

NATIONWIDE FIGHT AGAINST DISEASE

American Red Cross Will Have Health Centers in All Parts of United States.

The American Red Cross has launched upon a nation wide campaign of fighting disease and physical defect among the American people. A new and unique health institution has come into being as the result of several months' study by the Red Cross Health Service Department at National Headquarters.

Officials in charge of the department predict that before long this new health activity will be in actual operation all over the country, and that the sign-'American Red Cross Health Center" -will become as familiar to the people everywhere as are now the signs of the telegraph companies.

Busy Long Before War.

The interest of the American Red Cross in the fight against disease is not, however, of recent origin. Long before the war the organization began this health service through its medical units in disaster relief work and its department of Town and County Nursing. During the war and following the armistice thousands of American Red Cross officials have been fighting disease in the war-stricken countries. At the same time tens of thousands of local Red Cross officials have been engamed at home fighting disease, notably during the influenza epidemics.

The American Ped Cross has determined that all this valuable experience in health service abroad and at home shall not go to waste. So long as there are a half a million people dying yearly in this country from preventable causes, and so long as more than one-third of the American children and young people are victims of physical defects, the Red Cross recognizes the urgent need for continued Red Cross health service at home,

How Organization Works, The Red Cross Health Center is governed by business principles, applies business methods, and, in its more simple form, can be established

It proceeds upon the demonstrated fact that health is a commodity that can be bought and sold like brooms and soap. Therefore, it establishes itself in a storeroom in the principal business section of the community. It displays its goods in the form of attractive health exhibits in its show windows. It advertises constantly and extensively. And it uses every business and social device to attract cus-

The Red Cross Health Center is of service to the sick in that it gives out pliable and complete information toria and other institutions for the sick and the defective; about available and Southwest show that it is a mis-nurses, both trained and practical; take to consider those sections vastly about when to consult a physician and why to shun the quack and his nos-

Teaching Disease Prevention.

The Red Cross Health Center is, however, of even greater service to the well. It teaches people how to pre-vent sickness and disease. This is done in many interesting and attractive ways first of all, by the distribution of popular health literature and through health lectures illustrated with lantern slides or with health motion picture films. Then special exhibits are given, one after the other, on various health subjects. Practical demonstrations are made; also health playlets by children to interest and instruct themselves and their elders. Classes are organised in personal hygiene, home care of the sick, first aid and in food selection and preparation. Health clubs, both for younger and older people, are formed; also Little Mothers' Leagues. Nutrition and growth clinics are conducted for children.

Already more than a hundred of these Red Cross Health Centers are in actual operation throughout the country. Many of them also conduct medical clinics, but the one chief, outstanding feature of the American Red Cross Health Center is its health education service which teaches well people how to keep well.

MPORTANT CONFERENCE HELD

Government Officials Say They Will Aid In Obtaining the Required Help in Disposing of the Bonds in this Country.

Washington, - American bankers agreed at a conference with officials of the government and sugar companies to afford relief from the present financial stringency in Cuba.

Under the agreement the bankers will purchase bonds issued by the Cuban government which will use the money in financing the sugar crop and in affording other relief.

The terms of the agreement will be communicated to the Cuban government and it will be for that govern ment to decide whether the plan will be acceptable. Meantime, the state department will inform Cuba that the American government as such cannot offer any financial assistance.

Other government officials participating in the conference were Assistant Secretary Sweet of the department of commerce; Howard Figg of the department of justice, and Vice Governor Platt of the federal reserve board.

The state department in announcing the conference, said it was arranged with a "view to ascertaining what assistance might be given by this country towards a solution of the problem in Cuba, so as to prevent any unfavorable effect in the United States.

BANKERS ADOPT PLANS OF **COMMITTEE TO ORGANIZE** A BIG CORPORATION

CONSIDER OTHER CROPS LATER

It Was Made Clear By the Speakers at the Meeting That Cotton Was Not To Be Held But Moved

On At a Stagnant Time.

Washington.-Plans for the organization of a \$12,000,000,000 cotton export and crop financing corporation were adopted at a meeting of bankers and representatives of cotton interests attending the convention of the American bankers association. The meeting approved suggestions contained in a report of a committee headed by Robert F. Maddox, Atlanta banker, to move at once in the direction of preliminary steps towards organizing the corporation. Tentative arrangements provide for the payment of half the capital stock, or an initial working fund of \$5,000,000 capital and \$1,000,-000 surplus.

Capital subscriptions, the plans suggest will be based on an assessment of \$1.00 a bale on cotton raised in the representative states, thereby making the organization one of influence throughout all territory which has had difficulty in financing the movement of cotton crops. The decision to call for the initial payment of only half of the total capital means therefore that the subscriptions will be pro-rated among the purchasers of stock on the basis of 50 cents per bale.

It was made clear by speakers at the meeting that the purpose of the corporation, which will be organized under the Edge act amending the federal reserve act, is not to hold the cotton crop but to insure that the commodity be moved "at a time when the market is stagnant."

Under provisions of the Edge act the corporation is enabled to, handle trade acceptances-agreement of the purchasers—to the amount of ten times its capital and surplus, or in the case of the proposed corporation, the ability to handle acceptances of cotton purchasers to the amount of \$60,-000,000.
