Whether the Mexicans escaped through the front door or from the rear of the store was not made clear in the reports received here, but it was apparent that they vanished during intense excitement which prevailed througha town of about 1,000 population. Officers tonight were watching all the roads in the hope of arresting the bandits and had sent warnings to towns throughout this section

Robbery was believed by officers to have been the motive for the attack on the store. Money was found scattered over the floor. they asserted. It could not be ascertained whether the bandits had secured any before their flight.

## ASKING FAVORS OF FALSE ECONOMY MAIL ORDER HOUSE

Preaching 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Interesting Results Might Be Obtained by Making Certain

Do All the Things for the People of Their Community That the Catalogue Concerns Will Not Do.

It has been said that three-fourths or nine-tenths, or some such big proportion-the exact figures do not matter-of the business of the world is done on credit. If this was not true there wouldn't be much business done for no currency system could be devised that would furnish enough money to meet the needs of commerce if every article sold had to be paid for in actual cash. The amount of money in circulation in the United States is only \$47 per capita and this would not go very far if everyone had to keep enough cash on hand to pay for all that he might buy.

The greatest of financiers need credft. They keep their resources employed and at times are in need of ready cash. The same thing is true at times of men of smaller means. The credit cially in the smaller communities, is abused and works a serious hardship upon the business men of the town. Some merchants, to avoid the loss that results from such abuse of the system or possibly to enable them to sell goods at a lower price than their cometitors, operate strictly on a cash bais, but the great majority of merchants in every community give those Yours for better customers who are responsible and honest the privilege of a charge account and the chances are that some sort of a credit system, properly safeguarded, will always continue to be a feature of legifimate trade.

Ask Catalogue House for Credit.

You who have a reputation in your community for being at least fairly responsible and upright know that when you desire it or need it you can obtain credit from at least some of the merchants in your town. But some time when you are in need of some article of merchandise and are a little short of ready money, order what you want from a mail order house in Chicago or some other city and ask them to please charge it till the first of the month. Some mail order concerns are now operating a so-called credit system, but it is not a credit system such as is maintained by most retail merchants. tain merchandise on the installment plan, but they not only demand an initial cash payment, but require the purchaser to sign a contract which operates as a mortgage not only on the merchandise purchased, but upon any possess. There is nothing in this system that bears any similarity to the open credit system that is used by the majority of retail merchants.

There are some other requests you might make of the mail order man when the occasion arises and the responses might be equally interesting. For instance, you, Mrs. Farmer, who bought that box of groceries from the catalogue house last month, might write the manager and ask him to buy would be considerable more trouble to pack them for shipment to the city than it is to take them in to your local grocer, who is always ready to pay you the market price for them, but then maybe the mail order man would pay you enough more than the market price to pay you for the extra trouble. And then again, maybe he wouldn't.

Suppose you write to the mail order man from whom you bought that wire fencing and ask him what he will allow you for your old machine on a trade for a new one. ## QUALITY OFTEN OVERLOOKED

Instance Seen In Case of Mail Order Houses Which Make Their Appeal Solely on Basis of

(Copyright, 1917, Western Newspaper Union. Economy is one of the greatest of virtues but false economy is no more a virtue than anything else that is false. To be able to economize wisely is one of the greatest blessings that one can have, for it is the prerequisite to thrift and well-being. Too many persons, however, who think they have found the secret of true economy are practicing a false economy which is worse than wilful waste.

For instance, the man who buys a stove from a mall order house for \$9 because he thinks he would have to pay \$10 for one if he purchased it from his home merchant, is practicing a false economy, for the chances are that he would save more than \$1 is the end if he purchased the \$10 stove from the local hardware leader.

There are several reasons why this is false economy. The first one is that dollar for dollar, the greater part of the merchandise sold by the mail order houses is of less value than that sold by the retail merchants of the smaller communities. The mail order business, as a whole is built upon cheapness. In order to attract customers the catalogue houses must sell goods cheaply and in order to do that they must sell cheap goods. Their business is built up on price and not on quality. The retail hardware dealer, like retail dealers in other lines, probably can match the prices of the mail order houses. He probably has a \$9 stove which he can sell to the man who wants to get a stove for \$9. The trouble is that the man who buys from the mail order house does not distinguish between price and quality. Thinks He is Economizing.

The man who buys the \$9 stove from the mail order house probably would not buy a \$9 stove from his local merchant for in the latter case he would see just what he was buying and might realize that the \$9 stove would not meet his needs. He orders a \$9 stove from the mail order house, however, just because the price is \$9 that the stove will meet his needs. He thinks he is saving a dollar or two by are that when the stove arrives and will realize that he has practiced false economy-that it would have been pay a dollar or two more to his home guaranteed by the dealer.

The patron of the mail order house, also, often falls to take the matter of transportation charges into consideration when making his purchase. He sees only the price of the article as listed in the mail order catalogue and does not think of the express or freight charges, which with the cost of a money order and postage often make the total cost of the article greater than the price at which the same thing could have been purchased at the local

Buying merchandise of poor quality because the price is low is often false economy when the purchase is made at the home stores but it is doubly so when the merchandise is bought from home one can be reasonably sure that the article purchased at a low price, while there is no such assurance when it is bought by mail on the "sight un-

### Idea Is Exploded.

The idea that the mail order houses sell the same quality of goods at lower prices than the home merchants is quickly exploded when one learns of the large profits that are made by the majority of the mail order houses and the large selling expense to which they are subjected. The large mail order houses spend hundreds of thousands of dollars annually for advertising and the selling expenses of the smaller concerns are proportionately as large. Their other expenses, such as rent, taxes and labor, are also higher than those of the local retail merchants, in proportion to the business which they do. In spite of these heavy expenses, the mail order houses distribute millions of dollars in dividends among. their stockholders. In one large mail order concern the profits of the stockholders, in cash and stock dividends. have aggregated as much as 1,000 per cent on the capital invested in the short peried of nine years. This does not indicate that the mail order houses are in business for their health and

The mail order houses have capitalized the desire to economize that is inherent in almost every one. By placto their interest to do business with, buy cheap goods at cheap prices.

NO KIDDIES NO CHRISTMAS

"Consider, if there were to be a a time as ten years, Santa Claus would fade out of active existence and become a mere tradition to be read about in books. This dish is now entirely obsolete, though "Poor Richard's Almanac" her own marriage license. mentions it as late as 1750, and a Mrs. Frazer, who published a cook-book in Edinburgh in 1791, announcing herself on its title page as the only teacher of the great art of cookery in that city, gives a recipe for making it. while Brand, the popular antiquary, tells how he partook of it at a Christmas dinner in the mansion of an old English gentleman in 1801, but it has long since been wholly supplemented by plum pudding. #### **RED CROSS ASSISTS** DISABLED VETERANS

The American Red Cross is carrying on a wide program of service for the disabled World War veterans receiving Health hospitals, and those being trained through agencies of the Federal Board for Vocational Education.

In each of the Public Health Service bespitals Red Cross workers devote their time to the general welfare of the service men from the day they enter the receiving ward until they are discharged. After the soldier's discharge the Red Cross continues its friendly service through the Home Service Section in his own community.

The Red Cross maintains a convaler cent house at all of the hospitals. where patients can amuse themselves after they are well enough to be up and around. Parties and picture shows in the wards are also furnished, with eccasional excursions when convalescence comes.

Great service has been rendered by the Red Cross in mental cases in identifying those who have appeared in state hospitals for the insane, and helping them secure compensation due from the Bureau of War Risk Insurance.

In the Federal Board's various district offices the Red Cross worker, acting with the Home Service Section, makes necessary leans to the men, arranges suitable living conditions, helps collect evidence and supply facts to the Board, assists in "appealing cases" and settles various personal difficulties for the men. The workers also follow up and aid all men who discontinue train-

The Red Cross agents find men "lost" te the Beard, help clear up delayed cases and aid the college counselors in their friendly work with the men. Many Red Cross chapters have set up recreation facilities, and in some instances living clubs, so these victims of war may have attractive surroundings and the fun which must go with

effective school work. To the American Red Cross Institute for the Blind near Baltimore, Md., mere than half of all the Americans

blinded in the World War have come for training. The Institute, through the Red Cross, long ago conducted an exhaustive industrial survey to determine the vocations for which blind men could be fitted. As a result it is putting forth well trained men equipped to meet the social, civic and economic requirements of their respective communities.

> Red is pre-eminently the Christmas color, and red carnations and red roses are the favorite purchases. The red immortelles, also, go in great bunches for Christmas decorations in houses of both high and low degree. These immortelles are real flowers, though some people have a notion they are made of paper. The natural color is yellow, and they grow in the south of France, where great fields of them may be seen dried and dyed for the market. It is a great industry there. Europeans use them largely to the exclusion of fresh flowers for all occasions They are dyed in all colors for the European market, and thousands upon thousands of boxes of the red ones are imported to New York every year for the Christmas trade. They cannot be successfully grown in America, owing to climatic differences. A few have been produced in Texas, but the florists say they are not "right."







The penalty for failure is a fine of not more than \$1,000 and an additional assessment of 25 per cent of the amount of tax due. For willful refusal to make a reyear's imprisonment, or both to-In ancient Egypt, in Assyria, in gether with the costs of prosecution. A similar penalty is provided for making a false or fraudulent return, together with an additional assessment of 50 per cent of the amount of the tax evaded.

Women Must Pay Tax

The income tax applies to women as well as men. Husband and wife must consider the income of both plus that of minor dependent children, and if the total equals or exceeds \$2,000 a return must be filed. A minor who has a net income in his own right of \$1,000 or more must file a separate return. To be allowed the \$2,000 exemption a married person must be living with husband or wife on the last day of the taxable year, December 31, 1920. Divorces, persons separated by mutual agreement, widows and widowers, unless they are the sole support of others living in the

Tax Rate For 1920

The normal tax rate for 1920 assist taxpayers in making out cost to taxpayers. Work has begun on the collection of the income tax for the cent on the first \$4,000 of net year 1920.
