



**AIR AND CARE ONLY CURE OF T. B. YET FOUND**

Head of National Tuberculosis Association Plays the Present So-Called Cures; Says Many Dangerous.

"No cure for tuberculosis has been discovered yet," declared Dr. Charles J. Hatfield, managing director of the National Tuberculosis association, in a report received yesterday by the New Mexico Public Health association, dealing with the widespread interest which has been caused by the repeated reports of so-called tuberculosis "cures" which have been coming from various European cities, such as Paris, London, Rome and Geneva.

"Ever since 1882," Dr. Hatfield stated in his report, "When Robert Koch discovered the tubercle bacillus as a specific cause of tuberculosis, men and women all over the world have been endeavoring to find a cure for the disease."

"So far as I know, no specific remedy or cure for the disease has been found," Dr. Hatfield emphatically declared. "There have been many honest investigators who have spent their lives in search of this remedy. There have been others who, mistaken in their judgment, have thought they have found or discovered a cure for tuberculosis. There have been others who have deliberately set out to play upon the victims of tuberculosis by offering them a 'cure' which is in no sense a specific remedy for the disease. In condemnation of this last group, too much cannot be said. They not only cheat the consumptive out of his money, but in most instances they cheat him out of a chance to live."

"The only cure known for the disease at the present time consists in hygienic living, that is, rest, fresh air, good food, combined with good medical treatment, and a proper mental attitude on the part of the patient. Thousands of men and women are today walking the streets and doing their normal work in life who have been cured of tuberculosis by this method."

"To cure tuberculosis by any other method requires first of all, that the tubercle bacilli embedded in the tissues of the body be killed in the body, or that they be made innocuous; and second, that in accomplishing this end, the tissues of the body must remain uninjured and the lesions caused by the tubercle bacilli be healed."

"No serum, vaccine, drug, gas inhalant, electrical or other method of treatment has yet been devised that will accomplish these ends. I sincerely hope that some day such specific method may be found."

**GOVERNOR ISSUES QUARANTINE ORDER TO PREVENT SPREAD OF INSECT PESTS**

In order to prevent the introduction and spread of the alfalfa weevil, the sweet potato weevil, and the cotton boll weevil and pink boll worm, insects which may become very serious pests in this state if they once get a firm foothold, Governor Mechem has issued three quarantine orders which can be summarized briefly as follows, and which should be carefully observed. The Board of Regents of the Agricultural College are designated to enforce these orders.

Quarantine Order No. 1.—In order to restrict the chances of introducing the alfalfa weevil, the importation into the state of New Mexico of hay, straw, grain, alfalfa seed, nursery stock, vegetables or fruit is prohibited from the states of Utah and Idaho; the counties of Unita, Lincoln and Sweetwater in Wyoming; Delta, Gunnison and Montrose counties in Colorado; and Malheur and Baker counties in Oregon.

Quarantine Order No. 2.—In order to prevent the introduction of the sweet potato weevil, the introduction of sweet potatoes and of sweet potato plants is prohibited from the states of Texas, Louisiana, Florida, Mississippi, Georgia, and Alabama.

Quarantine Order No. 3.—In order to prevent the introduction and dissemination of the cotton boll weevil and pink boll worm, the introduction into the state of New Mexico of cotton lint, linters, waste, sweepings, and samples of cotton seed, seed cotton, cottonseed hulls, cotton ginning and milling machinery, cotton bagging, used cotton pickers' sacks, and all other things and materials which have been used in connection with growing, harvesting, baling, or manufacturing of cotton lint or cotton seed is prohibited from all states and foreign countries except Arizona and California. It also prohibits the importation of corn in the sheuk or Spanish moss from any state where cotton boll weevil exists and prohibits the transportation of cotton seed or seed cotton from any county in New Mexico where either of these pests have been found, into another county.

**TRACTOR SCHOOL AND DEMONSTRATION AT STATE COLLEGE**

A tractor school and demonstration will be held at State College March 30th and 31st, and April 1. This work will be held under the direction of the Farm Engineering Department of the College, in co-operation with the various tractor machinery companies concerned.

The first two days will be devoted to giving instruction relative to construction, repairing, and general care and operation of some of the most modern and up-to-date tractors. On Friday, field plowing demonstrations will be given on the College farm. These meetings will be open to anyone who cares to attend.

**FARMERS MANUFACTURE THEIR OWN WOOL**

Progress is being made by various farmers' organizations in helping to relieve the wool situation by manufacturing their own wool into blankets and suiting, according to a report coming from the American Farm Bureau Federation. Montana has directed seven carloads of wool to a certain mill to be manufactured into cloth, blankets, and robes. Michigan farmers have placed orders for approximately 2000 blankets. The Illinois Agricultural Association is manufacturing blankets and bats. The Iowa Wool Growers' Association has under consideration a proposal from a reliable mill to accept Iowa wool at market price and return blankets of superior quality. Maryland and the New England states are also considering similar action.

Before this is possible, however, it is necessary for a large number of farmers to make their consignments collectively as no mill can afford to devote its equipment to converting a small clip of wool into manufactured articles. The mills usually require a minimum order of from 500 to 1000 blankets.

Gentlemen: We have instructed publishing agent Countiss to give emergency consideration at once to the publication of grain rates from Elida and points intermediate with Clovis, and from Clovis and points west to Phoenix and California, 10c lower than the present basis.

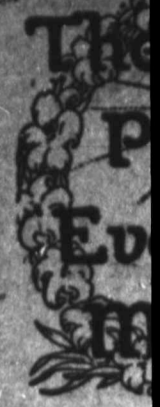
