

### Pleasant Valley New School House Dedicated

In spite of the windy, disagreeable weather last Friday, the new school building at Pleasant Valley was dedicated, the dedication program being witnessed by a good crowd.

Pleasant Valley, a consolidated district southeast of Elida, has one of the best school buildings in the county. It has been buit through the efforts and sacrifice of the people of that district. A distinctive feature of the erection of this building has been that the boys who are to attend the school have worked on it during the past few weeks. Under the direction of J. L. Ward and other workmen the boys have done what they could and, according to reports, have learned many practical things-

The first part of the program last Friday was in charge of the pupils of the school, it being their first attempt at literary work. It consisted of songs, recitations and several numbers of comedy by "Jimmie adn Johnnie."

The County Agricultural Agent was called on to make some remarks about his work in relation to the people. He dwelt upon the importance of the Farm Bureau movement in a county, state and national way. It is the desire of the leading farmers of Roosevelt county to soon reorganize the county farm bureau on a larger and more efficient scale than has characterized it in the past. It is their desire to have the largest possible number of local units in the county brought into the county organization in order that the problems of the local communities may be better worked out and that better advantages may be taken by this county of the work of the state and national organizations.

Rev. Richards of the Methodist church addressed the gathering on the importance of education and the vast possibilities for good that were forthcoming from the Pleasant Valley community or any other community that does as much for the cause of education,

## Thanksgiving Day Proclamation

#### EXECUTIVE OFFICE Santa Fe

Thanksgiving Day, which is by law and custom a national holiday, occurs this year on Thursday, November 24.

Our greatest cause for gratitude, which is undoubtedly uppermost in the minds of all citizens is the great historical event ushered in at Washington the 12th; of this month, when the Disarmament Conference met for the purpose of reducing the war machinery of the world. It is a matter of national pride that such a conference is now being held on American soil upon the invitation of our government representatives. The fact that the program for disarmament, as outlined by the spokesmen for the American people, has been heartily received and approved in "spirit and principle" by the great military and naval powers of the world, calls for profound thanks-

The solemn ceremony in connection with the burial of the unknown American soldier, the day preceding the meeting of the Conference, was a mute and tragic appeal for

President Harding truly voiced the sentiments of the American people when he not only urged peace but graphically pictured the horrors of war and its cruel waste of human life. The statement of a distinguished foreign representative that the American program for disarmament was in effect "idealism made practicable," indicated that a memorable achievement had been accomplished for humanity.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MERRITT C, MECHEM, Governor of the State of New Mexico, do hereby proclaim Thursday, November 24th, 1921, as

### THANKSGIVING DAY

nd a legal holiday in the State of New Mexico.

I respectfully suggest that the day be observed by all of our citizens in a spirit consistent with the meaning of the day, assembling in their respective places of worship or in their homes, for the purpose of gratefully acknowledging and returning thanks to Almighty God for benefits received during the past year; also invoking His divine guidance for the men at the Disarmament Conference in their sacred task of endeavoring to promote peace and good will between the nations

The commission association will sell the livestock of its members and others, charging the present fee, and at the end of the year, after deting all expenses and setting aside a part of the profits as a reserve or surplus fund, pro rate the balance in proportion to the amount they have paid in com-

missions in the year-Connected with each of these selling associations will be a stocker and feeder company whose business it will be to buy and sell feeders for its members and other patrons without profit.

A National Livestock Producers

Association is also proposed to be made up of the members of the terminal market associations and to be governed by a board of directors appointed by the several terminal market associations. The business of the National Association will be to promote the welfare of the livestock producers, to co-ordinate the work of the terminal associations and the stocker and feeeder companies, and to for-mulate plans for the even and orderly flow of livestock to market. This association will furnish producers, feeders and graziers information as to the number of stock on feed or on pasture and what the plans of the farmers are as to when they will market their animals. Each stockman will thus have as his guide full information as to what every other stockman plans to do. Underneath all these organiza-

tions at the terminal market, it is proposed to set up wherever needed local co-operati evlivestock shipping associations through which the small producers may pool their livestock shipments and be relieved of the necessity of

patronizing speculators.

The plan also contemplates the better financing of the producer and feeder. Under the plan also livestock producers will have a permanent organization at each of the terminal markets prepared to take care of the farmers' interests and protect them in case of a controversy with the railroad because of the death of the animals en route, or the late arrival of shipments; a controversy with the

Under the guidance of their other teachers they cultivate the school's lands, raise chickens, turkeys, rabbits and bees, and with the surplus of the proceeds of their farms they support other orphans like themselves who wish to join the col-

There now are fifty boys in the school, and other schools in Italy are trying out in a more or less complete way the co-operative system in use in the Collestrada School.

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



In one of the most extensive fights that has ever been made by any religious body in America for the eradieation of disease, Southern Baptists, through their Home Mission Board, have undertaken the task of combating tuberculosis in the 18 states comprising the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. The first step in this direction was the recent establishment on a tract of 143 acres at El Paso, Texas, of the Southern Baptist Sanatorium, where \$500,000 from the 75 Million Campaign has been invested and where \$500,000 more will be placed by the end of the Campaign period. The institution is located at an altitude of 4,500 feet on the side of Mt. Franklin and commands an excellent view of the mountains of New Mexico, Western Texas and Old 57,782. An odd case of first-ald was required of a newly installed Red Cross nurse at Bendena, Kan, recently, according to advices from that town.

A deaf man, who was endeavoring to help the woman clerk in a grocery store carry a sack of flour from the store room to his waiting automobile, inadvertently caught the drag-hook in her finger and dragged her instead of the sack of flour across the floor. His back was turned, and being too deaf to hear her cries, he did not know of the accident until he turned to lift the flour into his machine, The hook was so deeply imbedded in the woman's hand that surgery was necessary to remove it, but the Red Cross nurse was able to relieve her pain with first-aid at once while

a surgeon was being summoned.

Red Cross nurses in the chapters where public health work is conducted are constantly having just such calls as this, and frequently find themselves the only available help in serious emergencies. In many of the Red Cross Chapters employing public health nurses, the work is financed by the receipts from the annual Roll Call. The call asked for clothing principally, and in less than seven hours in one case and twelve hours in others, supplies were on their

Dallas replied at 4 p. m. following the call received in the morning, that clothing had been shipped. Waco not only responded to the first request, but sent a second supply of clothing. Houston sent 883 garments which had been cleaned and sterilized. Other towns in the adjacent territory sent more than their quota within the next two days, and the result was that by the time a sufficient degree of order had been created to look after the the stricken inhabitants of the flooded area, there were supplies on hand sufficient to meet all the needs of the situation.
