## Plans Being Made For Junior Fat Stock Show

Lubbock, Texas, February 22—Plans are going forward to make the forthcoming South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show to be held at Lubbock March 24, 15 and 26, a really big event.

Open house will be held Monday evening, March 24, from 5 to 8 o'clock at the livestock barns, to which the public in general is invited. A banquet sponsored by Texas Technological College, Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, American Business and Optimist clubs and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, will take place Tuesday evening, March 25, at 7:30 at the Tech livestock Judging Pavilion to which all exhibitors are invited. The highlight of the banquet will be the awarding of premium checks; beautiful plaques for each grand champion, compliments of the Jenkins Jewelry Co.; the Texas Swine Breeder's Association trophy to be awarded to the person having the grand champion barrow and, if possible, announcement of awards offered by the Kiwanis Club will be made. A parade will be staged at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning by 4-H and FFA clubs.

Entries will be accepted from thirty counties, but they must be postmarked not later than March 19th.

## YOU MAY DEDUCT FROM YOUR INCOME TAX

Collector of Internal Revenue Frank Scofield has asked that we publish the following list of deductions which are allowed in making out income tax returns since there seems to be some confusion regarding this list of items.

**DEDUCTIONS ALLOWED WHEN MAKING YOUR INCOME TAX RETURN**

Real estate taxes on personal residence; State gasoline tax 4c per gallon; Taxes paid on long distance telephone calls and telegraph messages.

Dues paid to labor unions; Interest on money borrowed; Automobile License; Poll Tax.

The following items, however, CANNOT be deducted from your income tax return:

Federal Income taxes; Social security deducted from your salary; Fines for law violation; Depreciation on a homestead.

Any deputy collector in South Texas will be glad to advise any taxpayer in regard to deductions allowed, and there is no charge whatever for this service. Collector Scofield stresses the fact that his deputies are glad to assist in any way possible in regard to the filing of income tax returns, and only asks that taxpayers not wait until the last day of March 15 to file these returns.

## Hereford's Fat Stock Show To Be Held February 28

Due to desire of the show committee to secure best judge possible for the event, Hereford's Fat Stock Show has been moved up one day and will be held February 28. A. R. Bateman, county agent, announced last week.

K. J. Edwards, who holds a national reputation as a livestock judge, will make the decisions on the animals in the Hereford show.

The show committee composed of H. G. Conkwright, Lee Hopson, Mal Stewart, Cecil Guseman, W. E. Mameron, John Pitman and Wiley Roberson will meet Saturday at 2:30 in the county courtroom to perfect plans for the show.

From 30 to 40 calves will compete for prizes totaling \$17.50 and in addition each boy entering an animal will receive \$1 whether the calf wins or not.

Judging will begin at 10 o'clock Friday Morning, February 28, and the auction sale will start at 1 o'clock.

## PLANTS UP IN FRAME GARDEN AT COURT HOUSE

The Frame Garden on the Court House lawn has plants up. The winds blew, the sand piled in, the temperature dropped, yet plucky plants have proudly reared their heads above the ground.

The frame garden has lettuce, radishes, spinach, swiss chard, carrots, and beets planted.

Quick maturing vegetables such as Tendergreen mustard, Black Seeded Simpson lettuce, Scarlet Globe Radishes, Bermuda Onions, and Double Curled parsley will be ready to eat 30 to 60 days from planting time. Where the size of the frame garden is limited the vegetable seed planted should be chosen largely from this class.

King of Denmark Spinach, Lucull Swiss Chard, Dwarf Rorticultural Beans, and Alaska English peas take 60 to 80 days and are classified as moderately quick maturing vegetables.

Crosby Egyptian Beets and Nantes Carrots take 80 to 90 days to mature and are called slow maturing vegetables.

All varieties listed are adapted to West Texas.

## TO SHOW PIGS AND LAMBS AT FAT STOCK SHOWS

Castro County 4-H boys will show pigs and lambs at this year's Fat Stock Shows. Eugene and William Hochstein of Nazareth will show 4 registered Southdown wethers at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show. These lambs will be judged on March 4th and the three of the boys lambs will weigh well over 100 pounds at the present time.

Rodney Smith and Wodie Lee Rhodes of Hart will each show a duroc barrow at the Lubbock show which will be the first time any 4-H boy from Castro County has ever shown pigs at Lubbock. One of the barrows will show in the class over 240 pounds and the other in the class for pigs under 240 pounds. These boys purchased these barrows from Mr. C. G. Johnson of Hart and hope to make their first show experience successful.

## Prices Lower Than Last Year

Due to much interest being shown in the cooperative purchase of trees last year the Land Use Planning Committee thought the program might be beneficial again this year.

The following prices have been given to the Land Use Planning committee—prices are even lower than last year:

6 to 12 inch Chinese Elms, Osage Orange, and Green Ash seedlings are 50 cents per 100 and \$1.00 per 1000. 12 to 18 inch Chinese Elm, Osage Orange and Green Ash are \$1.00 per 100 and \$8.00 per 1000. 18 to 24 inch Chinese Elm, Osage Orange, and Green Ash seedlings are \$1.50 per 100 and \$12.00 per 1000.

Anyone interested in purchasing trees must place his order at the County Agent's or Home Demonstration Agent's office not later than March 1st. Order must be accompanied by check or cash as the Land Use Planning Committee has no funds on which to operate.

Trees should be planted as soon after March 1st as possible, and anyone interested will want to bring in his order as soon as possible.

Remember that AAA payments of \$6.00 may be earned for 350 living trees at time of checking.

## Ground Water On The High Plains

Ground water on the high plains will be the program and topic for discussion for the community agricultural meeting during March. At the request of the Land Use Planning Committee, Mr. C. M. Stanley, from Amarillo will be present at each of these meetings to discuss ground water as he did to members of the land use planning committee. Mr. Stanley is considered an authority on this subject and all people who are interested in irrigation are urged to be at their community meetings to hear and enter into this discussion.

The schedule for the community meetings are as follows: Big Square, February 28; Flagg, March 3; Arney, March 4; Jumbo, March 5; Nazareth, March 6th; Sunnyside, March 7; and Hart, March 10th.

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RECIPE SERVICE  
College Station—For a good diet, every person needs an egg or nuts are substituted to provide the same nutritive elements. That the same nutritive elements, Food as a part of the new Texas Food Standard prepared by the Texas Nutrition Committee and soon to be issued by the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College.

There are many ways to prepare eggs other than scrambling, frying, or poaching them, and one of the best ways to get eggs into the diet is by means of desserts, advises Nora Ellen Elliott, extension specialist in food preparation. Here are some of her suggestions:

Soft Custard  
3 eggs; 2 cups milk; Cinnamon or nutmeg, if desired; 4 tablespoons sugar; 1-2 teaspoon vanilla; 1-8 teaspoon salt.

Heat the milk, sugar and salt in double boiler. Beat eggs lightly and add hot milk gradually to eggs, stirring constantly. Remove from the hot water at once, cool, and add the vanilla and spices.

Apple Flot  
4 egg whites; 2 cups thick apple sauce.  
Sweeten the apple sauce to taste while hot and add a little salt. Beat the whites very stiff and fold the apple sauce into them. Chill before serving.

Spoon Bread  
1 1-2 teaspoon salt; 1 cup cold liquid; 2 cups hot liquid; 3 tablespoons fat, melted.  
Mix the meal and salt thoroughly. Combine with 1 cup of cold liquid and stir until smooth. Add to 2 cups of hot liquid, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. Blend a small amount with the beaten eggs. Combine all the ingredients. Pour into a well-greased hot pan, baking in a hot oven for 45 to 50 minutes in a hot oven (400°F.). Serve from the pan in which it was baked.

Custard Sauce  
4 egg yolks; 2 cups milk; 1-4 cup sugar; Salt and vanilla to taste.  
Prepare in the same way as soft custard.

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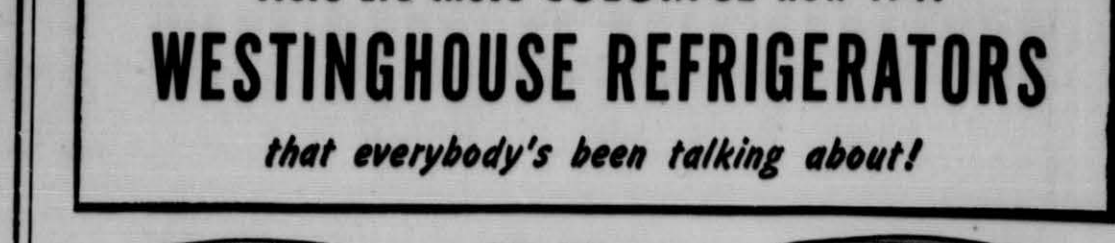

### For Coffee That Wins High Praise Here Are Nine Rules For Housewives



GOOD COFFEE can be made by any housewife if she will observe a few simple rules. That cup of coffee that is praised by the family doesn't just happen. The housewife pictured here is holding a new duraglas coffee container in which the coffee is not only vacuum-packed but kept fresh by an airtight cap that reveals the contents.

THERE is not one golden rule for making a good cup of coffee out of nine of them.

Good coffee may just happen once in a while but why take a chance especially when the best rules for coffee making are available straight from the coffee experts. Here they are:

1. Use good, fresh coffee.
2. Always use water, freshly drawn, for making coffee. Water that stands exposed loses oxygen, tastes flat and effects coffee flavor.
3. Always measure both coffee and water to obtain the same strength each time coffee is made.
4. Use a clean coffee maker. Scald it just before using to remove all stale odors. This also pre-heats the pot which is necessary for most all methods of coffee making.
5. Always use a standard measuring cup or spoon. A tablespoon is good for measuring.
6. Never allow coffee to boil. Boiling develops bitterness and destroys both flavor and aroma. The volatile oils, which give coffee its delicate flavor and fragrance, escape in steam as coffee boils and

changes take place which bring out a bitter or sour taste. The best temperatures for coffee making are below boiling (185 to 205 degrees, F). Coffee boiled for even one minute is more bitter than coffee made at 203 degrees F, which is just 9 degrees below boiling.

7. Remove grounds from coffee as soon as it is made. Used grounds absorb aroma and if left in contact with the brew may give coffee a harsh, unpleasant flavor.
8. If possible, serve coffee immediately, or keep hot on an asbestos mat over low heat.
9. If you buy vacuum-packed coffee there are new glass containers that are not only eye-appealing but are fitted with airtight, rubber-lined screw caps that re-seal the coffee each time it is used. These new containers obviate the necessity of using a cannister. They are made by the new duraglas technique which assures lighter, tougher glass.

In choosing a coffee maker the experts make only two suggestions. Buy a coffee maker that suits the needs of your family. Choose one that is easy to keep clean.
