Home Ec. Dep't Enrollment at Hi School Increases

Last fall 118 girls began the home making course offered in Cisco high school. Foods proved to be a popular subject. Fut clothing and related art courses offered this term have an even larger enrollment, 128 students are now registered.

There are three classes beginning clothing. The girls are studying personal grooming at present and are displaying a great deal of enthusiasm in giving manicures, shampoos and facials to their laboratory partners. In another week they will begin construction. They will make a simple school dress of some cotton material.

The second year clothing class is beginning a course new to Cisco. It is consumers' education and is a coming field in home economics. The girls select some article of clothing that is of some particular interest to them and study all of the guides to selection that they could use as a buyer of that article. At the end of this first six weeks they will make a report to the class and suggest what information is needed by the consumer if she is to become a more intelligent buyer. This class has three construction problems, a remodeling, making a tailored dress and making a child's play suit.

The third year class will begin construction before the others. They will begin cutting on Friday. This class has only one problem, making a dress for some special occasion. Since the class is composed of juniors and seniors, the girls are anxious to make their evening dresses for the junior-senior banquet. This class also studies home care and beautification, with much emphasis being placed on managing the home efficiently. The Cisco girls are proud of their department and work that they are doing. They extend a most cordial welcome to their patrons and friends to visit the department at any time.

Progress on New Picture House Here Being Made

Investigation Is Started by Leob Prison Slaying

JOLIET, Ill., Jan. 29. (AP)—A sweeping investigation into the sordid secrets of prison life today begun to uncover the whole story behind the fatal slaying yesterday of Richard Leob, the "thrill murderer" of Bobby Franks in 1924.

The coroner's jury heard Dr. John Larson, the prison psychiatrist, confirm in part the story of James Day, convict that "indecent advances" by Leob brought on Day's attack.

Dr. Larson said that "Day was sane, but emotionally unstable. That he had been apprehensive for several weeks about possible sex problems."

Day was formally charged with murder today.

Leob was slashed 22 times

with a razor. Sullen at first, Day discussed the case except Warden Joseph Ragans "just a fight."

But later, to Edward G. ers, investigator for the attorney's office, he gave statement of the furious slaying the incidents, which he said he and Leob engaged in to it.

He denied he had slung razor with which he "cut" the partner of Nathan Leopold, Chicago's most revolting criminal, nearly a dozen years ago. The razor, he claimed, had been left in the afternoon for home in Peccos.

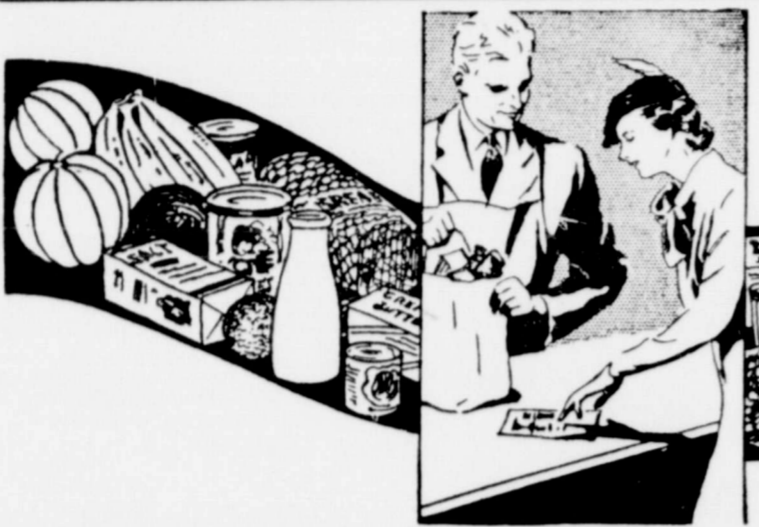

Proving Age Will Be Biggest Problem Of Old Age Pension Applicant, Says

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—Facing old-age assistance applicants will be the difficulty of proving their ages, Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Old Age Assistance commission, said today when asked what he thought the most difficult problem of old people making application.

Application forms will be distributed to cities and towns over the state and will be available to all who want them February 14, when the law goes into effect. As required by the new law, certain facts must be established by the applicant. The law grants assistance to the needy who are 65 years of age or more, and each applicant must definitely and conclusively prove his or her age.

"There are many ways by which a person can establish his age," Director Carpenter stated. "The commission will consider any evidence that proves or helps to establish definitely the age of the applicant. However, it will be necessary in each case for the applicant to establish to the satisfaction of the commission, by whatever means he can, that he is 65 years of age."

A number of kinds of evidence to be used in proving age are the following:

1. Birth certificates.
2. Marriage certificates giving the ages of both parties.
3. Birth certificates of children giving age of parents.
4. Ages of sons and daughters when these are sufficiently advanced.
5. Naturalization papers giving age at time of applying for same.
6. Passports. Service books of immigrants.
7. County records. Baptismal certificates.
8. Insurance papers.
9. Employment records.
10. School records.
11. Records of trade unions, fraternal societies, or other organizations.
12. Federal or state records in the case of those who have been in civil or military service.
13. D. A. R. U. D. C., Daughters of Texas Revolution, etc.
14. Hospital records, or those of physicians.
15. Vaccination certificates.
16. Poll tax receipts that show the actual age of voter and not mere fact that he has passed a certain age.

Local census records which may give birthdate and place. Na-

tional Census Records, Dept. of Census, Washington, D. C.

18. Old licenses of various kinds (such as hunting, fishing, and liquor licenses) sometimes carrying age.

19. Tombstone records when stones have been erected in anticipation of death.

20. Entries in a family bible or other genealogical records or memoranda of families of applicants.

21. Bills of sale as a slave in the case of aged negroes.

22. Such other evidence as the Old Age Assistance commission may approve.

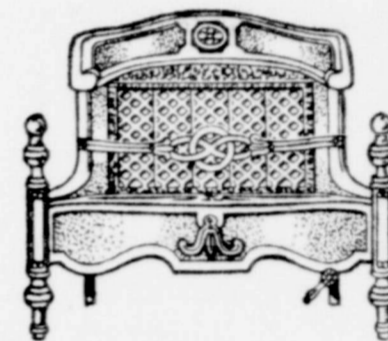

TOTAL APPROACHES RECEIPTS TO OFFICERS SALARY FUNDS

With a few minor exceptions—for which estimates have been inserted—the Eastland county commissioners court this week fixed the salaries of Eastland county officers as provided for under the constitutional amendment and statutes abolishing the fee system in the state of Texas.

The total amount of these salaries about approximates the total paid last year, County Judge Clyde L. Garrett said. County Auditor Don Parker said that from best estimates and indications the receipts of road bond interest and sinking officers salary fund will be between \$42,000 and \$43,000, which is just about the total of the salaries and expense estimates fixed by the court and the auditor. In this fact Eastland county is fortunate, Auditor Don Parker said, because in many instances the total of county salaries is considerably in excess of the potential salary fund revenue.

The maximum salary for a county official in Eastland county, which is an "under" county because its population is less than 2,000, is \$3,500. But the commissioners court could not, under the law, fix a less salary than the earnings of the officer last year if those were \$3,500 or under. One exception to this is the salary of the district attorney which was fixed by state statute several years ago at \$5,000. This was done by the legislature in 1931 when a special district attorney in Eastland county to replace a former county attorney status, was passed. The commissioners court could not fix a less amount for the salary of this office.

Another exception is the salary of the county treasurer, maximum of which is \$2,000. Only about \$900 of the county treasurer's salary is paid out of the officers salary fund, however, the remainder coming out of the

The expense figures under the new set-up are also county auditor estimates.

Approximate
The 1935 salaries and expense figures are only approximate, Mr. Parker explained. They are taken from preliminary reports of the officers and are subject to correction from the annual reports to be filed by each officer.

Total salaries and expense estimates as fixed by the commissioners court and the county auditor are \$43,670 as compared with salaries and expenses approximated at \$43,070.06 for 1935. Three Announce For Re-election To Commission

Burnett, H. C. Henderson and W. R. (Bob) Winston. Their names appear in the political announcement column. Formal statements of their candidacies will appear later, they said.

NYA Projects Offer Training for Youths

"The NYA has a half million dollars to spend in the state of Texas on projects that will give employment to youths from relief or WPA families," Mrs. A. J. Olson was told in a letter asking her assistance in securing registration of eligible youths. Registration, she said, must be with the national re-employment service.

"The projects," the letter said, "will provide job-training and, when completed, will be of use to all youth in a community. These youths may earn from \$1 to \$4 per day, depending upon their skill and the wage scale in the county in which they are employed. A youth may work only

46 hours each month on these part-time NYA projects, but by using three or four groups a projects may be operated continuously.

"In order to be eligible, these youths must be certified by the case worker or the Texas Relief commission, and must also be registered with the National Re-employment service."

Any youth in Cisco or surrounding territory who can qualify according to the above is requested to register at the chamber of commerce, Mrs. Olson said.

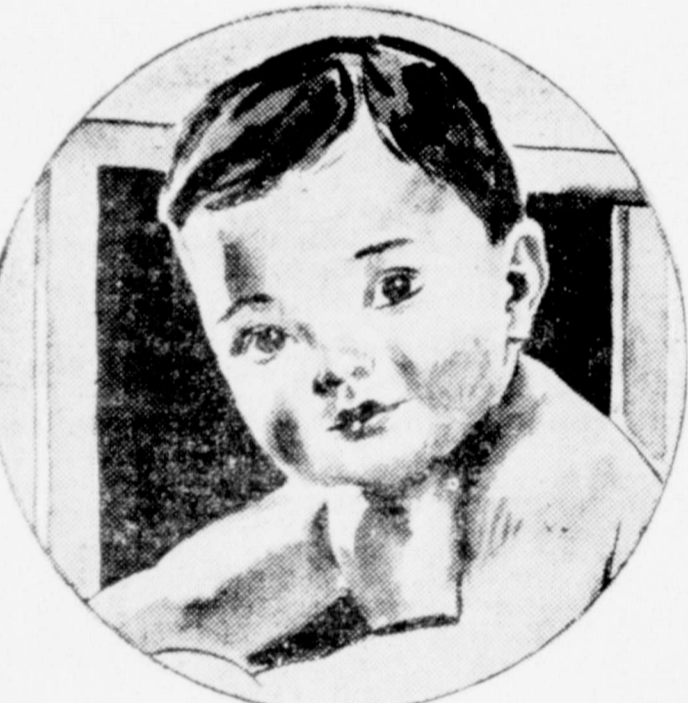

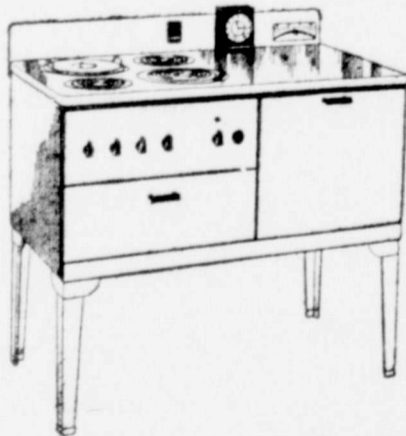

SYNOPSIS: So far as anybody has guessed, the man Bobby Jones and Dr. Thomas found at the bottom of a cliff on the Marchbolt golf links fell over the edge. Bobby has gone to London for a couple of days, and on the train returning to Wales has met Lady Frances Derwent, a friend from childhood. Frankie has spent the time going over mutual acquaintances, and just as the train reaches Marchbolt she offers to take Bobby home.

Chapter Five THE INQUEST

The inquest on the body of Alex Pritchard was held on the following day. Dr. Thomas gave evidence as to the finding of the body.

"Life was not then extinct?" asked the Coroner.

"No, deceased was still breathing. There was, however, no hope of recovery. The— Here the Doctor became highly technical.

The Coroner came to the rescue of the jury. "In ordinary, everyday language, the man's back was broken?"

"If you like to put it that way," said Dr. Thomas sadly.

He described how he had gone off to get help, leaving the dying man in Bobby's charge.

"Now as to the cause of this disaster, what is your opinion, Dr. Thomas?"

"I should say that in all probability (failing any evidence as to his state of mind, that is, to say) the deceased stepped inadvertently over the edge of the cliff. "That is, of course, perfectly possible. Whether the deceased walked over the edge or threw himself over is a matter on which I can say nothing."

Robert Jones was called next. Bobby explained that he had been playing golf with the Doctor and had sliced his ball to-

wards the sea. A mist was rising at the time and it was difficult to see. He thought he heard a cry and for a moment wondered if his ball could have hit anybody coming along the footpath. He had decided, however, that it could not possibly have travelled so far.

"Did you find the ball?"

"Yes, it was about a hundred yards short of the footpath."

He then described how they had driven from the next tee and how he himself had driven into the chasm.

Here the Coroner stopped him, since his evidence would have been a repetition of the Doctor's. He questioned him closely, however, as to the cry he had heard or thought he heard.

"It was just a cry."

"A cry for help?"

"Oh, no. Just a sort of shout, you know. In fact I wasn't quite sure I heard it."

"A startled kind of cry?"

"That's more like it," said Bobby gratefully. "Sort of noise a fellow might let out if a ball hit him unexpectedly."

"Or if he took a step into nothingness when he thought he was on a path?"

"Yes."

Then, having explained that the man actually died about five minutes after the Doctor left to get help, Bobby's ordeal came to an end.

The Coroner was by now anxious to get on with a perfectly straight-forward business. Mrs. Leo Cayman was called.

Bobby gave a gasp of acute disappointment. Where was the face of the photograph that had tumbled from the dead man's pocket? Photographers, thought Bobby disgustedly, were the worst kind of liars.

The photograph obviously must have been taken some years ago, but even then it was hard to believe that that charming wide-eyed beauty could have become this brazen-looking woman with plucked eyebrows and obviously dyed hair.

Time, thought Bobby suddenly, was a very frightening thing. What would Frankie, for instance, look like in twenty years' time. He gave a little shiver.

Meanwhile, Tmella Cayman of 17 St. Leonard's Gardens, Paddington, was giving evidence. Deceased was her only brother, Alexander Pritchard. She had last seen him the day before the tragedy, when he had announced his intention of going for a walking tour in Wales. He had recently returned from the East.

"Did he seem in a happy and normal state of mind?"

"Oh, quite! Alex was always cheerful."

"So far as you know he had nothing on his mind?"

"Oh, I'm sure he hadn't. He was looking forward to his trip."

"There have been no money troubles, or other troubles of any kind, in his life recently?"

"Well, really, I couldn't say as

to that," said Mrs. Cayman. "You see, he'd only just come back, and before that I hadn't seen him for ten years, and he was never one much for writing. But he took me out to theatres and lunches in London and gave me one or two presents, so I don't think he could have been short of money, and he was in such good spirits that I don't think there could have been anything else."

"What was your brother's profession, Mrs. Cayman?"

The lady seemed slightly embarrassed.

"Well, I can't say I rightly know. Prospecting—that's what he called it. He was very seldom in England."

"You know of no reason which might cause him to take his own life?"

"Oh, no, and I can't believe that he did such a thing. It must have been an accident."

"How do you explain the fact that your brother had no luggage with him—not even a knapsack?"

"He didn't like carrying a knapsack. He meant to post parcels
