





Neither house nor its contents were insured, Fire Marshal Gustafson said. Origin of the blaze had not been determined.



Agent Explains How New Farm **Program Works** 

How the new Agricultural Adustment administration soil conservation program may work out in Eastland county was explained briefly by Elmo Cook, county

"Take a typical farm of 70 acres. Native pasture and the land around barn and house and lots cover a total of 13 acres, garden and orchard take up 2 acres The remainder is normally divided between 40 acres in cotton, and 15 acres in feed, mostly grain sorghums and a little corn and cane.

"The soil depleting base would be 55 acres in this case. The minimum requirement to qualify for a grant for at least 20 per cent, or in this example 11 acres devoted to soil conserving or soil buildcle Will she had received just ing crops or practices. 

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
