WASHINGTON, April 20. (AP)—Funeral will be held in the White House tomorrow for Louis McHenry Howe, former newspaper man, friend and advisor of President Roosevelt, who died Saturday night at the age of 65 years.

#### Half of Relief Fund Still in Treasury

WASHINGTON, April 20. (AP)—The federal treasury department today reported that there was more than \$2,000,000,000 of the \$4,888,000,000 work relief fund remaining at the end of the third quarter of the fiscal year, March 1. At the same rate of expenditure, the remainder at the end of the fiscal year would be \$1,218,000,000, compared with \$1,000,000,000 estimated by President Roosevelt in asking for \$1,500,000,000 for next year. Of the \$1,029,223,000 granted to the state, Texas received \$80,594,570, the department reported.
