LONE STAR TO TEST BELOW RANGER HORIZON RANGER April 27.—The Lone Star Gas company and the Lone Star Gasoline company are deepening the Taylor No. 2, located about two miles due west of Ranger. This well produced for 17 years from the Ranger sand and is now being deepened to test the Duffer producing horizon and several possible producing points between the Ranger and the Duffer. Phil G. Russell, geologist for Lone Star, expects to encounter the top of the Duffer at a depth of 3,860 feet. The present depth of the well is 3,476 feet. The company intends to drill another Taylor lease well to the Duffer, regardless of the outcome of this test. The Lone Star Gasoline company are vitally interested in the Ranger area and are undertaking these tests in the hope of calling attention to possible oil and gas below the Ranger sand. The companies hope other owners of unplugged wells in the Ranger area will consider the possibilities of production below the Ranger sand and also the good chance of developing production in the black lime, above the Ranger sand, by shooting. Numerous wells in the Ranger area have had a good showing and in some instances good natural production from the black lime of Marble Falls, but passed up these showings in the rush for gusher production during the boom. This hard, black lime, as a rule, responds excellently to a shot. It is hoped that before plugging any wells that had a showing of oil in the black lime the owners will shoot them before abandoning them. As is generally known, wells are being plugged in this area almost weekly and unless something is done, and done promptly, the interests of this area will greatly suffer, company officials have pointed out. The Lone Star Gas company, through its geological department, will furnish any information and advise relative to conditions around any of these wells, it was stated Saturday.

prison bureau took over the plot in 1926. Prisoners were trained to shape the shale, pile the raw bricks in the large bake oven and fire the ovens to bake the bricks. As shops were added to the prison plant, inmates were able to take over more and more of the construction work. All the iron beds of the institution and much of the other metal equipment and woodwork were turned out in prison shops. 'If there's anything of a mechanical nature that we can manufacture here, we do it,' Sanford explains. Guards Double As Teachers A chair factory and another small dormitory to house disciplinary 'prompts' will be constructed by the inmate-workers this year. Inmates do most of the cooking and baking, run the prison laundry, scrub the floors and polish the brass. The prison farm produces vegetables, milk and pork for the mess. The typical Chillicothe guard frequently serves as keeper, fore-

man and teacher all in one. Besides watching the men at work to prevent escapes, he may be a skilled tradesman, capable of bossing the job and instructing the men in their trade. Two nights a week the shop crews are given instruction in the technique of the trade at which they are working. And one afternoon a week is devoted to studying the theory of the trade—the sources of materials, the development of machines and the running of the industry.

ALBANY, April 27.—Reliance Oil & Royalty Corporation—Jones & Stasney No. 1, J. P. Morris started flowing at a rate of 12 barrels hourly when drilled into the Bluff Creek sand at 1583 to 1601 feet to make a slight southwest extension for the pool. The well is the west center location of the southeast quarter of the northwest quarter of section 190, ETRY and opening new territory for drilling. The same operators staked location for No. 2, J. P. Morris 440 feet east of the producer and their No. 3 a like distance south of the producer. Putnam Supply Co. No. 1-B, J. P. Morris has staked a new test 220 feet from the south and 508 feet from the east lines of section 200, ETRY in the northeast side of the Bluff Creek area. Baker & Pardue No. 4, J. P. Morris is drilling at 1200 feet in the northeast corner of south center 40 acres of the southeast quarter of section 200, ETRY. White & Duncan No. 1, G. R. Davis is a new wildcat location southeast of Bluff Creek pool in the center of section 221, ETRY.
