

# Bobcat Band leaves on 2,000-mile trip

Dimmitt's Bobcat Band left for Nashville, Tenn., Wednesday on its longest band trip in 26 years. One-hundred forty students and 70 parents are making the 2,054-mile round trip aboard five chartered buses.

The buses were scheduled to arrive at Oklahoma City at 9 p.m. Wednesday at the Day's Inn Motel. They plan to arrive in Memphis, Tenn. Thursday and will check into the Day's Inn Motel in Nashville Friday.

While in Nashville, the Dimmitt sightseers will visit the Belle Meade Mansion, the Parthenon, the Upper Room and the Nashville Jubilee.

Opryland is scheduled for Saturday, with a viewing of the Grand Ole Opry matinee. Sunday they will tour the Hermitage and Tulip Grove. The students will depart for Fort Smith, Ark., Monday, where they will stay at the Motel 6.

They will also travel through the scenic Ozark mountains, which produce the nation's largest supply of lead and zinc; and will see Clarksville, site of Dardanelle Dam; Little Rock, the "City of Three Capitols" and the "City of Roses; and Lonoke, Ark. (cross-tie capital of the US).

Other interesting landmarks to be visited during the trip are Amarillo's Cliffside gas field, El Reno, Okla., and Oklahoma City.

After the week-long trip, the buses are scheduled to arrive in Dimmitt at 6 p.m. Tuesday.

## It's the 23rd trip for No. 1 band fan

"The Bobcat Band is my pride and joy," said Edna Faye Reinhardt, who has been on 23 band trips in 25 years. "I've been all around the world, and the band trip is the highlight of my life," she said. Wednesday, she boarded the bus for her 24th band trip — the longest ever, to Nashville, Tenn.

Mrs. Reinhardt is a quiet lady, but her love for the youngsters she has traveled with shows through, and she radiates the warmth of a woman who really cares.

Her first trip was in 1954, when her daughter was in the 8th grade. Since then she has gone with her nieces and nephews, then, "I just adopted some children to go with," she said.

"One of the greatest things for me is when a child comes up and says, 'You are going this year, aren't you?'"

She said it was hard for her to express what she feels in her heart, but her face tells "the story as she talks about 'her kids.'"

Mrs. Reinhardt has missed going on only two trips in her 25 years of traveling with the Bobcat Band. And both of those times, she mused, her bags were packed and ready to go. The first trip she missed was due to the death of a friend, and the second was due to her own illness.

"The trips are great — they teach the kids music, history, discipline, pride and achievement that they carry with them for the rest of their lives," she said.

Mrs. Reinhardt has a great respect for Band Director Ralph Smith and his wife Avis.

"With Ralph and Avis, everything goes smoothly. They teach and have fun on these trips."

"The kids remember the closeness they've had with Ralph even after they've grown up," she commented. "I love children," Mrs. Reinhardt said. But she doesn't have to tell anyone that. It shows in her face.

"I've held heads, doctor-ed blistered feet, cried when they've cried, and laughed when they've laughed — they just mean that much to me."

Some of the parents going on the band trips now were band students themselves when Mrs. Reinhardt first started going on the annual jaunts.

"To see the light on the kids' faces when they go places and see things on these trips, that they may never have been able to do otherwise, is worth a lot," she said.

"A few kids make music their life, but all of them carry the pride all their lives. I've seen it through their children and grandchildren."

Her personal treasure is a band blanket given to her by the Lyre Club 15 years ago. She has used it as a pillow, a cover, and to wrap a sick child in. The blanket has not missed a trip since she received it 15 years ago.

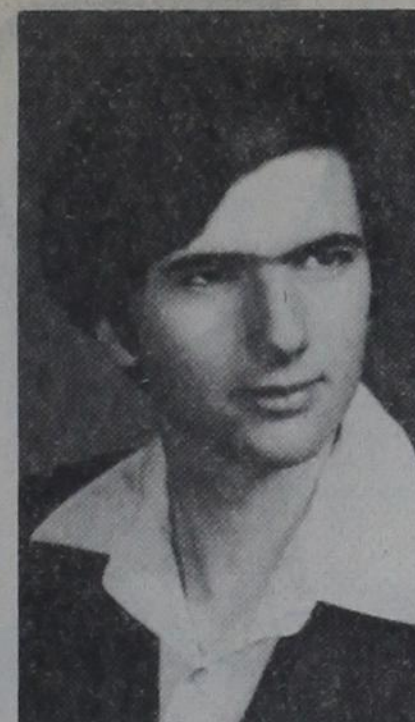

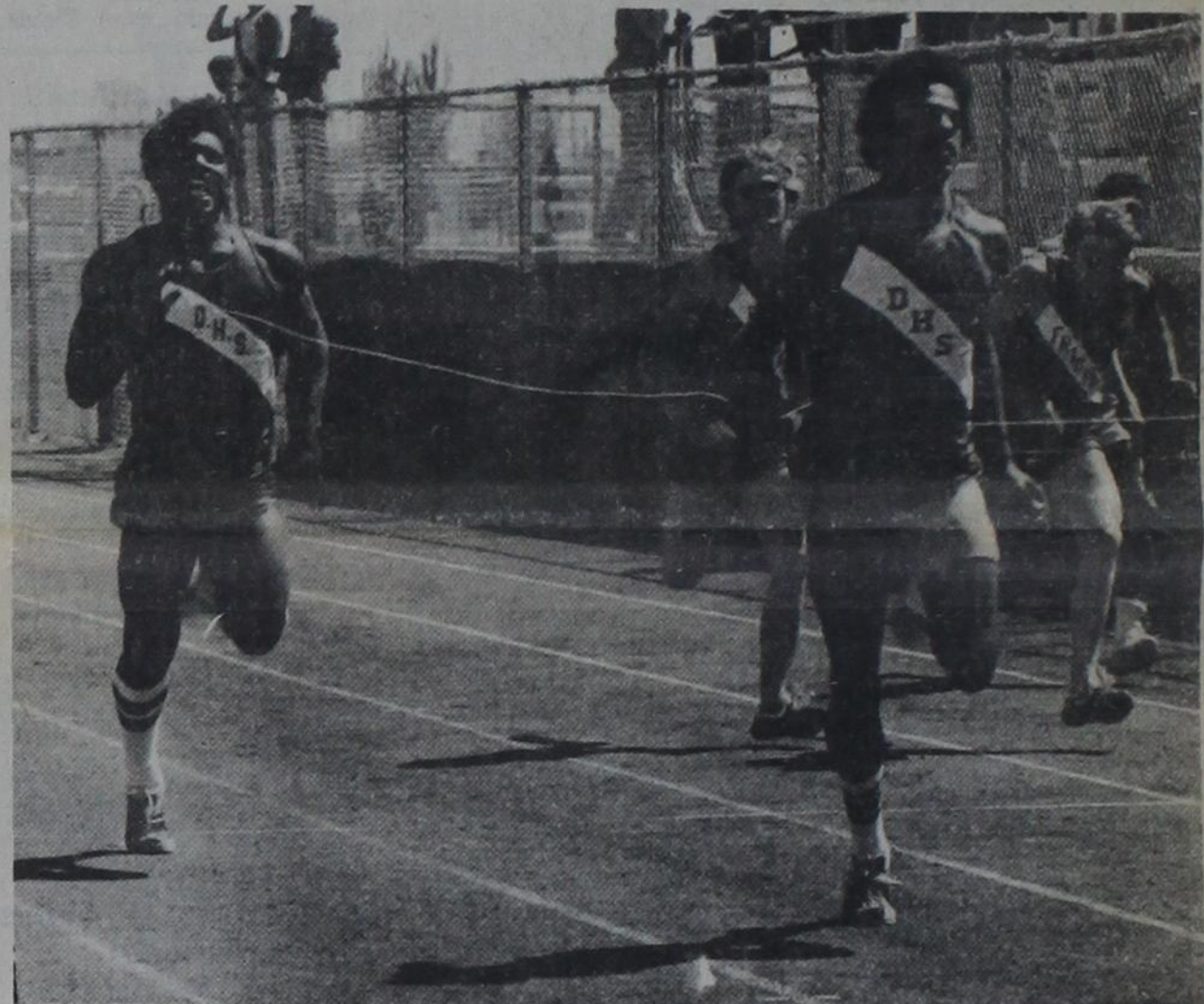
The athletes singled out George Howell, president of the Athletic Booster Club, for his support—and the crowd gave him a standing ovation.

## Tape units whir Monday at commissioners' meeting

Monday's meeting of the Castro County Commissioners' Court was conducted with two tape recorders running — one operated by Commissioner Anna Margaret Moss and the other by County Judge M. L. Simpson.

Simpson said the purpose of his recorder was to check the accuracy of the minutes for his own personal use. He added that he had also recorded the previous meeting, but had not yet played it back.

Commissioner Al Maurer moved to approve the minutes of the last meeting, with a second from Edd Wilson. Mrs. Moss voted against the motion, which carried 2-1. Commissioner Ed Bennett of Precinct 1 was absent.

A motion was passed to approve the Child Welfare contract as corrected and allocate \$1,000 to be set up in the treasurer's account to be used for child welfare until it is depleted, at which time the child welfare board is to meet with the commission for re-evaluation for any further expenses on an annual basis.

The contract will be sent to the Department of Human Resources in Austin for final approval.

The court agreed that each commissioner should appoint two members from his or her precinct to serve on the board, along with Judge Simpson, making a total of nine members. A \$2,000 expenditure was approved for local Department of Public Safety Trooper

Jackie Gunnels to purchase a new type of radar device on a lease-purchase agreement over a period of two years.

Simpson reported that Gunnels said the new unit would "fool fuz-busters" (radar detectors), enabling the radar device "to pay for itself within the first month of operation."

County attorney Jimmy Davis advised the commission to put off authorizing payment of a \$1,620 bill for medical and psychiatric care from Central Plains Hospital in Plainview for an approximate 19-day stay of a mental patient picked up in Dimmitt in late March.

The woman patient had been making a disturbance in the Circle K food store in Dimmitt. Police discovered that she was reported as an escapee from the state hospital in Big Spring, but a later report showed that the hospital's court order for her detention was expired, so they could not come pick her up.

Her parents are residents of New Mexico, and had her committed to Big Spring from El Paso. Davis said he will look into what can be worked out between the county, the hospital and the woman's parents.

Sheriff Granville Martin suggested that the commission try to save money in the future by changing the meal provisions for prisoners. Martin suggested that the county purchase a freezer and serve frozen dinners and breakfasts,

adding that in the long run it would be much cheaper than the present per-day cost of almost \$6.50 per prisoner.

Martin said a bill received from the Hereford jail for the feeding of a prisoner from this county showed a meal expense of \$2.10 per day.

Commissioner Edd Wilson said that according to the latest report from the Texas Jail Standards Commission inspector who visited here, several changes would also have to be made in the jail's kitchen area before it could be used.

Judge Simpson suggested that the commission look into the various aspects of the matter and give consideration to the sheriff's report, agreeing that something needs to be done about rising costs.

In other business, Commissioner Al Maurer reported on the progress of his negotiations for a piece of property in his precinct for the county's use, and asked about county policy in helping farmers control bindweed in the bar ditches near their property.

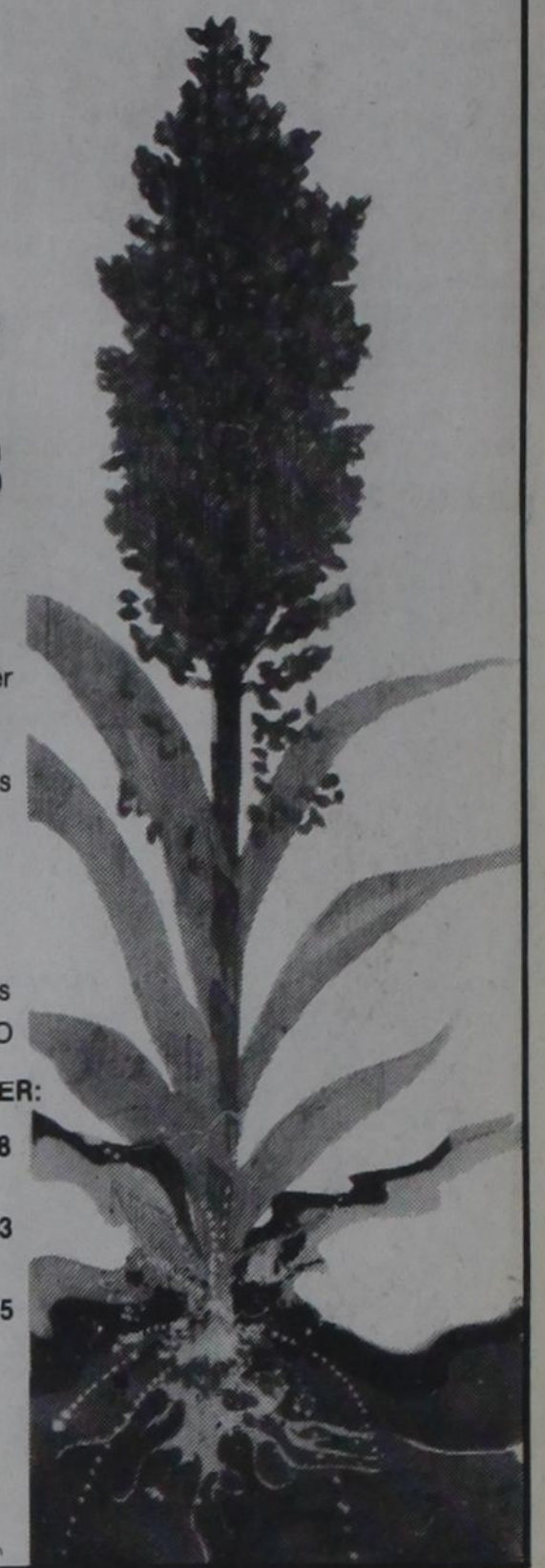

1. "Good as Gold" by Joseph Heller — said by some as not being as good as gold but as good as gold plate.
2. "Matarese Circle" by Robert Ludlum — most readers (except the picky ones) will find this on par with their other favorite Ludlum books.
3. "War and Remembrance" by Herman Wouk — it has been on the table for months so it must be pretty good; even the critics in Time Magazine liked it.
4. "Overload" by Arthur Hailey — "Overload" has proven to be a good story even though it is much like

the other Hailey books. One twist which is most mysterious is that the story seems to be somewhat prophetic in regard to our energy situation.

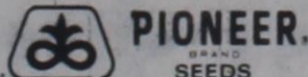

### Final plans for Farmers told of last chance Hart Days to be mapped for legislation in Texas

"Time is running out for the farmers and ranchers of Texas to accomplish anything in the Texas Legislature this year," Gerald McCathern of Hereford, a spokesman for the American Agriculture Movement.

"Since the Legislature only meets every two years — it is critical that anything in the way of legislation for farmers and ranchers be done during the next week, since the session ends in May. Bills must be scheduled at this time in order to be voted on this session," continued McCathern.

He listed some issues pending in the legislature in various committees, including:

(1) Bills to allow the manufacture of alcohol from raw agriculture products for the purpose of making gasohol;

(2) Family Farm Security Act which allows young people of Texas to get a foothold in farming, through state guaranteed loans for the purpose of purchasing agriculture land;

(3) a bill to deal with non-resident aliens purchasing farm and ranch land in Texas;

(4) Interstate Grain Marketing Compact — a bill which would create a commission made up of members from grain producing states for the express purpose of determining why farmers of Texas and other states must sell grain continuously at prices that are below the cost of production while farmers in other countries receive two to three times as much for the grain they sell.

"We in this area are very fortunate in having as our representative Speaker of the House Billy Clayton," McCathern continued. "we can be most effective in the Texas Legislature by urging the importance of various issues to agriculture as a whole and our district in particular. Please exercise your constitutional right and call Rep. Clayton and urge his support of these agriculture bills. Clayton will welcome your calls to discuss the issues. Call 512-475-3400 or send a telegram."

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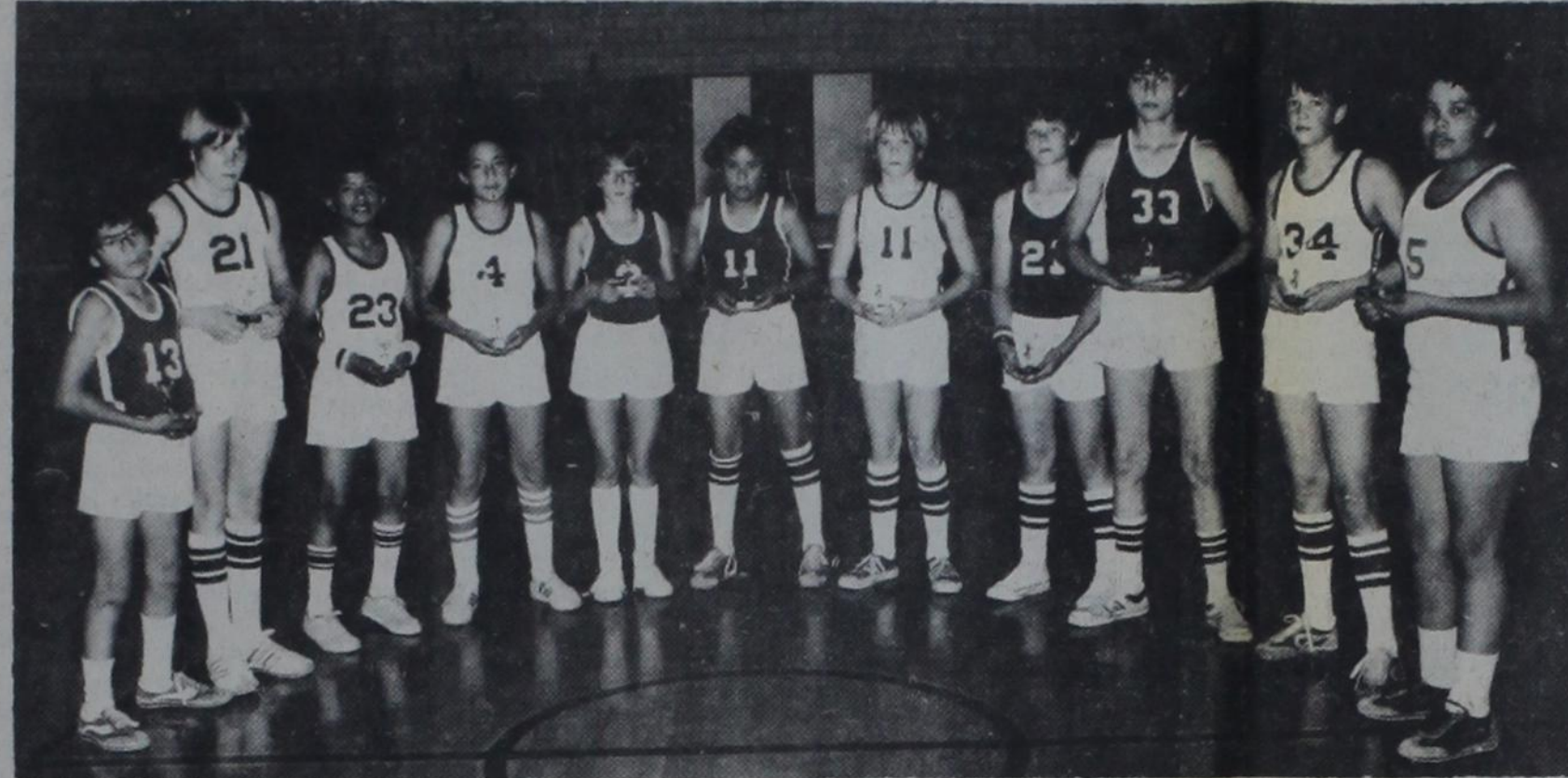

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**Gasohol program growth traced for Kiwanians**

An overview of gasohol development and the Dimmitt Amstar plant's present position in efforts to become a manufacturer of the motor fuel were outlined by plant manager Doug Lapins at the Kiwanis Club luncheon Monday.  
 "We want this program badly; it's the best thing we've looked at," Lapins said

in explaining that manufacture of denatured alcohol from corn would fit into Amstar's program, filling the gaps between seasonal production peaks in its other products, corn syrups and starch.  
 Lapins said the firm was not enthusiastic after an investigation last year of the proposal to manufacture alcohol for mixing with gasoline and making a motor fuel.  
 "But since then, the mid-eastern situation with its hike in gasoline prices, the moves to give tax breaks for use of gasohol, plus engineering improvements, all have put a new face on the matter," he said.  
 The speaker said farmers in midwestern states who originated the program are having huge success with it, and are promoting it energetically.  
 The program here would be strictly regional, not competitive with the cane sugar plant

in South Texas which has been assured of a federal loan guarantee to convert to alcohol manufacture.  
 A market is available in the north half of Texas and probably in Colorado, he added, so Amstar continues to work with Dimmitt Agri industry.  
 Lapins said an engineering study is the next step, and awaiting word from the Amstar headquarters office.  
 "We're looking at a separate building, though we can use some of our present equipment, and the investment would be \$7-\$10 million dollars," Lapins explained.  
 "also we're considering production of purely industrial alcohol, which is used in many products, as well as gasohol."  
 He said the "unknowns" which are now being investigated include government attitudes and the distribution problem. It would be necessary to tie-in with a major distributor, such as one of the oil companies which retails gasoline, in order for all the plant's production to be absorbed, he added.

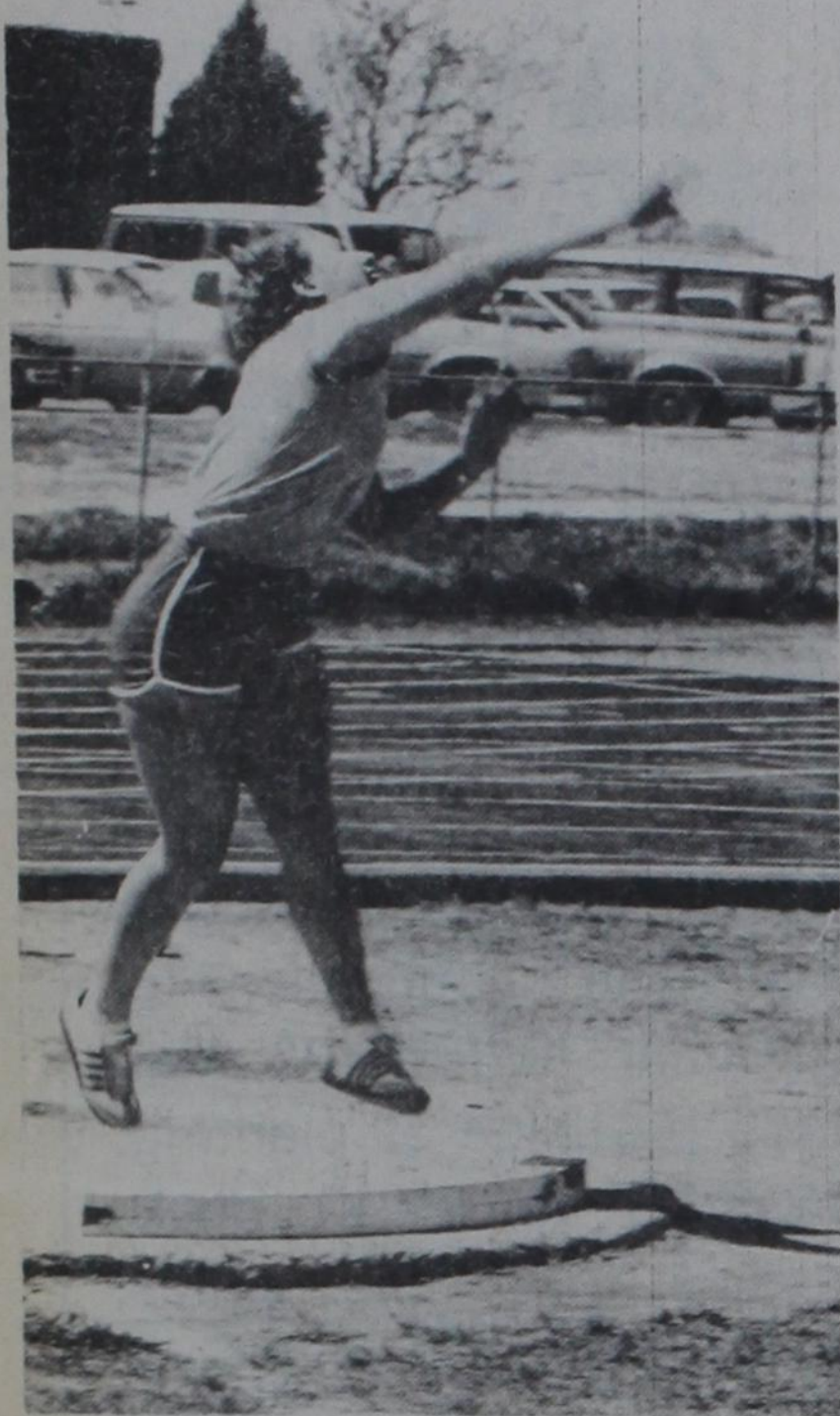
Biggest frustration of the

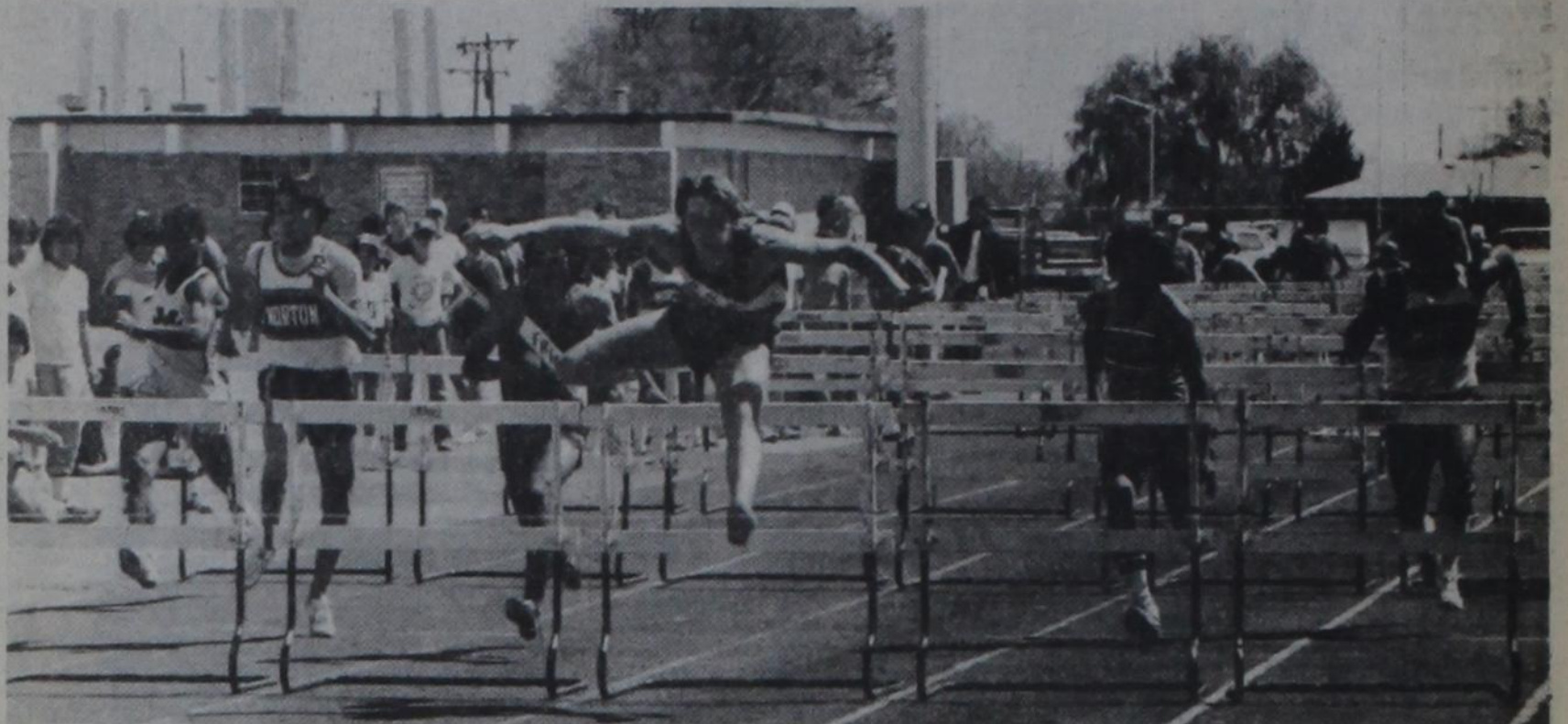
