Charlie and I took our families Friday night and went over to Brownwood to watch a stubborn band of Howard Payne Yellow-jackets take advantage of their underdog position and a wet field and hold a might TCU Horned Frog team to a 6 to 0 win. I saw H. D. Tucker, who used to pastor the First Methodist church here. He looks like he always did as bald-headed as Pete Nance, with a smile as broad as the new moon. And there was I. Moldave, who owned the Boston store here and moved it to Brownwood to make room for M. Rheinberg and a New Boston Store. There were lots of folks we know there and it was a pleasure seeing them, although the pleasure was marred by the mud and the shoving and the pushing of four thousand people trying to go through a little gate and a little tunnel that wouldn't accommodate a dozen at once. The timbers over the passage were so low that a tall man had to stoop nearly double to get through. Charlie hit his head on one of them and from what he said I gathered he wasn't particularly happy about it.

When we finally got within a couple of blocks of the stadium with Mrs. Charlie's big Buick, Charlie, who was driving, looked the situation over and decided he had rather walk a dozen blocks than get jammed in that mess. The Lobo band will go to Fort Worth during the morning, it was announced, and will play a concert over Station WBAP during the afternoon.

Secretary J. E. Spencer and Chairman H. L. Dyer of the Cisco Day committee joined in urging all persons who expect to take cars to notify Spencer Monday or Tuesday so that a suitable police escort for the motorcade can be arranged. The motorcade will form seven miles west of Fort Worth, it was announced. The Ciscoans will be met there by their escort, which will include Barney Oldfield.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, said: "The articles were conceived in malice and framed to give a false impression."

The newspaper was not named.

Sentenced to 25-Year Term in Prison

CARTHAGE, Sept. 19. (AP)—Mrs. Reable Childs was found guilty today in the rifle slaying of her crippled husband, Marlie Childs, former Shelby county treasurer, at Center April 23. The jury fixed her sentence at 25 years in the penitentiary. Childs was shot to death while in the kitchen at their home.

Terrance Bramlett, admitted lover of Mrs. Childs, charged jointly in the slaying, will face trial Monday.

500 RAILWAY MEN STRIKING

No Violence Reported; Trains Running

GREENVILLE, Sept. 19. (AP)—Five hundred union engineers and trainmen of the Louisiana, Arkansas and Texas and the Louisiana and Arkansas lines struck today over complaint of company failure to reinstate agreements for recognized pay rates, rules, and working conditions.

There were no disorders despite the move of railway officials to replace the striking crews and continue operations. Guards patrolled the railroad yards.

Strike of employees of the transportation department of the Louisiana and Arkansas railroad system began this morning, according to a report from Chrevoport, company headquarters.

All trains were operating on schedule, however. The number of employees going out was not ascertained.

New Orleans also reported that the yard crew failed to appear for work.

Begin Flood Relief

APPEAL MADE BY RED CROSS FOR MORE AID

Organization Directs San Angelo Relief For the Homeless

Simultaneous with an announcement that emergency relief is being rushed to flood-stricken San Angelo by the American Red Cross came an appeal for more funds to aid in the care of homeless in the flood area.

J. E. Spencer, Eastland county Red Cross chairman, received a telegram from William M. Baxter, Jr., at St. Louis headquarters of the Red Cross in which the latter said that the Red Cross organization already is taking relief to the homeless and destitute, and that a larger staff would begin work of distributing aid in the San Angelo immediately.

Aid Here Asked

At the same time, Baxter called on the Eastland county chapter, with headquarters at the Cisco chamber of commerce, to take part in the flood relief work.

The telegram from Baxter read: "Reports received today from Robert Bridge, National Red Cross representative in charge of relief at San Angelo, show approximately 300 homes destroyed and hundreds seriously damaged.

"Emergency relief proceeding satisfactorily under Red Cross direction with full cooperation of all agencies. Available food and clothing supplies adequate and emergency housing facilities being provided.

Staff Increased

"Albert Evans, director of disaster relief, and three members of disaster staff en route to San Angelo today.

"Please release this statement to press and advise public your chapter will receive and transmit contributions for flood relief to San Angelo."

Spencer asked that contributions for the San Angelo flood relief be brought or sent to the Red Cross headquarters at the chamber of commerce here to expedite the flood relief.

Japs' Consular Guard Is Killed In New Flareup

HANKOW, China, Sept. 19. (AP)—A member of the Japanese consular police at Hankow was shot to death by unidentified Chinese today.

A native of Korea also was reported attacked by Chinese in an anti-Japanese demonstration on a train.

Japanese naval forces anchored here in connection with the consular police established emergency patrols in the national concession where the slaying occurred.

Hurricane Turns After Beating Atlantic Coast

NEW YORK, Sept. 19. (AP)—One of the worst hurricanes in history swung out to sea northeast of New York today, with all vessels warned to get out of its path.

Despite violence over a thousand miles of Atlantic coastline, only seven persons were known killed. Fifteen were missing, however.

Flood Disrupts Communication

The Humble Pipe Line company said Saturday afternoon that it had had no communication with its Pioneer pipe line station in the Coleman flood area since early that morning.

"At that time," a representative of the company here said "our man at the station told us that there would be no further communication during the day.

He reported that the water was rising, but apparently believed that it would not reach a serious level."

Electra Saturday proved too powerful for the young Cisco Lobos squad and handed the Loboes a defeat of 31 to 0 in their first game of the season.

Details of the game were not immediately available.

Randolph Students Get Aid From NYA

AUSTIN, Sept. 19. (AP)—Lyndon B. Johnson, state director of the National Youth Administration, announced Saturday allotments providing part-time employment for 5,058 students in 84 universities and colleges in Texas.

Students selected by the colleges are employed at prevailing wages and assigned "socially desirable." The average pay for undergraduates has been \$15 a month and for graduates \$30 a month. Monthly allotments for undergraduates included Randolph college, \$150.

STEVENS 'SEEN'

FORT WORTH, Sept. 19.—Several persons saw O. D. Stevens in Handley the afternoon of July 8, 1933, and with him they saw J. B. and Harry Rutherford and Jack Sturdivant, whose bodies were found several days later bound in hog wire and sunk in the Trinity river, testimony in his trial Saturday tended to show.

Hollywood Comes To Cisco for Film

Cisco youngsters are going to have a chance soon to "break into the movies."

That's the word from K. N. Greer of the Palace Theater, who said Saturday that Melton Barker of Hollywood is coming here to produce a two-reel kid comedy similar to the "Our Gang" comedies. The local play will be a kidnap story and will be shown at the Palace.

Barker, who "discovered" Spanky McFarland, will make the entire picture in Cisco, using about 100 children between three and 12 years of age. Registration for tryouts will be at the Palace.

AGED FARMER SWEPT UNDER ANGRY WATER

Family Rescued From Housetop as They Cling for Lives

BROWNWOOD, Sept. 19. (AP)—Treacherous floodwaters of the Colorado river late today claimed their second victim when a farmer was drowned while attempting to save his livestock.

Ganum Maxey, 60, lost his life soon after eight members of the Ross White family in the same community had been rescued. They were taken ashore on the south side of the river after clinging precariously to the roof of their farm home. Previously a rescue party in a motor boat had been unable to locate them.

Hundreds Homeless
The Colorado had already claimed one life, inundated an entire village, and driven hundreds from their homes as it swirled southward. Only the daring rescue work of boatmen prevented other drownings.

Gaynor McBee, 60, ranch hand, was swept from his horse while driving cattle out of the path of the flood at Milburn, which was under water. Neighbors recovered the body.

The angry river was two miles wide at the Indian Creek community in Brown county, washing away a number of homes at Barnes. Loss of crops, livestock, bridges, and highways was expected to total many millions.

Stuart Pearce, for five years pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Cisco, a place he resigned several months ago to become superintendent of home missions for the Fort Worth presbytery, has accepted the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church of Hillsboro, effective November 1, he announced Saturday.

Dr. Pearce and his family will remain in Cisco until the latter part of October or the first of November while he continues his present duties, he said Saturday.

Dr. Pearce came to Cisco from San Antonio to take a pulpit vacated by the Rev. B. C. Boney. While here he was credited with having secured the location of the

run a car off the asphalt was to invite disaster if the machine was travelling with any speed. The presence of that old car with three irresponsible and unconcerned men enjoying the fateful delusion of a fool's paradise on a crowded thoroughfare was a positive argument for the necessity of "cracking down" on such traffic menaces without mercy. The erratic course of that decrepit machine threatened the approach of every other car. HOUSTON, Sept. 19.—Houston's greatest horse racing meet, the Epsom Downs autumn session, will open brilliantly on Thursday, with the most superb roster of thoroughbred animals in the history of the track.

Mass Production Idea Had Beginning In Mind of Blacksmith 50 Years Ago

Mass production which has put so much useful machinery of modern daily life within the reach of millions of our people was born not in the minds of today's great captains of industry, but in the mind of the American blacksmith at his forge fifty years ago, declared William S. Knudsen, executive vice-president of General Motors, during visits to the Texas centennial exposition in Dallas and the frontier centennial in Fort Worth over the week-end.

A. D. Anderson, of the A. G. Motor company here was among the business men of the southwest invited to meet with Mr. Knudsen and other General Motors executives who were in the party visiting the centennial celebrations.

The other notables included A. H. Grant, vice-president in charge of sales; L. P. Fisher, vice-president in charge of style development; Paul W. Garrett, director of public relations, and J. W. Wineen, director of the sales section.

"Many persons think of the automobile business as something where someone turns a crank and cars come out of the other end of a chain. Nothing could be more incorrect than that," said Mr. Knudsen. "Behind the heads of production are the mechanics. The mechanics of New England, the Middle West and the South have learned to do work right and that is the real reason why it is possible to duplicate pieces of machinery at a rapid rate—the process we call mass production. The mechanics of the last generation made possible the machine tools of today with which we do this. But beyond these mechanics there

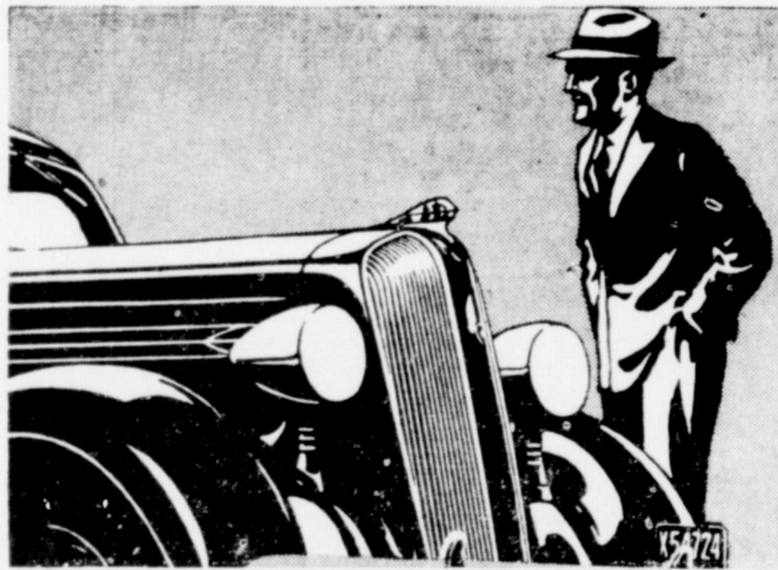
