### LOSS MOUNTS WITH ADVANCE OF 2 RIVERS

Millions Estimate Of Damage; No Deaths Are Reported

HEARNE, Texas, Sept. 29 (AP)—The flooding Brazos and Little Rivers continued to destroy millions of dollars worth of crops and property today but there was no loss of life reported as lowland residents heeded warnings to evacuate.

The Brazos was falling steadily at Waco. The flood crest was expected to reach here today and spread over farming lands. Little river was rising at Cameron but there was no danger to that city.

### TO GET FACTS TO HELP BODY, SAYS AUTHOR

'Impeachment' Hinted As 'Disregard' For Laws Is Charged

AUSTIN, Sept. 29 (AP)—The Texas house voted today, 80 to 48, to resolve itself into a committee of the whole to investigate the old age pension administration and ascertain the revenue needs for maintenance of the pension program.

The resolution was offered by Representative A. T. McKinney of Huntsville, who said that its primary purpose was to obtain facts needed to guide the legislature in levying pension taxes.

**Impeachment Hinted**  
Representative Clarence Farmer, of Fort Worth, supporting the resolution, charged that the administration's "disregard" for the section of the law providing for local pension authorities to determine the amounts of the grants was "worthy of impeachment."

A house investigation of the "rumored" communistic teaching in state colleges was proposed by Representative Joe Caldwell of Asherton.

#### ALLRED SAYS HIS PROPOSAL FAVORED

AUSTIN, Sept. 29 (AP)—Governor James V. Allred said today that many legislators had told him they favored his proposal that the old age pension borrow \$3,000,000 of the state highway funds.

The entire organization immediately began preparations for moving to a new ground on Highway One east of the city and at noon had accomplished the seemingly impossible task. The show was going on, and all 350 people in its personnel were going to help.

### TWO TRAINMEN KILLED WHEN TRAIN STRIKES OPEN SWITCH

Four Others Hurt; No Statement Is Given By Railroad; Workers Are on Strike

SHREVEPORT, Sept. 29. (AP)—Two trainmen identified as J. T. Dempsey, Texarkana, and H. H. Vaught, were killed and four other persons injured in the derailment of a southbound Louisiana and Arkansas passenger train eight miles south of Winn-

field about midnight. Officials made no statement but persons who visited the scene said that the train ran into an open switch. The railroad's transportation workers have been on strike since September 19.

### Reliance Sells Its Bluff Creek Area Interests

Reliance Oil and Royalty corporation of Cisco and A. V. Jones and H. S. Stasney recently sold their three-fourths joint interest in a lease of 187 acres, having five producing wells, in the Bluff Creek area of Shackelford county to W. E. Butler of Dallas for a consideration of \$150,000, it has been revealed.

The deal was the largest lease and production sale in Shackelford county in five years.

The lease is located in the southwest quarter of section 190, E. T. survey, in the southeast extension of the Bluff Creek pool in the western part of the county. The wells are producing from the Bluff

### Case Worker To Be in Office On 3 Days a Week

Miss Elsie Glenn, case worker for Eastland County Family Welfare association has announced her office hours for the convenience of her clients: Monday, Wednesday, in office from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m.; Saturday mornings: 8:30 a. m. to 12 noon. At no other time will clients be able to see her, as the other days are spent in home visits over one-third of Eastland county, she said.

She also announced that during the month of October no families on WPA will be given clothing; only those who receive county aid and those who receive commodities will be eligible. Those wishing to apply for WPA

### 9 Convicted For Kidnaping, Death By Black Legion

DETROIT, Sept. 29. (AP)—Nine men were convicted today by a circuit court jury in the Black Legion kidnaping and killing of Charles A. Poole, last May 12.

Seven of the defendants, including "Colonel" Harvey Davis were convicted of first degree murder, and two were convicted of second degree murder. A tenth defendant was acquitted.

Judge Joseph Moynihan later returned second degree murder convictions against two defendants who waived jury trial.

### Palestine Placed Under Martial Law

LONDON, Sept. 29. (AP)—Great Britain today clamped down martial law on Palestine to halt terrorism which the Arabs have waged in the Holy Land for months against Jewish immigration.

### 600 PRIESTS SLAUGHTERED

Executed by Reds For Aiding Rebels

(By Associated Press)  
Spanish insurgents began a fresh drive on Madrid today as the epic story of the rescued Alcazar fortress at Toledo was unfolded. In the last hours of the Toledo assault 600 Catholic priests, supporting the rebellion, were slaughtered by government forces, survivors said.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 29. (AP)—A fog bank rolled from the Pacific ocean today over the fire-scarred southwestern Oregon timbers assuring 20,000 people at least temporary respite from the forest fires which destroyed one

town and took nine lives. A grim-faced state policeman at Coquille, glancing up at skies so black that day looked like night voiced the fear of thousands: "If the wind changes, God help this place and Myrtle Point. They'll go like Brandon did."

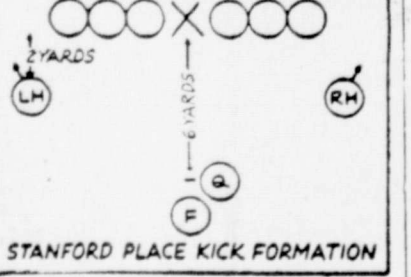

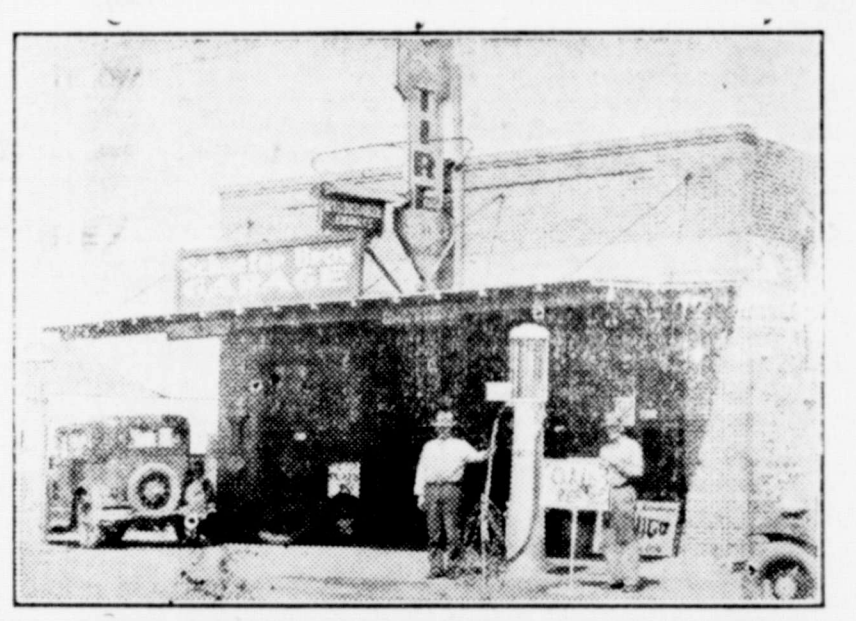
