

# Voters to decide Saturday

Polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday so Castro County's voters can help choose their party nominees for federal, state and local offices.

THE COUNTY has 2,750 voters eligible to cast ballots in Saturday's primaries. Any turnout of 1,400 or more would be above average for the county.

With Democrats in the majority, the Demo primary is taking the spotlight here. The complete sample ballot for the Democratic primary appears on Page 8 of this issue.

At the local level, both county commissioners' races have drawn crowded fields.

IN PRECINCT 1, it's a five-man event with Ed Bennett, George Heck, H. E. "Tom" McLain, Dean Sanders and Bud Steiert all seeking the nomination. E. I. "Tump" McLain, long-time Precinct 1 commissioner, is not seeking re-election.

In Precinct 3, Commissioner J. M. Wright has drawn competition from Jimmie Howell and Andy Schumacher.

It may take a June runoff to settle both of the county commissioners' races.

THE ONLY other new name on the Demo ballot is Mrs. Mary Jo Smith, who is unopposed in her bid for the justice of the peace nomination in Precinct 3 to succeed the late T. E. Harrison.

Unopposed for renomination for county offices are Sheriff Jack Cartwright, County Attorney Robert Buntyn and Tax Assessor Kent Birdwell.

THE STATE race generating the most heat is for the Democratic nomination for governor. With a run-off apparently in the offing, latest polls show Uvalde rancher Dolph Briscoe and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes locked in a deadheat for the lead with Rep. Frances Parendthold closing strong end Gov. Preston Smith still in the running. Others in the race are Robert Joe Butler by a TKO.

## New rule kills write-in effort

A new rule in this year's state election code has nullified Mrs. Jo Nita Smith's write-in bid for justice of the peace.

THE RULE was discovered this week by Democratic Party officials when Mrs. Smith sought specific information concerning her write-in candidacy. Article 1309(b) of the election code prohibits write-in votes in primary elections except for the party posts of county or precinct chairmen.

Ballots with write-in votes will not be invalidated, but the write-in vote may not be counted, the regulation states.

Because of the new rule write-in candidates are now allowed only in general elections.

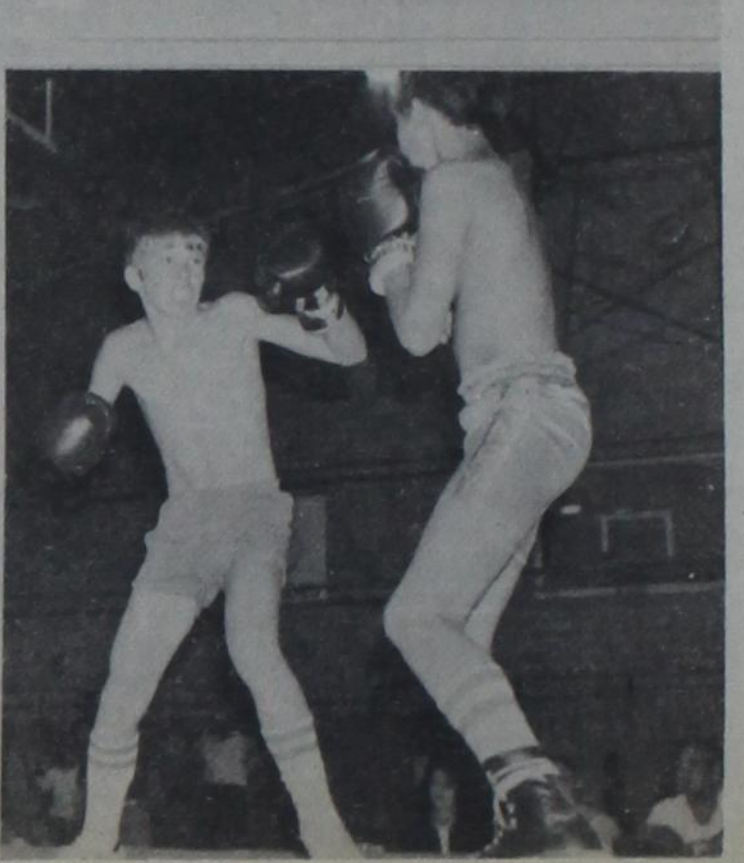
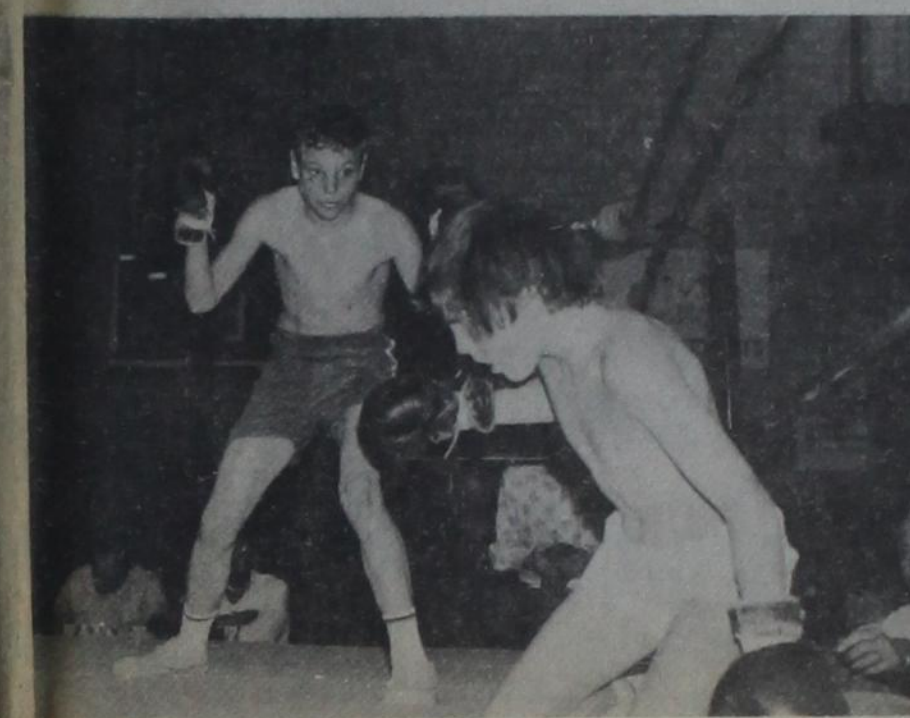
Saturday is primary election day and precinct convention time for both Democrats and Republicans in Castro County. Polls will be open from 7 a. m. until 7 p. m.

## Eight local boxers win trophies

Local fighters took eight championships and five runner-up awards in the First Annual Dimmitt Athletic Club Tournament held Friday and Saturday in the North Elementary gym.

A HOST of young boxers representing clubs from Amarillo, Hereford, Plainview, Levelland and Lubbock furnished the competition, and area boxing fans loved every round of it.

Todd Touchstone of Dimmitt got the tournament underway Friday night by dropping a close decision to Mike Martinez of Plainview. Paul Blackburn evened the scoreboard for Dimmitt in the next bout as he defeated Johnny Carasco of Amarillo. Two Dimmitt lads fought in the third bout, as Greg Clark won over Jimmy Joe Butler by a TKO.

Bobby Ramirez of Hereford put on a good show before bowing to the boxing talent of Dimmitt's Elias Bernal. The fifth fight of the evening ended in a split decision with Amarillo's Manuel Jimenez the choice over improving John Laurent of Dimmitt. Robert Casas of Dimmitt met Hereford's David Gonzales in a 65-pound affair, and took a hard-fought decision. Levelland's Roddy Blake used a lot of style in his win over Hector Guerrero of Hereford.

DIMITT'S Frank Alvarez drew a rugged opponent in Bobo Landrum of Lubbock, and Bobo took the decision. Andy Gonzales of Dimmitt drew a familiar opponent in Charley Gomez of Amarillo. Gonzales

lost his first match in quite some time in a close one to Gomez.

In the 85-pound division, John Blackburn of Dimmitt turned in a good performance before bowing to tough Mike Castro of Hereford. Scott Armstrong of Dimmitt looked sharp in turning back Tim Warren of Amarillo in an 85-pound match. Brad DuLaney and Henry Valverde hooked up in a real crowd-pleaser with Brad taking a popular decision. Dimmitt's Boyd Mcyer, in his first bout, looked good before losing to Jesse Car-

rasco of Amarillo. Rudy Rosas fought a good fight for the local team, but saw the decision go to Hereford's Lupe Padilla in a close bout.

In the 100-pound bracket, Mark Hood came on strong to win the first round, but it wasn't enough, as Richard Tillman of Amarillo took the decision. In bout number 26, Dimmitt's Larry Bossett came out hard and fast and stopped Rudy Nanes of Hereford in the first round. Tony Gonzales of Dimmitt dropped one to Joe Martinez of Plainview in one that could have gone either way.

ELIAS BERNAL came back for his second bout of the evening, but this time Elias lost to Amarillo's Manuel Jimenez. Greg Clark also ran into trouble in his second fight of the evening, as he lost a decision to Levelland's classy little Robin Black.

It was hard to tell that Robert Casas had already won one for the locals, as he came out fresh to defeat Charles O'Neal of Plainview and earn himself a trip to the finals. Scott Armstrong failed in his second attempt of the night, losing to Mike Castro.

SATURDAY afternoon's finals got underway with a bang, with Dimmitt's Brad DuLaney and Henry Goss of Plainview each winning their bouts to set the stage for the final bout in the 85-pound class, with Goss winning it on a TKO. In the final 40-pound bout, Caesar Castro defeated Roger Tillman of Amarillo. Paul Blackburn of Dimmitt took the 50-pound crown with a big win over Mike Martinez of Plainview.

Kelly Hill, a favorite of the Dimmitt fans, won the 60-pound championship over Martin Martinez of Plainview. Robert Casas became the third Dimmitt champ with a win over Charles O'Neal of Plainview. Richard Ewing avenged teammate Andy Gonzales' loss to Charley Gomez (See LOCAL BOXERS, Page 15)

Featured soloists will be Thomas McGuire and Crescencio Vidal. Accompanists will be Mrs. James Horton and Cecil Bolton.

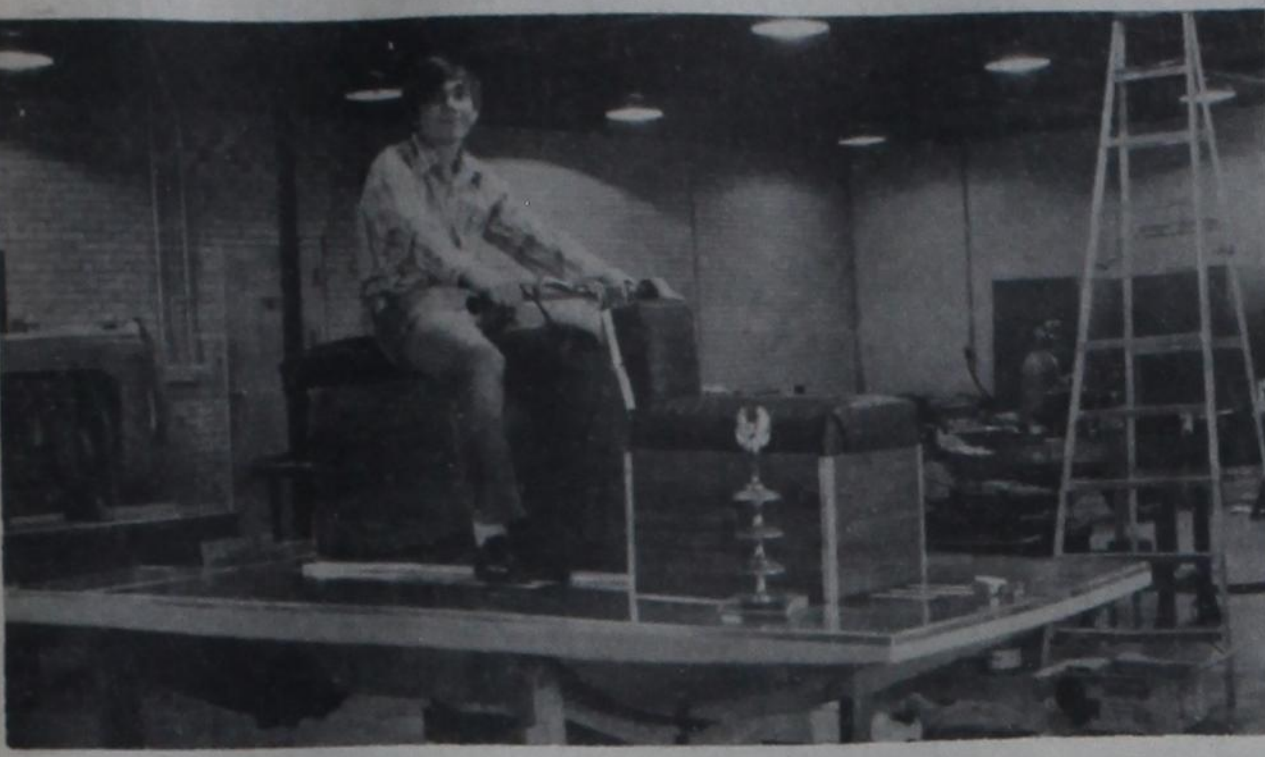
Dimmitt's civic organizations will give short presentations during the concert stressing civic and community pride and patriotism.

## Revenue sharing estimates given

Gov. Preston Smith announced this week that local governments stand to receive almost \$139,000 if the federal government's General Revenue-Sharing Bill is enacted. The bill was approved by the House Ways and Means Committee last week.

"INITIAL estimates indicate that a total of \$138,900 would be allocated to all governmental units in Castro County," Gov. Smith said. "Of that amount, the county government would receive \$37,900."

"The balance would be distributed to other cities and towns within the county. "It would appear from these early estimates that the bill, if finally enacted, will provide substantial fiscal relief to the hard-pressed cities and counties of Texas," the governor said.

## DHS sweeps area show; projects go to Austin

Fresh from impressive victories at the South Plains Industrial Arts Fair Saturday, Dimmitt High School's woodworking and power mechanics students hit the road to Austin today (Thursday) to enter their projects in the Texas High School Industrial Arts Fair.

TO CARRY their huge array of chests, tables, china cabinets, stereo sets and power vehicles, the students and their teachers are using a one-ton truck, a 16-ft. gooseneck trailer and a charter bus which they've converted to a six-sleeper, self-contained motor home.

Flagship of Dimmitt High's fleet of projects is a 9-ft. "aquacycle," built by Roger Allison, which was named the best individual high school exhibit at the South Plains competition in Lubbock Saturday.

Allison's aquacycle, guided by handlebars, is designed to do anything on water that a motorcycle will do on land—open "pop a wheeler." Powered by a 35-hp outboard motor, it will skim along at speeds up to 40 mph with the rider mounted on an upholstered saddle. The boat features a hull of fiberglass-coated plywood and a deck of gleaming palado (an African wood).

THE D.H.S. Industrial Arts Club is in its third year on its team project, the "Weekend Warrior," converted charter-type bus which was named the outstanding group project at the South Plains show.

The bus, which the boys have nicknamed "Nelson's Folly," features a full bedroom with double bed in the rear; a full

bath with tub and shower; kitchen with eye-level oven, range and 7-cu. ft. refrigerator-freezer; dinette which converts to bunk beds for four; 100-gallon water tank; 100-gallon holding tank; and shag carpet throughout. Its seats have been re-upholstered and its wall areas are fully paneled. The boys even equipped its engine with an ether-injector starter.

ANOTHER large project expected to be an eye-catcher in Austin is a set of two massive lounge chairs and sofa built by Max Hastings and Ricky Morgan, both first-year woodworkers. (See DHS SWEEPS, Page 15)

**Blow, wind, blow**

By LARRY O. STARNES

Did you feel that anyone was doing anything to prevent wind erosion last week? Did you find sand everywhere you looked? Did the dust cause you or your family any respiratory problems?

THINK OF all the problems you might have had if someone was not working to keep the soil protected and in place.

On April 25, I spent the day working with land owners and operators in the southern part of Castro County. I observed several instances where farmers were working through the worst of that day's windstorm to perform various types of emergency tillage to keep their soil in place.

I noted also that there was very little soil movement from most of the fields. It appeared that the bulk of the soil movement originated from roadways and turn-rows. These areas are extremely difficult to control since they have to be smooth surfaced.

I THINK it is only fitting, after a windstorm such as the

one last week, that we commend our area farmers for their efforts and accomplishments.

At the same time, in a more selfish attitude, we ask you, Mr. Farmer, to please continue this good work and we encourage you to be alert for new methods which might keep our air pure.

**Book tells how to spot faulty gasoline pumps**

How do you protect your dollars at the gasoline pump? How can you tell if the service station pump is operating correctly? How do you avoid paying for more gas than you get?

THE ANSWER to these and other questions are listed in a brochure available from Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

"More dollars are lost at the gasoline pump by both buyers and sellers through inexperience, carelessness or faulty equipment than by actual fraud," Commissioner White said. "But regardless of cause, most of these losses can be prevented."

The pamphlet gives a number of helpful hints on what to watch for when you are buying gasoline. It includes several ways you can tell whether the pump is operating properly, tips on recognizing "bait and switch" tactics, and a few cautions on credit card purchases and equipment losses.

THE PAMPHLET also lists all Texas Department of Agriculture regional offices where help can be obtained on gasoline problems. Copies of the information are available on request by writing John C. White, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin, 78711.

**SOYBEAN SITUATION**

Soybean production in Texas should be up 10 percent in 1972 while United States production is expected to increase 4 percent, according to Johnny Feagan, Extension economist. Texas farmers expect to plant 125,000 acres to soybeans while the national total will reach about 45 million acres, some two million more than in 1971. Even with a large crop this year, soybean supplies are expected to remain tight over the next year and a half. Thus, prices should continue on a strong note.

**Pioneer shows earnings gain**

**For quality environment**

**Soil stewardship vital**

Texas farmers and ranchers are the real custodians of our wealth of natural resources. How they use these resources, and the leadership and opportunities offered them, will determine the future of our environment, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said recently.

"A QUALITY environment—clean air, pure water and good land—should be our number one commitment in Texas," White declared. "The Texas Department of Agriculture is working on this commitment through its Environmental Sciences Division."

White noted that farmers and

ranchers were the original environmentalists, "before most people knew what it meant." They are also the main support of our state economy which is still largely dependent upon agriculture, despite our rapid urbanization, he said.

Good soil practices, water conservation, pasture control and forest preservation have become a standard practice of our rural people, Commissioner White said. However, industrial development, automobiles and city sanitation practices pose a grave threat to the environment that rural people are striving to preserve.

"IT TAKES a concentrated ef-

fort by farm and city people, alike, to keep nature in balance," said White. Programs to

achieve this balance are a major thrust of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Among the many projects underway, Commissioner White's department takes monthly samples of Texas rivers and streams to test water purity. Unusual fluctuations from month to month are traced to its source and referred to the state or federal agency with proper authority.

"A big problem in control is the lack of adequate legislation to meet all our pollution problems," White noted. "This must be a major problem to be attacked by our Texas Legislature."

In a five-man race for the Demo nomination for US Senator, the statewide polls claim Ralph Yarborough to be the front-runner with Barefoot Sanders in second place. The winner will face Sen. John Tower in the November general election.

ATTORNEY General Crawford Martin has drawn two opponents, and State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert finds himself in the midst of a seven-man field as he seeks another term.

Unopposed on the GOP ballot are Maurice Anly Jr. for state treasurer and Jim Segrest for railroad commissioner. No Republicans have filed for local offices.

Scoutmaster explains how funds use used to benefit local Scouts

Dimmitt Scoutmaster Nelson W. "Bill" Stephenson appealed this week for more support of the Boy Scout Fund Drive, now underway in Dimmitt.

A FEW local people apparently feel their donations to scouting here go to a far-off Scout Council and don't directly benefit local boys, he said.

But Stephenson—a former district Scout executive himself—said Dimmitt gets its money's worth from the council in all the services the council provides to local Scouts.

"Most people don't realize that the South Plains Council exists for no other reason than to serve us," Stephenson said. "We are planning on taking Troop 266 to not one week, but two weeks of summer camp. This is more than most troops do. If it weren't for the South Plains Council, we would have no place to go. Also, the council sees to it that our camps are well staffed, that there is good equipment, and that our boys will be safely taken care of."

"THE SOUTH Plains Council is where we get all of our awards, and serves as a clearing house of information and services to us. Anytime we have any problems, there is someone here to help. This applies not just to the Boy Scout troop; the Cub pack receives the same kind of help.

"The Council also serves as our source of information from the National Council. There are changes coming in the Boy Scout program that we would have no way of getting if it were not for the local council help. Without the local council, we might as well be a club, and one that would soon collapse without the constant help of the Scout Plains Council. "Scouting just doesn't happen.

It takes a lot of concern from some people to see that our boys have the very best program that is character building and will make good citizens. There is no other youth organization that succeeds nearly so well in making good citizens."

STEPHENSON said that people who refuse to help the local Scout Fund Drive are in reality denying Dimmitt Scouts of badly needed services.

"If people would stop and think that it takes someone to come and help not only the Scout troop but the Cub pack as well, and that without the vital council help we would soon close our doors permanently, they would be happy to help out financially," he said.

Stephenson is Scoutmaster of Troop 266, sponsored by the Dimmitt Rotary Club.
