Voters to decide Saturday

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday so Castro County's voters can help choose their party nominees for federal, state and local offices.

THE COUNTY has 2,750 voters eligible to cast ballots in Saturday's primaries. Any turnout of 1,400 or more would be above average for the coun-

With Democrats in the majority, the Demo primary is taking the spotlight here. The complete sample ballot for the Democratic primary appears on Page 8 of this issue.

At the local level, both county commissioners' races have drawn crowded fields.

IN PRECINCT 1, it's a fiveman event with Ed Bennett, George Heck, H. E. "Tom" Mc-Lain, Dean Sanders and Bud Steiert all seeking the nomina-tion. E. I. "Tump" McLainn long-time Precinct 1 commiss-tioner, is not seeking re-election. In Precinct 3, Commissioner J. M. Wright has drawn competition from Jimmie Howell and Andy Schumacher.

It may take a June runoff to settle both of the county commissioners' races.
