Thousands of wives and children of veterans and servicemen are failing to take advantage of benefits and programs provided by Congress, despite in-tensive efforts by VA to inform each beneficiary.

Educational benefits wives, widows and children of veterans whose total permanent disabilities, or deaths, were service-connected is cited by VA officials as one example of the many benefits available. Also eligible for educational benefits are wives and children of servicemen missing in action (MIA) or prisoners of war (POW) for more than 96 days. VA loans are available to wives of POWs and MIAs and to un-


