The disease is highly contagious in its early form and a slight contact with an infected person may easily transfer its virus to another. A few cases of the disease have appeared here and there recently.

It is easily controlled and a person can be readily immunized against it, I am told. Modern erums will render one immune for several months at slight cost and inconvenience, and it is possible to become permanently immune by undergoing a long proess of treatment with vaccine. But the trouble is that a person may come in contact with the isease and be infected unwitlater and forces isolation from other people and loss of time from work as well as greater ex-
