After production was obtained cover the lease contract to Hammonds and Branson and failed to include the \$395,000 in his 1933 income tax return. Collector Thomas assessed a deficiency for the amount of the tax against him, and claimed. Perkins paid the tax and then sued to recover.

In its decision the supreme court held that Perkins was not required to include the income from the oil in his income tax return although the internal revenue bureau vigorously contended that such a decision would upset the present system of depletion alowances on oil production.

The decision was not unanimous, two justices dissenting. They were Justices Cardozo and Stone. They declared in a very brief dissent that they believed the income from the oil was part of Perkins' income although he would be entitled to take the usual depletion allowance before paying the tax. The opinion of the majority was read by Associate Justice Butler.

### Loses Kilt During Coronation Week

LONDON, June 3. (A) - More than 20,000,000 people rode London's underground railways during coronation week-and the best story is of the jaunty highlander who lost his kilt.

The highlander rode an escalator while sitting on one of the teps. There was a loud ripping noise. The kilt went up while the Scot continued down.



Dr. James B. Simmons, founder, was an intimate friend of John D. Rockefeller and received 92 letters written in longhand from the financier. The letters are on display in Hardin-Simmons museum cases. Contents of the letters concerns Dr. Simmons missionary work and Mr. Rockefeller's encouragement that accompanied his checks. The money given Dr. Smmons was not for Hardin-Simmons but rather for missionary work throughout the South and East, Dr. Sandefer explains.






