The remarkable "homing" instinct with which a dog, above almost all other animals, is equipped was demonstrated anew this morning when "Laddie," gave black and white collie of Billy Butts Wright, came home. It was 18 days ago that Laddie, frightened at the firing of guns while accompanying Billy and his father, F. D. Wright, on a fishing trip to Lake Brownwood, became lost. Every effort to locate him failed, although hardly a day passed that a trip was not made to Brown county to search for him.

When the fate of a loved one or a family pet is definitely known, those left can the sooner reconcile themselves to the loss. Human nature has a happy faculty of adjusting itself to the known. But when that fate is a mystery, grief is lengthened and deepened by the uncertainty. There is reassurance in the knowledge of having done all that was humanly possible to do in a fatal illness, and a comfort that helps adjust one's thoughts to the realities in having provided a proper and loving disposition of the body of a person or a pet upon which affection had been lavished. But when the fate of the object of such regard is not known, the period of waiting becomes a succession of more or less agonizing moments of imagining in what state of helpless suffering or untended death it may be at such a moment. Parents of kidnapped children endure the supreme tragedy of that fact. No doubt in cases where eventually the death of the child was revealed, the very revelation became a relief.

Laddie is a dog of sense and character who has taken quite a large place in the Wright home. Hence, when he walked upon the front porch about 4:30 this morning and awakened Mr. Wright and Billy with joyous whines there was a celebration that might have been likened to the rejoicing that welcomed the prodigal son. It took Laddie about three weeks to make the journey of around 50 miles, and there is no telling what hindrances were thrown in his way. I am of the opinion that he was caged up a time or two by a covetous person, who really can't be blamed for his covetousness otherwise he would have been home a long time ago. He was footsore and rather gaunt, as if he had scorned food en route, but otherwise he was in excellent condition, with an appetite as big as the pot of stew that awaited him in the kitchen.

VALIDITY OF STATE TRUST LAWS UPHELD

Appellate Court Reversed in Allred Ouster Suit

AUSTIN, June 16. (AP)—The state supreme court today upheld the validity of the Texas anti-trust laws, overruling the Austin court of civil appeals. The decision was rendered in the famous oil company ouster suit brought by Gov. Allred during his first term as attorney general. The appeals court dismissed the suit on the grounds that the anti-trust laws were unconstitutional because farmers and stockmen were exempt from their provisions.

The supreme tribunal said that the appeals decision was an error and also declared that the argument that existence of the cooperative marketing act renders the anti-trust laws void was without merit.

James Accepts Call to Vernon Baptist Church

Dispatch to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram from Vernon, Texas, this morning said that the Rev. E. S. James, pastor of the First Baptist church of Cisco, had announced acceptance of a call to the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Vernon. The dispatch said the Rev. Mr. James would begin his duties there July 4, succeeding the Rev. H. H. Hargrove, who had resigned to accept a call to a Waco church.

Rev. Mr. James could not be contacted this afternoon, but he had not yet resigned the pulpit of the First Baptist church here, which he has served seven years since coming to Cisco from Parsons, Kan., to succeed the Rev. Acker C. Miller. One of the most popular and successful ministers who has ever served a Cisco church, James has been pastor of the First Baptist congregation a longer period than any preceding pastor.

A meeting of the board of the church is to follow prayer services this evening, at which time it was expected the minister would formally resign.

Two Nations Rejoin Spanish War Patrol

(By Associated Press)
Germany and Italy formally re-joined the international non-intervention patrol today while Spanish insurgents tightened their ring of steel about Bilbao.

The British evolved a plan guaranteeing safety to patrol ships that apparently satisfied the two nations who left the patrol after their warships were bombed by Spanish government planes and the Almeria retaliation bombing by Germany.

Word at Hendaye, on the Franco-Spanish border, was that the Basques, desiring to defend the city to the last, were struggling with anarchist Elemenos seeking to burn Bilbao. The insurgents' radio station at Salamanca predicted capture of the city in 24 hours.

WOMAN MAY BE CHAIRMAN

Position Open After Connery's Death

WASHINGTON, June 16. (AP)—The death late yesterday by food poisoning of Representative William P. Connery, democrat from Massachusetts, may place a woman, Representative Mary T. Norton, New Jersey democrat, into the chairmanship of the house labor committee to which she is entitled by seniority to succeed Connery.

The 48-year-old representative became ill late Monday after returning from a Massachusetts speaking tour.

AUSTIN, June 16. (AP)—The house today sustained a chair ruling yesterday that the bill banning all types of betting was outside the governor's call to the special session.

MAYOR ASKS PRESIDENTIAL INTERVENTION

Wants Roosevelt to Remove "Murderous Element"

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 16. (AP)—Mayor Daniel Shields appealed to President Roosevelt today to intervene in the Johnstown steel strike to "remove the murderous element that is infesting the city."

He said in addition to the dynamite bombing of the Bethlehem mill early today, six men kidnapped a steel worker, stripped off his clothing and threw him from an automobile. Shields appealed through the president to John L. Lewis to "withdraw the murderous element."

At Youngstown the back to work movement of non-strikers was ended inconclusively with Frank Purnell, Steel and Tube president, saying it will not reopen until authorities assure protection.

Some Detroit employees of General Motors initiated a back to work move; the steel workers organizing committee proposed at Pittsburgh to Bethlehem Steel corporation that a representation election be held at the Johnstown plant.

L. E. Vaughn Growing Rhubarb at His Home

Rhubarb, a plant seldom raised in this section because of the unusually heavy rainfall it requires, is being grown by L. E. Vaughn at his home just outside the city limits on the Rising Star highway.

Today he brought to town three leaves, all taken from the same plant, the largest one measuring 29 inches across and almost as long. The other two were slightly smaller.

Mr. Vaughn said he set out the rhubarb plants last November. He said the stalk of the largest leaf was over an inch and a half thick at the base and almost an inch in diameter at the leaf.

Eight of the ten plants he set out last winter are now living, and he expects "plenty of it next year."

BRECK JURIST HANDS DOWN ORDER TODAY

Position of Plaintiff Sustained; Opinion Yet to Follow

The countywide local option election of May 1, which resulted in a majority in favor of outlawing the sale of all forms of alcoholic liquors, was declared null and void in an order signed by Judge B. H. Atchison of 90th district court, Breckenridge, sitting in 91st district court in the stead of Judge George L. Davenport, who disqualified himself, this morning.

Judge Atchison thereby sustained the contentions of the plaintiffs, G. Connally, et al, that notice of election and the ballot were insufficient, although, in the absence of his opinion on which the order was based, it was not immediately known on what particular point he held the provisions of the liquor control act, providing for local option elections of the character to have been transgressed.

The order signed by the judge read, in part: "It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed, that the terms of the character, to have and the same is hereby declared null and void, that the order entered by the commissioners court as of May 27, 1937, declaring the results of said election be and the same is hereby declared null and void, and that the status of East-

Portable Milkers Aid Surles Dairy in Guarding Milk

For 25 years the name Surles has been synonymous with pure and wholesome milk and cream in Cisco. The reputation that the M. R. Surles dairy enjoys is the product of years of constant study of those factors which make for the best and the purest in milk and the most satisfactory service. This dairy, which is an effective example of the distance to which Cisco can extend its trade territory by cultivating the trade and interest of the people of its territory, is situated just beyond Dathan a short distance off the highway via gravelled road. Everything, the vacuums, motors, etc., is compactly built upon the small truck. The milk house, in which the milk is chilled by electric refrigerating equipment, bottled and stored in vaults awaiting delivery, reveals the care in handling of the milk which has given the Surles dairy a record for extremely low bacteria content. Delivery is made once daily—each morning — and milking is done between 3:30 a. m. and 4:15 a. m. and 3:15 and 3:45 in the afternoon.
