The winner of the Bradley-Skinner race will succeed long-time county judge Raymond Wilson.

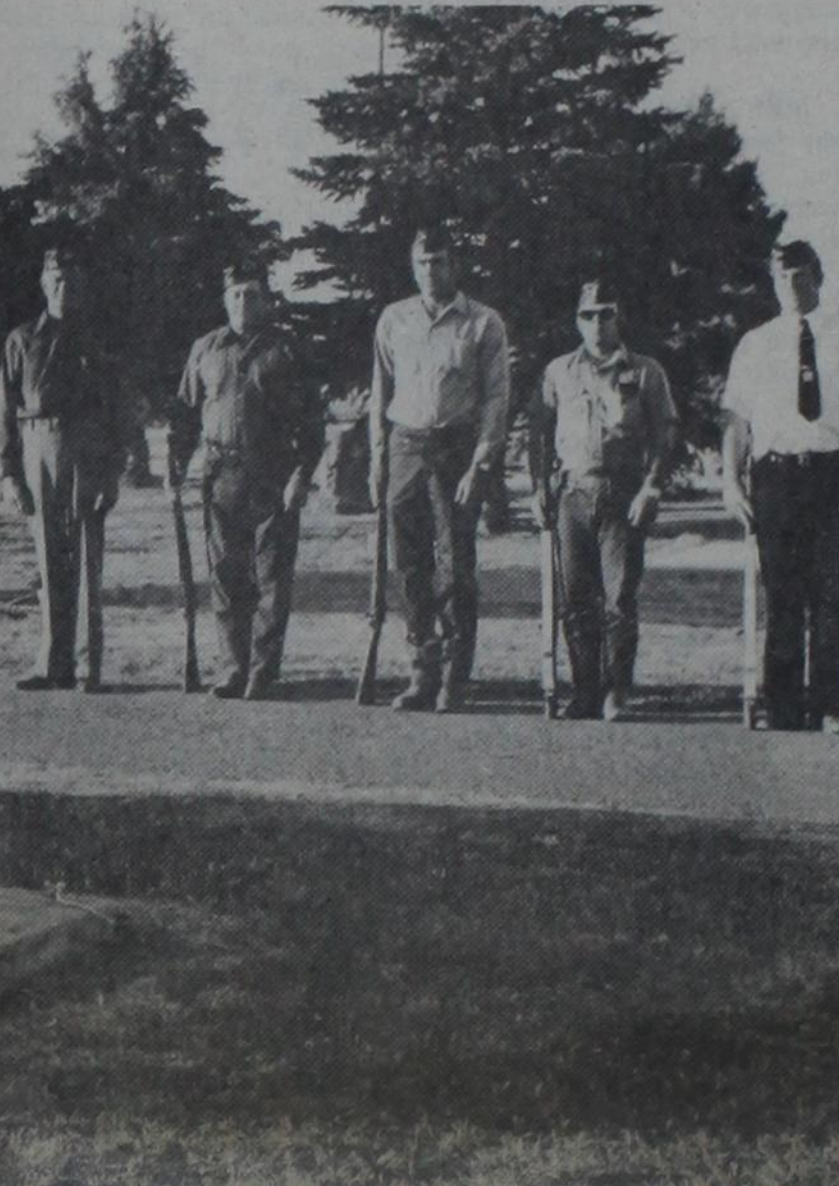

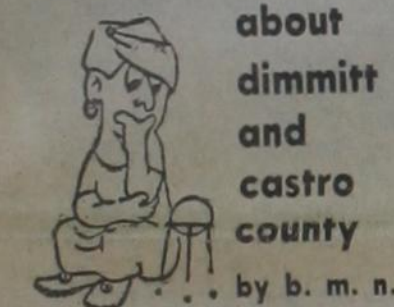

The invasion will start Friday. Just as soon as school is out the kids will be swarming all over town looking for excitement, competition, or whatever kids look for after nine months of confinement. Modern day kids are pretty hep to the dangers, ever present on highways and city streets, but like kids of every generation they have their share of curiosity and their attention may be diverted, by a cat or dog, or something else out of the ordinary, at just the moment they should be paying attention to the traffic. That is the reason that you and I should drive with extreme caution while the kids are cluttering up the streets, whether they are walking, riding a bicycle or just standing there. If you can't tell what they are going to do, just stop your car until they have done it, then proceed with caution.

The pretty weather we have been having this spring has been messed up quite a bit by high winds and blowing sand. A few gallons of rainwater on every square foot or so would be of great benefit to growing crops and to crops that are still to be planted. However, we can do without those large chunks of ice, such as the ones that plastered the northern parts of the Panhandle recently.

Apparently the Constitutional Convention is having some problems. For a while they seemed to have had a considerable amount of harmony and were moving along in their effort to write a new constitution. Of late they seem to be more or less deadlocked on a number of items, especially the one that has to do with county judges and a new type of circuit judge. The members of the constitutional convention are all state senators and state representatives, and that bunch of worthies has never been known to agree too long at a time on anything. Chances are that if they do come up with a document, which will undoubtedly have a number of options, the electorate will turn it down in favor of the old constitution that has served the needs of the state so well and so long. Even though the constitutional convention is made up of state legislators, if they fail to get the job done in the allotted time, the governor is not empowered to call a special session.

More than 1,100 people turned out Sunday afternoon for Dimmitt High School's spring band concert, art show and industrial arts open house.

THE SCHOOL auditorium was packed as four bands — fifth grade, sixth grade, junior high and senior high — performed a one-hour concert. Climaxing the concert was a lively "Dixieland Jamboree" featuring a jazz combo. The concert drew a standing ovation.

In the art show, visitors saw paintings and drawings in all media, ceramics, string art and craftwork of Dimmitt High School's art students.

The industrial arts open house featured finished furniture and mechanical projects of woodworking and power mechanics students.

SOME 800 people returned to DHS auditorium Sunday evening for baccalaureate services. Rev. Leo Gee, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Church in Amarillo, delivered the baccalaureate sermon.

Night school

All grads aren't 18

The 18-year-olds aren't the only ones graduating in Dimmitt this year.

DID YOU know that more than 120 adults have been trooping out at night to attend nine different classes in local schools? The adult night classes have also been having graduation ceremonies this week and last.

Elmer Berryhill, director of special services for Dimmitt Public Schools, supervises the adult education program. This year he put together a curriculum that included conversational Spanish, conversational English, art, typing, music and Adult Basic Education.

The "continuing education program," as it is called, is made possible through a variety of colleges, agencies and programs. Cooperating with the Dimmitt Public Schools in the courses here this year were South Plains College of Levelland, Amarillo College, Texas Education Agency and Panhandle Educational Service Organization (PESO).

ALL THE courses are taught by certified teachers.

Van Earl Hughes has been teaching two classes of conversational Spanish. (Only one class was planned originally, but 59 adults signed up for it, so it was split into two sections.) The students attended a three-hour session one night a week for 15 weeks. Completion certificates denoting course credit were passed out last week at the class's "graduation exercises," an ice cream supper. [See Night School, Page 14]

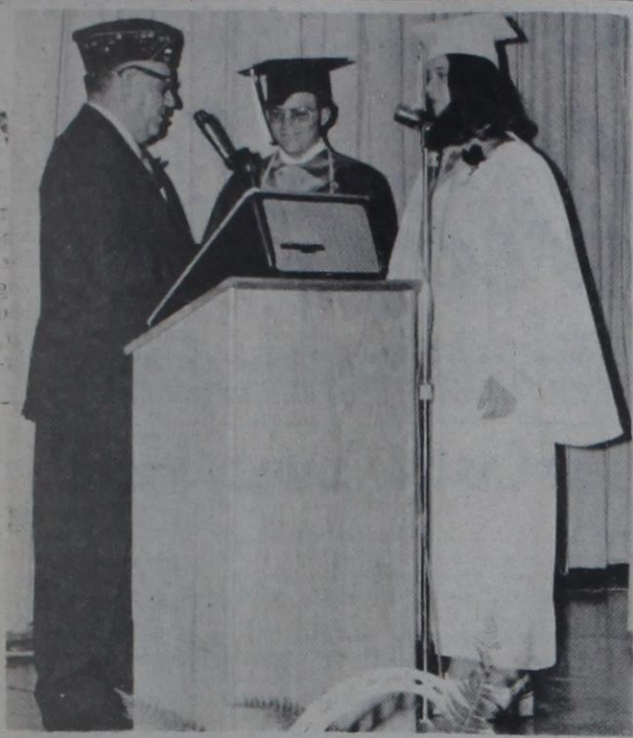





The Consumer Alert

Vacation bound? There's a chance you might also be heading for trouble if you haven't taken certain precautions before leaving home.

LAW enforcement experts and our Consumer Protection Division attorneys say that what is vacation time for most folks is working time for many burglars, pickpockets, and con men.

They suggest that you plan in advance to burglar-proof your home and to guard against possible thefts or consumer frauds on your trip. While the number of such occurrences is small compared to the number of vacationers, it only takes one bad experience to ruin a trip.

HERE'S A LIST of things to check before you leave:
Stop mail, newspaper and other deliveries.

Tell a neighbor or your apartment manager that you will be gone and ask them to keep an eye on the place.

Leave a few lights on or buy an automatic timer to turn certain lights on and off each evening.

Cut your lawn just before leaving and, if you will be gone a long time, have someone cut it while you're away.

CHECK ALL windows and doors to make sure they are locked. A sliding glass patio door can be more securely fastened by wedging a stick at the top or bottom of the door.

Check with your local police if you plan an extended vacation. Many forces offer a "close patrol" of homes where persons are away. If your police force does, you will need to tell them what cars or persons, if any, will be making authorized visits to your house.

Have your telephone put "on vacation." Your callers will be told that the telephone has been temporarily disconnected at your request, and you can have them referred to another number if you wish.

Avoid mentioning to casual acquaintances or strangers that you will be on vacation. Also, avoid telling your newspaper's society editor of your trip until you have returned.

Before leaving, engrave all valuables in your home and those you will be taking with you in the car with your driver's license or social security number. Some police forces will loan you an engraver to mark your belongings and will register your number on their master list. This may discourage burglars from taking your goods and can make identification of recovered stolen goods much simpler.

AFTER TAKING precautions to secure your home from burglars while you are gone, don't let down your guard when you get into the car and drive away. There are a few things to remember during your trip too:

Make sure you have had your car serviced and thoroughly checked before leaving and always get out of the car to watch when having it serviced on the road. There are a few unscrupulous persons who sometimes take advantage of tourists with out-of-state license plates. If your car was given a clean bill of health before you left, you can better evaluate warnings about faulty fuel pumps, air filters, batteries, etc.

Take traveler's checks or use credit cards, and keep a list of your credit card numbers in a safe spot.

Men should avoid keeping billfolds in back pockets, or at least button the pocket if possible. To discourage pickpockets, use the inside coat pocket or a money belt.

Women should select a purse with a secure clasp or zipper and keep a hand over the opening when carrying it.

DON'T WEAR unusually expensive or flashy jewelry or display large rolls of bills.

Never boast of wealth or possessions or tell strangers your home town or address.

Check valuables at your hotel desk for safekeeping.
YOU COULD be taken advantage of in more subtle ways, too. Many people spend large amounts of their money on vacation souvenirs without examining them carefully. Many souvenir items are cheaply made, over-priced, and of little or no practical value. Try to set a limit on the amount of money you spend on things you're likely to throw away or put in a closet later.

Check with your local police if you plan an extended vacation. Many forces offer a "close patrol" of homes where persons are away. If your police force does, you will need to tell them what cars or persons, if any, will be making authorized visits to your house.

Have your telephone put "on vacation." Your callers will be told that the telephone has been temporarily disconnected at your request, and you can have them referred to another number if you wish.

Minimum wage hiked for agricultural work

Recently-enacted federal legislation raised the minimum wage for farm workers who are covered from the present \$1.30 to \$1.60 an hour, effective May 1.

THE MINIMUM will increase to \$1.80 on Jan. 1, 1975; to \$2 on Jan. 1, 1976; to \$2.20 on Jan. 1, 1977; and to \$2.30 on Jan. 1, 1978.

"The differential in minimum wage for agriculture and non-agriculture is wiped out by 1978," points out Kenneth Wolf, economist in agribusiness for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The newly-enacted amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act do not change the exemption of agriculture from overtime requirements or the '500 man-day' test for coverage of agricultural employers."

Wolf advises each farmer to examine his records to determine whether he hired as much as 500 man-days of agricultural labor in any quarter of 1973. If so, the farmer is obligated to pay at least the minimum wage to all labor in 1974.

"COVERED farm employees need to keep the new minimum wage requirements in mind in

recruiting workers for this summer," adds the economist.

Also effective May 1, certain domestic service workers were covered by the minimum wage law for the first time, notes Wolf. In general, such a worker is covered if employed for a total of more than eight hours in a work week, even if the employment occurs in more than one household.

"However, domestic workers are not covered if employed on a casual basis for babysitting or companionship services for individuals who, because of age or infirmity, are unable to care for themselves," explains the economist.

THE MINIMUM rate for newly covered domestic workers is \$1.90 an hour. It will increase to \$2.00 on Jan. 1, 1975; to \$2.20 on Jan. 1, 1976; and to \$2.30 on Jan. 1, 1977.

For non-agricultural employees covered before 1966, the minimum wage increased from the present \$1.60 to \$2.00 an hour on May 1. Next January 1 it will go up to \$2.10, and a year later, to \$2.30.

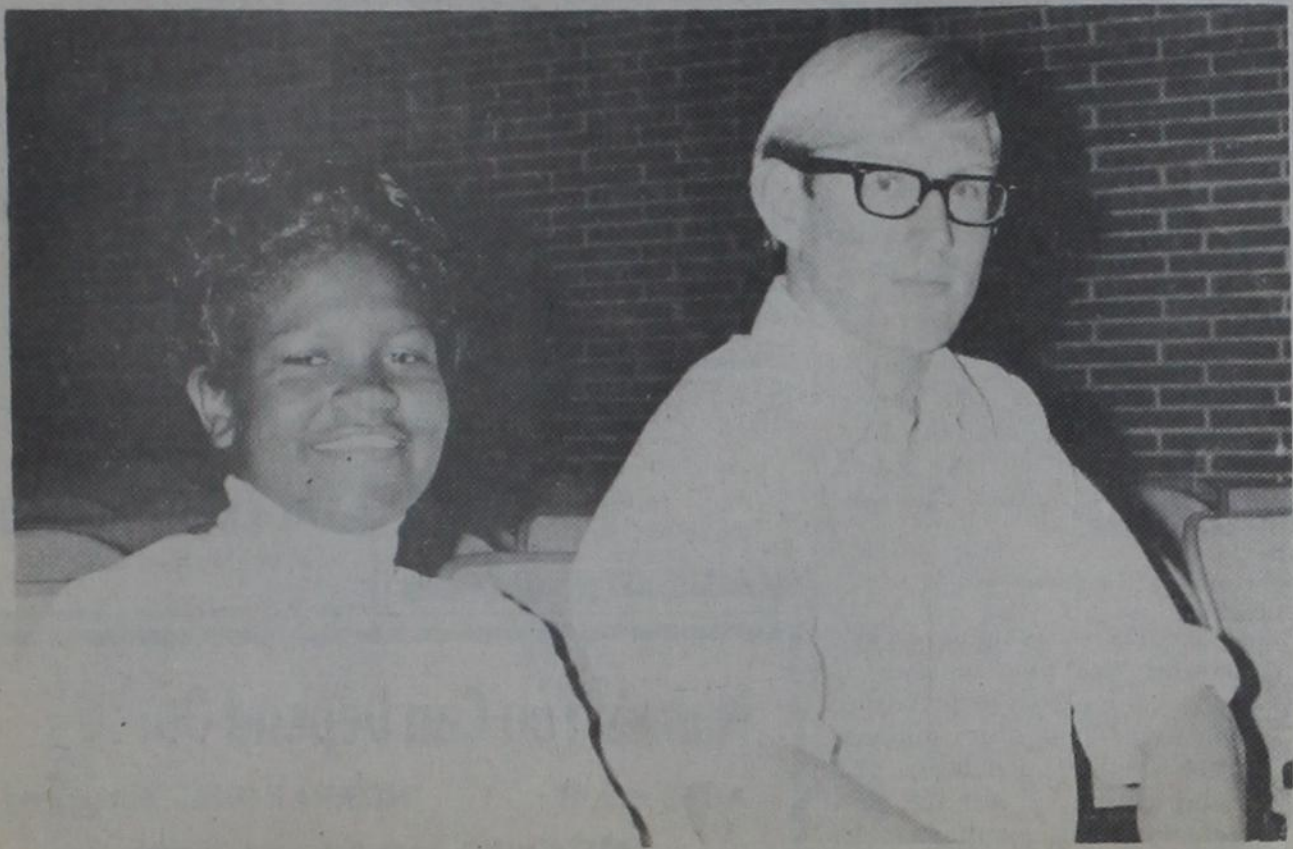
Dr. Enid Bates, assistant professor of education, received the \$1000 WTSU Foundation Faculty Excellence Award during the graduation ceremonies.

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Food item costs should be compared

Today's rising food prices emphasize the necessity of comparing costs of similar food items, one nutritionist said this week.

"FIGURING cost per serving is one facet of shopping wisely," Sally Springer, foods and nutrition specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, continued.

"For example, when figuring the cost of any boneless meat, allow four servings per pound. For meats with a small amount of bone, expect three servings per pound."

"Chicken and whole dressed fish furnish one to two servings per pound," she added.

Each serving provides about three ounces of cooked meat — and 20 grams of protein.

This is approximately one-third of the recommended amount needed daily by an average adult male or female, Miss Springer noted.

"ONE SERVING of meat or meat alternate — along with two glasses of milk or its equivalent — provides all the protein a person needs each day."

Serving meat alternates — such as dry beans, peas, nuts, milk and cheese — also helps stretch the food dollar. The foods are excellent sources of protein and calcium.

Get ready to see a remarkable change in the landscape of this country over the next few years. Windmills will spring up across the countryside as air-power becomes an alternative source of energy. The idea isn't as absurd as many would believe. Windchargers were commonplace on farms and ranches in the late 30's until cheap gasoline and diesel fuel became available and the REA expanded its service.

EXPERTS ARE quick to point out that windmills will never replace the oil, coal and nuclear powered electric generating plants of today, nor do they see windmills becoming a practical source of energy for individual homes. Windmill supporters do believe that air-powered generators will be useful as a supplemental source of energy and that by the year 2000, windmills could be producing as much as 1 percent of our total energy requirements.

Today's prototypes are made of cloth, wire, fiberglass or metal and are designed to turn as fast as possible in the slightest breeze. The blades must also be variable-pitched,

which automatically turns the blade from the broadest side in a light wind to the narrowest side in a strong wind.

Scientists estimate that a windmill with 50-ft. long blades would generate 100 kilowatts in a 20 mph wind. But the same blade would produce 800 kilowatts in a 40 mph wind. Another experimental design with 125-ft. blades moving 200 mph at the tips would produce 1,000 kilowatts in a 20 mph wind.

ONE EASTERN electric utility has concluded that a 250-kw windmill would not only be feasible, but also competitive with 30-cent per gallon fuel oil. The utility is paying 24-cents per gallon now. Offshore drilling rigs are also likely locations for windmill generated electricity.

Another experimental scheme calls for a 1,000-kw windmill hooked up to an air compressor which would pump air under pressure into abandoned oil wells or mines. Electricity would then be generated during peak periods by releasing the air to power gas-turbine generators.

Banks grass mite infestation noted

Infestation by Banks grass mites in corn and sorghum seedlings in several counties on the High Plains has been noted by entomologists.

HIGHEST infestation is noted in Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Bailey Counties in Texas and in Curry County, New Mexico.

Entomologists say the heaviest infestation is in corn and sorghum fields bordering wheat fields. The mites apparently are moving from wheat to corn or sorghum fields.

Chemicals labeled for use against mites on sorghum are Di-Syston, Thimet and Cygon; and for corn Di-Syston and Thimet.

Jack King, research director for Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, said the situation is being studied and more information should be available soon.

STUDIES funded by TGSPB on the Banks grass mite are currently underway by scientists, Dr. Charles Ward of Texas Tech University and Dr. George Teetes of Texas A&M University.

Here are week's best food buys

Beef, now at lower wholesale prices than it was a year ago, is one of the few food items boasting that distinction today, one expert says.

SHE'S MRS. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Consumer Marketing Information Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

"Scattered beef specials now offer the comparative shopper good values on chuck cuts, sirloin and rib steaks, round steak and beef liver," she added.

At pork counters, Boston butt and loin roasts are in the spotlight, while other features include quarter loins cut into chops, smoked picnics and some brands of bacon.

Turning to poultry sections, Mrs. Clyatt cited chicken, eggs and turkey — both whole bird and parts — as economical.

She termed turkey and egg supplies "large."

"Fresh fruit and vegetable items in good supply at economical prices include apples, oranges, grapefruit and strawberries."

ALSO, DRY yellow onions, green onions, mustard, turnips and greens, cabbage, carrots, beets and radishes — along with soft-shell, or summer squash.

"Watermelon prices dropped this week as supplies started increasing, while cantaloupe and honeydew melons reflect varying prices, usually according to melon size," Mrs. Clyatt said.

She reported pineapples in fairly heavy supply — and bananas in lighter supply with higher prices.

CONSUMER WATCHWORDS: Chicken meat that turns darker near the bone after it's cooked indicates a young, tender bird.

Because today's chickens are marketed at earlier ages, bones aren't completely calcified. Bone marrow expands during slow freezing, as in home freezing, causing pigment to seep through the bone — which doesn't affect taste or quality.

Cabbage, carrots, broccoli, soft-shell squash, cooking greens, radishes and green onions are other "economically priced vegetables worth considering this week," the specialist said.

Cantaloupe and strawberry supplies are increasing with prices more attractive, and this is the last "peak" month for pineapple. Watermelons are more plentiful, but prices remain relatively high.

"Apples, bananas, oranges, avocados and honeydew melons show moderate prices," Mrs. Clyatt noted.

AT POULTRY sections, she termed fryer chickens a bargain. "Egg prices are down, making them one of the lowest priced, high-protein foods on the market. Grade A, large and medium-sizes are "nip and tuck" for best values.

"Retail beef prices are unchanged for the past two weeks with features in most markets on various cuts of mature and baby beef — in general, best values include chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef, round steaks and roasts, and beef liver.

Wireworm warning issued by Harp

Farmers throughout the grain sorghum belt are cautioned to use planter box treatment against wireworms.

THE WIREWORM warning came from Elbert Harp, executive director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board and Grain Sorghum Producers Association at Lubbock.

Harp pointed out that wireworms can devastate hundreds of acres of grain sorghum when a farmer fails to use planter box treatment on seeds.

DR. GEORGE Teetes of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock said, "I think the only effective treatment against wireworms is Heptachlor." Dr. Teetes cautioned that farmers should carefully follow directions on the label when applying planter box treatment.

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
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Schoenenberger-Wines vows read at Nazareth Tuesday

The bride is a graduate of Hart High School and attended West Texas State University. The groom is a graduate of Dumas High School.

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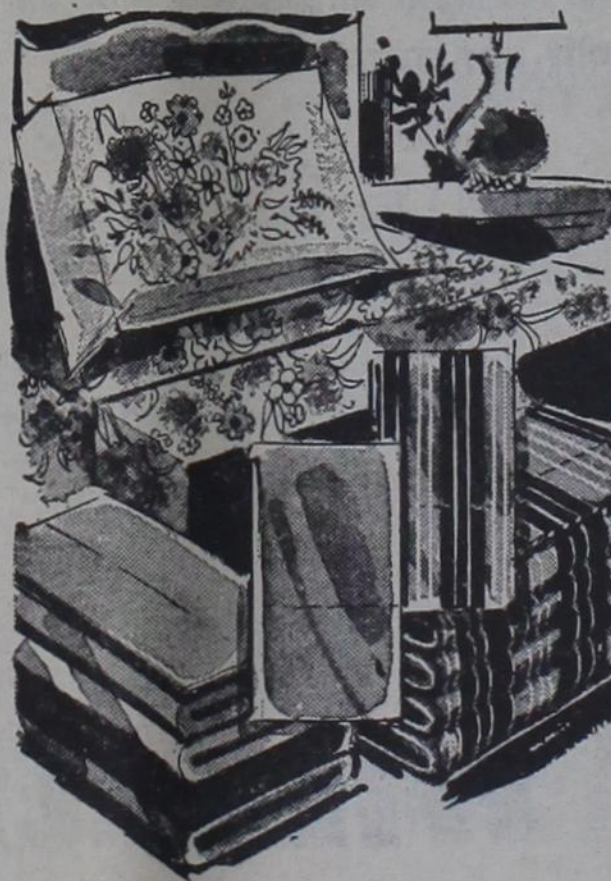

Newborns exhibit alcohol syndrome

Many newborn babies of alcoholic mothers exhibit "fetal alcohol syndrome," Dr. Barbara Sears noted this week, citing research by the National Foundation/March of Dimes. THE HEALTH education specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service said that of two million alcoholic women in the US, half are child bearing age. "Estimates indicate some 20 percent of their children could be affected by this malady."

Symptoms of fetal alcohol syndrome exhibited in children studied include growth deficiency in length, weight, head circumference and intelligence — with joint distortions, facial abnormalities, and heart defects present in some, the specialist continued.

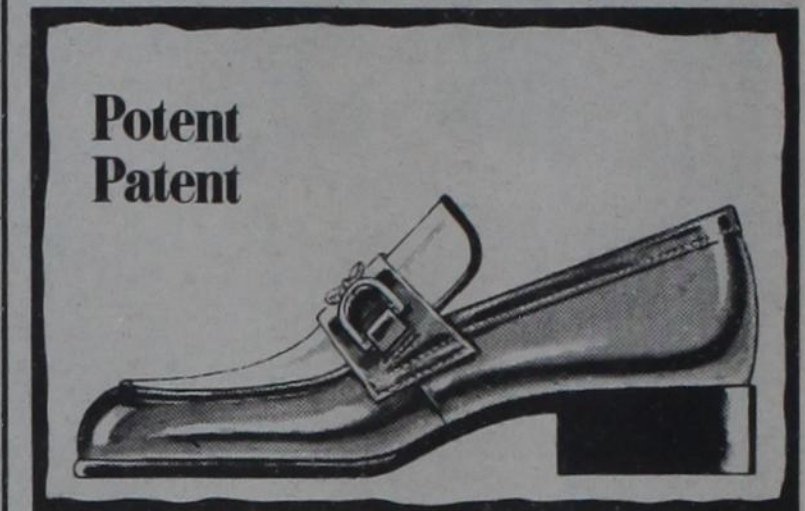

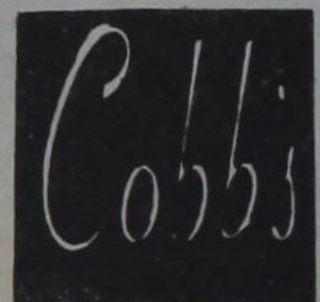

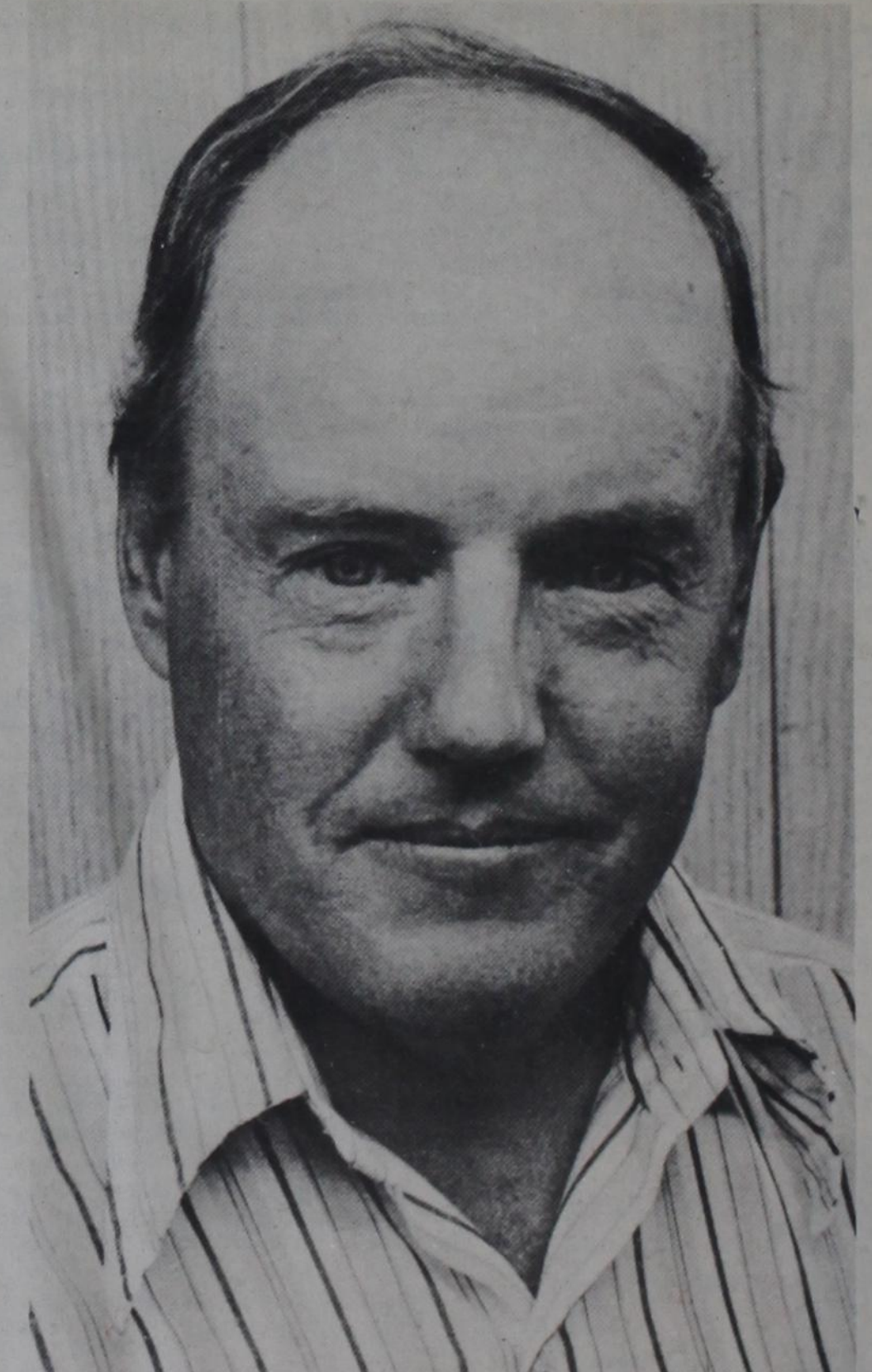

VETERANS' SERVICES

Public Law 93-82, enacted by the Congress on Aug. 2, 1973, authorized a program to provide medical care for the dependents and survivors of certain disabled veterans. Many eligible persons are not taking advantage of their entitlement under the program, known as Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Veterans Administration (CHAMPVA).

Eligible to participate in this cost-sharing medical care program is the spouse or child of a veteran who is permanently and totally disabled because of disabilities which were incurred during military service. Also eligible is the surviving spouse or child of a veteran whose death was caused by a service-connected disability.

PERSONS eligible under this program are provided with medical care identical to that furnished to the military retiree and his dependents and survivors under the Civilian

Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS). The reimbursement claims made by eligible participants are handled by the Mutual of Omaha Insurance Company, the Fiscal Agent for Texas. For inpatient care in a civilian hospital, an eligible person must pay 25% of the total cost, and CHAMPVA will pay the remaining 75%. There is an annual outpatient deductible amount of \$50 for one person and \$100 per family. After the deductible is met, CHAMPVA will provide reimbursement of 75% of the total cost of outpatient care, including drugs and medicines.

Any person who meets the basic requirements may apply for Veterans Administration eligibility by contacting their local Veterans Service Officer. An application form must be completed and sent to the nearest VA hospital or clinic. Each eligible person will be furnished with evidence showing their entitlement to participate in the CHAMPVA medical care program, along with instructions on how and when to file claims for reimbursement. Entitlement ends for persons eligible for Medicare or other government medical insurance.

Each of those days was, for Father Salvatore and his people, a day of terror or of hope, and each brought forth from the kapillan a message of inspiration to keep them going — the legendary tales of six mighty events of Malta's history which shone through the centuries and gathered them together in a fervent belief in their survival.

"Watership Down" is a novel by Richard Adams. The heroes of this tale are animals — wild rabbits. Their behavior is consistent with the laws of nature, yet each is endowed with a blood-and-gut personality that is unforgettable. The setting is the rolling hills and meadows of England. The time is now — or tomorrow — or always. "Watership Down" is a saga of the maverick band who set out, against all odds, on a quest for a new home, a better society. How they succeeded is an epic adventure and a compelling contemporary odyssey of leadership found and leadership lost.

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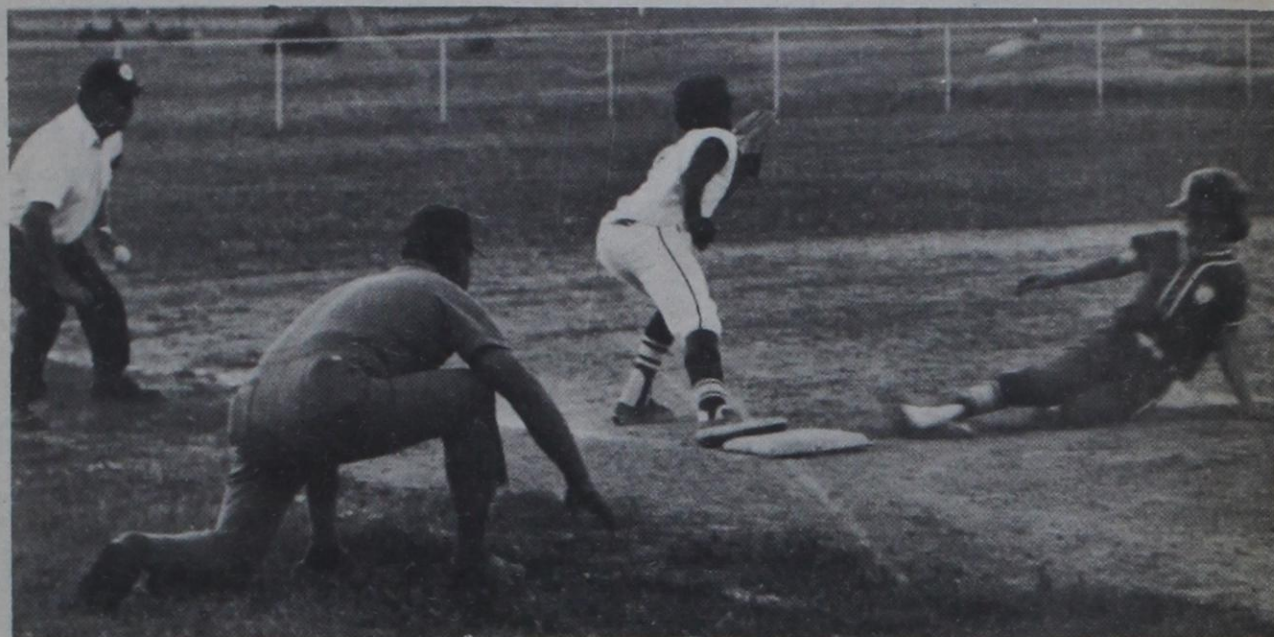

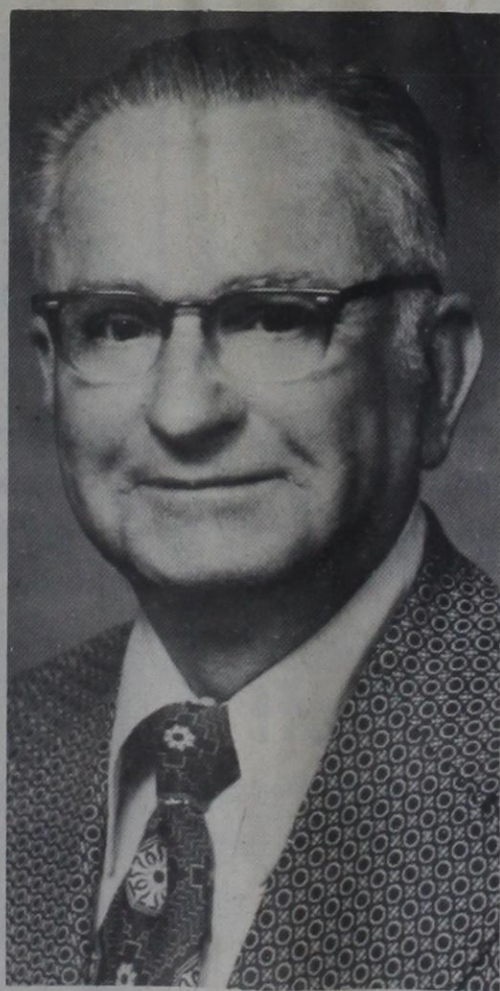

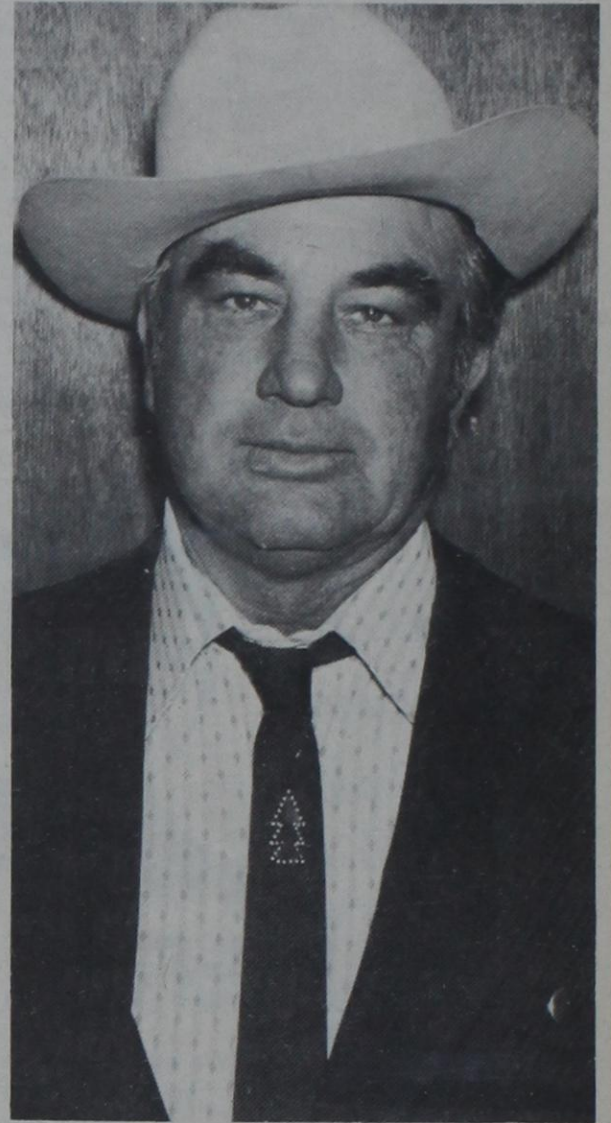

Grain prices to fall as supplies increase

Sorghum producers in the United States can expect feed-grain supplies to increase during the next few months, thus bringing prices down. Of course, much of the outcome depends on the world feedgrain situation and the weather, says a grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

According to Smith, the prospect for increased supplies and lower prices is brought on by a record feedgrain crop in the

making and uncertain demand factors. He expects both domestic and export buyers to stay out of the market for a while to see where the price will stabilize. This will result in sluggish forward contracting for the new sorghum crop through early summer.

Although sorghum production will be down slightly this year with about a one percent decrease in planted acres, corn

acreage is expected to increase a whopping 10 percent. This will set the stage for the feed-grain market," contends the specialist.

ANY CHANGE in fuel and fertilizer supplies could also have a measured effect on the feedgrain market, adds Smith.

On the export side, an excellent feedgrain crop appears to be in the making in the Southern Hemisphere. South Africa and Argentina are recovering from severe droughts of a year ago and their feed-grain crops will be moving into the world markets soon. A bumper crop in these countries

could mean some stiff competition for the United States in the export market.

"Some slowdown in the livestock feeding industry could decrease the domestic demand for sorghum," points out Smith. "Some cutback is already evident."

So, the market situation for sorghum and other feedgrains will be in a state of fluctuation during the next few months. Sorghum should be favorably priced with corn this fall as more corn moves to market. Until then, producers will have to keep a close eye on market developments.

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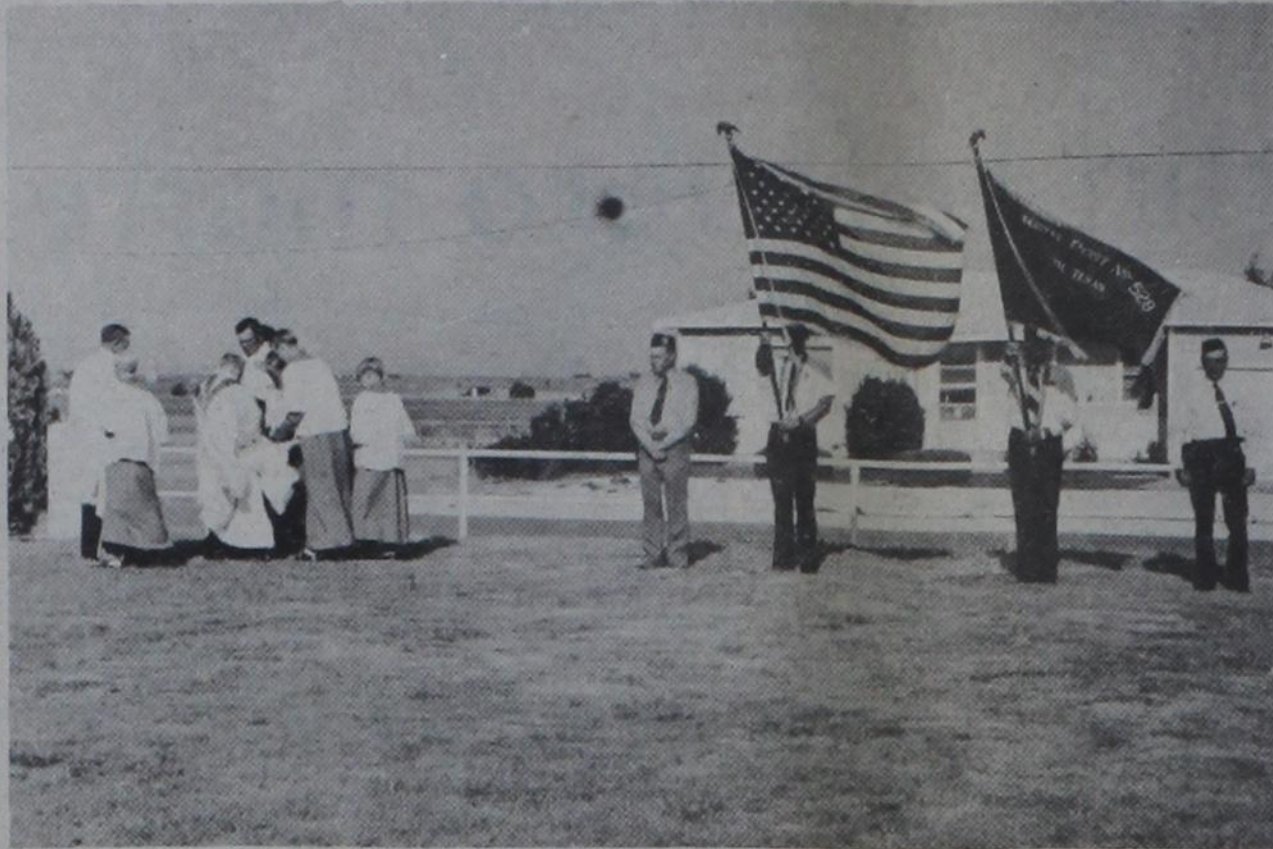

TEPE program seeking adult volunteers here

Now that school is out we're all busy with summer activities such as Bible school, camp and gardening. I hope each of you will be able to enjoy your summer. Remember to practice safety rules both in your activities and picnic meals.

IN THE mid-fall this year we will be conducting a unique program in Castro County and we need your help. A pre-parenting program in Castro County — one of the 20 being conducted throughout the state, is expected to start in October with youth ages 15 and over participating. Part of a nationwide program, the local Teens Explore Parent Education (TEPE) program will "help teenagers prepare for effective parenthood by learning about child development and the role of parents."

"Right now, we're looking for adult volunteer leaders to help us reach all the local youth groups who want to participate in TEPE," Mrs. Irene Keating, Castro County Extension agent and TEPE coordinator, said. Developed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System, through a grant from the Uni-

ted States Department of Health, Education and Welfare, TEPE will focus on six learning experiences for youth.

"Youth will learn how to identify needs and look at the importance of the family unit. They'll take a major step toward self-understanding and discuss concerns and decisions of beginning families."

"Also, parental roles and responsibilities, along with fundamental needs and growth patterns of children will be two other areas of major focus — as well as helping children learn and develop," the agent said.

"Since these subjects highlight the latest trends in family life education, we will provide volunteer leaders with special training."

TEPE leader training will be conducted by Extension family life education specialists who designed the project for Texas. It will include a three hour workshop and constant agent guidance throughout the project. Of potential volunteer leaders, the agent said that they should be adults willing to give guidance to youth discussions and help provide an atmosphere for informal learning," she said.

ers' aides. The course was conducted by South Plains College and PESO.

Adult courses here generally are timed to coordinate with the regular school year, Berryhill explained. However, a biology course started this week, so one group of adults will be going to "summer school."

Classes are planned to start again in late August. Course offerings and registration information will be announced in mid-August, Berryhill said.

If adult courses continue to grow in popularity here, the school buildings might become almost as busy at night as they are in the daytime as Mom and Dad leave the kids at home and go off to school.

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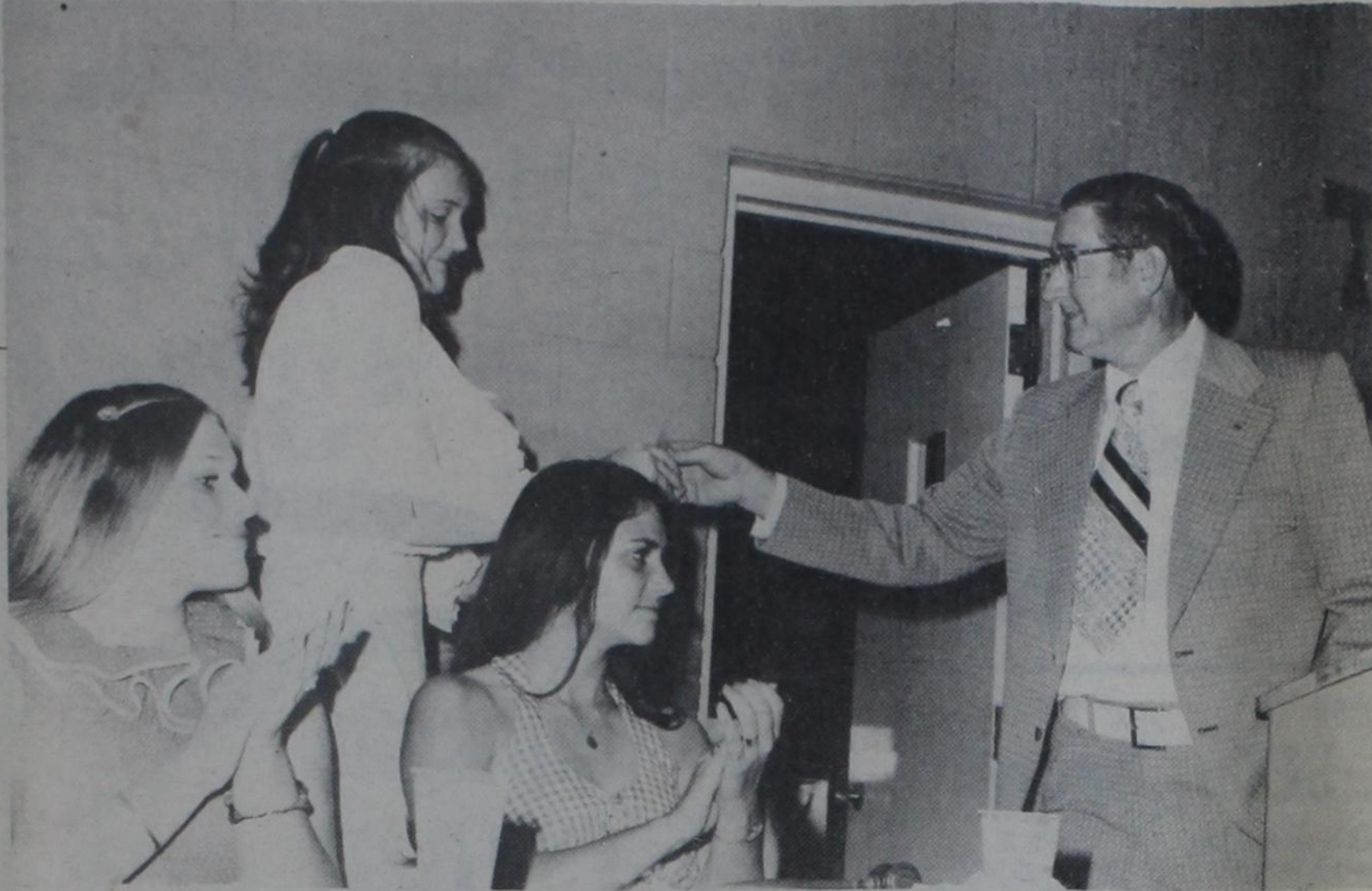

[Continued from Page 1] sion as is possible with the legislature.

Saturday is election day and the balloting will be done in what is commonly known as the second, or runoff, primary. As usual this is a short ballot, with only two races to be voted on by any voter. In precincts two and four there are runoffs for county commissioners, and of course the entire county will participate in the election of a county judge. These are important offices and the men elected to fill them will be the employee of every person in the county. That puts the responsibility on me as a voter to express my preference at the polls as to which of the candidates is best fitted to fill the office. Even if you don't have a preference among the candidates, it is still important to exercise your right of franchise. It is sort of like breathing, you just need to do it.

This is the first time in my memory that we have had only county candidates on the runoff primary ballot. I can remember several times, however, when there would only be one or two contested races in the runoff primary for state offices.

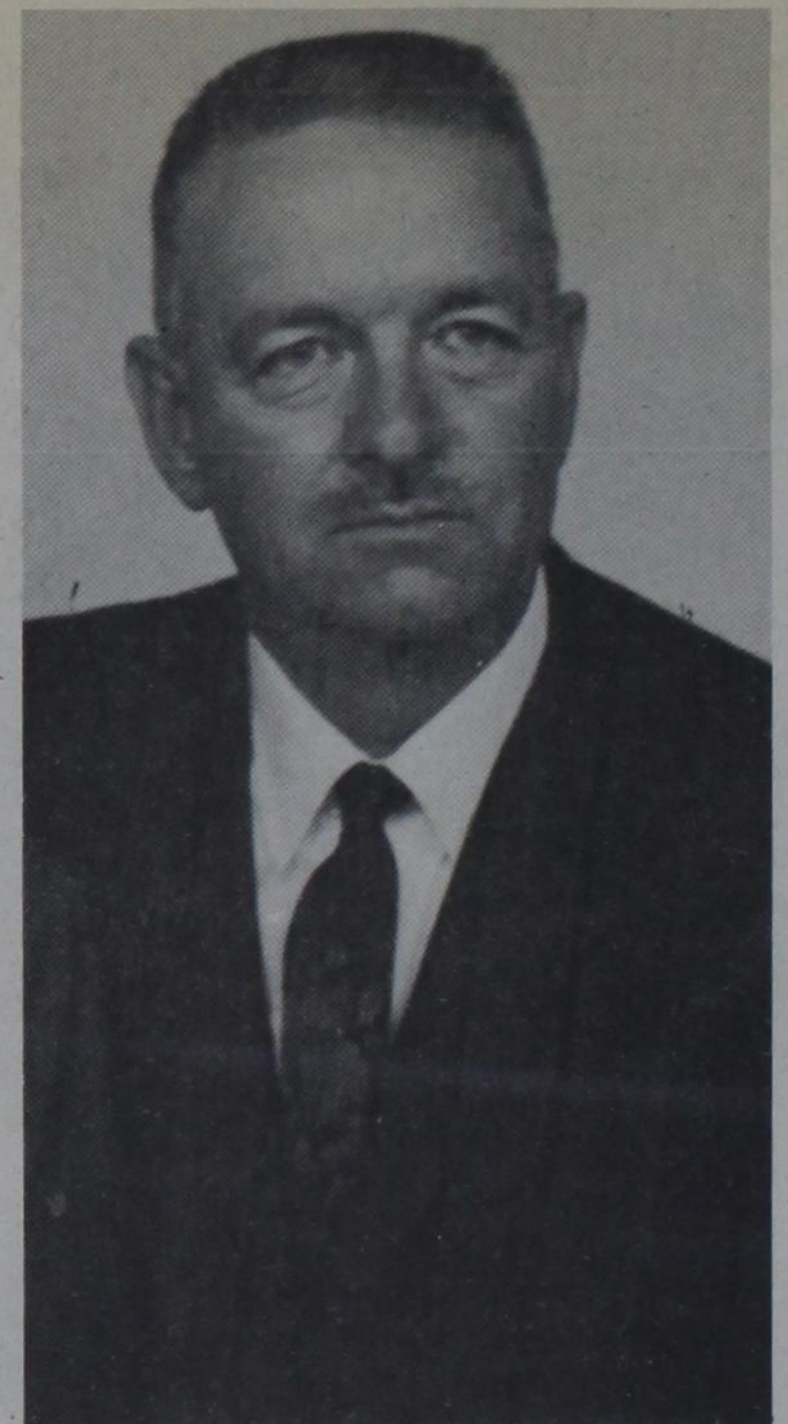

If you agree with my views and with my outlook toward this important job, I would greatly appreciate your vote in the June 1 Democratic Primary Runoff Election.

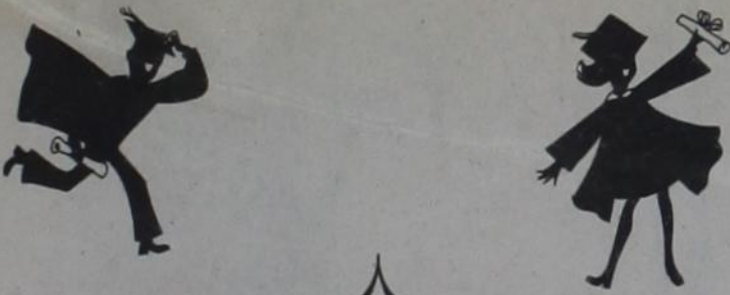
