

### Oak Mills Boom On Distillery Orders

HARRISBURG, Ill., Sept. 4. PI-Saw-milling, a pioner industry of this territory, has been revived because Kentucky's distilleries need whisky barrels.

Landowners are shipping their white oak to two mills for from \$5 to \$10 a tree. One of the mills turns out saves and the other barrel heads. Nearly 80 men are employed at the two mills, which have a daily capacity of 10,000

The white oak which abounds in this section is a tall tree which requires about 100 years to mature, but officials of the forest service say it is one of the "fast growing" hardwoods. The wood resists water and is also used for shipping and flooring. It is "air-cured" about 90 days before it is shipped to the distilleries.



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


