World Record Is Reached in Tarleton Contest

STEPHENVILLE, Oct. 19. (Sp.)—A third world's record was officially ascribed this week to the John Tarleton college eleventh international egg-laying contest, according to T. A. Hensarling, professor of poultry at Tarleton and director of the contest.

Topping the 17 standard egg-laying contests in the United States, the Tarleton contest broke its own world record established in 1933 for a new high in poultry contests. In 1933 average number of eggs per hen for the contest was 239; average number of points, 246. For the 1937 contest just closed, average number of eggs per hen was 236, but average points, 247.7 an increase of 1.7 in spite of a decrease of three in the average egg production.

Frank E. Mitchell, contest editor of the Poultry Item, wired Mr. Hensarling confirmation of the

record and congratulated him. He said: "You made an excellent year's record, and I hope you will go on with the splendid work that you are doing in your state."

Nearest competitor of the Tarleton contest was Storrs of Connecticut with an average egg production of 230, average points of 240.

In addition to the contest record, a white leghorn hen owned by the Woodlawn farm of Temple set a world record for all poultry breeds by laying 345 eggs for 370.65 contest points, and a black minorca owned by E. J. Covey of Everman set a breed record by laying 278 eggs for 294.95 contest points.

President Roosevelt was presented with eggs laid by the champion white leghorn, Lady Temple, and this week Mr. Hensarling will send to the directors of the A. & M. College System some Lady Temple eggs.

Pictures of Lady Temple were sent to several people, including Gov. James V. Allred, who this week wrote acknowledging his receipt of the picture, and expressing his interest in the world record.

themselves, this year are surpassing 1929 figures.

All these operations give employment to hundreds of thousands of men throughout the Great Lakes region. Railroad engineers, firemen, mechanics, shop and track men, dock men and sailors—all depend on the iron and coal trade for their livelihood.

Long-Geared Craft
Great Lakes bulk freighters are built as long as engineering design and navigation conditions permit. The typical bulk freighter is about 600 feet long, 600 to 65 feet wide and 32 feet deep.

The pilot house occupies the extreme fore end of the ship and the propelling machinery the extreme aft end, leaving the intervening space for cargo. Hatches cover the cargo section. They extend nearly the full width of the boat, and when loading or unloading, the hatch covers are removed making the deck almost completely open. A ship of this type carries between 11,000 and 14,000 gross tons of ore.

Load in a Hurry
As the freighter pulls into the ore docks, chutes are let down and ore from some 350 bins flows into the cargo hold. Ordinarily about four hours is required to load a 600-foot vessel, but the record is held by the D. G. Keer of the Pittsburgh Steamship company. The Keer in 1921 took 12,507 gross tons of ore at Two Harbors, Minn., in 16 1/2 minutes.

The argonaut unloading equipment works with efficiency comparable to the loading. It consists of five to six electric devices with a 17-ton self-filling grab bucket. With an operator, the bucket goes into the hold, fills itself, comes up, moves back over the dock and empties its load into a receiving hopper. The hopper, in turn, dumps the ore into a car for its trip to the steel plant where blast furnaces turn it into pig iron for the processing of steel.

TOOT AND BE DARNED

GRAZ, Austria, Oct. 19 (AP)—Special yellow plates bearing the word "Taubstumm," meaning deaf and dumb, have been put on bicycles of deaf mutes by police here. The plates show motorists it is useless to sound their horns. The regulation became necessary because it is a Graz custom to employ deaf persons to distribute newspapers.

SALZBURG, Austria, Oct. 19 (AP)—There's a new answer to the old question about an opera singer's ultimate goal. It's Salzburg.

That's the answer at least, for six who have sung with the Metropolitan Opera company in New York and who are now prominent in the Salzburg Music festival.

Some are attracted by the international audiences, the pay, the chance to talk with many other artists, or the quiet of Salzburg. Lotte Lehmann is one of the growing number that has looked beyond the Metropolitan to this little city. Others are Ezio Pinza, Virgilio Lazzari, Elizabeth Rethberg, Kerstin Thorborg and Franca Somigli.

British Methods Borrowed By Us

LONDON, Oct. 19 (AP)—When America takes its voluntary unemployment census it will be borrowing a page from the British. British unemployed register every week at one of the some 2,000 government offices. The weekly registration keeps the government posted and guides employment offices.

The October 4 report showed 1,090,967 wholly unemployed, 191,737 temporarily stopped, and 56,500 normally in casual employment making a total of 1,339,204. This was an increase of 30,000 over August 23 but a decrease of 236,000 over Sept. 21, 1936.
