

CONFRONTING the country now is the G fact of a special session of congress before which the president proposes to lay a number of relief and regulatory measures, including "wage and hour" legislation. #### Patience About Exhausted

ON the eve of the nonintervention committee meeting, Foreign Sec. Anthony Eden said that British patience is about exhausted with Italian intervention in Spain.

The world has marveled that British patience has endured so much, seeing in it a sign of British unreadiness for war. It was partly that, undoubtedly, and partly the responsibility Great Britain feels for the preservation of peace. But British neutrality is due largely to the feeling that Britons have no right to intervene in the domestic quarrels of another nation.





NAVY DAY this year finds the bulk of the United States fleet at Pacific ocean stations, where the panorama of national defense shown on this map has been worked out to protect the U. S. from sea attacks from the west.

Hawaii's heavily-fortified Pearl Harbor, key to the plan, is the apex of the "triangle of inner defense." At Samoa, 3,150 miles to the south, is a navy anchorage. Guam, 3,337 miles west of Hawaii, is a supply station. Fifteen hundred miles beyond Guam is Cavite, the Philippines outpost at the front door of Asia and its international tension.
