SENATE VOTES AGAINST MOVE TO RESURRECT

Some Sort of Tax Bill Expected by Time Session Ends

AUSTIN, Oct. 25 (AP)—Proposals to legalize mixed drink sales of hard liquor apparently died for the session today when an effort in the senate to bring up house legislation of the bill failed by one vote. The session ends tomorrow. The senate struck out the sale provision Friday.

The governor reiterated today that another session of the legislature would not be called immediately after adjournment. A \$3,000,000 tax bill has passed the senate and a \$5,000,000 bill has passed the house. It was expected the two houses would get together on some sort of a bill by the time the session ends. A section of the general tax bill recently passed the senate, providing a \$4,500 slash in departmental appropriations, was killed on a point of order sustained by the house speaker, Robert Calvert.

MAY RESTRICT LEGISLATION

May Be Limited to 5-Point Program

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP)—Administration leaders may propose limiting legislation in the special session of congress to the president's five point program, informed persons said today. This would require the adoption of a resolution by the house and senate. The idea is that an enactment program might be completed in six-weeks session beginning November 15 if all other subjects were held over for the regular session in January. The program embraces crop control, wage-hour regulations, government reorganization, regional planning and anti-trust law revision.

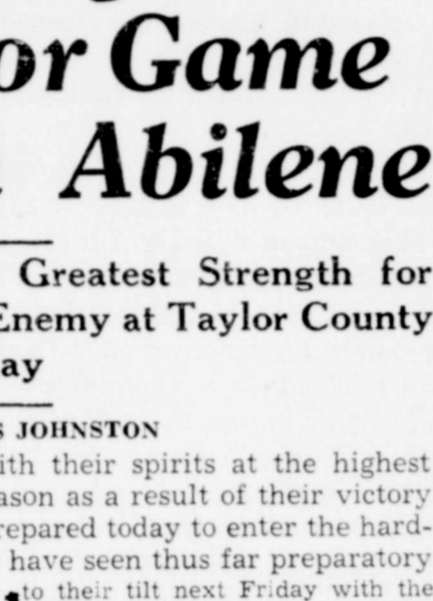

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP)—Haywood Patterson, one of nine negroes involved in the Scottsboro case, lost in the supreme court today in an effort to escape a 75-year prison sentence imposed in Alabama courts for an alleged attack on a white woman. The court said that Justice Black "took no part" in the decision. That removed possibility of a challenge of Black's position on the grounds he was a former klansman.

FRENCH SEEK NATIONALITY OF WARPLANE

Chinese Forces Halt Jap Drive on Shanghai Front

Insurgent Generalissimo Franco prepared today for a new and gigantic offensive in an effort to end the civil war in Spain before winter. French authorities, seeking to determine the nationality of a seaplane which yesterday attacked and sank a French freighter in the Mediterranean, were told by the captain that the plane was marked with a black cross. The British foreign secretary sought, with little likelihood of success, to get the nations to agree on the number of fighters to be withdrawn from Spain. In China, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's forces halted the Japanese offensive after five days of heavy fighting on the Shanghai front. A furious battle continued at Tazang, key center five miles north of Shanghai. The British, as an aftermath to the slaying of a British soldier by a Japanese warplane yesterday, ordered defense posts to fire without hesitation in self defense, and protests were lodged with the Japanese who said that an inquiry would determine the responsibility and that they might punish the pilot.

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Electric Power Consumption Gains

AUSTIN, Oct. 25 (Sp.)—Consumption of electric power in Texas during September continued the wide margin of gain over last year which has prevailed during the past several months, the University of Texas bureau of business research has announced.

Reports from seventeen electric power companies of the state give total production of 238,000,000 kilowatt hours of electricity during the month, an increase of 19.3 percent over September, 1936. For the third quarter production of these companies totaled 703,000,000 kilowatt hours, an increase of 20.8 percent over the corresponding period last year.

Commercial consumption, 52,000,000 kilowatt hours, was 15.6 percent above September last year; industrial consumption, 118,000,000 kilowatt hours, was up 19.6 percent; residential consumption, 35,000,000 kilowatt hours, gained 15.8 percent, and miscellaneous consumption, 33,000,000 kilowatt hours, increased 29.3 percent.

necessary use of hot water faucets, and huddling in one or two rooms were discussed as some of the wasteful practices which cause consumers to use more gas than necessary.

Prohibit Order on Beer Sales in Pre. 5 Enjoined

EASTLAND, Oct. 25 (Sp.)—B. H. Atchison, judge of 90th district court at Breckenridge, granted Friday the application of beer retailers in Eastland county justice precinct 5 for an order enjoining putting into effect a commissioner's court order declaring sale of alcoholic beverages in precinct 5 prohibited as shown in an election Sept. 18.

Milton Lawrence, Eastland attorney, filed the case for W. C. Caraway, Gorman beer retailer, and others against commissioners court, County Judge W. S. Adamson and Criminal District Attorney Earl Corner, Jr., in 88th district. Lawrence's application for an injunction was first presented 88th district court, which after consideration and argument hearing was refused, and denied by Judge B. W. Patterson upon insufficiency of allegations to warrant order for issuance of injunction.

Bond for issuance of the writs of injunction, which were to be returnable to the next term of 88th court, was to be filed Saturday.

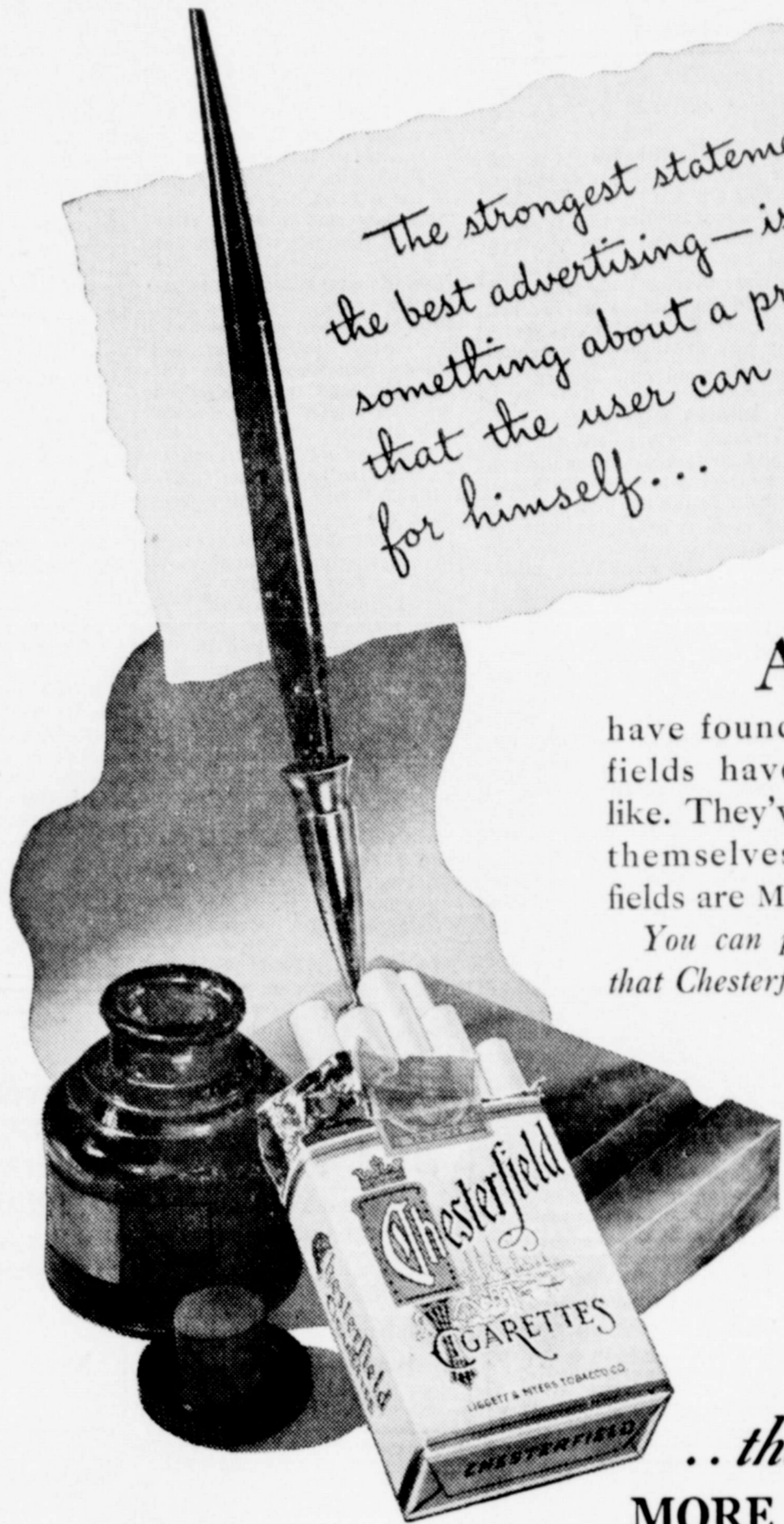
Lawrence alleged that the election was void because of insufficiency of the petition calling for the election, form of ballot was insufficient as the status of Eastland county is undetermined because of a case pending in the court of civil appeals which is an appeal from an order holding void the recent county-wide election upon prohibition from sale of all beverages and that allegedly the petition did not set out the type of liquor legal in the county.

Contestants further contend that reading of the order of the court in calling the election in response to the petition of residents of the precinct did not say what type of an election.

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Chemical Industries Seen as "Naturals" For Texas

DALLAS, Oct. 25 (Sp.)—Chemical industries are seen as an advantageous and "natural" field for Texas industrial expansion in a report of the All-South Development council which, in noting many physical qualifications of the Lone Star state for this type of wealth-production, urges a stable state policy toward industry to accelerate the logical trend.

Not only is Texas in a favorable position for attracting these industries by reason of its wealth of leading mineral raw materials used in chemical manufacturing, processing and by-products, the report points out, but it also ranks high in non-material raw products—such as cottonseed, peanut oil, pulpwood—which are gaining importance in the fast-growing field of creating new materials by chemical processes.

Recognizing the growing economic significance of recent chemical "miracles" in industry, and the deep interest in farm chemistry, the report reviews salient "facts and figures" set forth in a special issue of "Chemical and Metallurgical Engineering."

That this type of industry would be eminently worth cultivating here is shown, the report says, by these general indices cited by this leading journal: employment in chemical industries is regular, well-paid and under favorable conditions of hours and safety, intensive research being largely responsible for this stabilization (the chemical industry is spending \$20,000,000 in research this year); 82 per cent of workers are in plants of less than 1,000 workers, 56 per cent in plants of less than 500; there is an average of \$8,260 in capital investment behind each worker.

The ratio of salaried to hourly employees is high (18.1 per cent salaried against 12.7, the general average for all American industry); despite rapid increase in output of chemicals per worker—which is the essence of technology—there has been no technological unemployment; and these industries beget new industries, the "offspring" of discoveries of new processes and new products and by-products.

Despite Texas' favorable raw materials status—her petroleum, sulphur, gas, salt, lime, clays, carbon black, coal tar and potash are

among the most essential bases of the chemical industry—the state now holds a relatively insignificant place in actual chemical manufacture, accounting for little more than one-half of one per cent of United States chemical values in the 1935 census. Her output of \$3,849,071 was almost doubled by that of Louisiana, with \$7,324,036; it was about one-seventh as large as Tennessee's (\$24,870,886), and was ever topped by little Connecticut and by Alabama, each of which bettered the six-million figure. Such industrial states as New Jersey and New York, of course, were leaders with \$138,128,726 and \$123,496,822, respectively.

"Facing these facts" the report declares, "Texas should redouble its efforts to develop its latent advantages. The first step, already being taken in many other states, must be the establishment of stable state policies toward industry, warranting long term planning by industrial interests."

Among southern states, Louisiana, whose oil, sulphur, carbon black and salt raw materials most nearly parallel Texas' assets, has made conspicuous progress in the last 18 months in attracting chemical industries which, had Texas been able to present an official attitude of "welcome" to counteract the Pelican state's tax-exemption bait, might as well have settled here, the report says. A recent Louisiana coup brought to Baton Rouge a \$5,000,000 ethyl plant, first plant for making this fluid commercially outside its Deepwater, N. J., "birthplace."

Texas' pine forests, her capability for growing any of the new rich-in-cellulose plants now finding industrial utilization through chemistry, her undeveloped lig-

nite, potash, fluorspar and are "potentials" for putting state on the fast-changing industrial map. Conversion of these into cash assets, the concludes, would seem to be on vigorous merchandising combined with an official state position to encourage rather than antagonize industry.
