## Resigned But Not Discouraged

DRES. ROOSEVELT is becoming more philosophical under defeat, and it is a good thing for his own peace of mind that he is. During his second term he has lost oftener than he has won in conflicts with congress, and prospects are none too good for bettering

At his press conference last Friday, fifth anniversary of his incumbency, he gave the impression that he is resigned to failure of wage and hour legislation at this session, but s not greatly discouraged thereby. He admitted that the bill to put a floor under wages and a ceiling over hours might not go through this session, but made it plain that till favors it.

Indications are that Mr. Roosevelt has sized up the situation correctly. The bill is still deeply enmeshed in the web of controversy which held it up in last year's regular and special sessions. Congress has given up trying to reshape the original Black-Connery bill into acceptable form, and has turned over to a house subcommittee the job of writing a new bill.

Although the administration would have it that Southern congressmen knifed the bill, the fact is that their outright opposition to any legislation of that character was less effective than the inability of groups which favor it in principle to agree upon a practical formula.
