BERLIN, March 21 (AP)—The German foreign office organ indicated today that Adolf Hitler, in his role of protector of Germans abroad, was casting angry glances in the direction of Brazil. The Deutsche Diplomatische-Korrespondenz expressed the chagrin of the government because President Getulio Vargas was not showing a strong hand in suppressing anti-German measures in the outlying states.

HENDAYE, France, March 21 (AP)—The Spanish insurgents driving a wedge southeast of Alcaniz, trapped scattered units of government troops today in the triangular sector of west Torrevieja. A movement to strengthen the insurgents' front for a renewed drive toward the Mediterranean was started yesterday with aerial and artillery attacks which took the government advance guard by surprise.

HOUSE OKES NAVY MEASURE

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—The house today overwhelmingly approved the administration's billion-dollar naval operation bill. This measure, which now goes to the senate, authorizes the construction of 46 new warships, 20 auxiliary vessels, and 95 airplanes which President Roosevelt said were needed "specifically and solely because of the piling-up of additional land and sea armaments of the other countries."

A district parsonage has been purchased at Ave. N and Ninth st. and the district superintendent, Rev. J. Walter Hall, and family have moved here from Wichita Falls.

SAN ANTONIO, March 21 (AP)—Robert Toscano, 32, was charged with murder, arson, and assault with intent to murder today in connection with the death of his mother, Mrs. Lena Toscano, and with the beating of Merle Starnes, contractor and former candidate for the state legislature. Mrs. Toscano, 59, was found slain inside her burning home Saturday night. Firemen also found Starnes, who was unconscious from a head blow, in the same house. Starnes had not regained consciousness today. The charges were filed in Justice of the Peace Raymond Gerhardt's court by Detective Ed Amacker.

"You are tired, aren't you?" he said in an entirely new tone, glancing sidewise at her. "If I were you I'd get to bed as early as possible. There's nothing like—"

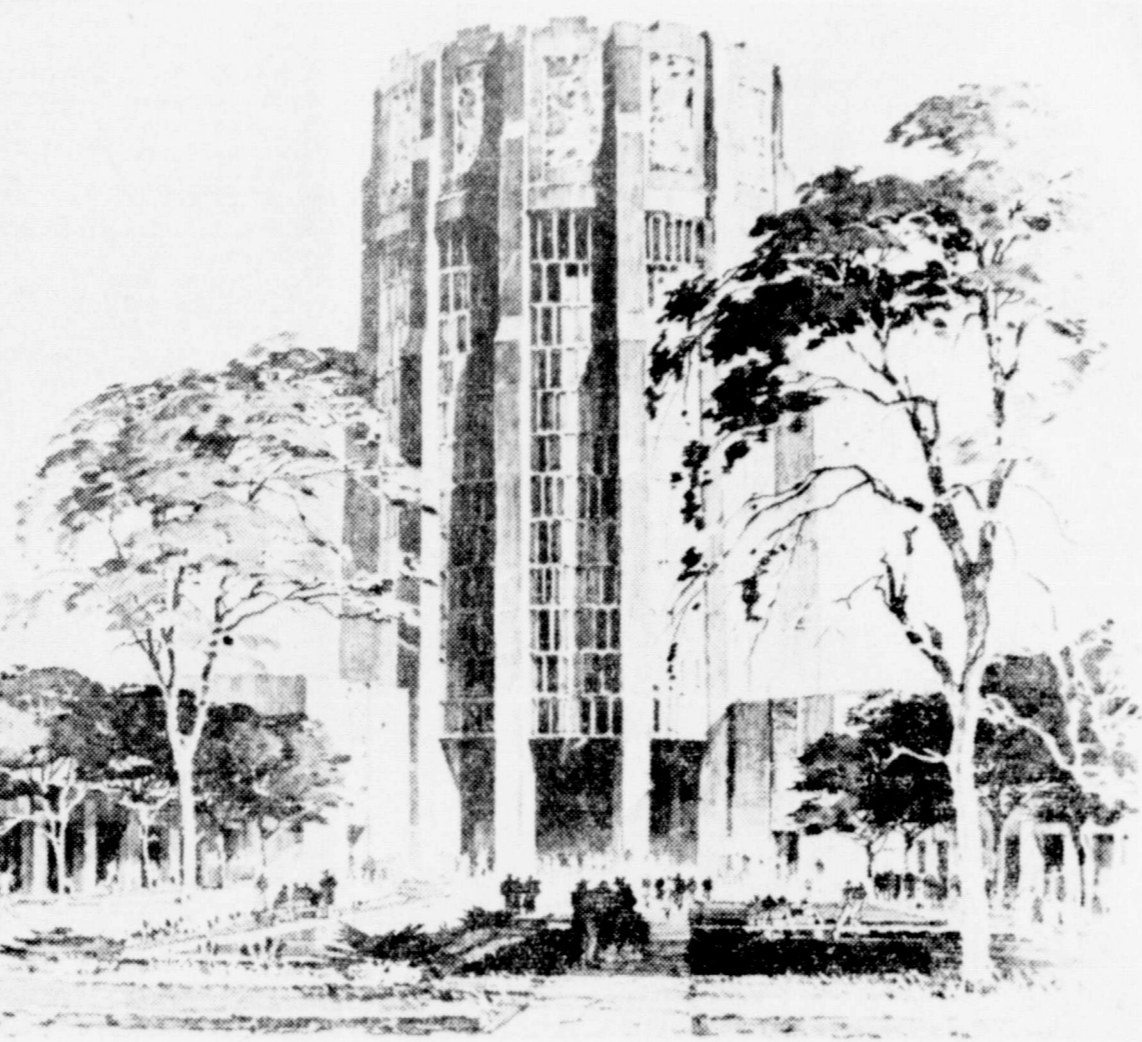

Hitler Got There Ruler of Germany's 75 Million Tempered in Fire of World War

The next thing you know, the lad Hitler is being expelled from school for smoking. That's odd, for Hitler, the man, neither smokes nor drinks.

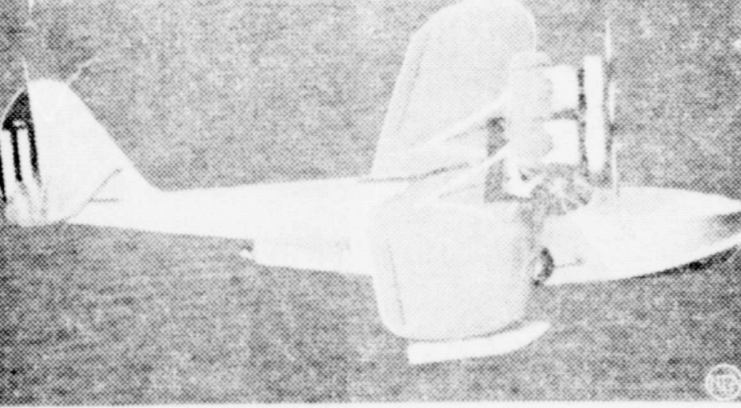
Hitler's father, Alois, is pictured by biographers as a strong-willed cobbler who obtained a financial nest egg when he married the first of three wives. Then he wrangled an Austrian civil service job, and started a family, moving from town to town along the border as a customs inspector. In a few years the first Mrs. Hitler died, and Alois took a second wife. She lived only a few months after the marriage.

Later Hitler attended a Catholic monastery school and there developed a taste for music and art—especially art. This ruled Alois who told Adolf he was to follow in his father's footsteps in the civil service. He punctuated the declaration with a spanking.

One day, the widowed Alois spied tall, dark-eyed Clara Pösel, a young woman who had been a housemaid for the first Mrs. Hitler. Clara had left her rural home for Vienna in her teens. Now she was back, a mature woman.

Fared Badly As Artist When Adolf was 13, his father died and the son continued his schooling for a while, making indifferent progress, and leaning more heavily toward that art career. Although his mother was slowly dying of cancer she determined Adolf should settle the course of his life in his own way. She helped him go to Vienna to study art when he was 17.

Coast Guard Flies to Rescue \$60,000 Old Age Benefits for Texas Claimants



Swooping over the Gulf of Mexico on an errand of mercy, a flying lifeboat of the United States coast guard—such as shown above, flies from Biloxi, Miss., to rescue a sick sailor aboard the Danish freighter Maryland en route from Copenhagen to Galveston.

KING SAID 2,327 payments to claimants have been approved since the old-age insurance program became operative on January 1, 1937, and that 508 of these were authorized during the past month.

Operating with remarkable precision and co-operation, the coast guard cutter Legare of Pascagoula, Miss., simultaneously approaches the Maryland, as pictured strikingly in the airview above, taken from the rescue plane, and removes Sailor Julius G. New Device Tattles On Hen's Slack Work WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—Hens do their own book-keeping in a nest just patented by Orland E. Kellum, of Moreno, Calif., for fine breeding stock. When the hen enters the nest she locks automatically to prevent the entrance of another hen. When she lays her egg another door opens automatically permitting her to leave. As the second door opens it operates the lenses of a camera which takes a picture of the hen and of a number painted on her back or side. In that manner her owner keeps track of how well she tends to her business of producing eggs.

Not Necessary to Sell Cotton for Adjustment

It is not necessary for producers of cotton to sell their equity in their loan cotton in order to be eligible for a cotton price adjustment payment on this cotton, according to a statement just released through the county agent's office at Eastland.

Following is the statement: "Numerous reports have been received that producers are being urged to sell their equity or interest in their loan cotton in order to be eligible for a cotton price adjustment payment on loan cotton. The sale of transfer of the producer-borrower's equity or interest is not necessary for such a purpose since the new farm act provides that cotton otherwise eligible for a payment which is in the loan on June 30, 1938, will be eligible for a payment based on the amount by which the price of cotton on the 10 spot cotton markets is below 12 cents per pound on that day. Furthermore, the new act directs that the maturity date on all cotton loan notes be extended to July 31, 1939. The maturity date was originally July 31, 1938."

ner in which their interests will be affected before actually making such transfers. This section of the farm bill provides that before July 1, 1938, any producer may transfer his right, title, and interest in loan cotton to the Commodity Credit Corporation and directs the corporation to accept it and to assume all obligations of the producer with respect to the loan on the cotton transferred. The corporation is then directed to notify the secretary of agriculture of the cotton so transferred to it and the secretary of agriculture is directed to pay to producers a sum equal to 2 cents per pound on the cotton they transferred to the corporation; the amount so paid to be deducted from any price adjustment payment to which they are entitled. Since no appropriation has been provided out of which these payments can be made directly, it follows necessarily that a cotton producer who transfers his loan cotton to the Corporation pursuant to this provision cannot receive the 2

\$1000 Award In West Texas C. C. Annual Contest

WICHITA FALLS, March 21.—The West Texas chamber of commerce will inaugurate an annual contest, with a \$1,000 award to the West Texas county with the best record in soil and water conservation activities, if proposals are approved, as is expected, at the twentieth annual WTCC convention here in Wichita Falls, April 25, 26 and 27.

Annual awards in the contest,

expected to begin with the 1938-39 year, will be based on soil and water conservation improvements, row cropping, terracing and contouring, eradication of mesquite and prickly pear, listing and clearing farm and ranch land, and other practices.

H. H. Williamson, director of the state extension service at Texas A and M college, will submit rules for approval of the WTCC agricultural committee. D. A. Bandeen, WTCC manager, said today.

The winning county will use \$250 to stimulate boy and girl club work, and will act as custodian in awarding the remaining \$750 for counties in all of west Texas.

Results from this contest may

easily influence the topography of west Texas," Bandeen said. Rt. Rev. Musgr. Patrick J. F. Farmer's Initiative Saves Baby Chicks

EASTLAND, March 21 (Sp.)—A brooder house made of an old galvanized tank was good enough to save 99 out of 102 baby chicks for J. D. Morton, Rising Star, Miss. Illa R. Parrish, home supervisor for the Farm Security administration, reported recently.
Mr Morrow turned the tank upside down, cut a hole in the side for a furnace, and covered the whole with dirt to keep the warmth inside. Since wood from the place is used for fuel, the cost

of this brooder house was nothing. "The importance of poultry in a sound farm and home plan for this section can hardly be over-estimated," Miss Parrish said. "Even more important than the cash value of the sales of chickens and

eggs that may be made is the health-giving value of poultry products on the family table." A sufficient supply of home grown food to insure a balanced diet is one of the first requirements which FSA makes of its clients, she pointed out.
