KEEPS SILENT ON MOVES IN TVA QUARREL

Roosevelt Gives Chairman Until This Afternoon to Answer

YELLOW SPRINGS, Ohio, March 22 (AP)—Arthur Morgan announced today his refusal to meet President Roosevelt's request that he give reasons why he should not be removed as chairman of the Tennessee Valley authority.

He said he had no further statement to make. He arrived home here today.

The president had given Morgan until 2:30 this afternoon to provide "any reason."

Morgan said at a press conference he called shortly after Roosevelt had threatened to remove him that "I challenged his action and I denied his right of power to suspend me."

The president had asked Morgan to resign as a result of the bitter internal dispute which has split the chairman apart from the other two TVA directors.

Morgan said that at the White-House meeting at which the other directors, David E. Lilienthal and H. A. Morgan, were present, he gave Roosevelt this statement:

"It is my judgment that my resignation at this time would not be in the public interest. Therefore, I do not tender my resignation."

The official transcript showed that the president, holding Chairman Arthur E. Morgan "guilty of insubordination and contumacy," resorted to strong language at one point.

He declared Chairman Morgan had offered no explanation for "reckless and astounding conduct" in charging, and refusing to substantiate with evidence, that TVA counsel in the recent constitutional litigation over the TVA act had shown "unethical conduct" in the proceedings.

Morgan would not say flatly what course of action he would pursue, but made clear at his press conference that he would not withdraw his charges.

He told reporters that he did not "expect to communicate" with the White House in any way.

He said he would leave for his Yellow Springs, Ohio, home this evening and would be there for a short time. He would not say where he would go then, but remarked, "To sum up my attitude, I'd say that I do not intend to run away."

PREPAREDNESS FOR PEACE VFW HEAD'S THEME

Tells Veterans to Be More Active in Local Affairs

A national defense program that will keep America adequately prepared to defend its territory and maintain its integrity in international affairs, and an appeal that the veterans organization make itself an effective force in national and civic life in order that it may better prosecute its program for peace, were the high-points of a stirring address delivered by National Commander Scott P. Squires of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at a banquet for ex-service men and their guests at the Laguna hotel last night. Squires' address was broadcast over the Abilene radio station.

Squires developed the four-point program of the VFW designed to prevent war by adequate defense forces, legislation to remove the profit from war supplies, national mobilization of men, materials and industry on a cooperative, non-profiteering basis, and the assurance of ample economic support for veterans and their dependents.

He characterized the administration's current naval and military expansion program as the minimum which the national may reasonably adopt for preparedness.

The United States, he declared, should be able to defend the Panama Canal Zone, the Philippines, the Hawaiian Islands and the entire coastline of the western hemisphere, asserting that the principle of the Monroe doctrine should be maintained intact and that any foreign invasion of the American continent should be regarded by this nation as a positive threat to its national security and the independence. He advocated a navy strong enough to resist any possible combination of countries.

He pointed to China, Ethiopia and the more recent German absorption of Austria as examples of the folly of unpreparedness and declared that in a world where dictators have no regard for the sanctity of covenants and espouse the law of force as the law of might,

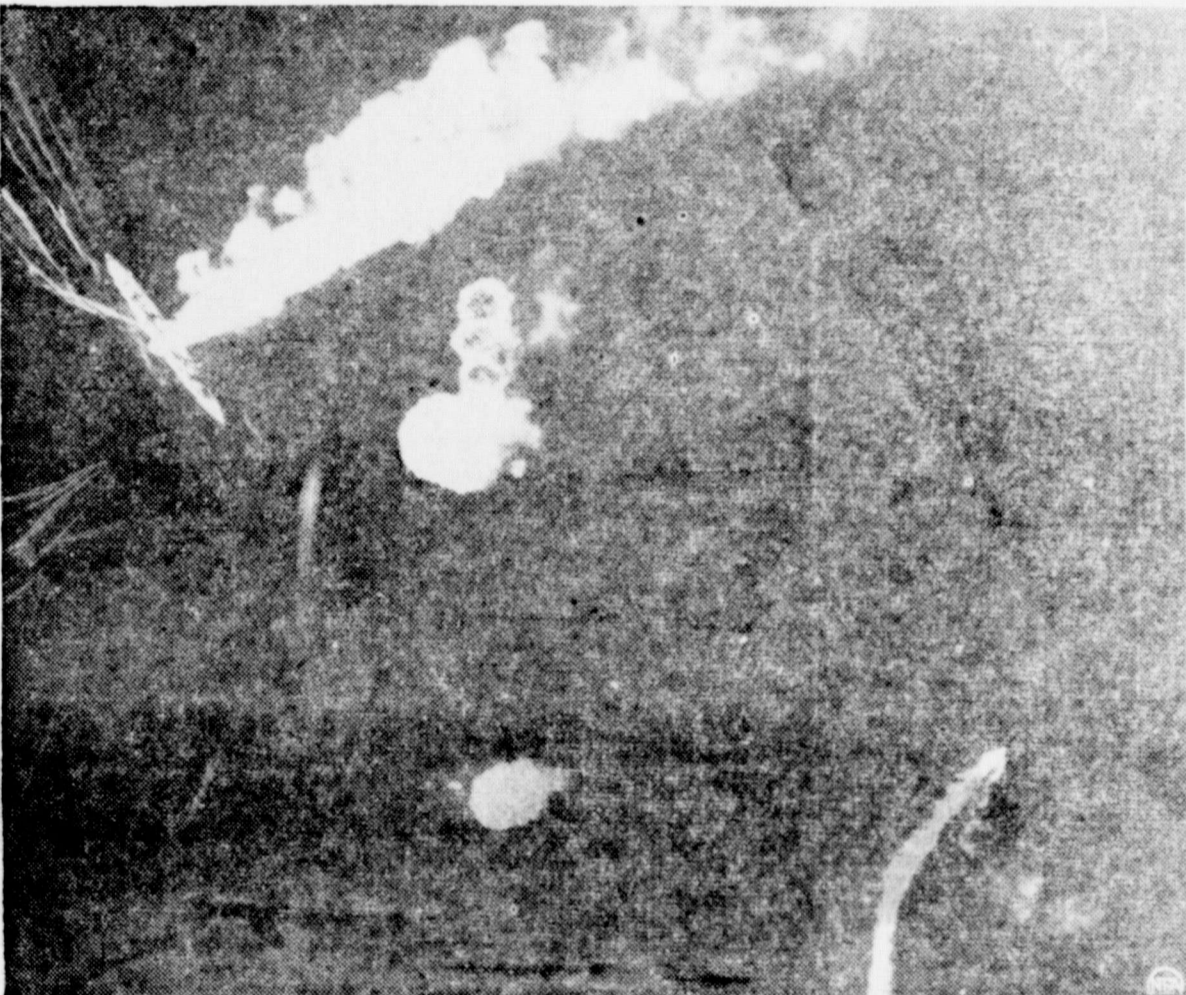

AUSTIN, March 22 (AP)—Senator John Redditt of Lufkin, chairman of the senate finance committee, estimated today that the appropriations for the next biennium would total approximately five million dollars less than those for the current two years.

Senator Redditt also expressed the opinion that no new taxes were necessary to provide for the teachers retirement, for the support of the needy blind and dependent children, and to supplement old age assistance fund which will come to about \$1,500,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22 (AP)—The Security Exchange commission requested New York authorities today to postpone for two weeks sentence on Richard Whitney, bankrupt former New York Stock exchange president.

The postponement was requested in order to give the commission time to complete its own investigation of the Whitney failure.

CLAIM DENIAL OF JUSTICE IN GOV'T SEIZURE

Cardenas Says Other Industries Need Not Fear Move

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22 (AP)—The Huasteca Petroleum company, the Standard Oil company of California, the Mexico - Sinclair corporation and the Penn-Mex Fuel company filed a brief today with Secretary Cordell Hull claiming a "manifest denial of justice" in Mexico and asking the support of the United States government.

At Mexico City, President Lazaro Cardenas assured the Mexican industry that the expropriation of foreign oil companies was "exceptional" and that no similar measure was in prospect against other branches of business. The Mexican treasury department took its first steps toward fixing the sum to be paid to 17 British and American oil companies for the loss of their properties. Another development of the Mexican situation was reported from Tokyo where Cardenas' action is being studied by the Japanese for the possibilities it holds for its oil import agreement with Mexico. A large number of oil operators, who are leaving Mexico with their families, reached Laredo today.

Panay Bill Presented Japanese Government

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—The state department announced today that Ambassador Grew presented Japan with a bill for the deaths, injuries, and damages caused by the bombing of the U. S. gunboat Panay and three American tankers last December. The amount involved was not disclosed, however indications were that more than a million dollars was asked.

Clark Denounces Licensing Bill

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Edward Clark, Texas secretary of state, denounced the Borah-O'Mahoney industrial licensing bill today as "unjustifiable intrusion" of federal authority into state affairs. In asserting that Texans "do not like to be regulated or controlled by anyone," Clark urged the senate judiciary subcommittee to disapprove the measure.

Carpenter Fatally Shot, Wife Wounded

SAN ANTONIO, March 22 (AP)—William Beal Gibson, 49, WPA carpenter, was wounded fatally and his estranged wife, Ruth, was wounded critically in a shooting today near the cafe in which Mrs. Gibson was employed. Justice of the Peace Oliver Wiley held that Gibson shot his wife and then himself. Gibson died two hours after the shooting occurred.

Mr. Bennett, proprietor of a recreational parlor in Eastland, died of a heart attack at the Maverick hotel in Eastland where he resided. He had lived in Eastland the past 18 months. Formerly he lived at Carbon, where he operated the Carbon Motor company. When he first came to this section he was a cable-tool oil well driller.

Surviving are his wife, one brother and three sisters.

America should profit by the "hard realism" of 1917 and equip itself with the means to secure and maintain the respect of any aggressor nation.

Would Incur Contempt "A policy of pacifism and disarmament," Squyres warned, "will do nothing but gain us the contempt of warlike powers."

At another point: "We of the Veterans of Foreign Wars know what war means. The United States for the most part has been spared the reality of war within its borders, but we who have gone

abroad know its hell and we are concerned that there be no more of it. We want to bring to the realization of the people of America just what war is, and we are concerned that they shall not repeat the mistake of 1917 when unpreparedness proved fatal to peace and costly in resources and in the lives of our citizens—lives that are more important than all the wealth and material resources we possess."

Commander Squyres was introduced by State Department Commander Arthur Dodds of Dallas who in turn was presented by State Adjutant C. E. Garretson of Abilene.

Thanks Business Men. R. H. Garrett, of the Cisco VFW

post, was toastmaster, expressing the thanks of the post for the cooperation given the veterans by the Lions and Rotary clubs, the chamber of commerce and the junior chamber of commerce in promoting the dinner. The Jaycees sponsored the broadcast.

The Harry Schaefer-Ray Judia and Ernest Hiltson orchestra played for the dinner, while the Lobo

band, directed by R. L. Maddox, played a brief concert in the Laguna lobby and later presented three numbers over the radio from the roof.

Garretson, prefaced his introduction of State Commander Dodds with a brief resume of the outstanding record which the Cisco post has made since its organization in 1936, a record which ranks

it second in the state in the point of new members received.
