SOUTHWEST TORNADOES CLAIM LIVES OF SIX Serious Troubles For Mexican Gov't Oil Industry

NO MARKET IS FOUND ABROAD, OUTPUT IS CUT

Decline of Pesos Is Adding Worry to Other Problems

MEXICO CITY, March 29 (AP)—Lack of foreign markets pressed urgent problems today upon the Mexican government's newly acquired oil industry. No sales abroad have been made since the government took over the foreign oil properties and the nation's oil tanks are filled near capacity. Production has been curtailed 65 to 75 per cent.

Another problem which the government faced today was the rapid decline of the peso, which started with the suspension of purchases of Mexican silver by the United States.

ANOTHER CENT SHAVED FROM SILVER

WASHINGTON, March 29 (AP)—The treasury shaved another cent off of its price of foreign silver today. The new price is 43 cents per ounce. The action, which many observers believe is directed against Mexico because of its expropriation of American oil properties, will make it more difficult for Mexico to sell its silver abroad.

Hike Intrastate Freight Rates

AUSTIN, March 29 (AP)—Railroads and truck lines in Texas today were allowed a 10 per cent increase in rates on less than carload freight shipments intrastate, except those to, from, or between differential territory.

Sportsmen Cross Desert To Fish

MEXICALI, Lower California, March 29 (AP)—American sportsmen are braving 130 miles of dangerous desert road—to fish.

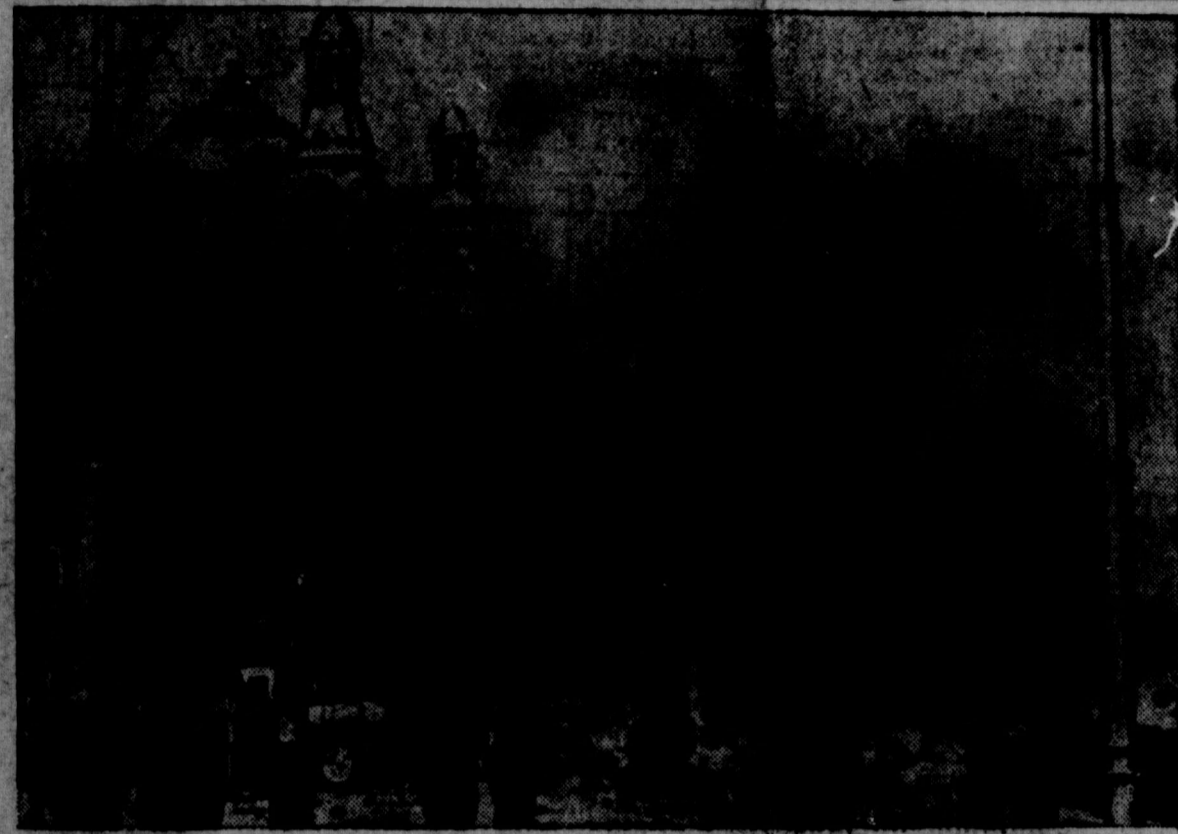

Senate Committee Approves Bill to Widen RFC Loans

WASHINGTON, March 29 (AP)—The senate finance committee approved today a bill by Senator Glass widening the scope of RFC loans to business and reviving the power that government agencies can make loans to states and municipalities.

Chairman Jess Jones told the committee that the RFC had approximately \$1,500,000,000 in "unused funds" available for all types of loans.

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HOMEMAKERS TO HAVE AREA OUTING HERE

500 High School Girls Expected at Lake Cisco Saturday

Five hundred high school girls, home economics teachers and mothers will gather at Lake Cisco next Saturday for the first area Future Homemakers outing and picnic to be held in this section of the state, it was announced today by Miss Martha Graves, head of the homemaking department of the Cisco high school and chairman of the Future Homemakers clubs of District Two in Texas.

The area, which is No. 4 of the district, embraces schools in the following towns: Baird, Moran, Albany, Putnam, Breckenridge, Strawn, Gordon, Ranger, Morton Valley, Colony, Olden, Eastland, Dublin, Carbon, Gorman, Cross Plains, Pioneer and Cisco.

Approximately 200 girls and their teachers from the schools outside Cisco are expected to be here, while Cisco will furnish probably 300, all members of the homemaking clubs which have been organized here in the new movement to promote more interest and enlistment in the program of educating housewives of the future and to encourage the ideal of self-help among the students.

The outing here will follow an area banquet at Albany Friday evening, the first for the area. Miss Dorothy King, Albany, president, will preside at that banquet and she will also preside at the area business meeting to be held in the afternoon at Lake Cisco.

Skating and other diversions will occupy the morning period at the lake, beginning at 10 o'clock. At noon there will be a basket luncheon in the parks and the afternoon period will be devoted to the business session.

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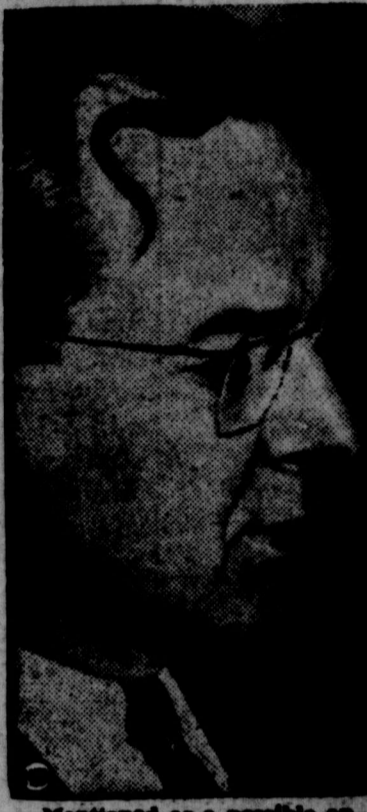
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Attorney May Get TVA Post

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FOUR DIE IN STORM TODAY IN LOUISIANA

Another at Texarkana Takes Toll of Two, Both Children

Tornadoes in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana today claimed at least six lives and thousands of dollars in damaged property. Many were injured.

The twister struck in the Turtle Lake section near Ford, Louisiana, today killing four persons and injuring six others. The dead as listed are: James Ours, 38, and his three sons.

Yesterday storms struck in the vicinity of Beaumont, Texas, Wilburton, Oklahoma, and Greenville, Mississippi, and Wadsworth, Texas.

Two children were killed when a twister struck near Wilburton, Oklahoma, today. Many streams in north Louisiana were overflowing.

The swirling storm struck from the northwest shortly after 7 p. m., accompanied by rain and electrical storms. It cleared a half-mile path, 100 feet wide. A hurried survey showed four homes damaged, power and telephone lines down.

Both victims were children. They were Billy Ray Davis, two-year-old son of Mrs. Verna Davis, and four-year-old Charles Davis.

Mrs. Davis was listed among the injured as were the persons: Barnett child, Mr. and Mrs. Barnett, and two other members of their family—a two-year-old and a 16-year-old daughter.

The storm hampered traffic and stalled many automobiles. Leonard Jackson, Wilburton, Ark., was injured when his car was blown off the road and turned.

Thirty homes were damaged and at least six persons were injured in a tornado which struck Gurdon, Arkansas, today. Damage was estimated to amount to a loss of \$20,000.

Spiritual Morbidity

PICK up almost any newspaper today and the burden of its news will be a message of blood and despair. Automobile wrecks, love tragedies, suicides, morbid stories of cremation and executions, murders, wholesale slaughter of the innocents in civilization's modern version of war from the air—these things and the variants of these things pictured, written or spoken with all the graphic

realism of which language and art are capable dominate the media through which we keep ourselves informed of what is going on in the world about us.

WE are moved to ask ourselves: What is the reason for all this? What element of appeal in this ghastly sequence of tragedy makes it interesting to the public, so interesting that it demands it as news? Crowds flock to the cremation of a girl slain in an unfulfilled suicide pact, morbidly eager to witness the tragic climax of a misdirected romance. What a tincture of fatalism in such an episode to stain the youthful mind upon which today there presses down an atmosphere of gloom and human futility. One wonders if beauty and happiness and hope are lost realities in this world, if the spiritual resources of mankind are inadequate to cope with the influences of despair, if winter has no spring, if the heart has no capacity for bloom?

NEVER in history was humanity more desperately in need of a revival of those spiritual mores and forces which build virtuous minds and sturdy character on which alone can a healthful and happy civilization be erected. If the roots of life are lifted from this nourishing soil what sustenance can there be for any fragrant bloom? We need no streamlining of government, no political and social alchemy, so much as we need a simple orientation of the individual mind that seems to have lost a sure sense of direction in a welter of events and "isms" which are the product of its own inability to appreciate real values. The bloody purges of Russia, the pogroms in Germany, the ruthless massacres in Spain reflect the futility of the spiritual content of modern nations, while at home the decreasing moral capacity of our own national character allows noxious social and economic evils to gain headway despite every effort at legal reform.

THE situation is not as hopeless as it reads. We are convinced that humanity has the capacity to right itself, that it will come to a startled sense of the need of reforming its appreciations and reestablishing its faith in clean and simple virtue. But it needs constructive and sure leadership in this, just as it must have good leadership in political and economic fields. And as yet that leadership seems to be lacking.

AN ORDINANCE PRESCRIBING AND LEVYING CERTAIN OCCUPATION TAXES OR LICENSE FEES FOR PERSONS, FIRMS, CORPORATIONS OR ASSOCIATIONS OF PERSONS AUTHORIZED BY THE STATE OF TEXAS TO ENGAGE IN THE SALE OR DISTRIBUTION OF BEER, PROHIBITING THE SALE OF BEER BY ANY DEALER WHOSE PLACE OF BUSINESS IS WITHIN 200 FEET OF ANY CHURCH, SCHOOL OR OTHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS; MAKING A VIOLATION OF PROVISIONS THEREOF A MISDEMEANOR AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, as follows:

SECTION I
That there is hereby levied and assessed and shall be collected from every person, firm, corporation or association of persons pursuing or that they pursue within the corporate limits of the City of Cisco, Texas, the business of distributing or selling beer as defined in House Bill No. 5, Article 2, Section 1, passed by the 45th Legislature, as follows:

(a) From the holder of each General Distributor's License, as defined and required by the terms of Sub-Div. (b) of Sec. 3, of Art. 2, of the above mentioned act of Legislature, domiciled in the City of Cisco and carrying on business therein under such license, an annual tax or fee of \$100.00 for such license.

(b) Branch License: From the holder of a Manufacturer's or General Distributor's License as defined and required by the terms of Sub-Div. (b) of Sec. 3, of Art. 2, of the above mentioned act of the Legislature, carrying on business in the City of Cisco, under such license, an annual tax or fee of \$25.00 for such license.

(c) From the holder of each Local Distributor's License, as defined and required by the terms of Sub-Div. (c) of Sec. 3, of Art. 2, of the above mentioned act of the Legislature, domiciled in the City of Cisco and carrying on business therein, under such license, an annual tax or fee of \$25.00 for such license.

(d) From the holder of each Retail Dealer's On-Premise License, as defined and required by the terms of Sub-Div. (d) of Sec. 3, of Art. 2, of the above mentioned act of the Legislature, domiciled in the City of Cisco and carrying on business therein, under such license, an annual tax or fee of \$12.50 for such license.

(e) From the holder of each Retail Dealer's Off-Premise License, as defined and required by the terms of Sub-Div. (e) of Sec. 3, of Art. 2, of the above mentioned act of the Legislature, domiciled in the City of Cisco, and carrying on business therein, under such license, authorizing the sale of beer by retail dealers for consumption on or off the premises where sold, an annual tax or fee of \$5.00 for such license.

SECTION II
Upon the payment of the applicable tax or fee herein prescribed to the Tax Collector and the exhibition to him of a license duly issued by the State of Texas to the applicant or person paying such tax or fee, the Tax Collector shall in the name of the City of Cisco issue and deliver to such applicant or person a license to engage in the business in the City of Cisco of the character described in and authorized by the license from the State of Texas held by such applicant or person, and the license so issued in the name of the City of Cisco, Texas, shall authorize the conduct of such business upon the premises described in the license from the State of Texas and shall remain in force only so long as such license from the State of Texas remains in force.

SECTION III
Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to pay any tax or fee prescribed in Section I hereof and secure a license before engaging in any business for which the payment of any such fee and the securing of any such license is required by the terms of this Ordinance, or who shall engage in any such business without holding an unrevoked or unexpired license from the City of Cisco, authorizing the same, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine in any amount not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

SECTION IV
It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to distribute or sell beer as defined in Sec. 1, of Art. 2, of the above mentioned act of the Legislature, at a place of business located within three hundred feet of any church, school or other educational institution, the measurements to be along the property lines of the street fronts, and from front door to front door, and in a direct line across street intersections where they occur. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this Section shall be fined not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

SECTION V
All Ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION VI
The fact that the sale and distribution of beer containing not more than four per cent of alcohol by weight has become lawful in the City of Cisco, and the fact that there are no ordinances of said city regulating such distribution and sale, and providing for license fees, creates an emergency requiring suspension of the rule providing for the reading of ordinances at two several meetings of the City Commission; said rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

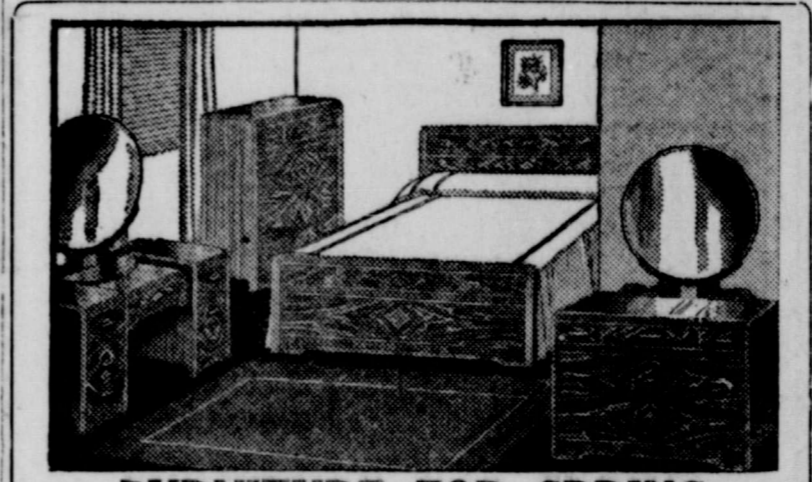
prevention, garbage and trash disposal, thorough spring housecleaning for city and home will be encouraged.

Mountaineer Miller Is Unique Gemcutter

HAWK, N. C. (AP)—Roby Buchanan, mountaineer miller, kept finding glistening pieces of semi-precious stones — garnet, amethyst and others—in creek beds and elsewhere near his mill.

Nobody seemed to value the uncut gems enough to buy them and they were of no use as jewelry in the rough. Others might have let it go at that but this mountaineer did not.

He rigged up a home-made apparatus to cut and polish the

stones getting his power from a belt to the overshot waterwheel of his mill. Now, he has what may be the only waterpower gem-cutting shop in America.

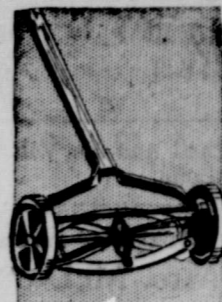
