Judge Graves' eligibility was challenged in connection with motions for the rehearing of two minor criminal cases from Ellis county. Attorneys for the appellants contended that Graves was ineligible because when he was appointed, he was a member of the legislature which raised the salaries of the judges. ## **COURT DEBARS BANK IN DEAL** FOR RAILROAD

Restrained From Use of Stock to Acquire Van Sweringen Rails

NEW YORK, March 30 (A) -The Guaranty Trust company, third largest bank in the United States, today was restrained by a federal court injunction from exercising stock voting rights which would give it virtual control of the Van Sweringen rail empire.

The temporary injunction, returnable Friday, was issued on the allegation of Robert Young, 41-year old Texas and Cleveland financier, that his control of the Van Sweringen roads was menaced by the combined Morgan hanking interests and by prom-

inent General Motors officials. Young, who last year with comparatively small cash outlay got con rol of the rail properties. filed the equity petition.

## FLEEING TRIO **LEAVE GAR AND LOOT IN CRASH**

#### Man and Woman Badly Injured in Brownwood Collision

Equipped with definite clues, officers of Cisco and central west Texas today were on the lookout for a trio of men who last night cut their way into the Norvell and Miller grocery company here, burglarized the store of an estimated \$200 in igarettes, cigars and tobacco and then climaxed their criminal foray n an automobile collision near Brownwood in which two persons, man and a woman, were serious\_

The thieves abandoned their vrecked machine with its loot on he spot and made their get-away during the excitement.

The burglars carried out their obbery here swiftly and boldly according to a plan based on an evident prior examination of the ear of the store. The rear door was secured by a heavy bar placed porizontally in brackets. Enrance was obtained by cutting out a panel of the door opposite this bar and lifting it from the

#### Cigarettes and Cigars Taken

Two cases of cigarets, valued at \$150, and 25 boxes of cigars and sundry tins of smoking tobacco were removed. There were no nces of a search for the sired mrchandise, the burglars apparently having gone directly to the stock which they wished to steal. They appeared not to have gone to the front of the store, where a light was burning.

W. R. Miller, manager of the company, said that the cash registers, always left open, had not been touched and a small amount of money left in the drawers was not taken. He estimated the value of merchandise taken at \$200. It was recovered by the Brownwood sheriff who investigated the auto-

#### Remove the Mystery

FDUCATORS are learning that the best way

to squelch "red scares" in the schools, such as the recent University of Kansas incident that had the legislature in the throes of a bitter, week-long debate, is to teach the students what communism, fascism, nazism and other "isms" are, and to what degree they have succeeded and failed where they

Remove the mystery and consequent glamor from these "isms"-and from any other subject, for that matter-and youthful curiosity is no longer piqued. The president of a large mid-western university said recently that a secret campus communist society had dwindled and disbanded when instructors took the mask off communism and explained it realistically in the light of its failure as a governmental theory.

It is natural for children to express an active curiosity in what is suppressed by their class-room teachers. Make them learn : bout the "isms" in relation to our own government, just as they learn their lessons in mathematics and English, and the glamor is gone. More over, the student is thus taught to think out for himself. And any student who thinks intelligently about government, will automatically discard the "isms" of the world.

The love of liberty is born in every American child. It is obvious that there is more personal liberty under the American form of government than anywhere on the face of the earth. There is little or no liberty under communism and the dictatorship. Let the student know that. Let him know that the low. 

Irmgard Keun's "After Mid-

ight" is in the latter class. It is short book, misnamed a nove by its author or its publisher. It is supposed to be the story of German life as it is lived today, written not from the Jewish position, but from the viewpoint of a sensitive "Aryan." It actually is a gently venomous attack, and although the attack may be justified (we have not been in Germany since 1930 and have no means of !

direct judgment) it vitiates the 'novel" and spoils the effect. The narrator is a German girl chosen (perhaps by design) be cause, although she has miments of sensitivity, she really is pretty dull. She is impressed, ostensibly, by such things as shiny motor cars and the clothes of movie actresses She has an Aryan friend who is in love with a half-Jew, and the friend has a curious and quite dangerous complex-she insists on

baiting all her nazi friends. These also are made uniformly dull. The entire scene is reported on basis of trivality.
