ILLINOIS IS **HARDEST HIT** BY TWISTERS

250 Injured; Damage Will Exceed Million Dollar Mark

By Associated Press

Five tornado-stricken midwestern states today counted 32 persons killed and nearly 250 injured. Unofficial estimates of the

damage passed the million dollar mark. Hundreds are home-Storms, laden with hail, struck

hardest in central Illinois, where at least 12 persons were killed. The next hardest hit state was southeastern Kansas, where sever Pekin, Rushville, and Astoria

were the Illinois towns hit, and Columbus, Kansas, bore the prunt of the kansas-Oklahoma-Arkansas-Missouri storm. All of the seven Kansans known to be dead were killed there. Six died in Missouri.

In Arkansas, four were killed in Heber Springs, two at Walnut Ridge and one at Conway. Illinois' 12 deaths occurred in and

The storms first tore at the tritate corner of Kansas, Okianoma and Missouri, dipped into northern Arkansas then wnipped up the iiiinois river valley of central III-

The first storm raced across the west end of Columbus, wrecking at least 50 buildings, and tearing open the Highland grade school, housing more than 100 children. The pupils were rescued without fatalities at the school despite the collapse of its roof.

Hailstorm The twister was accompanied by severe hailstorm and high winds oared along the path of the torado. Three inches of rain fell in ed. Trees and sidewalks were rippd out and communication lines



New U. S.-Canadian Link of Concrete and Steel





Cementing still more firmly traditional Canadian-American peace, workmen are hurrying to complete the \$2,000,000 Thousand Islands bridge spanning the St. Lawrence river between New York state and Ontario province. As graphically depicted in the artist's skeich above, the project consists of five separate bridge spans, linked by strips of highway and connecting Collins Landing on the American side

with Ivy Lea on the Canadian shore. The span shown at extreme left is a suspension bridge across the American channel to Welleslty Island. Actually linking the U.S. and Canada is the 90-foot arch over the International Rapids between Wellesley and Hill Islands. Three smaller arch and suspension bridges connect Georgiana Island, Constance Island and the Cana-



dian mainland. The map at lower right shows highways leading to the project from large cities in each country. At left, below, Commissioner F. J. Martin and Secretary W. G. 5 Killed in Earlier Crash During Naval

Maneuvers

6 MEN ABOARD

HONOLULU, March 31 (A) The navy sent 240 planes into the air and dispatched surface vessels to northwest of Oahu island today in a search for the six blue jacket fliers who vanished last night aboard a

combing plane. Disappearance of the plane occurred only live nours after another bomber crashed at sea with a loss of five men.

The first snip, a long range bombing plane, crashed outing a great mock battle for the count of Hawaii.

In a neavy rain squall, the big twin-engined fighter crasned out Waianae, on the northwest side of Oahu, principal island of the Hawanan group.

Witnesses said the plane struck at tremendous speed. Seven men were aboard. Three of them anparently succeeded in climbing out on a wing of the partially suo-

One of those, radioman G. J. Milles, of Wilmette, Ill., swam 150 yards to shore. H. F. Bartz, aviation machinist's mate of Houston, was washed ashore unconscious

and taken to a hospital. Aviation Chief Machinist's Mate G. H. O'Neil of Trumbull, Texas, the third man to reach the wing,

apparently perished. The other four presumably were rapped in the cabin and were beieved to have drowned. They were Lieut. L. O. Crane of Nashville, Tenn.; Aviation Cadet W. H. Lear; Navigation Pilot B. I. Windham and Radioman V. A. Luciana, who has relatives in Baltimore.




