### PLAINS AREA FIGHTS WORST SPRING STORM

Traffic Paralyzed, Livestock and Crops Are Killed

The snow-bound panhandle and the south plains sectors grappled today with the worst spring blizzard in 25 years. Drifts piled 20 feet high in places, paralyzing traffic, killing livestock and crops, and endangering trapped motorists. School buses and motorists were stranded on impassable highways, and trains were stalled miles from station stops. Sheared sheep and spring lambs died by hundreds. The ruined fruit lay on the ground. Wheat belt faced partial ruin. Snow still swirled and gale-like winds lashed the countryside. No casualties were reported, but fear was felt for scores of stranded motorists.

A school bus stranded near Pampa since yesterday had not been reached. School officials were confident that seven children which were aboard had reached nearby homes. Caterpillar tractors sought to reach the bus. A coast guard plane left El Paso to search the panhandle for stranded persons.

"It means disaster, not only to a million and third acres of wheat half-ruined, but to many trees, I'm afraid," said Don Jones, superintendent of Texas experiment substitution at Lubbock.

Snow drifted into north Texas, peppering Dallas, Corsicana, and Waco.

The Rio Grande valley feared no killing freeze, however. A howling blizzard swept eastward across Oklahoma.

More than a hundred stranded motorists found safety by plowing through snow afoot to nearby towns or houses between Childress and Carey.

Thirteen deaths in a Georgia flood raised to 23 the death toll of storms gripping a broad section of the nation for the third successive day.

McWhorter of this city, who died while publisher of the Edinburg Valley Review and whose record of citizenship was taken as a model in the exemplification of those traits and characteristics which make for leadership in community affairs.

The award was presented Mrs. McAskill at a dinner and reception Thursday evening, March 31, at Edinburg.

### Britain Seeks Oil Return in Mexico

LONDON, April 8 (AP)—London announced today that Britain had informed Mexico that she considers the expropriation of foreign oil companies "inherently unjustified," and requested the restoration of the British-owned company, Aguila, owned by Royal Dutch Shell, which was the largest of the companies taken over.

Informed persons said that Britain was considering possible steps to enforce its stand, but declined any further comment.

DETROIT, April 8 (AP)—The strike that tied up street car service here, ended at noon today when members ratified a settlement agreement.

### FD SAYS WORK RELIEF MUST BE INCREASED

No Decision Reached on New Public Works Program

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt told the press conference today that his billion dollar estimate for work relief for the next fiscal year would have to be increased. He mentioned no definite figure. The president said in relation to the new public works program now under discussion, that no decision had been reached.

Roosevelt discussed relief shortly after Harry Hopkins, WPA administrator, urged congress to provide a "permanent security program" based on work, instead of on direct relief.

Informed persons said that a program to provide \$4,500,000,000 for loans and direct expenditures to combat the recession was in the making.

**Cited Indications**  
They cited these indications of the form to be taken by the administration's new effort to "prime the business pump" and aid the jobless:

1.—A high administration authority said the president contemplated asking congress to approve a \$1,500,000,000 program of public works loans to cities, states and other political sub-divisions. The loans would bear no interest.

2.—Chairman Glass (D-Va.), of the senate appropriations committee, predicted the administration would ask congress to appropriate between \$1,250,000,000 and \$1,500,000,000 "as a starter" toward meeting next year's relief needs.

3.—The administration's bill to authorize the Reconstruction Finance corporation to make \$1,500,000,000 of long-term industrial and public works loans was at the end of its journey through congress. Senator Glass agreed to change the house made in the senate version of this measure, and this indicated to many observers that the bill would be sent to the White House speedily.

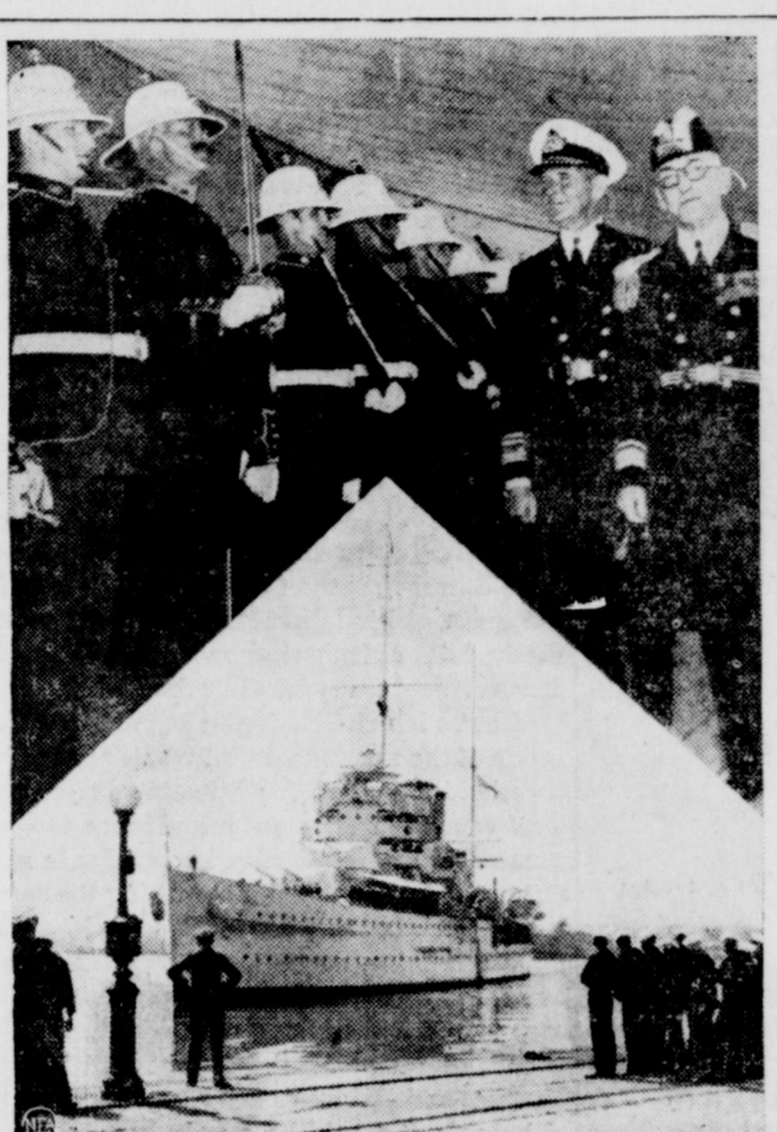
**Public Works Loans**  
Interest centered on the proposal for non-interest bearing public works loans to cities and states, which would be required to repay them in 50 years at the rate of 2 per cent a year.

Officials said expenditures under this program could be started soon and could furnish badly needed demand for the products of the lagging heavy industries, such as steel.

Authorities said the president had in mind for PWA financing a vast number of "projects of permanent usefulness" which he hoped would flush heavy industry with big orders and long payrolls by mid-July. They said that, in addition to the usual type of public works, he favored flood control projects and the construction of multiple dwelling and large modern apartments.

**Probers Discard Worthless Clues in Frome Case**  
EL PASO, April 8 (AP)—Discarding a welter of worthless findings, authorities today stated that they would start anew in their investigation of the baffling slayings of Mrs. Weston Frome and daughter in the desert sand east of here last week. "We are going back to the beginning and start from where we were when the bodies were found," said Sheriff Fox.

### Blum Quits as Senate Rejects Dictator Bill

**Troops Held in Readiness as Strikes and Demonstrations Flare in Streets of Paris During Vote on Measure**  
PARIS, April 8 (AP)—Premier Leon Blum today formally announced the resignation of his government, after the senate voted down his bill for placing of dictatorial powers over the French finance in his hands. Blum's resignation had been anticipated.

The highly controversial measure, narrowly approved yesterday by the chamber of deputies faced a hopeless prospect in the senate as the political atmosphere of Paris was tense with the threat of violence and the readiness of troops called out to defend the senate if necessary during the crucial vote. The soldiers were ordered out by the secretariat of the senate under constitutional rights conferred on its president.

Rioting flared in the streets. Communists, anarchists and socialists battled police and mobile guards in a vain effort to march on Luxembourg palace, the senate building.

The fighting, in which several policemen and demonstrators were injured, following summary rejection of Blum's bill by the senate finance committee which voted 26 to 6 against the measure to give Blum the right to decree all measures "judged indispensable to meet the necessities of national defense, protect the holdings of the bank of France and rehabilitate the nation's finances and economies."

**Statement By Refugee Scored**  
NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—The friends of the Abraham Lincoln brigade issued a statement Thursday denouncing John G. Honeycombe, who reported in Perpignan, France, the virtual destruction of the Washington and Lincoln brigades, composed of Americans fighting with the Spanish government forces.

The statement, attributed to Captain Carl Bradley, executive secretary of the veterans of the Abraham Lincoln brigade, read: "Honeycombe was never a political commissar, as he claimed, nor was he present when the Lincoln and Washington battalions were merged. Honeycombe x x x left Spain without permission of the officers of the Lincoln brigade."

**WARD SALES OFF**  
CHICAGO, April 8 (AP)—Montgomery Ward & Co., Inc., mail order and retail company, reported a decrease of 11.84 per cent in its gross sales for March, compared with the same month last year. Totals for the two months were \$30,796,876 and \$34,931,168.

### TEMPERATURE RISING HERE; IS 32 AT NOON

Some Hope Is Seen for Survival of Part of Crops

Rising temperatures this afternoon gave promise of relief from the worst spring blizzard in a quarter of a century after two days of sustained high winds which swept a blanket of moist snow and sleet over the countryside.

In the presence of this moisture and the heavily clouded skies many found hope for the survival of at least a portion of the well-advanced fruit and field crops, endangered by temperatures which dropped to 24 during the worst part of the storm. While the loss undoubtedly will be heavy, there were still numbers who predicted that a good share of the excellent fruit and grain prospects that had existed would mature. Specimens of pears, apricots and plums brought to the Daily Press office this afternoon which showed a little or no effect of the cold.

**Material Damage**  
Complete destruction of the crop was reported from other areas, however, and it is certain that whatever of the crop does mature will be materially reduced from the yield that would have been realized had the cold wave not materialized.

Farmers were frankly pessimistic concerning the wheat crop, most of which had progressed to such a stage that it would be easily affected by low temperature. Cattle and sheep suffered extremely. The freeze took heavy toll of garden vegetables. The effect on ornamental shrubbery and young tree shoots is yet to be realized.

Fair skies and rising temperatures are in prospect for tomorrow. Temperatures recorded at the Cisco Gas Corp offices today showed a low of 24 degrees this morning. By noon this had risen to 32 degrees and at 1:30 the reading was 33.

The strong wind, which blew almost without interruption for two days, increased the discomfort of the cold to a great degree.

ready received all weekly benefits for which they qualify. At present, the number of applicants being paid in full are nearly equaling the number of new applicants.

Despite the one and one-half million withdrawn, the trust fund has steadily increased during the past three months. It stood at \$19,463,744.84 on January 1 when benefit payments became payable. Today it stands at \$23,213,877.81, an increase of \$3,900,132.97, notwithstanding the money withdrawn for the checking account.

This large increase is due because many employers who were delinquent in their state taxes paid in full during January to receive the 90 per cent credit allowed on the federal taxes.

Under the terms of the Federal Social Security act, this money would go to the United States, instead of Texas, if Texas had no Unemployment Compensation act. Since there is a state act, the federal government collects one-third of that the state collects, and pays all administrative expenses of the state act. The state-collected taxes go into the Texas jobless fund in Washington and can be paid only to unemployed Texans who qualify under the Act.

### Showing Found In Lee Passed Up After Shot

RISING STAR, April 3 (Spe.)—A mild flurry was caused here late the past week when a nice showing of oil in the Caddo lime was struck at 2520 in the C. R. Cox Lee estate No. 2 three miles southeast of Rising Star. Drilling was continued to 2615—a saturation of 95 feet. The hole was plugged back to 50 feet and on Monday was given a shot with a time bomb which was followed by a head lasting several minutes.

Bish Tyson, head driller on the well, said Thursday that the shot had brought in quite a quantity of water and that no further effort would be made to produce the well in the Caddo. Drilling was going forward at about 40 feet off the bottom of the hole, but very little progress was being made, according to Mr. Tyson, on account of the sloughing of the

shot hole. There was about a thousand feet of fluid in the hole, Mr. Tyson said.

The well has caused considerable speculation on account of the thickness of the Caddo lime, which had not been gone through when drilling was stopped for the shot. Other wells, including the No. 1 Lee, only about a quarter of a mile away only had some 20 feet of Caddo lime, according to reports of drillers.

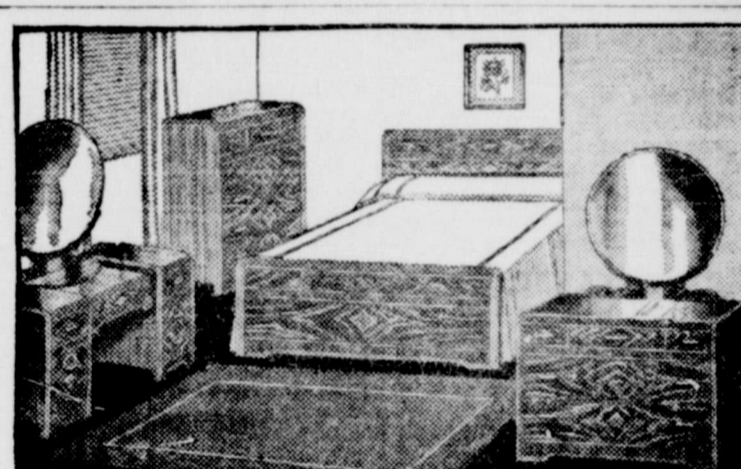

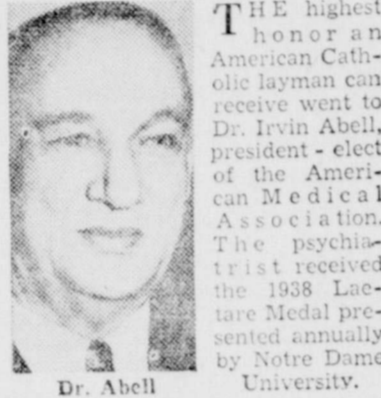

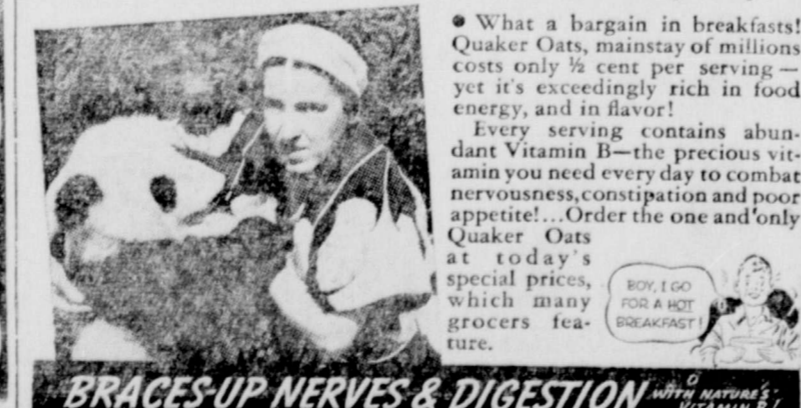

### ETIQUETTE If You Have to Apologize Better Do It With a Smile

Apologizing pays—if you know how to go about it. "When you've made a mistake," says John C. Burg, who's in charge of complaints for a large chain of hotels, "rectify it at once. Otherwise, the slight bruise may grow into a very sore spot."

Effective apologies have four essentials, according to Mr. Burg. Promptness and brevity, some action to demonstrate your willingness to make up for the damage done. Those are three. The fourth, and perhaps the most important, says Mr. Burg, is a pleasant, but positive approach throughout the procedure.

Flabbiness in the apologist, he says, reflects insincerity of an inferiority complex that is as embarrassing to both parties.

Settings make a difference in the handling of apologies. In a formal dining-room, for instance, it's out of place to do anything besides make a prompt, formal apology. In an informal gathering joking may be an effective means of passing it off—providing the recipient of the apology understands the sincerity behind it.

Apologies, of course, play their part in business as well as in social life. The business man's jinx, says Mr. Burg, is the perennial grouch. There are two kinds of these.

The first is the grouch who "sharpen[s] his statement to thrust it home." Often he is trying, in his blundering way, to help you. If you treat him with good humor you'll make a permanent customer—or friend—of him.

The second is the one who naturally likes to be offensive. No amount of arguing can change him. If you treat him good humoredly—without being flippant—he will get less satisfaction out of his complaining—and he might even stop it.
