been discovered accidentally. It consists of an injection into one of the outer linings of the spine and results in reducing the blood pressure sometimes for relatively long periods of time. The treatment may be administered in the home and is said to be simple. Often it will result in saving a patient's life by staving off an attack and permitting treat-

ment for more permanent results. It is interesting also to note that use of the venom of the deadly cobra snake is being tried with results that in time may lead to the employment of this poisonous substance in reducing blood pressure. Another instance of a bad thing being turned to good use.

APOPLEXY, which kills almost without warning, is one of the principal causes of death. Heart trouble, which is associated with it in the minds of the laity and may have some definite connection with it, ranks ahead of apoplexy as do cancer, pneumonia and kidney trouble. Medical science in its long and

patient battle against human ills has conquered one by one other scourges which took a greater toll, such as smallpox, typhoid and other virulent fevers, and diseases which are caused by germs. Isolating the causes, it has developed anti-toxins which successfully counteract or destroy those causes.

THE record of this persistent warfare contains many instances of the supreme heroism and the sacrifices of unsung warriors against death. Many have given their lives in a superb, calm courage so different and so much greater than gallantry in excitement on a battlefield. The spy who goes among hostile armies in search of military secrets is not more courageous than the scientist, sitting in the quiet of his laboratory and sticking a needle full of virulent germs into his veins to discover the reason for their deadliness. Mankind owes his civilization to such heroism. It is one of the assurances that whatever the future holds in store for humanity, it can at least count upon a constant advance toward greater and more effective knowledge in subduing the foes of life and in making the earth


