LONE STAR TO DRILL 2 MORE WELLS NORTH

Offset to Thomas and Test on McKee Said to Be Planned

Expanding operations in the deep oil area northwest of Cisco Saturday, according to unconfirmed reports received by the Cisco Daily Press, had produced two new developments.

These were locations said to have been made by the Lone Star Gas company, one on the Cozart tract offsetting the same company's Marshal Thomas to the north, and the other on the McKee tract, 660 feet from the northwest corner of Section 41 in southwest Stephens county.

The Cozart will be drilled between two Ellenberger producers owned by the Lone Star, one the Cozart, a gas well deepened to ordination and completed for a reported potential of 288 barrels daily and the other the Thomas, completed for about 1,000 barrels well. The Thomas is a west offset to the Heckok company's Van Parmer well.

The McKee well, if reports are true, will be drilled in territory where already the company has brought in several Caddo lime producers of major proportions.

Lions Largest Easter Egg Hunt This Afternoon

Britain and Italy Sign Pact to End Long Period of Differences

Accord Is New Step Toward Europe Peace

ROME, April 16 (AP)—Italy and Britain Saturday signed the East-entide pact which is to end nearly three years of dangerous differences and to bring Europe peace. The principal provisions were to bring recognition to the Italian conquest of Ethiopia, to affect withdrawal of Italian troops from Spain, and to recognize and protect each other's rights in the Mediterranean.

The accord, previously approved by Prime Minister Chamberlain and Premier Mussolini, needed only the signatures of Il Duce's foreign minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano, and Britain's ambassador, the Earl of Perth, to put a formal end to tension which in the last three years had brought the two powers to the verge of war.

France was expected soon to follow Britain's reappraisal lead, the better to deal with a powerful Adolf Hitler at the other end of the Rome-Berlin Fascist axis.

Italy's press carefully pointed out, however, that renewed British friendship in nowise replaced collaboration with Germany.

"Omnibus" Bill on Relief Planned

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—Congressional leaders, seeking quick action, considered Saturday the drafting of an "omnibus bill" to carry through congress President Roosevelt's main relief, and public works recommendations for spending to end the recession; Chairman Taylor, Colorado, of the house appropriations committee, indicated that this plan might be followed when he announced that hearings would start Wednesday. The largest item in the bill will be the proposed \$1,250,000,000 for relief for the first seven months of the fiscal year beginning July 1.

What other items will be included was under study. It was expected, however, to contain an allotment of \$450,000,000 for public works grants to cities and states and whatever additional appropriations and authorizations may be necessary to provide for works loans.

Informed members said it was virtually certain the housing authority would need additional powers to carry out the proposed new \$300,000,000 slum clearance program. Whether this should be included in the omnibus bill or handled separately was undecided.

OBSERVANCE TO BEGIN AT SCENIC POINT

Large Attendances Registered at Week-day Events

Churches and religious and civic organizations of Cisco generally are observing Easter this year with special services almost without parallel. Pre-Easter services have dominated the calendars of Cisco churches during the week, and the large numbers attending these worship periods have manifested the reverence with which the event, traditionally one of the most important in the religious year, is regarded in the minds and hearts of the people.

All of these services will have their culminations in special religious celebrations to be presented by the various denominations. Outstanding on the Easter program for the county is the mass sunrise service to be held at Scenic Point, eight miles east of Ranger, when between 500 and 1,000 people are expected to greet the sunrise from the beautiful eastward slope in union worship. The services will begin at 6 o'clock.

The pastors, cities and churches of Eastland county and surrounding districts are cooperating in the efforts to make this service a memorable and lasting observance. Rev. M. H. Applewhite, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Cisco will give the Easter address. Masonic Service

The Presbyterian church will have a special Knights Templar Easter program at the morning hour. This service is open to the public. At 7 o'clock tonight, the First Presbyterians will repeat their Easter cantata.

The First Methodist church, in its morning observance, will have an Easter program which will feature the baptism of babies and the welcoming of young people into the church. At the evening service, the Wesleyan class will present the Easter pageant, "Easter Garden."

At the First Christian church, the Sunday services will give purpose to the pre-Easter services which have been held during the past week.

Sunday evening services will end the two-weeks revival of the First Baptist church. The sermon topic for the morning Easter service will be "Four Gardens." The evening sermon will be "The Unpardonable Sin." Sunday school attendance drive has brought pleasing results. Attendance last Sunday was 417. Today the objective of the drive is to be sought—an attendance record of 500.

The Church of Christ will end its two-weeks revival with its Sunday night service.

Other churches of Cisco will observe Easter Sunday by presenting special, devotional programs. At about 3:30 o'clock this afternoon the annual Cisco Lions club Easter egg hunt will begin. The hunt will take place at the Lake Cisco-Lions parks.

Dothan Farmers Begin War on Grasshoppers

With the assistance of the county and federal government, farmers in the northwest part of Eastland county, particularly around Dothan, in the next two weeks will begin a war against grasshoppers.

That the northwest part of Eastland county, particularly around Dothan, is the most likely place for a heavy infestation of grasshoppers was determined this week in a survey by County Agent Elmo V. Cook and Charles A. Gable of Abilene, in charge of federal grasshopper control in this section.

It is estimated that of 16,000 acres in that area, 4,000 are in cultivation and will likely be the scene of "hopper" operations.

The winged jumbo and flying yellow abdomen are the two types of grasshoppers expected in the northwest part of the county.

The commissioners' court has

given approval to stand for a reasonable expense in the fight against the grasshoppers. The court appointed Agent Cook, R. R. Bradshaw of Scranton, J. D. Guy of Carbon and E. E. Traffic Tickets Are Colorful in Evanston

EVANSTON, Ill., April 16 (AP)—Evanston police have adopted green, blue and red traffic tickets and compulsory schooling for motor vehicle law violators.

Green tickets are used for violations where the owners are not present, such as parking overtime, in restricted areas or without lights.

Blue tickets are given to motorists as warnings in minor violations. Records are kept; when a motorist has accumulated three blue one she is summoned for consultation.

If a motorist was at fault on each of three "blue" violations he is requested to attend a traffic school. Refusal brings prosecution on the last charge made against him.

Red tickets are warnings to out-of-state motorists who violate Evanston traffic laws.

Saginaw Takes Action

AT SAGNAW, MICH., members of a business club have started a "Buy Something You Need Today" campaign in the hope of setting in motion a movement that, gaining national scope, will do much to end the depression. The movement reminds of the early days of the World war when the "Buy a Bale of Cotton" clubs were organized and every person who was able was urged to buy one or more bales of cotton to help meet the plight of the cotton farmer whose markets had suddenly been disrupted.

Whether or not the movement adopted by the club meets with one's personal favor, the fact that the Saginaw business men recognize a need and are cooperatively planning to meet it is of significance. It is clear that this is a buyer's market. Prices probably will not be as cheap again in a long while and the folks who have money tucked away in savings accounts can well afford to put some of those idle funds to work in purchasing what they need.

But the point to be brought out here is the fact that the Saginaw business men have an institution through which they can both express themselves and secure the cooperation of the various commercial, industrial and professional elements in attacking problems of common concern. Saginaw is not the only community which such an institution and wherever these exist more effective community endeavor is evident. Cisco needs such an institution.

It Works Two Ways

OPINION conflicts on the wisdom of the administration's latest pump-priming experiment. Obviously there is a great deal less enthusiasm over the country generally for the program. It is useless to argue against the new program, for as surely as sin it is going through. The reasons are largely political, because few members of congress are going to dare raise their voices against the measure. The most sensible attitude, we think, in which to view the program is that suggested by Mr. Roosevelt in his address. In pursuing the essential course of national cooperation which he asked in attacking the business depression, we should be prepared to yield our doubts as to the wisdom of the relief program, to concede its certainty. BUT, it is just as incumbent on the administration to follow the same course of cooperation and conciliation and to avoid the costly mistake which was made in earlier programs. We are constrained to believe that the first great relief project would have been a success had the new deal leadership accompanied it with measures which, instead of discouraging business, had encouraged it to move forward confidently and aggressively and take up the burden.

they came to Texas by train—Cisco was their destination. One of his first impressions of Cisco was the old wood-frame station, with the huge timber beam jammed through the roof. The diabolic power of the cyclone, which struck

Cisco on the night of April 21, 1893, thrust the beam into the roof of the building. Mr. Purdue can recollect that members of his church at Mount Olive took up collections for the storm-stricken people of the Cisco area.

Mr. Purdue settled near Atwell, and in two years he bought a place near Nimrod. He lived on this farm until about ten years ago, when he and his wife moved to Cisco. He still owns the place. And he said that its creek, its wild plum trees, its fertile soil, its "sweet" water well, and its old house would always be home to him and Mrs. Purdue.

Three New Wells Scheduled For Shackelford Area

ALBANY, April 16 (Sp.)—Three new drilling operations are scheduled for western Shackelford in the Merrick Davis ranch area, with Jones & Stasney No. 1, Merrick Davis starting operations this week for a Bluff Creek-Cook test, 220 feet out of northwest corner Section 29, Block 13, T&P.

J. F. Baker No. 3, Davis, is drilling in center south of northwest quarter Section 30, Block 13, T&P, seeking to extend his producing area east, after completion of a 43 barrel producer in Bluff Creek sand 1576-1594 feet in No. 2 well on the same lease.

J. F. Baker has contracted for a Bluff Creek-Cook sand test in southwest quarter Section 19, Block 13, T&P, on the Merrick Davis west ranch to start within 30 days. This location is a short distance southwest of St. Marys Oil & Gas and Grisham-Hunter Corp. production.

Charter Oil & Gas Co. No. 2, A. J. Swenson failed to catch Bluff Creek sand in east 160 acres of E. Williams survey 2 in area east of Leuders.

Healey & Walter No. 2, W. P. Newell, is drilling at 400 feet in a wildcat area southwest of Cook pool, on location southwest corner of north half of northeast quarter Section 4, Block 12, T&P.

In the Albany vicinity, Poly Oil Corp. No. 13 Florence & Delia Spears is chalking up as a 30 barrel well in the 615 foot Tannehill sand, in center north half of the southwest quarter Section 1, B. A. L.

Three miles northeast of Albany Neff-Meeks & Phillips No. 2, Claussel heirs created considerable excitement with a 48 barrel well in Hope lime at 770 to 784 feet, which responded nicely to a 1,000 gallon acid shot, and after being cleaned the well was pumping 2 barrels hourly.

Located in the center south 80 acres TE&L Survey 587, the new well opens a nice area for the deeper production, with several wells drilled the past ten years that have failed to test this horizon.

J. L. McMurray Heirs No. 5, J. A. Matthews was a failure in center northeast quarter Section 57, ET Ry., and was plugged at 1,050 feet.

Roeser & Pendleton, Inc.-Continental Oil Co., No. A-99, in the northwest quarter Section 60, ET Ry., of the Cook pool, was dry in Straw sand at 3,150 feet in test drilled for gas reserve supply for the Cook field repressuring and recycling and absorption plant uses.
