SENATE GROUP RECOMMENDS TAX REVISION

Would Be "Exceedingly Helpful," Committee Says

WASHINGTON, April 20(AP) -The senate unemployment committee reported today that enactment of the senate-approved corporation income and capital gains taxes would be "exceedingly helpful" in making jobs for the nation's 12,000,000 unemployed.

The committee reported that the elief expenditure for 1933-1937 ggregated \$9,300,000,000.

These taxes, imposing flat rates on corporation income and capital gains, have been approved by business and condemned by the administration.


