WITTMER SHUT DOWN SHOWING FOR OIL Farley "Interferes" In Pennsylvania State Race

DEMOCRATS ON BOTH SIDES IN UPROAR

New Emphasis Placed
On Role of Labor
Leader, Lewis

PHILADELPHIA, May 17 (AP)—Heavy balloting developed today as Pennsylvanians voted in the primary that capped bitter battles for party control and marked a major test of power for John L. Lewis and his CIO.

In Philadelphia some charges of fraud were heard. Elsewhere verbal squabbles were reported in scattered precincts.

John Kelly, Philadelphia democratic chairman, said that national chairman James Farley's endorsement of two candidates "isn't having any effect in Philadelphia."

The democratic party's high command stepped into Pennsylvania's New Deal factional war Monday in an election-eve move for harmony.

From both sides came retorts of "interference."

National Chairman James A. Farley, fearful that wounds of the slashing campaign would hurt the party's chances in the November general election, proposed a fusion slate of one major candidate from each faction.

One upshot was new emphasis upon the role of Labor Leader John L. Lewis, whose political power receives a test in today's primary balloting.

Farley made his plea in a statement from New York.

The "only solution," he said, is to nominate CIO-backed Thomas Kennedy for governor and Gov. George H. Earl for senator. They lead opposing slates.

Farley's proposal, in effect, was to sacrifice Philadelphia's Mayor S. Davis Wilson, running for the senate nomination on Kennedy's slate, and Charles Alvin Jones, Pittsburgh lawyer, candidate for the gubernatorial nomination with Earl.

Earle quickly condemned Farley's interference and reaffirmed support of his ticket mate, Jones, and fired a blast at CIO Chief Earl Lewis who, with Senator Joseph P. Guffey, is backing the Kennedy-Wilson line-up. Wilson asserted Farley's statement would be "resented." He cried "double cross."

Former Cisco Man Manager of Temple C. of C.

NEW BRAUNFELS, May 17 (Spec.)—E. H. Whitehead, former Cisco man, has relinquished his post as manager of the chamber of commerce here, and will assume his duties as manager of the Temple chamber of commerce this week. He has served in New Braunfels since February, 1936.

Whitehead was a high school teacher, and later in chamber of commerce work in Cisco some years ago. He left Cisco to become publicity manager of the West Texas chamber of commerce and later served as assistant manager of the South Texas chamber. He came here from Dallas, where he was in charge of the north Texas office of the Texas State Manufacturers association.

Mr. Whitehead had signal success in his undertakings in New Braunfels, and it was with great reluctance that the local board accepted his resignation. The post at Temple came to him unsolicited following a visit here by the committee from the Temple chamber.

Whitehead put over an east-west highway through New Braunfels, a project upon which this city had worked more than forty years without success. His work also has made New Braunfels a popular resort and convention city.

Seven state and district conventions were located here this year. Landa Park, closed when he came here, was purchased by the city and made into a municipal park, and more than \$175,000 has been spent on this project by the WPA and city. He also did effective work in trade promotion, his last project here being a Merchants & Manufacturers exposition which closed Saturday. A "Treasure Hunt" put on by retail merchants opening last Christmas shopping season brought the largest crowd ever to assemble in downtown New Braunfels.

Local civic organizations presented him with a scroll upon his departure, and the directors of the board of city development presented him with a handsome present at his final meeting.

JAP TROOPS BOMB CHINA RAIL CENTER

200,000 Japs Converge
On Suchow From
All Sides

SHANGHAI, May 17 (AP)—Japanese artillery bombarded Suchow, central China railway junction and objective of five months of bloody fighting, a Japanese communique said tonight.

Two Japanese columns are reported within firing distance of Suchow. Japanese sources said that Chinese soldiers, as well as civilians, were in wild retreat to the southeast.

Two hundred thousand Japanese converged from all sides today on Suchow, with one force of the invaders poised for a direct attack on the vital railway junction.

Japanese troops fighting from the southwest, reported they were within 10 miles of Suchow, which is 330 miles northwest of Shanghai, and that it was "only a matter of hours" before they would unlimber their guns on the city itself.

The commander of this force said the Chinese defenders about the strategic city were clearly visible from his newly won position on a low mountain range near the Suchow-Siaohsien highway.

Inside the ever-tightening Japanese movement were an estimated 240,000 Chinese defenders seeking desperately to stave off the fall of the nerve center of the Central China war front.

Spread out over a 40-mile radius were the Japanese whose spokesmen declared the Chinese must now "surrender or perish."

The declaration was made before the largest number of oil men ever to attend a monthly meeting of the railroad commission.

Bound to St. Paul for delivery to the Northwest Airlines, the plane left at 1:40 in the afternoon. Company officials said that there was scant hope that the plane made a forced landing in the desert.

ELLENBERGER IS TOPPED AT 4,077 FEET

Prospects For Good
Deep Production
Are Indicated

Wittmer Oil and Gas Properties No. 1 Williams, north of Putnam two miles, was shut down awaiting seven-inch OD pipe after touching the Ellenberger lime with a promising showing for high gravity oil. The lime was topped at 4,077 feet and drilled probably less than six inches. Cuttings of Ellenberger revealed much free oil and the drill was greasy.

The well was drilled to 4,036 feet in ten-inch hole and reduced there to eight inch. Two carloads of seven-inch OD pipe are en route and this will be run at 4,077 as soon as it arrives. No further drilling will probably be done until Friday, operators said.

The well, in rank Ellenberger wildcat territory, is located in Section 2269 in the TE&L survey. It is viewed as one of the most important deep tests in this section and as a producer would open up a large territory to deep drilling.

ODESSA, May 17 (AP)—The body of Grady Bell, 49, Midland, was found hanging in the Ector county jail today.

Heavy Rains Send Buffalo Bayou On A Big Rise

HOUSTON, May 17 (AP)—Heavy rains totaling more than six inches sent the Buffalo Bayou on a rise, delaying traffic in parts of Houston, and caused some crop damage in south Texas today.

Strong winds buffeted parts of the Texas coast, but sunshine replaced the clouds in most sections and no serious floods are expected.

7 Killed in London Subway Crash

LONDON, May 17 (AP)—At least seven persons were killed, and scores injured, today in a rear-end crash between two crowded subway trains. Wild panic followed the crash which was the worst in London's subway history.

Trading on American Welfare?

The American nation, not merely the industrial leaders and those who hold investments in industry, have a fundamental interest in the welfare of American industry, and if Mr. Lewis is planning a strategy to threaten their benefits from a rising tide of industrial activity in behalf of his own ambitions, a forceful public opinion to impress him sufficiently with his irresponsibility.

Canning Products Insures "Margin Of Safety"

EASTLAND, May 17.—Canning of vegetables in Eastland county is well started as gardens recover from the freeze.

"Most gardens had to be planted over," she said, "but vegetables are growing so fast that in a few days we will scarcely know there was a freeze."

Ordinarily the only two kinds of hoppers that eat crops are the "jumbies" and the yellow flying ones but other species do lots of damage to pasture grasses.

Eastland county farmers are reminded that the government grasshopper poison mixing plant will be open each Tuesday and Thursday afternoon from 1 o'clock p. m. to 5 p. m. unless there ceases to be a demand for poison.

"AN ORDINANCE DESIGNATING AND DEFINING CERTAIN ACTS AS A NUISANCE, PROHIBITING THE PERPETRATION THEREOF, PROVIDING A PUNISHMENT THEREFOR AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The practice of being in and upon private residences in the City of Cisco, Eastland County, Texas, by solicitors, peddlers, hawkers, itinerant merchants, and transient vendors of merchandise, not having been requested or invited so to do by the owner or occupant of such premises, for the purpose of soliciting orders for the sale of goods, wares, and merchandise, and/or for the purpose of disposing of and/or peddling or hawk-ing the same, is hereby declared to be a nuisance and punishable as a misdemeanor.

Section 2. The Chief of Police and Police Force of the City of Cisco are hereby required and directed to suppress the same and to abate any such nuisance as is described in the first section of this ordinance.

Section 3. Any person convicted of perpetrating a nuisance as described in the first section of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in a sum not to exceed \$100.00.

Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance, are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

RANCHES TOLD SEEDS BEST TO USE

Eastland county ranchers and livestock farmers who plan to re-seed part of their pasture land by the use of grass or legume seed in connection with the 1938 range program are being advised by the county agent that the county agricultural conservation committee has recommended the use, where adapted, of any one or combination of the following: Rescue grass, Bernuda grass, Italian rye grass, bur clover, black medic, and annual sweet clover.

Ranchers who use this practice in connection with the range program will receive 20 cents per pound of seed sown, but not in excess of \$2 per acre. The practice must be used in combination with contour listing, furrowing, or ridging.

RESUCE GRASS SEED GATHERED

Several hundred pounds of rescue grass seed have been gathered along roads and fence rows in Eastland county during the last two weeks by County Agent Cook, who used a group of N. Y. A. workers employed under a soil conservation project. The seed will be used on soil conservation demonstration plots in various parts of the county this fall. In

probably the best grasses for which seed can be obtained.

County Agent Cook is urging farmers and ranchers to gather rescue grass seed along roads and fence rows where seed are now available as they will be shattered in a few days. Rescue grass makes a good late and early spring pasture. The supply of rescue grass seed for sale by dealers is limited this year.

Bernuda and Italian rye grass seed must be bought from dealers who import them. Italian rye is a temporary winter and spring grass but may re-seed itself if grazing is withheld for a short period during the spring.

Bur clover and black medic are very similar and will not thrive unless there is considerable winter rainfall. These and sweet clover seed can be obtained from seed dealers.

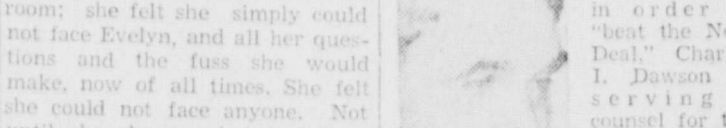
