FLOOD FEAR IS CREATED AT MENARD

A Steady Downpour Here Today Totals About 2 Inches

ABILENE, July 22 (AP)—A West Texas Utilities company dispatcher at Menard reported late this morning the main street of Menard was a running stream and that low residential areas had been evacuated as the San Saba river rampaged.

There was hope the flood crest had passed shortly before noon. The river had fallen a few inches. Several southwest highways were closed by high water.

STEADY RAINS HERE THIS MORNING

Rain in Cisco this morning and early this afternoon totaled approximately two inches, the city hall gauge reported this afternoon. The rain began early this morning and continued throughout the morning, at times very hard, never stopping. At 1:30 it had practically stopped, but heavy clouds gave indications the rain was not over. City officials reported today Lake Cisco had not benefited much from the rain. It had risen slightly, it was said.

Today's rain brought the total for the week to about four inches, including the heavy rainfall Monday and a light shower Wednesday afternoon.

The total for the year is approximately 19 inches. Brady, threatened yesterday, was tense today as waters crept near the top of the levee.

Reporting beneficial rains during the night were Sherman, Corsicana, Dallas, Wichita Falls, Big Spring and Abilene.

Mrs. Qualls Is Reported to Be Out of Danger

Mrs. Herman Qualls today was reported out of danger in a San Angelo hospital. She and Mr. Qualls were injured in a head-on collision Sunday afternoon near San Angelo. Mr. Qualls, known here as "Red," suffered a broken knee cap and will be unable to resume his work in Wink for six or eight weeks.

Dan Yarbrough, brother of Mrs. Qualls and son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Yarbrough of Cisco, was still in the hospital today. He was riding with Mr. and Mrs. Qualls at the time of the wreck and received a severe scalp cut, it was said, and an injured right arm. He was first reported only slightly injured. He is not in a serious condition, however, it was stated.

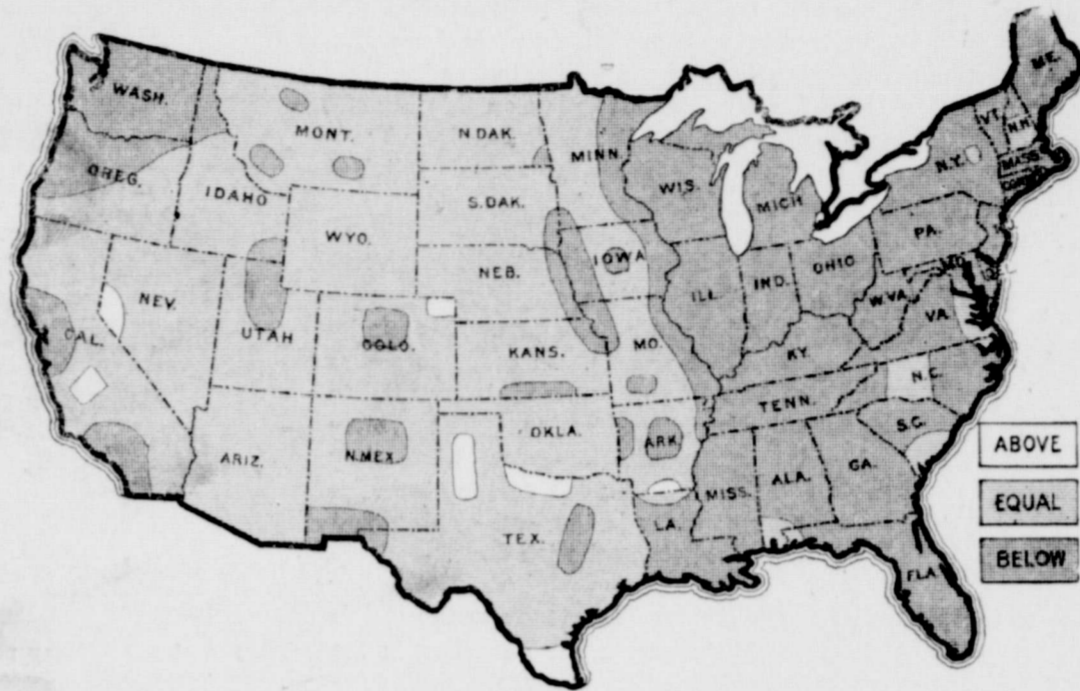
Tri-Church Services on Lawn Sunday Night

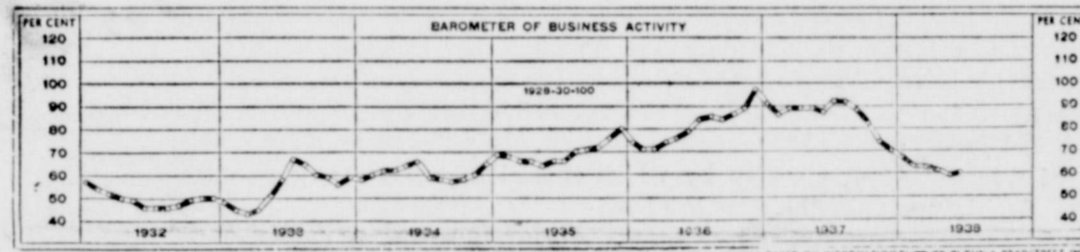

GERMAN SHIP SPANS OCEAN

Catapult Flying Boat Lands Today

PORT WASHINGTON, N. Y., July 22 (AP)—Germany's huge catapult flying boat Nordmeer alighted at 8:42 a. m. today after a non-stop flight of 2,397 miles from Azores in 17 hours and 42 minutes. It was tossed into the air at 3 p. m. yesterday from the mother steamer Schwabenland at Horta, Azores.

The flight began eight minutes before the Mercury arrived here yesterday. The Nordmeer was powered by four oil-burning Diesel engines. The crew was headed by Captain Joachim von Blankenburg; there were three others. The catapult ship Friesenland which next week tosses the Nordmeer into the air for a return trip, is already here. This was the first of 14 Luftwaffe experimental flights scheduled during this summer.

Repayment of Six Million in Levies Planned

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—Internal revenue officials today were planning a system of making repayment on the \$6,000,000 collected under repealed cotton and tobacco levies. It was passed in 1934. The recent congress ordered repayments. The Texas collection for the past two years was some \$341,000.

Disputed District Is Being Occupied By Soviet Troops

TOKYO, July 22 (AP)—Statements of Japanese official spokesmen tonight indicated Japan entertained no intention of forcing the issue with Soviet troops' occupation of the disputed district near the junction of Siberia, Korea and Manchoukuo. They said the border question could be disregarded for the time being. They refused to announce Japan's next move. "All we can say is that great patience is necessary," they said. The Tokyo press continued to report concentration of the Soviet military and naval forces near the danger point.

Violation of Holding Co. Act Is Charged

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Securities and exchange commission in a bill of complaint filed in the federal district court here today, charged an associated gas and electric system of violation of the public utility holding company act and the securities act. Balloting Likely Will Be Cut in Cisco By Adverse Weather

AUSTIN, July 22 (AP)—Although the weatherman predicted a majority of Texas voters would ballot tomorrow under cloudy skies and showers, it appeared certain that the democratic primary would exceed a million votes for the third time in history. It would perhaps surpass the all-time high of two years ago.

Today everyone wondered: "Who can beat O'Daniel?" Thompson, McCraw and Hunter are generally conceded his best opposition. All are claiming a victory. Ballot-counting was expected to be slow; the vote heavy because of the unusual number of candidates. It may be late Sunday or Monday before the public knows the results.

WEATHER MAY CUT VOTE HERE

reshers Through Moran Section

Harvesters in the Moran section have been pulled into sheds for the 1938 harvest season. Moran had one of the largest harvests in history planted to wheat and oats this year, and despite a hard late freeze, grasshopper infestation and wet weather, secured the second largest crop. The shipment thus far is 69 cars. The last car was shipped last week. Many farmers have been expecting a better crop later. When this wheat is harvested, the 1938 total will be increased considerably. It is estimated that at least six more cars will be shipped in the next few weeks, which will bring the total to 75 cars.

Rich Well Tests 288 Barrels in 24 Hours

G. Willard Rich No. 1 M. and J. W. Andrews, section 39, block 7, T&P Ry. survey, has been given an official test. The test, according to information received here, was 288 barrels for 24 hours. This well, located six miles east of Moran across the Stephens county line, was drilled in about four weeks ago. It has been tied in with storage tanks and will run around 100 barrels allowable.

CISCO SCOUTS AT CAMP SAFE

Producing from the Lake sand, this well has created considerable interest in this territory. This is the first producer from this horizon in the Moran section, and will in all probability lead to much drilling during the next few months. Mr. Rich and associates have staked a second location west of the discovery well which will be spudded in in the near future, according to information received here. There has been considerable leasing in that territory, with land not under lease west of the Andrews being taken.

Marooned, But Have Food, Reported

Good Producer The Rich is one of the finest producers found here in some time. Being found just below the Caddo lime, it hasn't been given much chance in this area. Most of the deeper wells stopped in the Caddo. The Rich is only a foot in the pay, with very little gas. Should there have been an appreciable amount of gas in the sand, the well would have flowed at a (CONTINUED ON PAGE FOUR)

Moran Cotton Acreage Very Light This Year

Cotton acreage is lightest Moran has had in many years.

Text: Judges 7:4-7, 15-23

THE story of Gideon's army would seem to be almost without parallel in the history of military strife, though it has records of moral endeavor and triumph.

Napoleon is credited with the cynical remark that "God is on the side of the great battalions." That, in general, is the world's estimate—that might not only makes right, but that might makes for success and power.

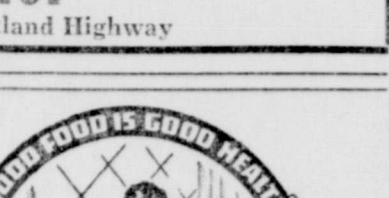

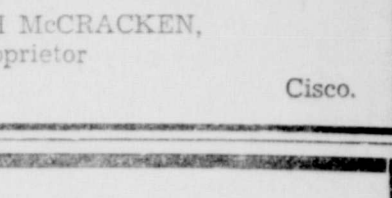

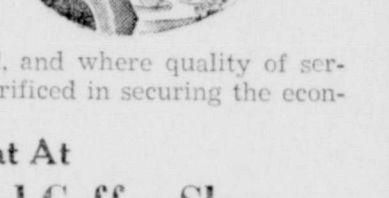

Instead of getting this increase, the railroad commission cooperated with the citizens of Cisco in getting a substantial decrease in gas rates.

Both Col. Thompson and Mr. Terrell have a full understanding of the problems effecting our particular community and have at all times fully cooperated with the citizens in endeavoring to get development in this area and keeping our gas rates at a reasonable figure.

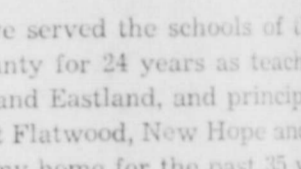
