Situation in Flood Area Is Improved

SAN SABA, July 25 (AP)—The Southwest Texas flood situation was greatly improved at noon today despite heavy rains which fell last night.

The San Saba river was at a standstill at San Saba. A large part of the town remained under water.

At Menard the San Saba had receded to the bank and the danger was believed past.

At Brady the Brady creek was back in its channel.

At Llano the Llano river was reported receding.

The situation along the Colorado river was growing worse this afternoon.

Meteorologists said a flood greater than the great 1936 one was in prospect.

The river at Austin was already 10 feet above flood state, and the 32-foot crest was expected there late today or early tomorrow.

Over 250 Due For FFA Camp At Lake Cisco

The annual Future Farmer encampment to be held at Lake Cisco August 4, 5, and 6 will attract at least 250 boys from over this area, T. G. Caudle, vocational agriculture instructor of Cisco, said today.

In response to inquiries sent them agricultural instructors in this section have answered giving the approximate number from their city who plan to attend. Between 240 and 250 have already reported they plan to attend, and several more are due.

The camp will be three days of recreation for the boys; there will be little instruction with competitive sports contests to be featured.

Horse shoe and washer pitching, swimming, diving, skating, soft ball, boxing, racing and water polo are included in the list of contests. Awards will be given the best agriculture student and the best Future Farmer.

Meals this year will be served in the mess hall of the Presbyterian camp site.

Burkett and Sellers Remain in Race in 107th District

Additional returns tabulated by the democratic county committee at Eastland today did not change the results reported Saturday night in the county and district races. County Chairman Oscar Lyerla said that a complete tabulation would not be available before tomorrow.

Only one run-off will be held in the strictly county races. John White will oppose Curley Maynard in the August primary for nomination as district clerk.

In the legislative contests Omar Burkett of Cisco will face Wayne Sellers of Rising Star in an August primary contest for nomination to the legislature from the 107th floratorial district, comprising Eastland and Callahan counties.

By a coincidence the Burkett and Sellers vote in Callahan county, with all returns complete except for one small box, was tied. Each received 875 votes. Tip Ross received 549 votes in that county and Ed Curry 457 on the basis of the same returns.

T. C. Williams won the Eastland county superintendent's race with a majority of 484 votes with all returns except Kokomo figured in to the tabulation.

Rest of Races Same

The remainder of the races furnished the same results as reported Saturday night. Sheriff Loss Woods winning renomination handily over Virge Foster, with Foster for Garland Branton of totals 4,432 for Woods and 1,569 for Foster.

Rising Star winning over both Mrs. Frances Cooper and W. O. Weekes with 3,169 for Branton, 7,667 for Mrs. Cooper and 1,035 for Weekes.

Crossley was assured of election as representative from the 106th legislative district, comprising Eastland county only, by a large margin.

In high good humor over the outcome of the gubernatorial race, he said, "The victory is unparalleled not only in the state, but in the nation."

"His friends should see that delegates are elected who are friendly to his program," the governor said.

39 KILLED BY BOMB BLAST

Worst Explosion of Palestine Crisis

HAIFA, July 25 (AP)—A bomb blasted a crowded Arab market today for the second time in a month. Thirty-nine Arabs were killed and 50 or 60 wounded.

It was the worst explosion since the crisis. In the same spot, 23 were killed July 6.

New racial clashes followed the explosion. Traffic was suspended and many were injured in the rioting.

As the troops rushed to northern Palestine, the tension spread.

Scouts Back From Flood Area; One of 68 Marooned Tells Today of His Experiences

Editor's Note — The following story was written by Evatt Horne, one of the leaders who attended Camp Billy Gibbons with Cisco scouts, and is one of the 68 trapped by the raging flood waters of the Brady creek. His story begins with the arrival of the second party of Cisco scouts who arrived late Tuesday night and did not go on to camp until Wednesday.

By EVATT HORNE Troop Four of Cisco carried their camping equipment across

the waist-deep, swiftly flowing waters of Brady Creek Wednesday morning. Later in the day, the water reached the low point of the whole camp and the troop from Rising Star succeeded in getting a truck of equipment across the water.

A rise of about three feet in five minutes trapped the boys and truck in the camp until Sunday. This sudden rise in the Brady and small creeks on the other side of Camp Billy Gibbons left the boys in camp temporarily marooned except for messages that could be signalled with bugles and flags.

The water was not over six feet

deep at that time, but the current was flowing from 15 to 20 miles an hour, so it could not be forded.

Wednesday ended as a usual rainy day, with everyone expecting the water to go down and the camp to continue normally. Rains that night pushed the creek further up the banks, though. A good amount of canned goods and staples were left from the previous camp, but Thursday the sixty-eight scouts and scouters were limited to two meals a day. Limited as this menu was, there was no complaining. Everyone was thankful for that much.

Friday the Brady forced those in the lower part of camp to pack their equipment and move hastily up the hill. Both of the Cisco troops were already on high ground, so they were not forced to move. Friday, the dwindling supplies were supplemented by a beef and 100 lbs. of flour. The beef was killed on the ranch and the flour was packed for 26 miles over rough trails and swollen creeks.

Brooks Ahead in Race for Lieutenant Gov.; Woodul Leads Mann

BULLETIN The latest gubernatorial count early this afternoon placed O'Daniel's majority at 26,220.

DALLAS, July 25 (AP)—Returns of the Texas election bureau at 11 a. m. today showed 246 out of 254 counties had reported, 85 complete.

For governor, Karl Crowley had 13,883, Hunter had 90,758, McCraw had 123,072, W. Lee O'Daniel had 448,267, Thompson had 173,517. All others were far behind.

For lieutenant governor Pierce Brooks' ballots totaled 230,888. Coke Stevenson was second with 204,534. Nelson was next with 170,675. The others were trailing far behind.

In the attorney general's race Gerald Mann had 251,366, with Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul leading him by a vote of 265,785. Ralph Yarborough had 171,382, with the others far behind.

O'Daniel's majority continued to increase as more returns were received, a report said.

DALLAS, July 25 (AP)—Apparent elimination of Representative Morgan Sanders, slated to become chairman of the powerful house ways and means committee, momentarily overshadowed the governor's race today.

Eastland County May Enter WTCC Contest

A meeting has been called for Tuesday afternoon by the Eastland chamber of commerce and County Agent Elmo V. Cook for discussion of plans for the county to join in the West Texas chamber of commerce and water utilization contest of 1938, it was announced Saturday.

The meeting will begin at 3:30 in the county courtroom. The purpose of the contest, declared Agent Cook, is to encourage the conserving and rebuilding of Eastland county soil by terracing, contour farming, winter cover crops and soil building crops practices.

Prizes in the contest, according to WTCC notices, are \$500, \$300 and \$200 for first, second and third, respectively.

Arch Bint, commissioner of Precinct 4, and T. G. Caudle, Cisco vocational agriculture instructor, will attend the meet.

WEEK'S RAIN IS 6 INCHES

More Falls Saturday, This Morning

While various sections of the state have reported heavy rain during the past week, Cisco and the surrounding area hasn't been slighted.

Since last Monday, one of the heaviest weeks of rainfall of the year, if not the hardest, has come and gone. Six inches of rain has fallen during the week.

Monday downpours during the afternoon totaled 1.8 inches. Wednesday late 2 more fell and Friday 2.3 was recorded. Saturday night another 1.2 fell and this morning another half inch brought the total to six inches.

The lake Saturday morning showed a rise of between 15 and 16 inches. Since then over an inch and a half has fallen and it was believed this morning the Saturday night and Monday morning rains have increased this total.

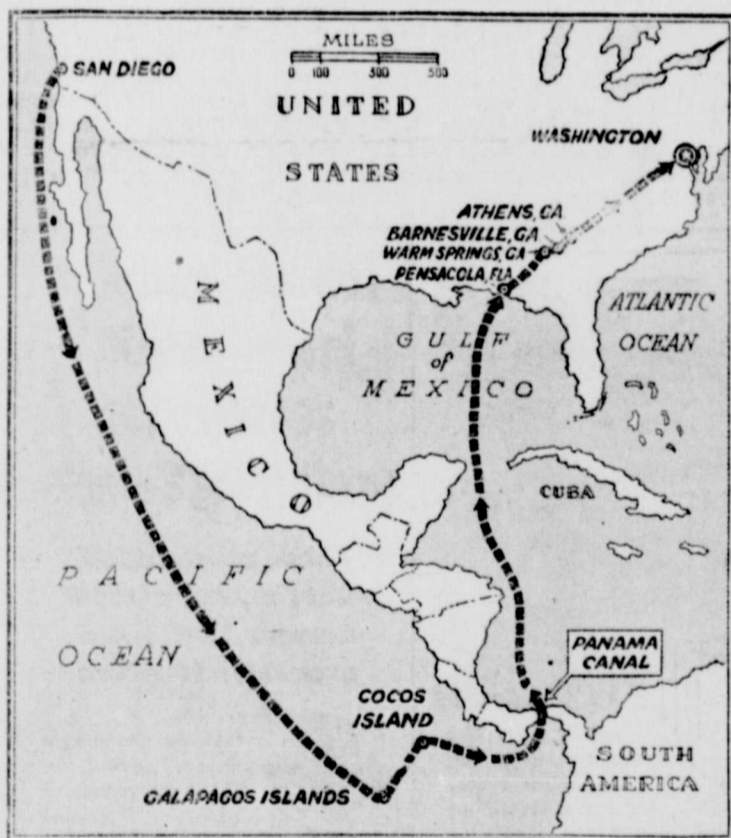

mess hall. The walls were washed out by the swiftly flowing water, causing the main part of the structure to collapse. The next morning, a wrecking crew of scouts salvaged what was left and carried it to higher ground. The stoves were salvaged and a complete kitchen was quickly erected far up the hill. Early Saturday morning, some of the camp staff who had been trapped on the other side of the creek arrived by way of Brady after half a day and a night of travel. Later in the day, a coast guard plane caused considerable excitement when it dropped a flood warning. The waters that ran through Brady had not yet reached camp, and cut off from quick communication with the outside world as we were, we did not know the seriousness of the floods coming. Nevertheless, as soon as the warning was received, the entire camp moved to the surrounding hills. Saturday night water in the town of Brady rose six feet up in the court house. Leaders of the camp did not know this at the time, but they decided that it would be best to hike out of camp and come back when the waters had gone down. The scouts were fed a hearty meal of beef, biscuit and rice Sunday morning. Twelve miles of hiking over hills and through mud and rain brought the scouts to a road over which a truck could travel. Despite the many mud-holes the truck had to be aided through, Brady was finally reached. The flood waters had receded there, but it is probable that they rose to a new high on the site of Camp Billy Gibbons after the scouts left. From Brady the scouts were taken to Brownwood.

High water and intense rain broke up what would have been one of the biggest camps in Billy Gibbons territory, but they definitely proved the value of scout training. Very few got sick and they were not seriously ill. Despite continued rain, everyone stayed fairly dry and in high spirits. The camp equipment was left where it will be high and dry. It will be removed when the creek waters can be crossed.

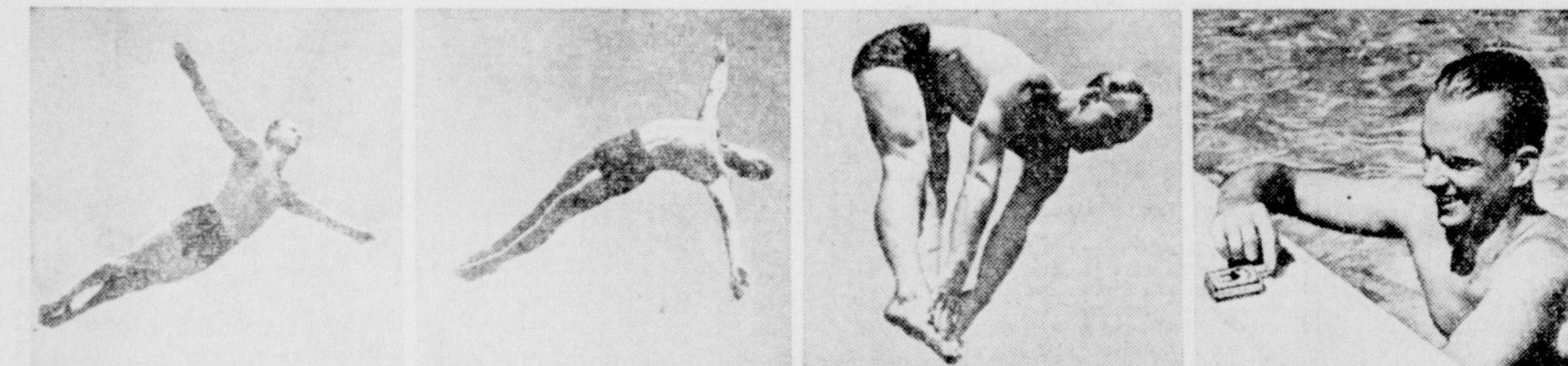
