

Man Says er Red Cross Is Needed

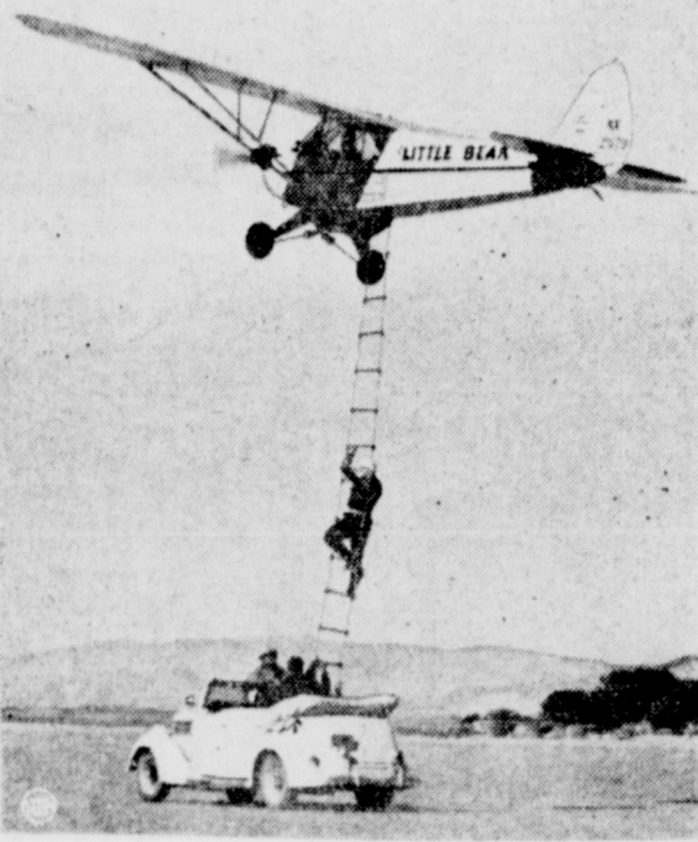
Red Cross membership in proportion to the population of Texas is necessary expansion of services with this coming year. Cross membership in Texas represents only 2.9 per cent of the population while the enrollment is 4.38 per cent, a statement issued by Red Cross Chairman R. C. Eastland said.

Organization hopes for an enrollment of 50,000 members or more in the 239 chapters of every county and residents of every county an opportunity and of joining the Red Cross roll call from Armistice to Thanksgiving. Last year 172,067—not as many as in some of our largest cities—answered the roll call of chapters; but, this was an increase of 36,000 over the previous year, hence encouraging.

Chapters are dependent on enrollment each year for their two-year life. They are dependent on disaster relief and Cross safety, health, and welfare services respective communities. A portion of membership fees are kept by the chapters in excess of \$1.00 are \$0.50 cents for each member to the National Red Cross for administration of work throughout the smaller contributions are fifty cents.

National allotment reverts to Red Cross work in communities. In the last one-half year, for example, National Organization for the Blind raised \$253,773 to add to the \$46 million within Texas for relief and rehabilitation of Texas families stricken by disaster.

Her pilots bail out in parachutes and climb back in with rope ladders, but a tiny plane seeking the endurance flight record above Rosamond Dry Lake near Lancaster, Calif., flies on. Here you see, in a stunt reminiscent of Hollywood's most daring efforts, Pilot Tommy Smith clambering from a speeding auto, up a rope ladder, and back into the plane from which he bailed out at 2000 feet four days ago when he became ill. Harley Long relieved Smith at the controls when Smith bailed out, and Clyde Schlieper, who had been alternating with Long and Smith at the controls for nearly a week, also bailed out shortly before Smith re-boarded the plane.

"During the first nine months of this year the Red Cross assisted 3,029 Texas families, which included more than 13,000 persons, who suffered losses caused by six tornadoes and three floods. The \$65,125 contributed by Texans (Texas was asked for \$100,000) was augmented by \$36,017 from National headquarters to provide necessary medical care, food, clothing, shelter, replacement of household goods, livestock, implements and other equipment to enable stricken families to again 'get on their feet.' To bring it closer home; before the government took over the 'relief' problem, Eastland county on account of drought, sent out an SOS call and the Red Cross responded to the tune of \$55,000 in food, clothing and other necessary relief which many of us have forgotten about.

Baylor Eleven On Way to Coast Game With Loyola

WACO, Nov. 9—Baylor university's Grizzlies, 28 strong and jubilant after a thrilling 14-3 victory over the University of Texas Saturday, today rode toward California for an inter-sectional game with the Loyola university Lions in Los Angeles Friday.

The coast bound Bruins left Waco Monday afternoon and spent the night in San Antonio. They are scheduled to arrive in Tucson, Ariz., Wednesday morning where they will work out on the University of Arizona gridiron that afternoon. This drill on the field which annually supports more grid cleats than any other college turf will be their only practice session before they arrive in Los Angeles Thursday.

This 1500 mile trip to the coast will be the longest made by a Bruin eleven since the Bears played Boston college in far away New England in 1922. In addition to the 28 players, the crew making the trip includes Coaches Morley Jennings, Bill Henderson and Ralph Wolfe, Mike Ducey, student manager, and Charles Black, student publicity man.

With the exception of Hoyt Williams, veteran pivot man left behind with torn leg tendons and cartilages, the Bruin squad is in perfect condition and anxious to duplicate their 27-13 victory over the Lions in Beaumont last year.

Spectacular passing tactics of the Bears' Bullet Bill Patterson are expected to draw a capacity crowd for the Armistice day performance.

HUNTING REGULATIONS Turkey and Deer Laws Listed

With hunting season approaching hunters are beginning to think of the trips into the deer and turkey country. The guns are being trained to hit the mark, hunting knives sharpened, camping equipment assembled and other equipment put in readiness. In this hustle and bustle hunters are likely to forget certain laws regarding wild turkey, and deer. A game warden meeting you at a very unexpected moment might ruin the pleasure of the whole trip; so please check and be sure that you have all the laws down in your mind regarding the species that you are going to hunt and all the laws regarding the species in the country in which you are going to hunt. Doing it this way one will have only a few laws to remember. Get a game law digest and be on the safe side.

Deer and Wild Turkey

Season opens on white-tailed deer and wild turkey on November 16, and closes on December 31. Black tailed deer or mule deer season will open east of the Pecos river on November 16 and closes December 31. Black tailed or mule deer season will open west of the Pecos river November 16 and will close on November 30. Bag limit on white tailed deer is two bucks with pronged antlers per season. Black tailed deer or mule deer only one per season.

Bag limit on wild turkey—three gobblers per season. If automatic or repeating shot guns are used to hunt turkey, they must be permanently plugged to a three shell capacity and not larger than a 10 gauge.

The following counties have no season on wild turkey: Anderson, Armstrong, Austin, Bastrop, Briscoe, Brown, Cass, Coleman, Comal, Cooke, Erath, Fanning, Freestone, Hemphill, Henderson, Hutchinson, Jones, Kent, Leon, Liberty, McCulloch, Marion, Mills, Montague, Montgomery, Nacog-

Don't shoot any gun or firearms in, along, on or across any public road.
Don't possess a deer carcass or green hide with all evidence of sex removed.
Don't kill a doe deer, fawns, or spike bucks.
Don't place deer or turkey on cold storage three days after season closes.
Don't use dogs to hunt deer ex-

cept in the counties of Brazoria, Fort Bend and Matagorda.
Don't kill an antelope, wild sheep, or elk at any time.
Don't forget a game warden might be watching you.
Next week migratory waterfowl regulations will be discussed in this column.
Kill all wild house cats.
